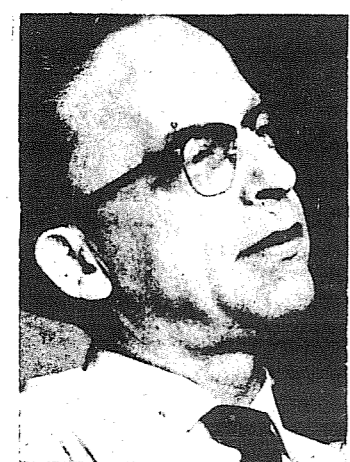

## Future Farmers Week

Future Farmers of America Chapters at Franklin Pierce High School and Bethel High School this week were observing Future Farmers of America Week as proclaimed by Governor Albert D. Rosellini.

The Governor's statement follows: The Future Farmers of America was organized 34 years ago and chartered in Washington State in 1930. The organization since has grown until the membership in this state alone numbers 7,000 youngsters. They take part in the activities of 142 local chapters. In the United States and Puerto Rico there are now 9,000 local chapters with more than 380,000 members.

The State Board for Vocational Education estimates that Future Farmers of America members in 31 years have added some 24 million dollars to Washington State's economy through their supervised farming programs. Many former Future Farmers of America mem-

### Let Me Tell One:

## The Dangers Of Driving

The tragedy of six people, five of them from this area, dead in one accident on our highways is very vivid to the people in the Franklin Pierce area.

Knowing the emotional impact of a tragedy such as this, this might be the time to make another plea to drivers of this state to stop killing themselves and each other.

The fault in the Sunday morning tragedy will not be placed in this column and no judgments will be passed. That will come when the investigations are all in and the courts have had their say.

How can we, who climb into our cars through sheer force of habit each morning, and go through actions which have become routine ever forget that two automobile accidents in this state within a year have had the destructive power to claim 12 lives. And we kill and maim hundreds each year on the country highways.

Our memories must be very short that we can forget (and all of us do if we drive with any regularity) the carnage that visits us each day on the roads we travel. It would seem to me that an automobile trip of any length at all would re-

less of age or conditions. As I said earlier, this column is not a judgment but a plea for those of us who are driving the roads every day to think twice BEFORE we step into our cars and stay aware of the fact that the comfortable buggy we call the family car can be a deadly weapon.

As this is being written Colonel John Glenn is making his scheduled trips around the earth in the Mercury capsule. In this office we were trying to comprehend the awesome speed at which he is traveling. More than 17,000 miles per hour seems as if it should be unattainable and the tremendous power required to place the capsule into orbit would seem out of the reach of mere man to dream about much less put into a usable, workable vehicle.

Pioneers, it seems, are still with us, although their numbers tend to shrink as we expand our horizons into the unknowns around us. The shrinkage comes from lack of applicants, but the room in that capsule was designed for only one man at a time, whereas Columbus had to take quite a few men with him when he sailed off "the edge of the world."

All facilities, service and provisions have been donated to the event so the entire proceeds can go to the Heart Fund.

Services to patients supported by the Pierce County Heart Fund include penicillin twice daily for 500 rheumatic fever patients; physical therapy for stroke victims, a loan closet of hospital equipment for home use; a cardiac work evaluation clinic to issue "work prescriptions" to the unemployed cardiac; a recreation magazine for homebound children; information and referral service to sources of medical and financial aid; blood donor assistance; classes for the handicapped homemaker and for those on special diets.

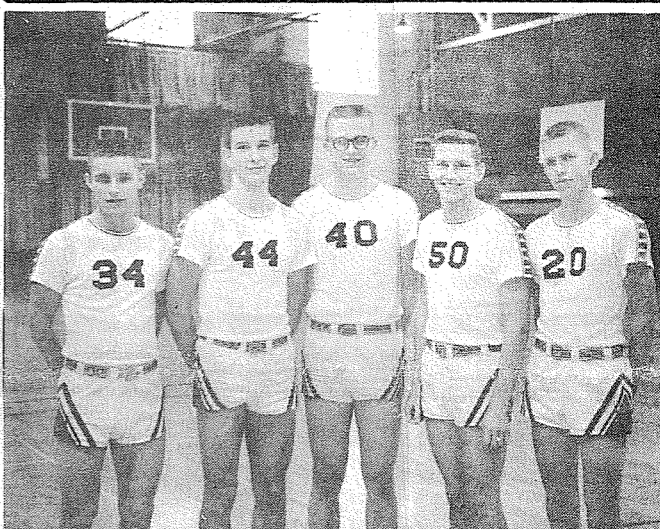

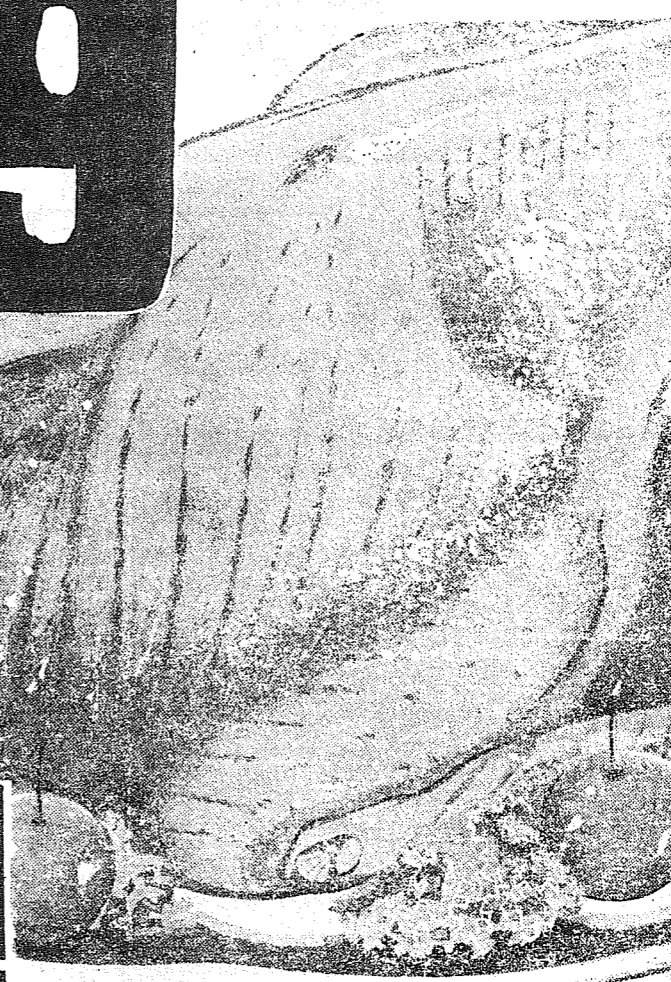

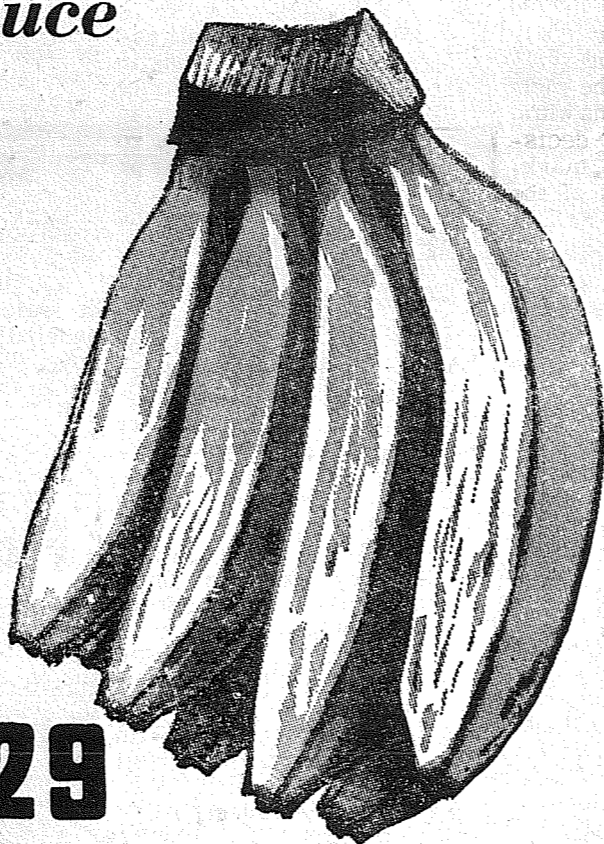

Public officials, civic and business leaders and the press toured pulp and paperboard operations that pump \$8 million annually into the state's economy in the form of wages and salaries.

Upwards of 5,000 persons were expected to tour the mills Saturday during a public open house.

In addition to the paperboard machine, the expansion includes a 38,000-sq.-foot machine room, a quality-control laboratory; six pulp-storage tanks, each with a capacity of about 20 tons; rooms for preparing pulp mixes and paperboard coatings, and a 30,000-sq.-foot warehouse and shipping facility.

The project represents a total investment of about \$10 million and boosted payrolls by \$300,000 a year through the hiring of 41 additional workers.

A primary purpose of the expansion is to permit Weyerhaeuser's Longview branch to develop new grades of lightweight paperboard and new coatings for an expanding market.

"The new machine was designed to have as many features as we could conceivably put on it to develop new grades," explained E. N. Wennberg, Longview pulp and paperboard manager. "But perhaps even more important is the flexibility, economy

and speed with which the new machine can be changed from one type of paperboard product to another in short runs."

Higher-volume orders will be shifted to a bigger machine.

Scheduled to be produced at the Longview branch for the first time are boards for tag, index and post cards; coated cover stock for such uses as menus and children's books; vellum bristol for returnable cards, fancy cards and similar uses; and other coated grades and lightweight specialties.

Coating improves the printing surface of paperboard.

New grades, developed either through customer requests or Weyerhaeuser research, will be run on the new machine, known as No. 5. The machine, 480 feet long, produces a continuous sheet, 10 feet wide, at speeds ranging from 200 to 1,200 feet per minute. Capable of producing 100 tons a day, the machine increased paperboard capacity of the Longview branch 20 per cent.

To assist developing new grades, Weyerhaeuser expanded its pulp, paperboard and container research facilities here under the direction of Dr. John D. clude a pilot-coating machine that duplicates certain operating condition on the new paperboard machine. Experimental grades can be produced on the pilot coater in small quantities for customer trials and later switched to the new

### Money Aid To City Light Customers Who Rewire To Increase Electric Use

Again this year, Tacoma City Light offers customers financial assistance in rewiring their homes to increase electrical capacity or to install electric cooking and water heating. A resolution passed by the Public Utility Board at its last meeting provides \$50.00 to City Light customers who install electric cooking and water heating -- replacing flame-type ranges, and flame-type or side-arm water heaters, changing from a two to three-wire service. Twenty dollars will be paid for installing either the range or water heater under these requirements. This "switch from fire to wire" program will begin May 1, 1962.

On February 15, City Light reinstated its program to help customers who increase their homes' electrical capacity. Under this program on new construction, remodeling or rewiring an existing home, City Light will pay \$50.00 toward installation of a 150-ampere service entrance (fuse box) with 30 kilowatts capacity, using city - approved electric water heater.

City Light will continue to pay \$50.00 to builders and home owners meeting the Gold Medallion, all-electric requirements.

The Utility Board also announced that City Light would provide some 300 major electric appliances for use in home economics classes at schools in Tacoma and certain suburban areas.

Annually these programs generate thousands of dollars of new business for appliance dealers, plumbing and electrical contractors and others.

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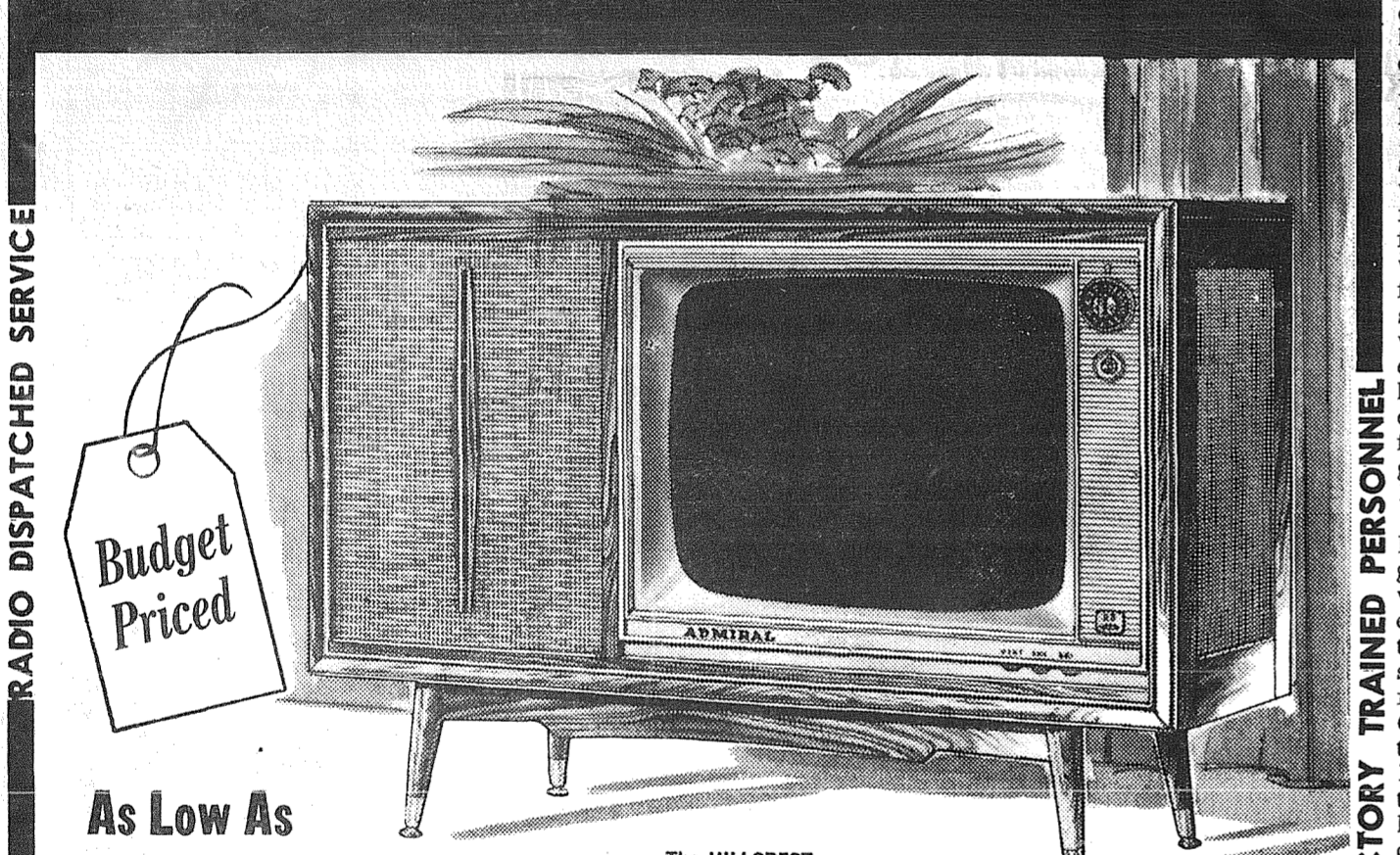
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## a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

"The first child born in 1962 will owe \$1,603," said the COFC of the United States. "So will every other child born during the year. That figure is the per capita share of the public debt. Let's not make it bigger.

"The dollar, 100 cents purchasing power at the beginning of this century, has 28 cents today (the two bit dollar is almost at hand). If inflation continues at the rate since the Korean War, the dollar will rot to 16.2 cents at the end of this century.

"The federal debt and guaranteed obligations of the federal government, \$295 billion, surpass by \$42 billion all the debts of all the other countries in the world." And Congress is faced with proposals to increase the debt and annual federal spending by billions.

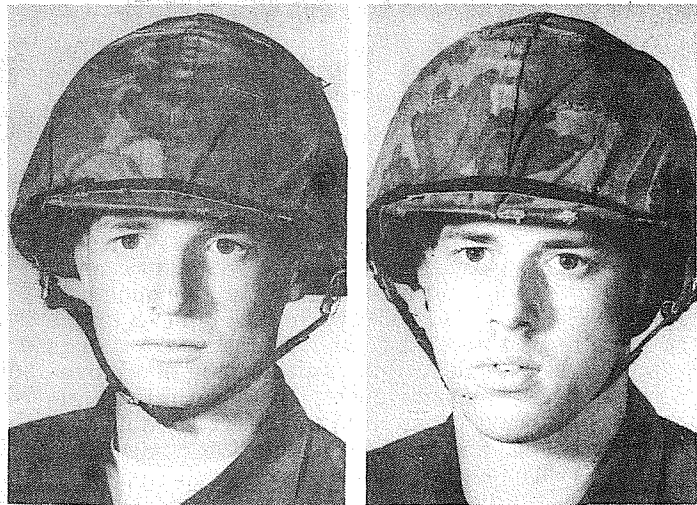
What I would like to know is what will happen to this country when the purchasing power of our dollar hits zero. Seems to me that we're getting too close for comfort. Someone, somewhere, someplace had better start putting on a little braking action or we'll run through the blocks as sure as your born.

Any time you think you know all the answers, start traveling around with your eyes open and you'll see just how little you really understand about what makes this old world tick. The more I see the less esteem I hold for my meager store of knowledge.

Here's one that will interest you gals. The other day I was in a town eating breakfast and looking over the local paper. I noticed that the food ad prices ranged about the same as ours at home. However, the prices in restaurants seemed much lower. I had a couple of poached cackle berries on toast and a cup of mud. The bill came to 45¢ which I sure thought was very reasonable.

The following week end I was in another part of the country and on the way in from the airport I noticed signs on the sandwich boards of a market advertising sugar at 39¢ for five pounds and potatoes at 10 lbs. for 19¢. This sure sounded like easy living to me and I assumed that restaurant prices would probably be proportionately as low.

The next morning I went the hen fruit route again with coffee. When the waitress brought me the bill I practically did slow rolls in the aisle. \$1.85 for two poached eggs on toast and one cup of joe. I'm certainly not smart enough to figure out the answer to an

Public welfare--in many instances--has become a racket and a disgrace in this country. So everyone with a sense of decency and honesty should welcome Welfare Secretary Ribicoff's announced intention to make some drastic changes.

As the Portland Oregonian sums up the Ribicoff program, it will "consist both of administrative actions and requests of Congress for new authority to put relief recipients to work on community projects and bring a halt to the upward surge of relief spending. He hopes to end the phenomenon of chronic relief families who live on handouts from generation to generation, to put a new emphasis on providing incentives for getting off relief and to build a sense of self reliance among relief recipients."

This is an ambitious program, and it won't be easy to put into effect--welfare is shot through and through with politics, for the sad reason that the vote of someone who makes a career of living off the public treasury is as valuable as the vote of anyone else. But it is a program that is damned well needed and long overdue.
