Carol Johnson of Midland will be showing the pictures of her European tour.

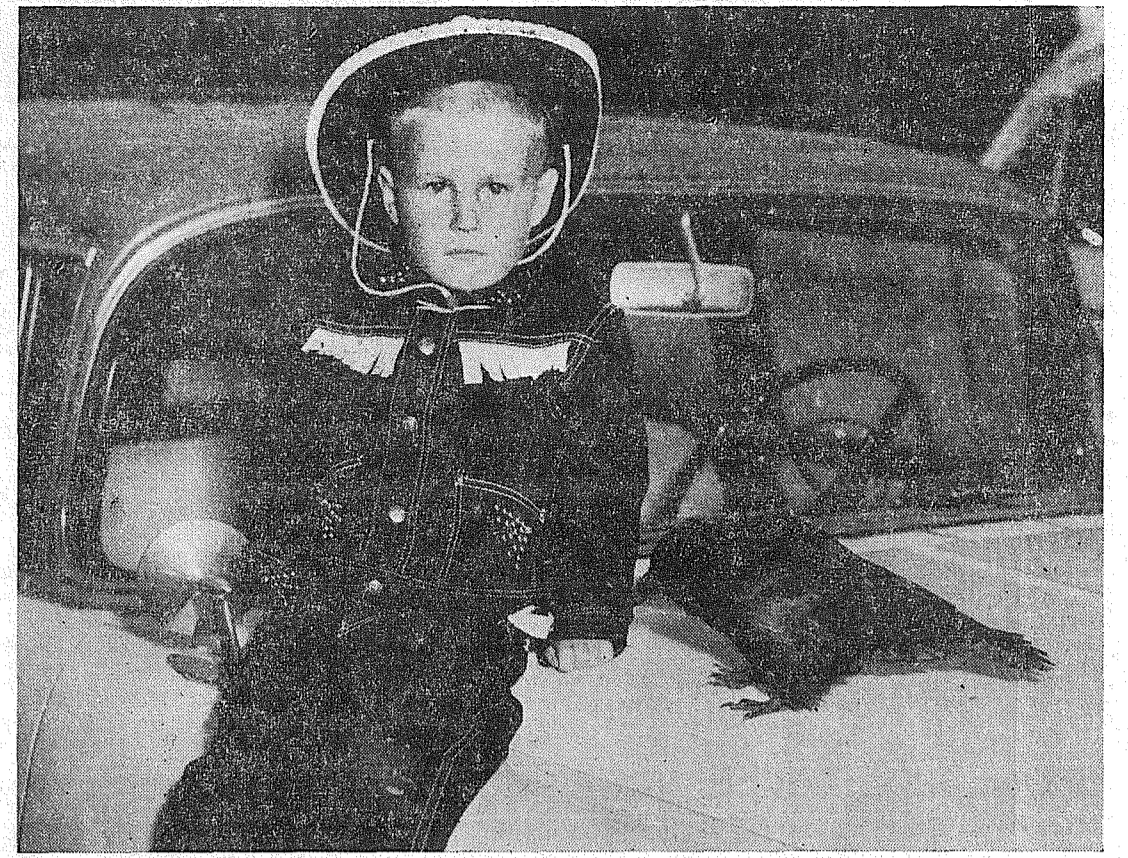
The ladies of the church will serve refreshments at the close of the program.

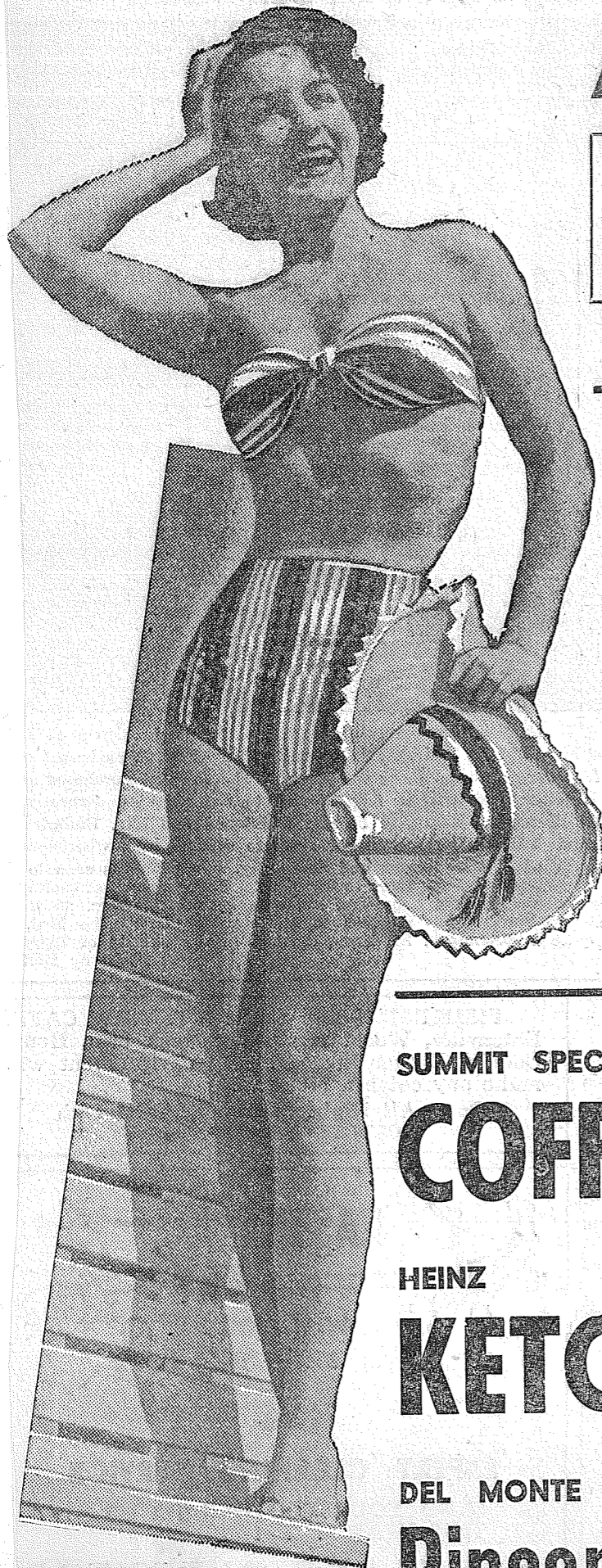

HOOKER of Tacoma, Washington is hereby granted a permit to appropriate the following described public waters of the State of Washington, subject to existing rights and to the following limitations and provisions: Permittee shall construct and maintain at his own expense a weir, or other suitable device, for measuring any water granted herein for irrigation purposes and such appropriation shall be subject to a reasonable rotation system if ordered by the State Supervisor of Water Resources. Diversion intake shall be tightly screened at all times with wire having a mesh opening not greater than .125 (1/8) inch.



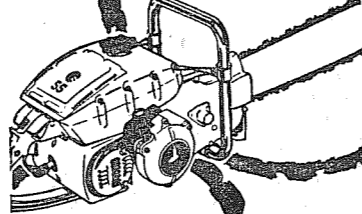

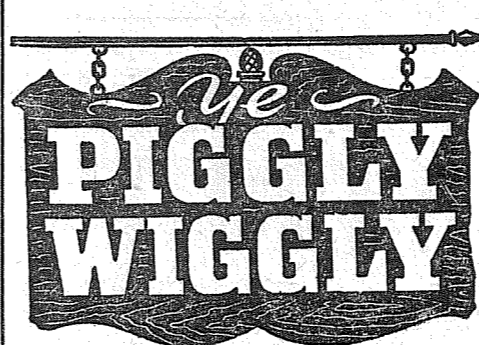

With lowland fishing season just a few days away the Department of Fisheries sent out a release concerning the 1956 salmon season in Washington state. Sports salmon anglers in Washington State during 1956 caught more salmon than in any previous year, with both the chinook catch and that of silvers breaking all records.

Catch estimates, compiled from boathouse reports, boat and creel counts by biologists and patrol officers, show that a total of 681,500 salmon were landed by sportsmen in 1956.

Individual fisherman's "trips" on Puget Sound were estimated at 752,000, at Westport, 100,000. These, plus trips to La Push, Columbia River, Tokeland and by stream anglers, bring the total of individual trips near the million mark.

The silver catch totaled 357,850, chinook landings, 323,350. Chinook catches, particularly in southern Puget Sound and Elliott Bay, included many marked fish, identifying them as products of department plants. Marked chinook reported from Deschutes River releases exceeded 2,500.

Total catch in Puget Sound, from Port Townsend inside, was 416,300 (202,300 chinook, 214,000 silvers). Neah Bay catch included 9,250 chinook and 18,500 silvers for a total of 27,750 and the inner Straits of Juan de Fuca and San Juan islands contributed 13,750 chinook and 13,500 silvers for a total of 32,250.

County Agent's Corner

Though farmers are traditionally over-worked and underpaid, all of them benefit as a result of the community and general organization efforts by some of them.

Just now John Rasmussen and I. L. Larson of Roy, Chester Gibbs of Buckley and Maurice De Mynck of South Prairie are taking valuable personal time to call on neighbor dairymen for the purpose of enlisting them in the Pierce County unit of the Washington State Dairy Federation.

Though an individual farmer

can be vocal and draw attention to a bad situation he needs the benefit of organization to support his cause.

Recently an Orting dairyman purchased a truckload of Eastern Washington alfalfa. He experienced sick cows and reduced milk checks as the direct result of cattle poisoning from eating lupine (a poison weed) that was present in considerable quantity in the purchased hay.

One of the immediate objectives of the local organizing Federation group is to seek hay grading and the imposing of more responsibility on the seller.

Disease control program, milk marketing, inspection and legislation are other problem fields for dairymen that the organizing committee feels the new Dairy

Federation unit can deal with effectively for the benefit of dairy farmers.

Why do 4-H boys and girls learn to judge their products? This is a question which people often ask. The answer to this question is to acquire the ability to make wise decisions based on understanding and facts. If you can help boys and girls learn to choose what will be most useful and what will give lasting satisfaction, they have gained much in day by day living.

The members of 4-H judge by comparing one article or product with another, or with a standard. Keeping in mind the whole

is more important than its parts, a person judging must consider how the article is to be used. He must be able to state the reasons on which the opinion is based also.

The goals in judging are to measure the workmanship, sharpen the power of observation and improve the project and methods. The effect of the experience of judging is what the 4-H program values most. The aims are fair play, respect for the opinion of others, keeping an open mind, backing the opinions by reasons and willingness to try again.

The value of judging articles of clothing was demonstrated to a 4-H club in Midland by the leader Mrs. Robert Lewis. Work articles such as pin cushions, tea

towels, pot holders and aprons were judged by the members who made them. As a practice for future judging, the 10 members also placed skirts which they had made. Reasons of the judging and suggestions for improvement were also discussed. The philosophy of judging and the practical approach of facing a problem and making a choice gives 4-H members wisdom in project work as well as ability and self-confidence. Just one more way in which 4-H'ers help "make the best better."

School Bonds To Lower '58 Taxes

By Morris Ford, Superintendent of Franklin Pierce School District No. 402

Your local School Board has by resolution declared a bond election necessary to insure that adequate educational opportunities be available to your children, and have established Tuesday, May 21st, as the day that this issue should be brought to the people for their decision.

Even though your previous efforts have made available to the district ample funds to obtain state matching monies for the proposed junior high school project, new regulations attached to the \$2 million dollar school construction fund recently passed by the Legislature makes it mandatory that our local district be bonded to the full 10% of its assessed valuation.

The assessed valuation of property within the Franklin Pierce School District is now \$9,705,019.00. Because of this increased valuation it will be necessary to pass an additional \$485,000 bond issue in order for us to be fully bonded to the 10% requirement. This will have no additional effect on your next year's tax statement. In fact, your taxes should reflect a reduction because of the re-instatement of State support for kindergartens. With the State supporting kindergartens, it will eliminate the 5.2 mills that had been needed for this program. When this new bond issue appears on the tax rolls in 1959, the additional millage necessary to redeem all bonds passed by the district should be approximately 2 mills.

This most important of all bond elections effects our entire future educational program in Franklin Pierce. Without it the District will receive no state

matching monies and the junior high cannot be built. With the bond issue the district could receive 9 dollars of state money for every 1 dollar of district money.

A new junior high school is a MUST beginning with the 1958-59 school year. The completion of Brookdale will partially solve our student housing problem for the 1957-58 school year. However, even with Brookdale, the 7th and 8th grades from Parkland will still be housed at the high school. Beginning in September of 1958 the high school will need all its classrooms, and without the junior high a real housing problem will be faced. This will effect every school in the district because the transfer of all 7th and 8th grades to the junior high would make available desperately needed classrooms for the lower grades. Without the bond issue, double

shifting will be necessary in some schools starting in September, 1958.

This bond issue will also furnish funds for the equipment needed in the junior high, and will provide for the procurement of future elementary school sites. It will insure the replacement of old and obsolete desks and other furniture in all of our other buildings, and also the installation of modern lighting in these buildings. Renovation of all district schools, where needed, could be carried out.

In order that this election may be properly validated, it will require that it be voted upon by at least 3,000 persons in this district. All of you are individually challenged to muster your friends and neighbors to come out and vote on this vital issue. All new residents are urged to register.

Let's go forward with our school program.
