

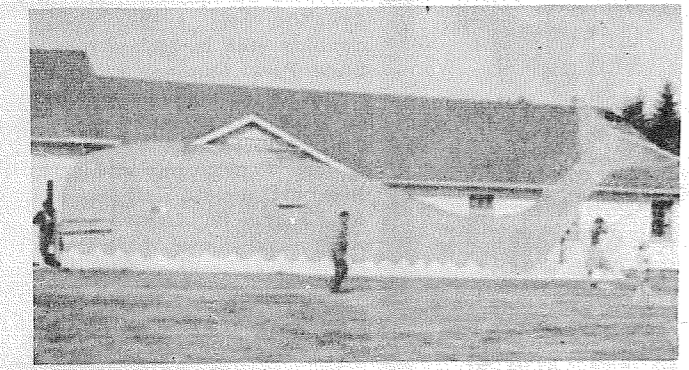

Questionnaire Will Determine Area's Physical Development

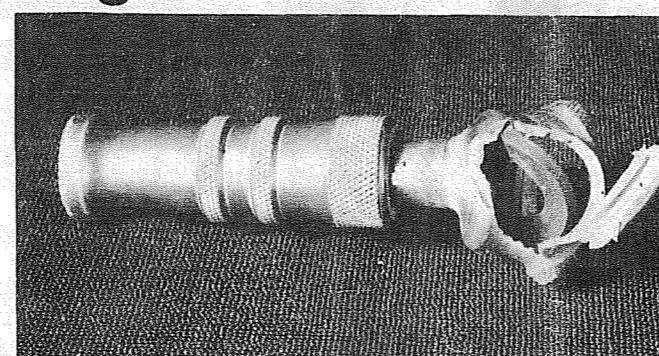
The Pierce County Planning Commission is currently engaged in the formulation of a general physical development plan for the Parkland - Spanaway Communities.

Area Playground Closing Nears Boy Plus Match - Fire

Another summer playground season is approaching the end. Friday, August 11th, marks the final date of supervised play at Dawson Playfield and Gonyea Park. James Sales School Playground will be in operation one week later, running until August 18th.

The ten weeks of activities, conducted under the joint sponsorship of the Franklin Pierce School District and the Pierce County Park Department, began on June 14th. Most of the youngsters find it almost impossible to believe their playground fun is finished and school is just around the corner.

The final weeks will not be void of activity, though. Some of the special features will be a Halloween Preview, Bubble Gum Contest, Farewell Party, and Playground Awards Day. Cookies and other goodies have been promised by interested mothers and ambitious youngsters for the farewell party, which will in itself insure excellent participation. Games and contests of all sorts should also leave boys and girls somewhat saddened to see the summer activities come to an end. Playground awards day is to be held in recognition of those children who have become junior leaders through their helpfulness and

participation in the summer long program. Also, at this time certificates are to be distributed to kids who passed the A.A.U. physical fitness tests.

In these tests the youngsters were judged on their sprint time, walk-run time, sit ups, pull ups, standing broad jump, push ups, baseball throw, distance hike, and running high jump. Many of the children failed the minimum standards of the events the first time around but by the summer's end they had no difficulty at all.

A near tragedy was averted last week when a raging brush fire near 146th and Pacific was battled by volunteer fire fighters until fire trucks could arrive at the scene.

Flames licked menacingly at a house near the blazing lot, but were diminished by workers using shovels and burlap sacks. Three of the four children in the nearby house were immediately carried to safety. The fourth, a little girl, was found hiding under one of the beds. Luckily, the flames never did jump the narrow strip separating the house from the flaming lot.

The Parkland Fire Department was the first to show up, coming out of their area from another fire to help out. Elk Plain arrived a short time later, followed by the Spanaway Dept., which had been fighting a fire in Fredrickson.

At least four other fires were reported during the same day, keeping all available fire departments on the run with more than their share of work.

An ominous note was discovered by officers investigating the fire. It seems that a small boy had been playing with matches and had thrown one on the ground to see if it would light, thus starting the blaze.

This should serve as a reminder to parents to make sure their children are fully aware of the disaster that can result from an incident such as this, especially during the hot, dry weather we are now experiencing.

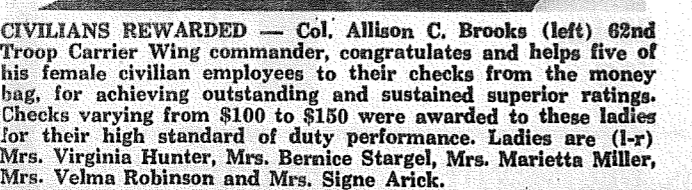

4H's Complete Camp Session

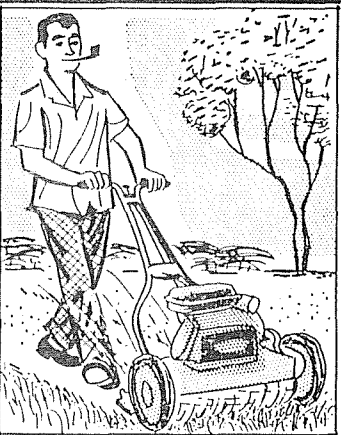

It is no wonder that more and more people—including officials with strong pro-labor sentiments—are coming to believe that some effective mechanism for preventing and arbitrating strikes which gravely weaken the whole country must be found.

This applies full bore to the Teamsters Union. As was made absolutely clear at its recent meeting in Miami, its president and undisputed boss, Jimmy Hoffa, intends to create a labor empire of unprecedented power. There is hardly an important field of enterprise which he means to leave untouched. His intentions are to make it a "jack of all trades" union. This would mean that one union, dominated by one man, could virtually bring the economic life of a nation to a halt. If it were so decided, not a train or a truck or a ship would operate. No commodities would move on any significant scale. The national security could be imperiled to the point of disaster.

Mr. Hoffa has said that he would never call a national transportation strike. I say "Nuts". Times, circumstances, attitudes and people change. The fact that such power exists, even though latent, would be an intolerable threat that could be held over our heads till dooms day.

This is a very different thing from a union versus industry fight over wages or working hours or fringe benefits or anything else. This will decide if a single organization can have what amounts to life and death power over the nation. The law must restrict privilege as well as guarantee rights. The national interest, which includes the national security, must always come first.

Now before you blow your stack, sit down, shut up and think this over a little. Besides, the nose punching and name calling department of the Times Journal is closed during hot weather.

As long as I am not about to win a popularity contest this week I might just as well let off a little more steam on another subject.

I am firmly convinced that it is high time people of this country opened their eyes and their minds to the fact that we have a lot of deranged people on the loose that are shielded and protected only because the subject they wildly expound is religion.

I have many times been subjugated to the absolute mad ravings of people who are insane, without a shadow of a doubt, yet they are shielded, protected and praised by neighbors and friends who refuse to admit that they are mad, only because they profusely mouth the word of the Lord and offer their praises to Him.

Take these same individuals and let them utter the same words in the same tempo on any other subject in the world and their families or neighbors would have them in the booby hatch by sunset.

How often have you read where murder has been committed with the culprit shouting that he was only doing the bidding of the Lord? Too often I say! Let's wake up and start giving these people some treatment and care instead of indulgence and acceptance until they commit some horrible crime, guided by a sick mind believing it is the voice of the Lord that bids them do these things.

As far as I am concerned these misguided souls do more to ferment atheism in the breast of man than any other factor that our young can encounter, for to their minds it is obvious that something is wrong with some of those who walk with Bible in hand and it has a tendency to push them away from religion rather than draw them to it by the very fear of their own sanity becoming endangered.

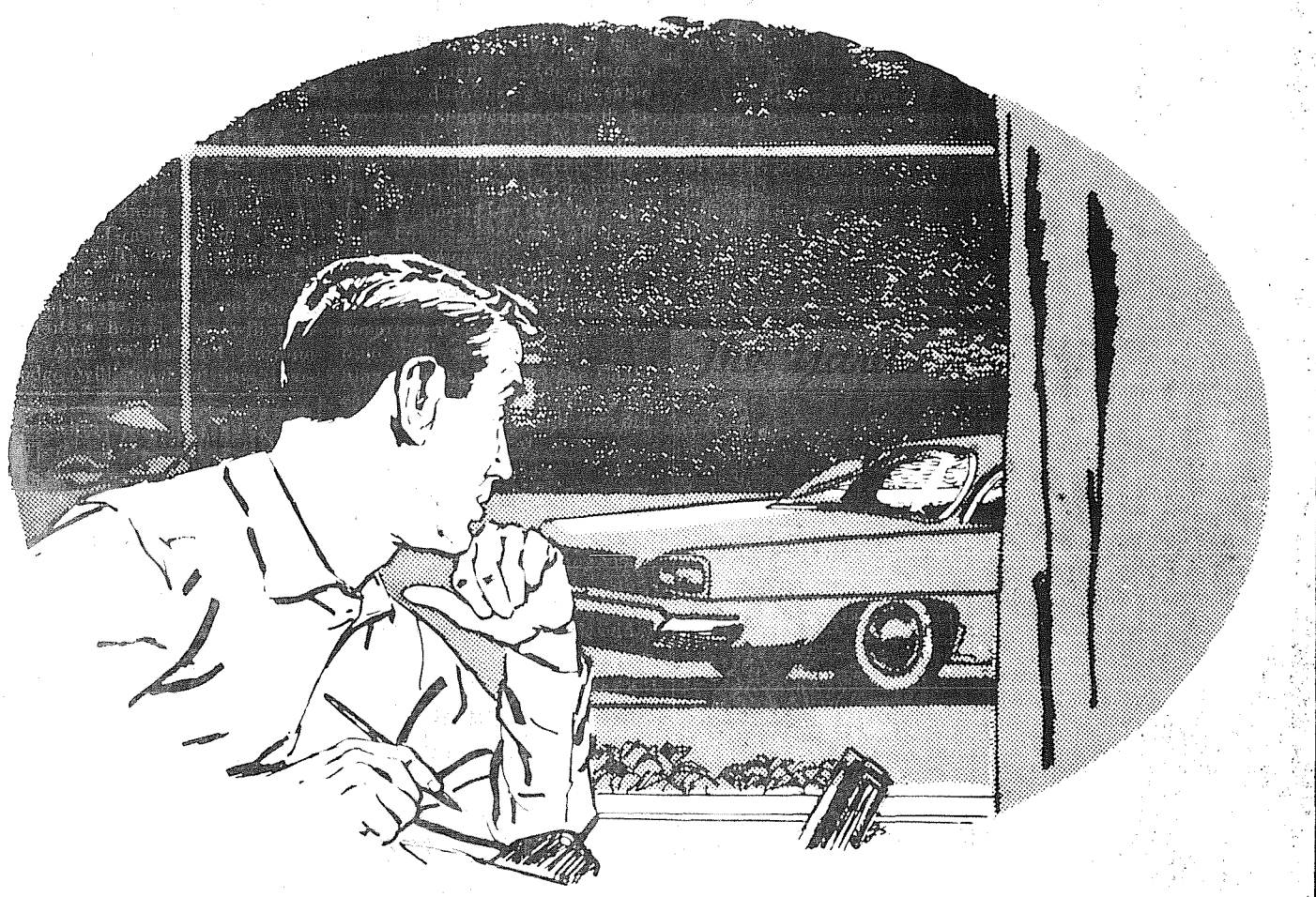

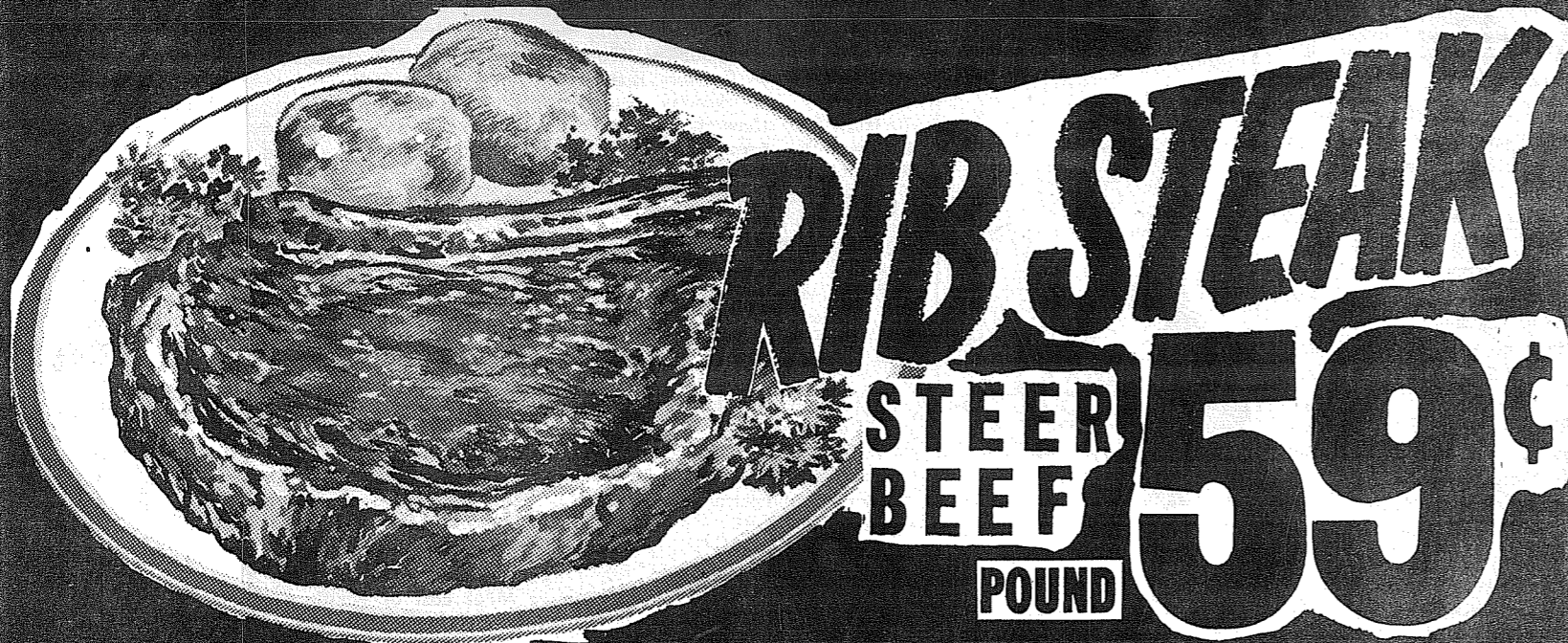

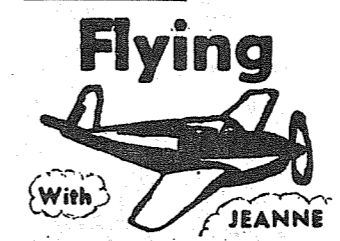

It's The Law WHAT IS LAW? The English language uses one word, "law", to express two distinct ideas. In many foreign languages these two meanings are expressed by two different words.

When we speak of the "rule of law," we are thinking of the whole body of law, under which we live together in a civilized society. In Latin the word law in its broad concept is "jus," but for a specific statute it is "lex," from which our word "law" is derived. In French it is "droit" and "loi"; in Spanish, "derecho" and "ley."

The French word for law is identical with the word for "right." This is not a coincidence. The whole purpose of the law is to define and enforce our rights. We are forbidden to speed on the highway so that others may enjoy their rights to travel the same road in safety. Laws specifying how wills and deeds shall be made have been adopted for the benefit of the people.

Our rights are in three broad groups. First, specific legal rights; thousands of these have been established through the years as the law strives to keep itself responsive to the changing needs of the people it serves. Second, fundamental rights such as the right to vote, to bear arms and to participate in government.

And third, there are "basic rights" so basic that they belong to all men everywhere in this country. Call them God-given rights, if you will — rights guaranteed under law and named in the Declaration of Independence — life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. (This column is written to inform, not to advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)
