Editorial

Parkland area residents will join in a massive community clean-up campaign starting May 8th and climaxing in an all out one-day pick-up drive Saturday, May 11.

Some of those who volunteer their labor Saturday will find themselves cleaning up garbage dumped on unoccupied property by persons who display little respect for the rights of others. Bottles and other roadside litter tossed from vehicles also will be picked up by the volunteers.

Despite anti-litter campaigns, and despite laws that threaten stiff fines for roadside littering, truck loads of litter will be gathered.

Considering the volume of garbage strewn along our roads, few arrests are made. Maybe the solution can be found with the residents. If every citizen who witnesses an act of littering would get "involved" enough to jot down a license number with a description of the offender for the police, perhaps clean-up drives could put more emphasis on painting and fixing than picking up after the lazy.

Undeclared Wars Bad Policy

In the past this paper has limited editorial comments to subjects of strictly a local nature.

However, we are making this exception to briefly editorialize on U.S. "Brush-fire war" policy and to call on Congress to further limit presidential power in committing troops in future undeclared wars other than defending against hostile attacks on this country.

We believe that if the use of military force is deemed necessary, then the resulting war commitment should be a total victory effort backed by formal declaration. American youth should not be asked to risk their lives in battle unless every tactical advantage is employed in their support.

This is not being done in Vietnam. With specified areas restricted to bombing attacks, imaginary boundaries used as places of refuge by communist troops, and cease fire holiday periods used by the enemy to reinforce his positions, conduct of the Vietnam War is hardly a successful blueprint for victory.

We feel Congress should act to spare Americans from involvement in future efforts of this type. If a war is worth fighting, it is worth fighting to win.

As for the present conflict, we all hope it can be resolved by negotiation. If not, it appears a change in high level strategy is in order.

Fire Hall Construction Begins

Construction of the new \$185,250 Parkland fire hall officially started Monday with Clarence Marsh, charter department member, turning the first shovel of dirt in a brief ground-breaking ceremony.

Voters approved a measure last fall to authorize the building and additional equipment. Johnson - Austin Associates are the architects and general contractor is George Yulleberg.

Marsh was one of the first fire district commissioners elected in Parkland when the district was formed Feb. 16, 1946. He saw the volunteer organization prior to the district survive gas rationing and has donated gas ration stamps and money to keep the fire truck operating during World War II.

Original property where the present fire hall now stands was purchased from Robert and May Mahoney April 30, 1946. Logs were sold off the property to help finance purchase of an additional lot.

The late Morris E. Ford, former Franklin Pierce District superintendent, was first fire district treasurer and maintained detailed records of those early days, Marsh stated. "We all pitched in to make the district go and when it came to a vote for formation we had 395 yes votes and only 5 no."

Fire Chief Ray Hixon pointed out that in building the structure Parkland is helping finance the State. Washington State sales tax will amount to \$8,336.25!

charged with the responsibility of maintaining treaty relations and preserving the tribal traditions, language and legends. Many of the legends in

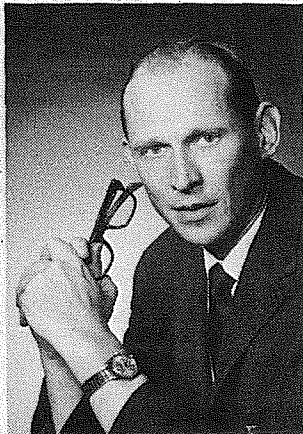


MARTIN J. SAMPSON Swinomish Chief

To be published by Thomas Nelson & Sons, Camden, N.J., the book will also include drawings by Lorence Bjorklund, an illustrator in Minnesota, and several color photographs taken by Matson.

Because of the author's relationship with the Franklin Pierce schools and because of the appropriateness of his book, plans are being made for a special program and presentation of the book in the elementary schools of the district next fall, Mrs. Ruth Gaume, director of elementary education, said. Mrs. Leila McCoy, library coordinator, will be in charge of planning the event.

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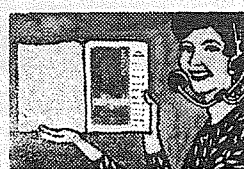

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Two Spanaway Men On Christmas Seal Board

Frank T. Walters, last week (April 17), was named the recipient of a special award plaque honoring his twenty-nine years of service as volunteer treasurer of the local Christmas Seal organization.

The award, signifying his unanimous election to Honorary Membership on the Board of Directors, was accepted for Mr. Walters by Dr. Chris Reynolds, at the 58th Annual Meeting of the Tuberculosis Association of Pierce County. Mr. Walters was unable to attend the meeting.

Walters is the fourth person in the history of the local TB association to be elected Honorary Director. Others were Chris C. Reynolds, M.D.; John F. Steele, M.D.; and the late Charles A. Green, Jr., O.D.

New members elected to the Board of Directors were: Sister Mary Oliver, Mr. C.G. Plummer, Thomas Skrinar, M.D., Mrs. E.H. Van Fossen, all of Tacoma; Mrs. Gordon Scraggin, Milton; and Mrs. Harry Thomas, Spanaway. Re-elected to an additional three year term on the Board were James Early, M.D., Lakewood; Mr. Vernon Hill, Puyallup; and Mr. John Sharp, Spanaway.

David M. Perry, M.D., of Seattle, specialist in infectious diseases, was guest speaker at the meeting. He discussed

the changing concepts in the treatment of tuberculosis over the past ten years.

Citing studies done since the discovery of effective anti-TB drugs, Dr. Perry stated it has been proven prolonged hospital stay is not necessarily beneficial to all patients, and complete bed rest is not essential in all cases.

"Hospitalization is still needed for isolation when the disease is communicable, but drug treatment has been proven effective in reducing the hazards of infection," he said.

Preventive drug treatment is being used with good results for individuals known to have been in close contact with an active case of TB, and with young children who have a reaction to the tuberculin skin test but show no evidence of active disease, Dr. Perry said.

James G. Billingsley, M.D., President of the association, presided at the Annual Meeting.

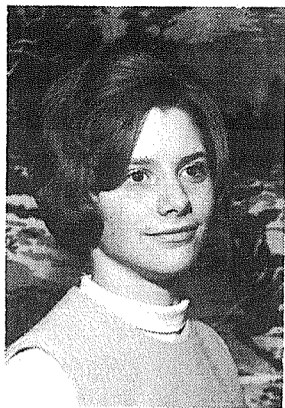

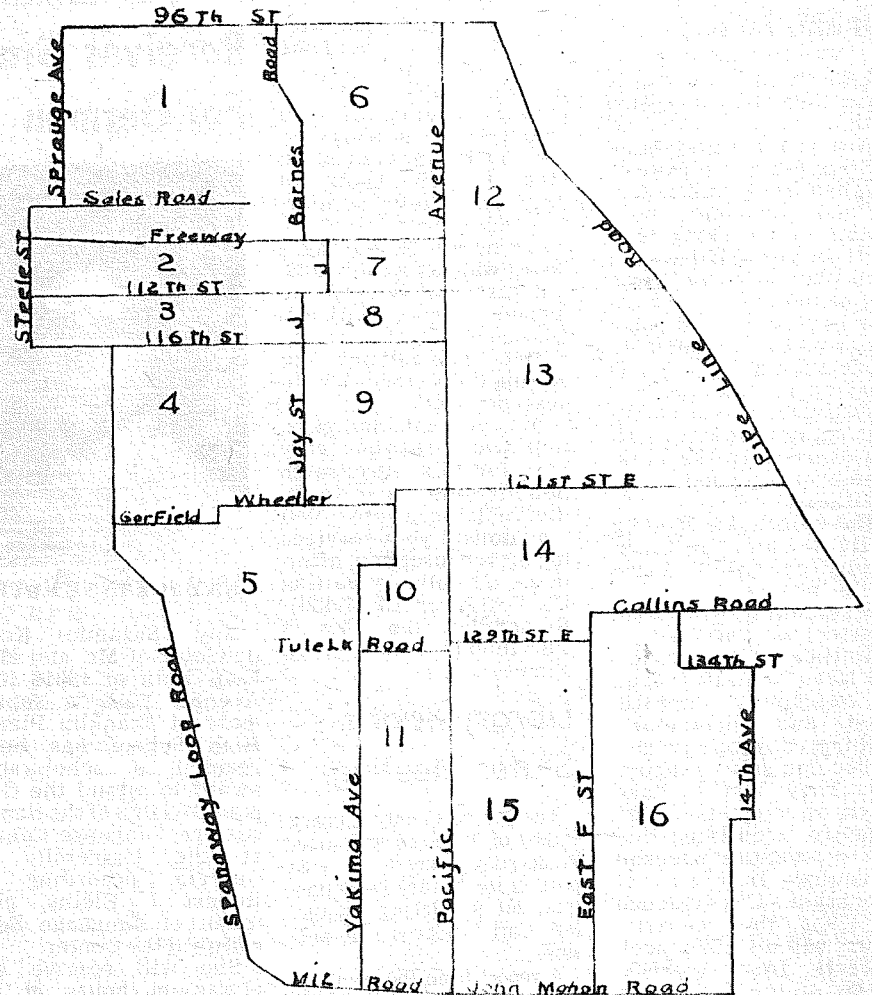

Area captains of the Parkland Development Association's "Parkland Clean-up Campaign" have completed the "Junk Car Survey", according to Clean-up Chairman, Hank Hetle. "The next step," he said, "will be for the Tritan Car Club, headed by Jim Newkirk, president, and Dayle Richter, treasurer, to serve warning notices on residents who have junk cars on their property." The Warning Notice states: "You are hereby notified that the Pierce County Zoning

code prohibits the repairing, dismantling, junking, wrecking and/or storing of automobiles not in operable condition in this area, unless within an enclosed building.

"Violation of the Pierce County Zoning Code is a misdemeanor, punishable by fine of not more than \$250 or 90 days confinement in the County Jail."

According to the zoning code "Major Auto Repair" can be in areas zoned C-3, M-1, M-2 and G only. The code defines Major as "the rebuilding or reconditioning of motor vehicles or trailers including trucks over one and one-half tons capacity; collision service, including body, frame or fender straightening or repair; overall painting or paint shop; automobile wrecking within an enclosed building."

"Minor Automobile Repair" can be done only in zones C-2, C-3, M-1, MP or G. Minor repair is classed as "a general motor repair, replacement of new or reconditioned parts to passenger automobiles and trucks not exceeding one and one-half tons capacity, but not including any operation specified under Automobile Repair, Major."

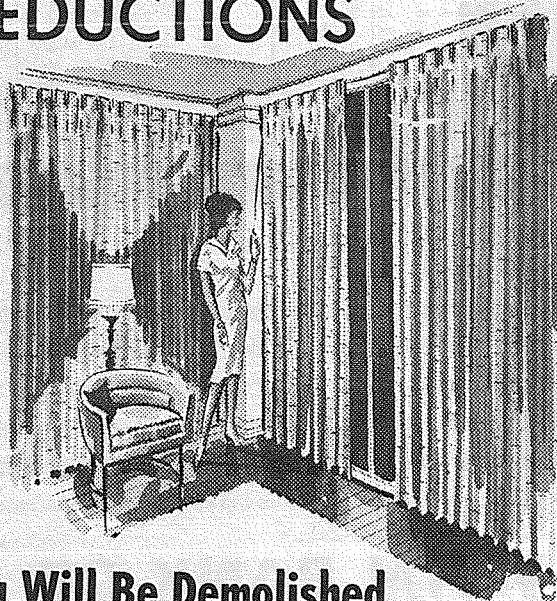

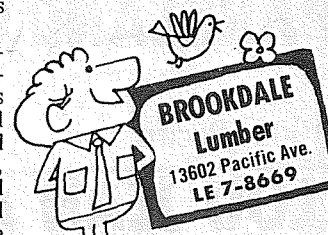

The traditional folk-dance event will be held at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday in PLU's Memorial Gymnasium. The public is invited.



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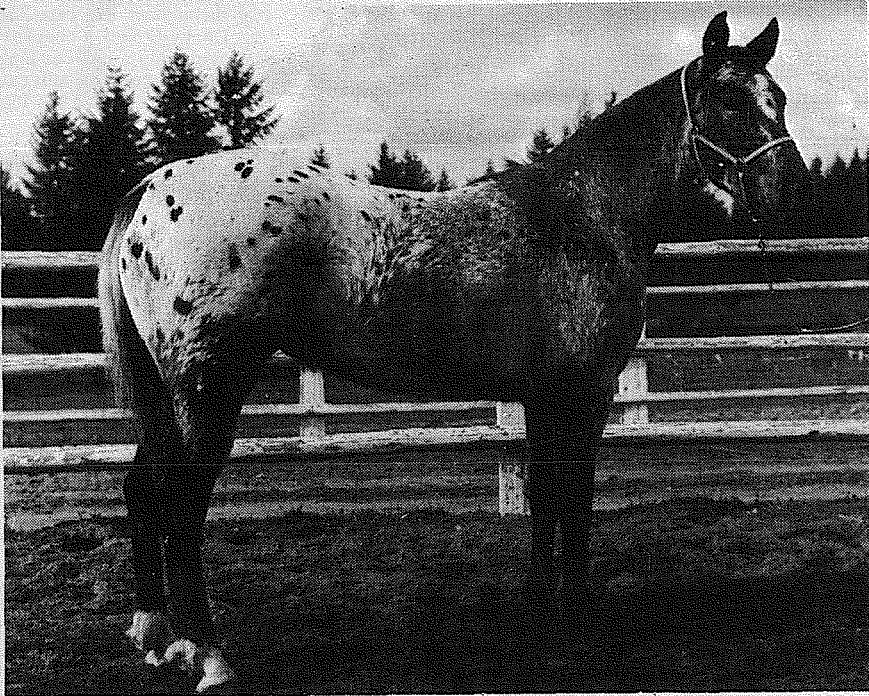
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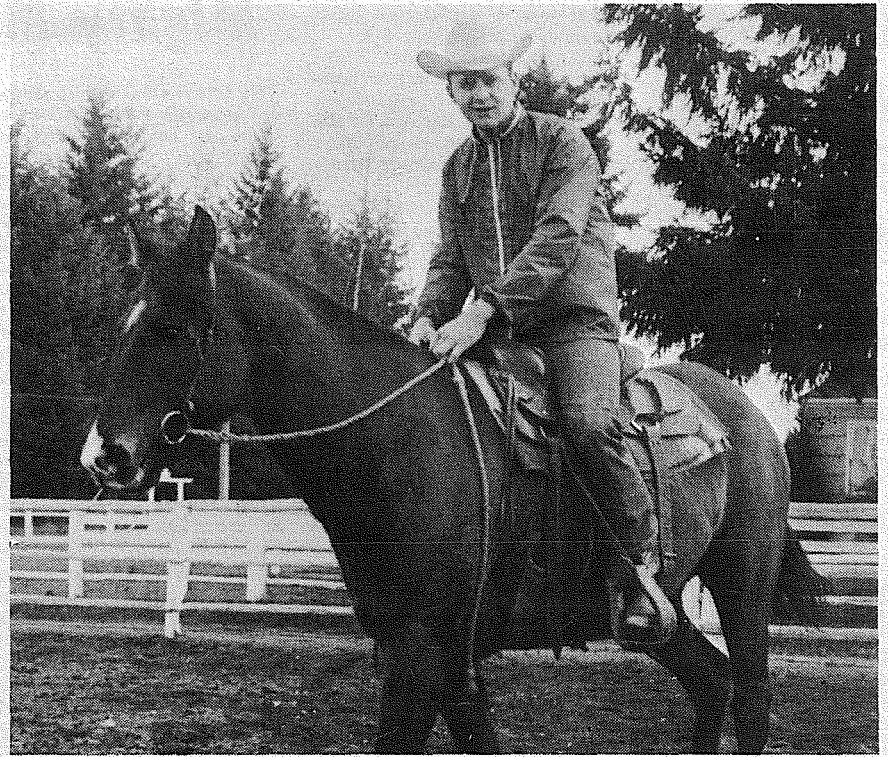
