Mail Box Fix-Up Week Coming

The Post Office Department has designated the week of May 15 to 20 as Mail Box Improvement Week. The Department wishes to encourage patrons to provide suitable receptacles erected and maintained for easy and safe accessibility, presenting a neat appearance and maintained and affording protection to the mail, according to Postmaster Helen G. Young, of Spanaway.

Patrons of rural boxes are required to provide mail boxes of the standard approved type. Names of the box owners should be inscribed on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, or on the door if the boxes are grouped. The number may be inscribed on the box and the box and support should be kept painted.

The approaches to the box should be kept level and properly graded for easy and safe accessibility. Boxes that are no longer serviceable must be replaced.

This is the 23rd year that rural patrons have been asked to improve their mail receptacles. It is believed that where mail boxes are improved mail service is likewise improved.

Spring Outing Ends in Tragedy: Three Killed in Car-Train Crash



A FAMILY SPRING OUTING ended in tragedy Monday night when Theodore D. Couture, 29, of Rt. 1, Box 220, Sumner, and his two young daughters, Roberta, 6, and Pamela, 3, met death when their car was struck by a south-bound train at a Stewart Ave. intersection three miles north of Sumner. His wife had remained at the Lake and did not return with the family. Engineer Frank Jones, 68, told State Patrolman Charles Stansbury he was traveling about 65 mph when he struck the Couture vehicle, throwing it 350 feet from the unlighted crossing. (McKewen Studio)

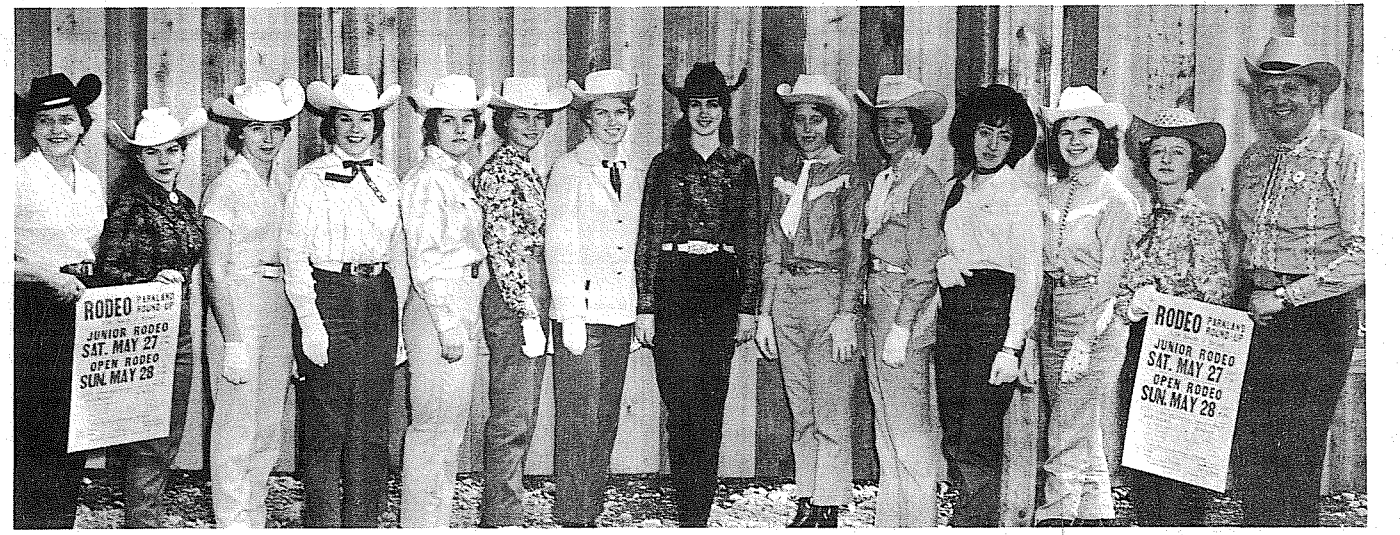
The wild horse race will be made up of five teams. There will be two monies paid plus a certificate for a pair of levis for each member of the third place team.

Eatonville Man On Destroyer
Western Pacific (FHTNC) — Michael D. Treadwell, electrician's mate fireman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray A. Treadwell of Eatonville, Wash., is serving aboard the destroyer USS Richard S. Edwards, a unit of Destroyer Squadron Seven and the Seventh Fleet operating in the Western Pacific. The Edwards visited Chinhae, Korea, April 5, as part of a goodwill tour, during which the ship was host to Po Sun Yun, President of Korea, and Commander Seventh Fleet, Vice Admiral C. D. Griffin. The crewmembers of the destroyer presented 1,600 pounds of clothing to the Holt Orphanage in Seoul in conjunction with the Navy's "Operation Handclasp", and donated 8,000 pounds of rice to needy Koreans in the Chinhae area.

Marymount Acad. Visits Ft. Lewis
Fort Lewis, 3 May — Seventy seven young soldiers from the Marymount Academy, visited the "grown up" 4th Infantry Division and Fort Lewis this week where they were treated to tank flame thrower demonstrations and tank rides through Fort Lewis woods by the 1st Medium Tank Battalion, 34th Armor. Prior to their visit to the 34th Armor, the cadets toured the 1st Battle Group, 8th Infantry where they viewed a precision drill performance by the 8th's famed drill team, "The Bullets." Following this the cadets lunched with the 34th at Headquarters Company Mess, then were treated to an afternoon of excitement, climaxing their visit to the Armor Battalion by becoming honorary members of the 34th. From there the cadets went to the 4th Aviation Company, where they were introduced to the 4th Infantry Division's "family" of aircraft, and briefed on the Fort Lewis weather computing facilities. According to principal, Mother Mary Edwardine, Marymount Academy enrolls 77 boys from grade levels 5 through 9, and is the only academy of its kind in the Northwest. "The biggest contribution we make," Mother Edwardine said, "is giving the boys overall training and discipline. They drill every day and they become familiar with weapons by firing and forming rifle teams. They gain a great sense of security here," Mother Edwardine said. The academy was established in 1923, growing out of a boys school. Originally taking boys from the grade levels, 1-8, the academy has since tightened its standards and has become more concentrated and selective.

a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

Every once in a while I get a call or some one stops by the office to tell me that they are not sure just where I stand or what the ultimate goal of this column is. Several have pointed out that I do a lot of wandering and they fail to grasp the real point in some of my articles. Frankly, I have never until now tried to look ahead at any particular goal. I know full well I have wandered from subject to subject—national, local, serious and frivolous, depending largely on my frame of mind when I sit down to write, and/or the time available for research.

I realize all too well that for every person I have patted on the back I have taken a kick at some one else further down their frame. I have written articles that have cost me revenue and others that have brought it in. This I believe is as it should be, for if, as the publisher of a newspaper, I let personalities and the almighty dollar sway my beliefs then I'd better put the cover on this typewriter and leave it on.

Perhaps it's time I took a stand and explained what I feel to be the real motives behind these columns I sweat over weekly. I believe I can put it best thusly: I subscribe to the belief that freedom is a God given gift and not a political grant; I believe that the welfare of each individual should depend upon his or her own initiative and ability; I believe in maintaining a society where the citizen has the fullest individual freedom, and that the government's primary and paramount role is the protection of that freedom. This I fervently advocate, and my goal as a publisher is: (one) in my humble and sometimes crude way to help keep America free, and (two) to try and feather my own nest as best I can through honest endeavor.

Speaking along the lines of personal freedoms, you will no doubt notice this summer practically a complete lack of youngsters working in our community. You may begin to wonder about this. The Wellington Ohio Enterprise has told of an incident that occurred in their town last year that was to serve as a warning of things to come this year.

It recounts how a 16-year-old son asked his father, owner of a small factory, to give him a job during vacation. Dad was pleased and rather boastfully told his foreman to find a spot for sonnyboy. The foreman pessimistically pointed out some road blocks:

"First you must apply for a special permit for the employment of a minor," he said. "Then you'll deduct 20 per cent from your son's wages for income tax purposes."

"At the end of his employment you'll apply to the Internal Revenue Bureau for permission to refund the 20 per cent, since the boy would not be earning enough in the vacation period to make him eligible as an income-taxpayer."

"Next, you'll report the boy's earnings along with your own, at the end of the current tax year, and pay taxes on them, since the boy is a minor."

"You'll also have to report the termination of the boy's employment."

The Wellington Enterprise concludes this sad tale of ambushed ambition and punctured pride thusly:

"Sequel: The boy attended a summer school."

Take this sort of red tape, add a minimum wage law that forces you to pay a completely untrained youngster more than you feel you can afford, and what chance do the herds of kids, pouring out of our schools for the summer, have of making an extra buck or two? Better yet, what chance do they have of learning something through actual experience? All of us will admit that you can't beat experience, yet we sit around on our fannies and let the opportunity for our youngsters to gain experience be "out-lawed", (call it whatever you may).

Talk about lightning striking twice. Not too many months back on a trip to L. A. I found myself in a motel trying to get into one of my son's shirts that my wife had carefully packed for me. Naturally I had several remarks to make on the subject upon my arrival home. After clearly expressing myself, I really felt that my "ever loving" would never let it happen again. Last week in Dallas, as I tried to get into a shirt obviously three sizes too small for me I realized that a man should never underestimate the ability of his mate to pull the same boner more than once.
