Anzo Grazzini heads the JC committee in charge of the project.

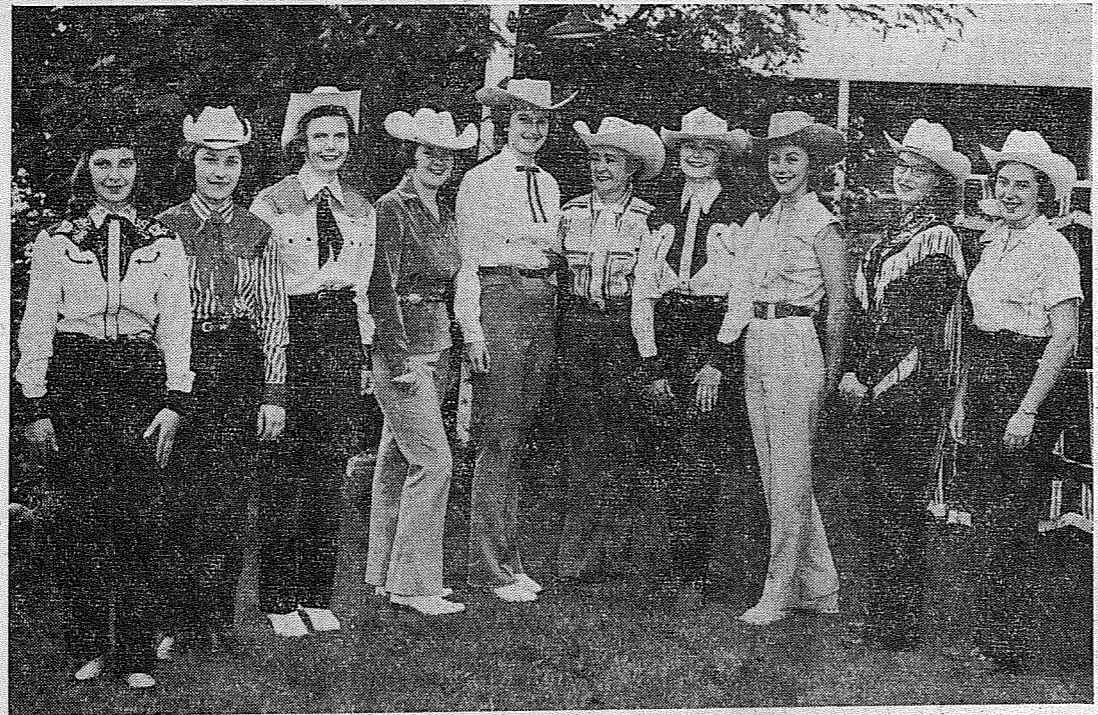

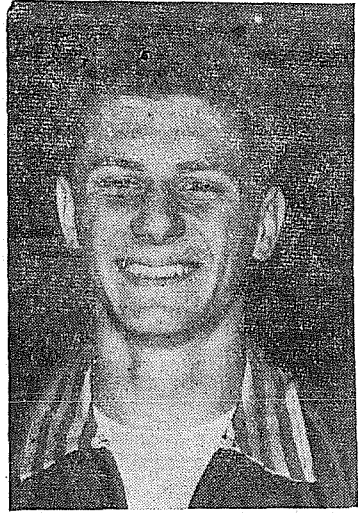
of the announcers' stand, for which the Parkland Juniors have raised the funds. The Juniors are also planning a show for late summer.

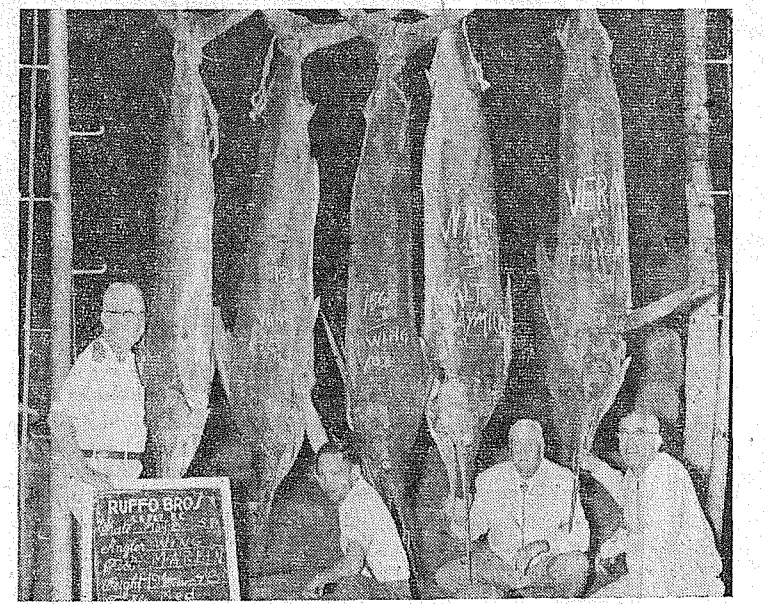

### County Agent's Corner

**By George Purcell**

"Spanaway soil won't produce much forage" you still hear. But it does if managed properly and we have good rains and some warm weather like this spring.

The other day in walking through Jerry Harlow's pasture at Elk Plain to see his beef cattle I got wet up to my waist. The moisture bounced off the waist high grass. I blame Claude Doran. If he had not given Jerry recommendations for such a good fertilizer the grass would not be so good—so tall! Can you guess the condition of the cattle? Yes, they looked good too. Jerry gets fast gaining calves by practicing good management and feeding practices. Being a part-time farmer compels him to save labor so he uses successfully a self-feeding bunker silo. Just any registered, bull isn't good enough. His herd sire must be a big-forage bull or have made at least a 2½ pound average daily gain. A new young full-time farmer at Elk Plain too is John Airheart who raises mink, fryers and sheep. His 12 ewes had 23 lambs until recently when a dog jumped his five and one-half foot high women wire fence and killed one lamb before John could chase the dog. John says he and his father who farmed there until recently like sheep, that they are profitable. They use them too, instead of expensive chemical weed killers to control weeds and grass around buildings and lumber to avoid fire hazards.

Speaking about weeds reminds me! About three weeks ago I had a large patch of buttercups as well as plantain and dandelion

in my lawn. A feed store sold me a small bottle of MCP—2,4-D combination which did perfect job of killing all those weeds. For this small area I used nine tablespoons of the weed killer in 3 gallons of water applied with sprinkling can. The buttercups had been so greedy and aggressive that it was rapidly crowding out all my grass until then.

Pheasant rearing season is here again. Over 1,000 fertile pheasant eggs are being hatched for Pierce County 4-H members. Another 700 eggs will soon be set. After the three week incubation period the day-old pheasant chicks will find new homes on 15 4-H members' farms. Most of these are from the Otto Moebus and Purny McCormack 4-H clubs in the Thrift area. A few will go to other sections of the county. Kenneth Hicks from Orting; Judy Garrison, Summit; Kathy Williams, Parkland; and Kenneth Green from north of Puyallup represent other areas.

The present rearing program is a cooperative project between the Extension Service and the State Game Department. The fertile pheasant eggs are furnished by the State Game Department. Incubation, brooding, and rearing till 10 weeks of age is the responsibility of the 4-H member. At 10 weeks of age the game farm purchases the healthy pheasants and releases them in selected areas. It is quite a challenging project! The 4-H members learn poultry husbandry as well as wildlife management. It is not an easy project. Dogs and cats may be quite a problem. Cannibalism causes many headaches. When the 10 week session is completed the youngsters have gained much in experience and if good managers also some financial profit.

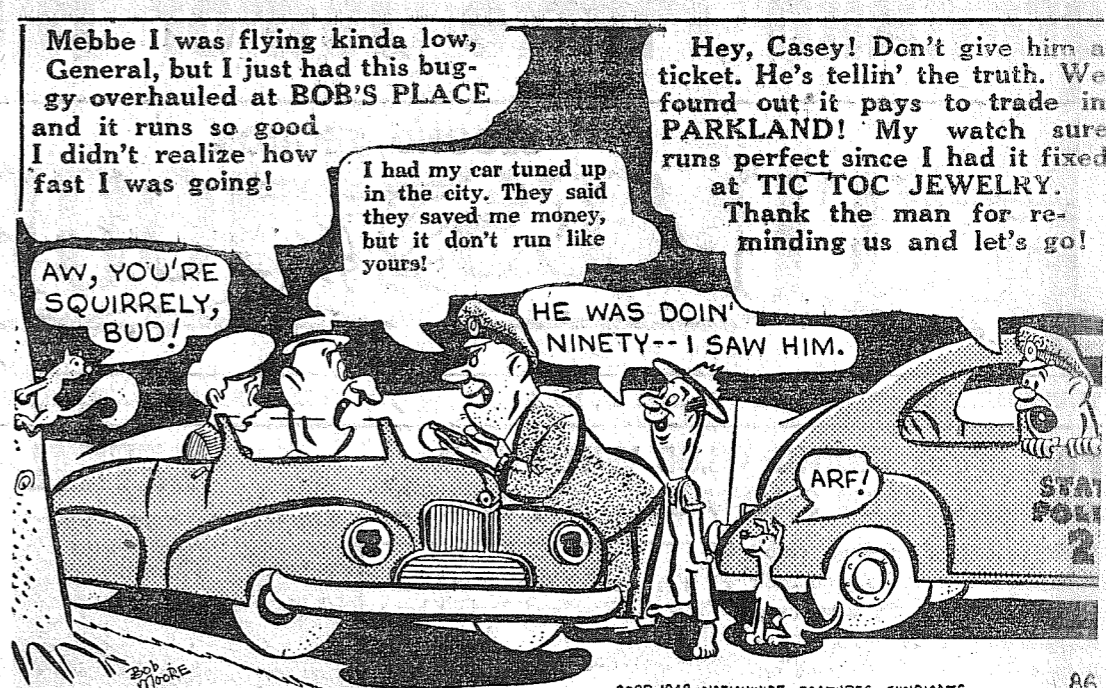

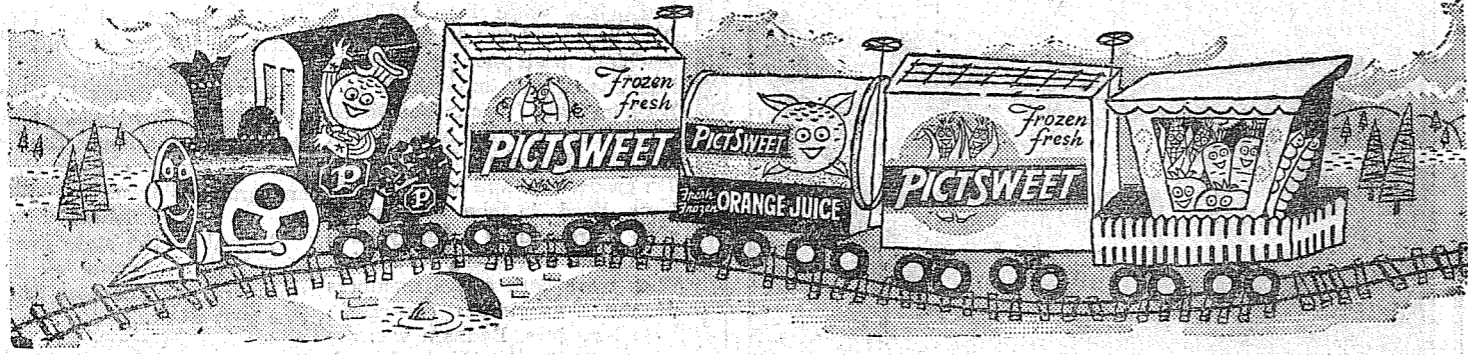

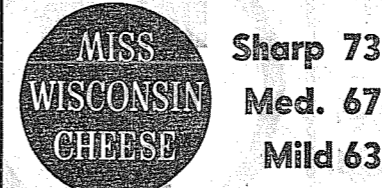
