

"Spanaway soil won't produce much forage" you still hear. But it does if managed properly and we have good rains and some warm weather like this spring. The other day in walking through Jerry Harlow's pasture at Elk Plain to see his beef cattle I got wet up to my waist. The moisture bounced off the waist high grass. I blame Claude Doran. If he had not given Jerry recommendations for such a good fertilizer the grass would not be so good—so tall! Can you guess good management and feeding feeding bunker silo. Just any registered, bull isn't good enough. His herd sire must be a big-forage bull or have made at least a $2\frac{1}{2}$ pound average daily gain. Then he knows his chances are calves.

A new young full-time farmer at Elk Plain too is John Airheart who raises mink, fryers and sheep. His 12 ewes had 23 lambs until recently when a dog jumphis five and one-half foot high woven wire fence and killed one lamb before John could chase the dog.
