By way of comparison, New York is third, Connecticut fourth, and Indiana 10th.

Excise Tax Will Be Discussed

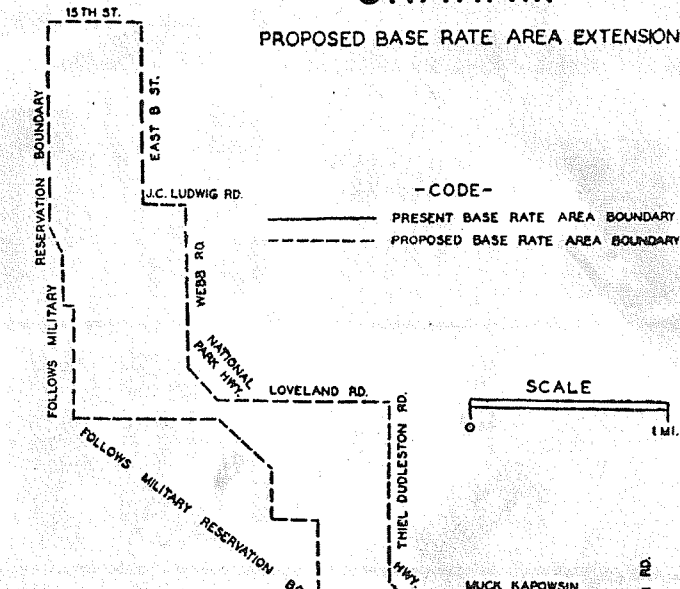

Reduced Rates for Graham Residents



City-type telephone service will be extended Friday, March 10, for some 73 Pacific Telephone Northwest customers north and west of the present Graham base rate area.

Under the new service arrangement, eight-party suburban lines will be eliminated and customers will be offered one-, two- and four-party "city-type" service.

According to manager J. R. Olson, suburban service mileage charges will be discontinued within the area and regular monthly service charges will be adjusted to correspond with similar types of service in Graham. Adjustments will generally amount to a reduction in rates for the customers affected.

"This would be a good time for customers wishing single or two-party service to make arrangements by calling the business office," Olson pointed out.

The area affected comprises about one and one-half square miles near Loveland.

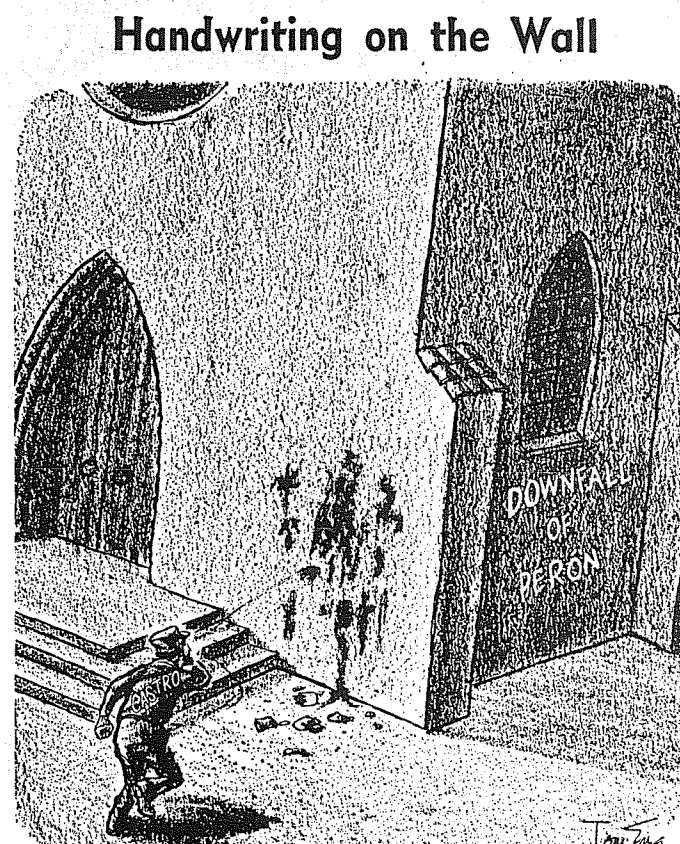

So you think things are bad. Well, maybe to a degree you're right, but just remember they could be a heck of a lot worse. Just look at this and give it a thought or two.

If the world were miniaturized to a community of 1,000 people we would find that it includes 60 U.S. citizens. These individuals — 6 per cent of the total — would receive half the community's income, possess 15 times as much "goods" as all the rest and have a surplus of food while a large percentage of the remaining 940 were hungry. So who's hurting?

Here's an off-shot thought. It should never be forgotten that this condition mentioned above was brought about under a system that extolled the virtues of individual freedom with responsibility.

Then here's another rather cheering piece of news. The average life expectancy at birth has risen 22 years in this country since 1900 while in many other countries it has practically stood still. We're now only three-tenths of a year short of the Biblical "three-score-and-ten".

You often hear the remark that it's great to be an American. If you ask the person making this remark, "Why?" you either get an answer ranging from freedoms to doles or they look at you to see if your communist card is sticking out of the brim of your hat. However, very few of them ever come up with the answer that I feel is most important of all. Here is my idea on the matter. The fundamentals on which our government is founded not only guarantee our freedoms and nourish our free enterprise system, but they make it possible for every American with initiative to start at the bottom and work his way up. Given the opportunity, who can ask for more?

The other day while looking over some figures, I noted that in the United States today there are some 13 million people in the middle income bracket that own shares in American enterprises. Surprisingly enough, a lot of these people are housewives. The next time you hear someone running down big business and referring to it as "They", remind him that the "They" he is referring to is you and I and the rest of his neighbors.

Could even be that his wife has joined the gang by looting the egg money.

On the serious side there is this to think about. Smaller nations have never before in history been in a position to singlehandedly threaten the world and make it stick. Much like a Terrier snapping at the heels of a Great Dane, they have enjoyed the luxury of irresponsibility. Now more and more of them are about to achieve atomic capability. France has exploded her third nuclear bomb in the Sahara desert and Egypt's President Nasser has warned that if Israel, which has a reactor capable of producing plutonium for atomic bombs, gets bombs, Egypt will then get them too no matter what the cost. Sweden, too, is getting into the act with announced intentions of becoming armed with nuclear weapons.

Will their wisdom and restraint grow with the same speed as their atomic strength? Here's hoping.

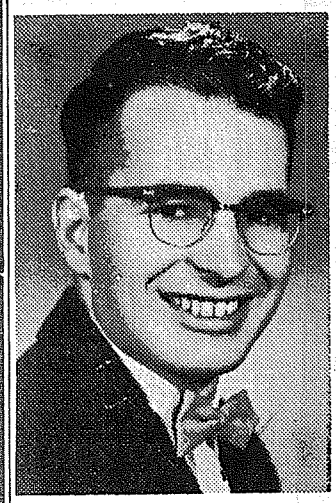

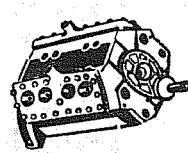

truth is that there is not enough selection in some items, mainly ready-to-wear and yardgoods. You may find the fabric you are looking for, but the chances are you won't find the color. The chances of finding a dress in the right size, of a fabric you like, style and color you can wear, are extremely small.
Where in Parkland can you purchase a wedding gift, have it beautifully gift wrapped for a nominal charge, and have it delivered to the home of the bride at no additional cost? Most wedding gifts I purchase would not cost me one cent less in Parkland.

While I am at it I am going to sound off on one of my pet peeves. Heavens knows how much business it takes away from the Parkland merchants. I am referring to the very common practice of "Hostess Parties". In case you are not familiar with them this is where a homemaker invites a group of friends, neighbors, and relatives to her home to listen to a sales pitch on any number of different items, including housewares, plastics, cosmetics, jewelry, toys. She in return is given a bonus in merchandise, the value of which is usually determined by the amount of money her friends, neighbors, and relatives are induced to spend and the number of parties that are booked with those attending the party. While a sales tax is collected on these items I would venture to say that much of the merchandise comes from out-of-state firms that pay no property or business tax in the State of Washington.

As far as advertising for a 'lost dog' in your paper, let me tell you what happened to us just two summers ago. One Tuesday we found a little stray puppy on our porch. It was during a very hot spell, and we fed him and gave him water. Every day we looked in the daily (dirty word?) to see if we could find someone looking for him. We already had a dog, a cat, and four kids to take care of, so finally on the following Monday we called the Humane Society to come get him, because we were afraid he would follow some child up to Pacific Avenue only half a block away. Well, you may have guessed it by now, but on Thursday when your paper came out, sure enough there was an ad for this little lost puppy. We called the owner who in turn called the Humane Society but that little puppy had a new home by that time.

Well, Mr. Brown, now I have expressed my opinion, and I will close with this remark. Many Parkland residents are employed in downtown Tacoma and Villa Plaza. Why shouldn't their families shop there?

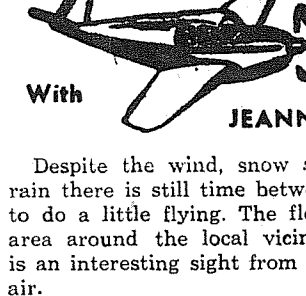

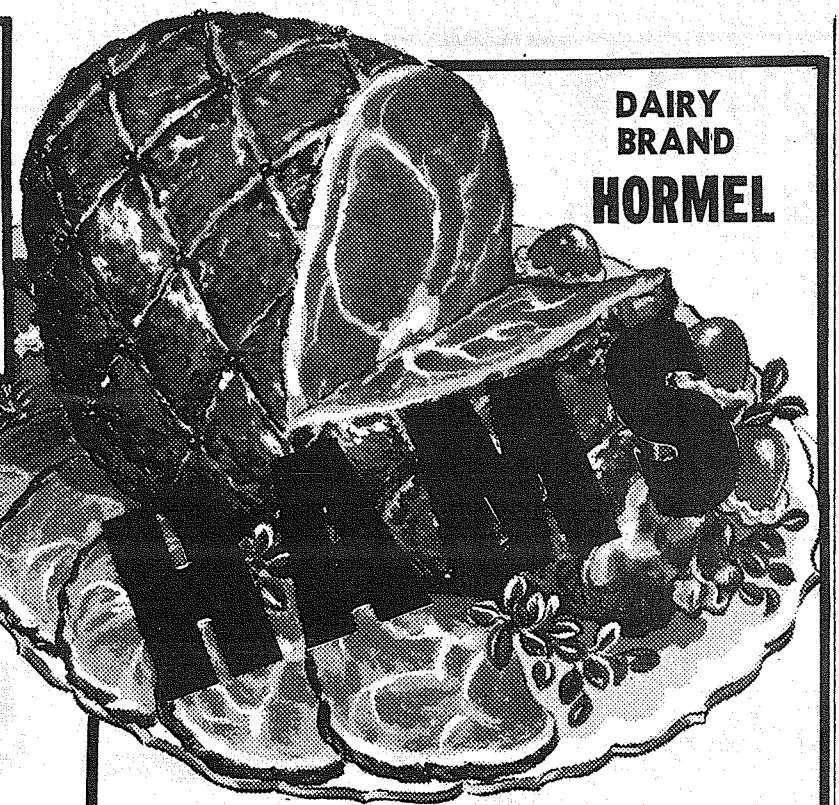

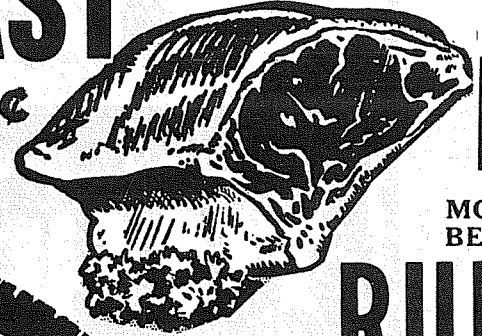
