# Subsidization Bill Proposal Needed

The Franklin Pierce and Bethel District are affected by two basic problems.

One is, of course, that of salaries. The State of Washington has the highest teaching requirements west of the Mississippi River. As a matter of fact, they are highest in the nation, being even with only New York, Connecticut, and Indiana. Yet in salaries Washington ranks 15th. By way of comparison, New York is third. Connecticut fourth, and Indiana 10th.

In addition to this, Seattle has the second highest cost of living of any city in the nation, Chicago being first. Millage Too High

Turning to more local matters, the problem of millage is particularly acute to this area. There is no industry in Parkland capable of being taxed to a substantial degree, thus the property owners in our area are taxed as high as 42 mills on the dollar for school support, compared to only 32 mills on the dollar in Tacoma proper. Someone Will Pay

The tax will always be raised somehow. If there is no industry to pay it, then the people must pay it. The only other solution is for the state to subsidize an area by leveling funds to help out a district such as Franklin Pierce and Bethel whose property values are low.

Bill Should Be Proposed A bill for subsidation by the state of such districts as Franklin Pierce and Bethel may be proposed in Olympia. The Franklin Pierce Teachers Education Association feels that such a proposal should be brought before the legislature and acted upon in a favorable manner.





### a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering ...

So you think things are bad. Well, maybe to a degree you're right, but just remember they could be a heck of a lot worse. Just look at this and give it a thought or two.

If the world were miniaturized to a community of 1,000 people we would find that it includes 60 U.S. citizens. These individuals - 6 per cent of the total - would receive half the community's income, possess 15 times as much "goods" as all the rest and have a surplus of food while a large percentage of the remaining 940 were hungry. So who's hurting?

Here's an off-shot thought. It should never be forgotten that this condition mentioned above was brought about under a system that extolled the virtues of individual freedom with

Then here's another rather cheering piece of news. The average life expectancy at birth has risen 22 years in this country since 1900 while in many other countries it has practically stood still. We're now only three-tenths of a year short of the Biblical "three-score-and-ten".

You often hear the remark that it's great to be an American. If you ask the person making this remark, "Why?" you either get an answer ranging from freedoms to doles or they look at you to see if your communist card is sticking out of the brim of your hat. However, very few of them ever come up with the answer that I feel is most important of all. Here is my idea on the matter. The fundamentals on which our government is founded not only guarantee our freedoms and nourish our free enterprise system, but they make it possible for every American with initiative to start at the bottom and work his way up. Given the opportunity, who can ask for more?

The other day while looking over some figures, I noted that in the United States today there are some 13 million people in the middle income bracket that own shares in American enterprises. Surprisingly enough, a lot of these people are housewives. The next time you hear someone running down big business and referring to it as "They", remind him that the "They" he is referring to is you and I and the rest of his neigh-

Could even be that his wife has joined the gang by looting the egg money.

On the serious side there is this to think about, Smaller nations have never before in history been in a position to singlehandedly threaten the world and make it stick. Much like a Terrier snapping at the heels of a Great Dane, they have enjoyed the luxury of irresponsibility. Now more and more of them are about to achieve atomic capability. France has exploded her third nuclear bomb in the Sahara desert and Egypt's President Nasser has warned that if Israel, which has a reactor capable of producing plutonium for atomic bombs, gets bombs, Egypt will then get them too no matter what the cost. Sweden, too, is getting into the act with announced intentions of becoming armed with nuclear weapons.

Will their wisdom and restraint grow with the same speed as their atomic strength? Here's hoping.






