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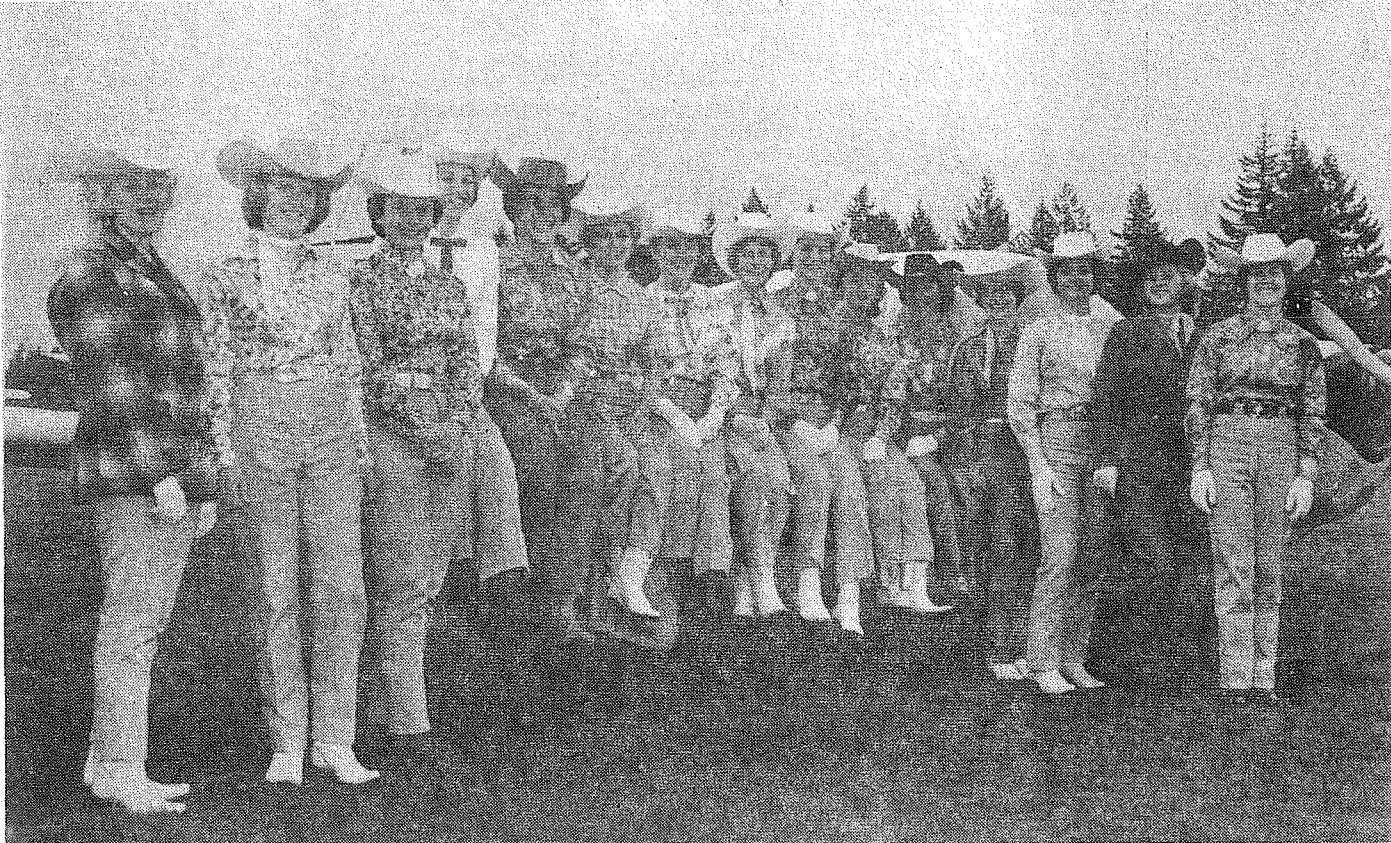

Special mothers will be introduced by Mr. Dave Turnbull, school principal.

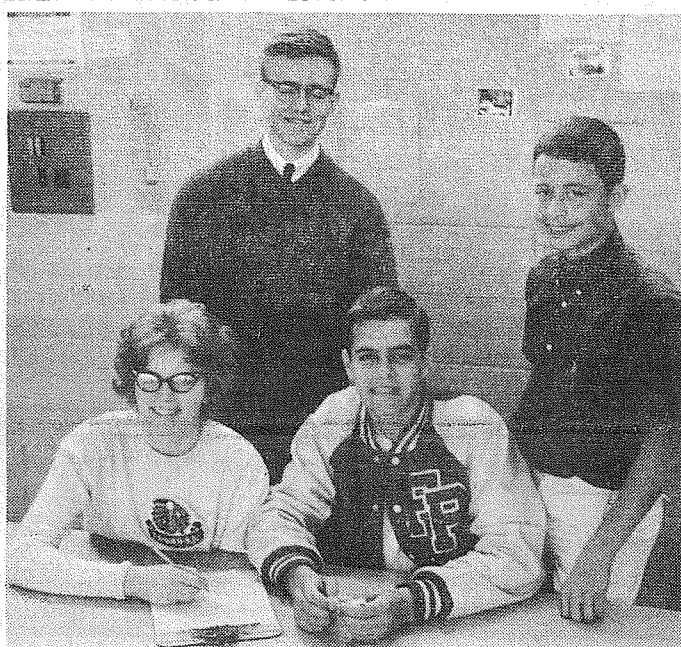

'Open House' At McChord May 19th

McChord AFB, Wn. -- A day-long "Open House" with aerial demonstrations, aircraft and equipment displays, a wing parade and review, and possibly parachute jumps will highlight the Armed Forces Day celebration here on May 19th.

The base will be open to the public from 10 a.m. until 4:30 p.m., with the jumps, flying and similar events scheduled to begin at approximately 1:30 p.m.

McChord has been designated as the principal installation for Armed Forces Day observances in Pierce County. Along with the planes, rockets and other Air Force equipment, visitors may see Army tanks, anti-aircraft missiles, and various equipment from other services.

Flying activities for the day will center around demonstrations by the supersonic F-106 jet interceptors, jet trainers, transports and tankers stationed at McChord. Parachute jumps will be performed by members of the Fort Lewis Sky Divers Club or members of the Military Air Transport Service Combat Control Team.

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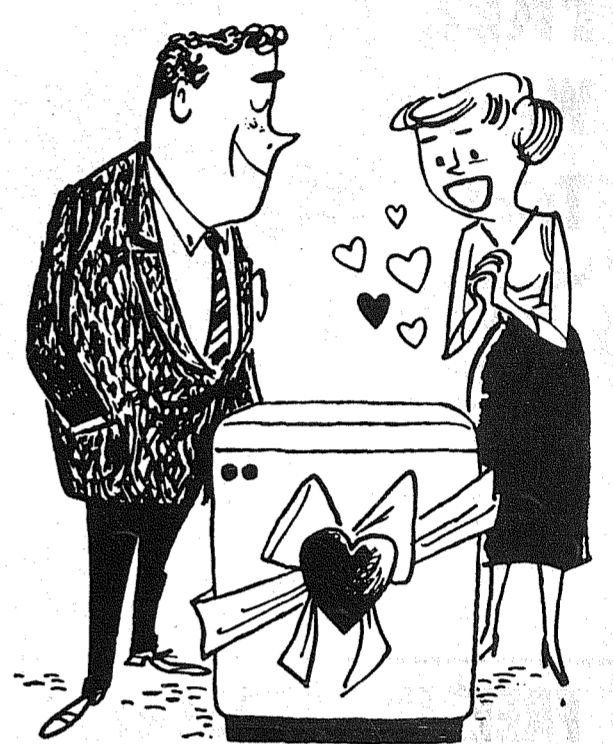

Puyallup Lists Summer School Schedule Dates

The dates for the Puyallup Summer School program have been set for Monday, June 18th, through Friday, July 27th, with July 4th being a holiday.

The summer school program, on the elementary level, will consist of offerings in French, Typing, Art and Science. The second objective is providing a remedial program. Elementary level remedial courses will be offered in Reading (phonics), Arithmetic, Language and Spelling.

On the secondary level, students may make up deficiencies in Mathematics, English, Social Studies and other courses.

Classes for students in grades 3-8 will meet for one-hour sessions beginning at 9:00 a.m. In grades 9-12 classes will meet for two-hour sessions beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Fees are based on the following schedule for the six week program: One hour per day - \$15.00; two hour per day - \$25.00; three hours per day - \$35.00; four hours per day - \$45.00.

Family rate: If two or more students enter from a single family and register at the same time, they will receive the advantage of the multiple rates listed above.

The Driver Training fee will be \$25.00 per student and will be separate from other course fees (multiple rates do not apply).

A course for adults in Intermediate Conversational French will be taught at 8:00 a.m. in conjunction with the summer school program. Mr. Robert Mendes, the exchange teacher from France, will be the instructor.
