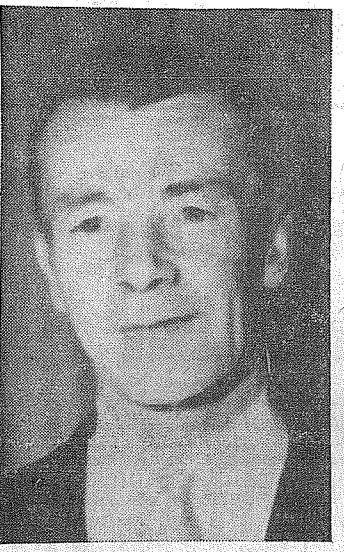

As his life story was unfolded, Mr. Turnbull was greeted by many (Continued on Page 4)

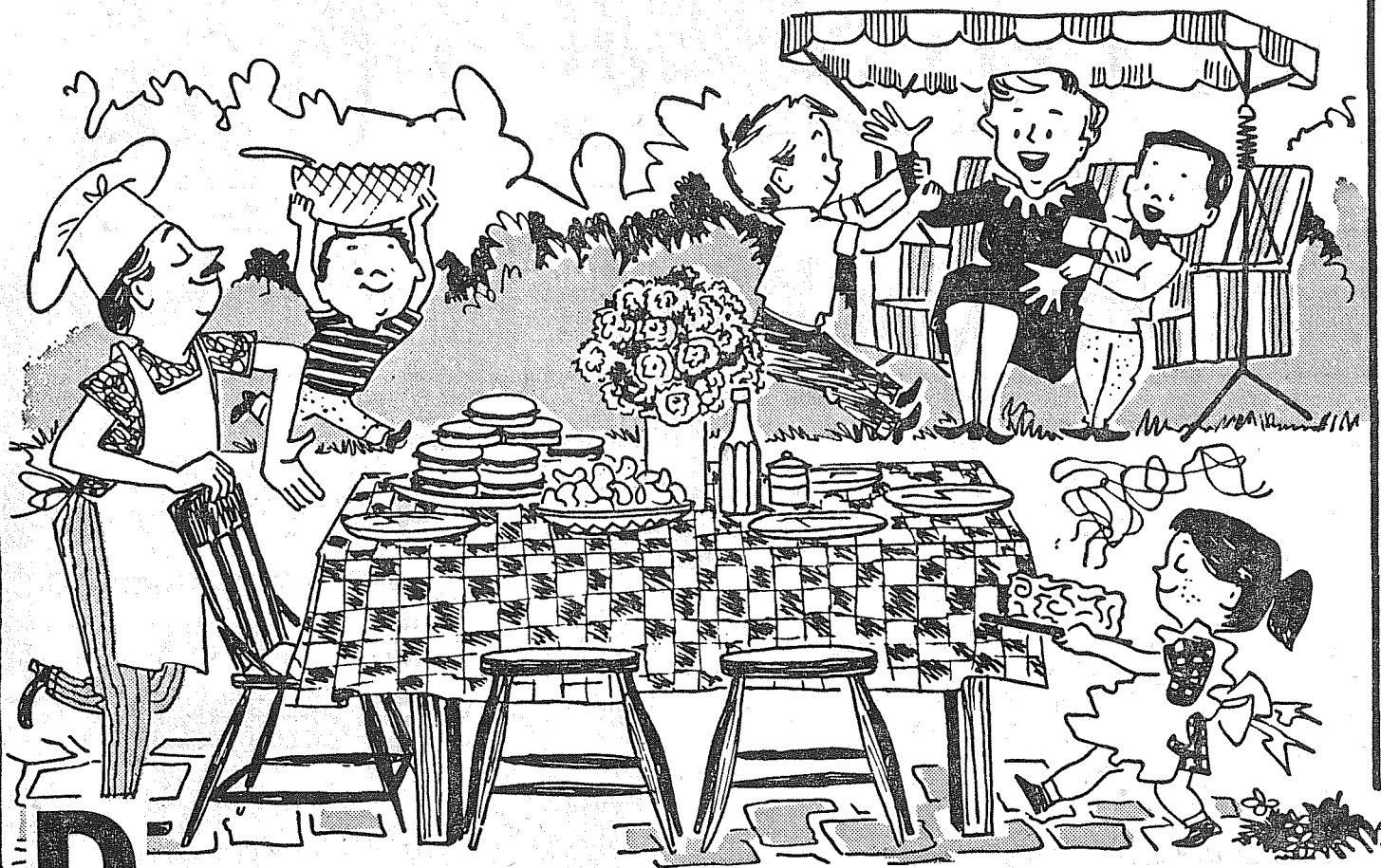



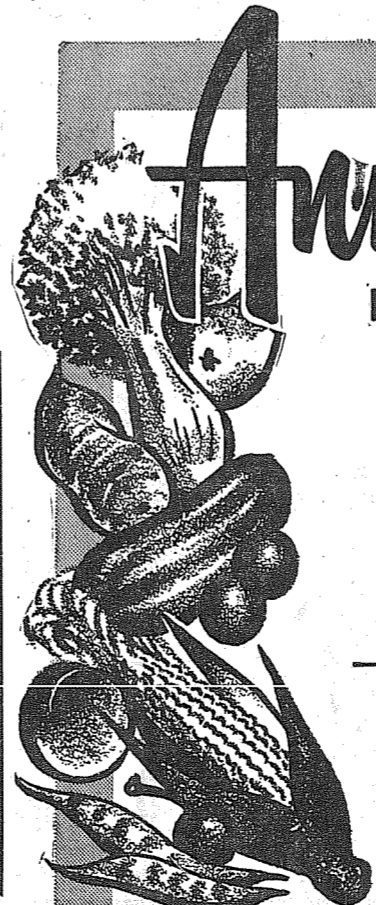

We are two concerned mothers with questions in our minds — who and what is a juvenile delinquent? Webster says a juvenile is someone immature or undeveloped. Delinquent is to fail, do wrong, or failing in duty. We are wondering if there is an age limit. Are the youth of today the delinquents, or are the parents really the guilty ones? There are too many working mothers — resulting in a lack of proper home supervision and no time for companionship. To make up for this, and to save their one conscience, money is handed to the kids, so they don't learn money should be earned. There is too much play and leisure time — not enough constructive and instructive work.  
 Why is it common practice for some adults to stamp the term "juvenile delinquent" on our teenagers? A common conversation to hear is, "The kids nowadays are sure worse than when I was a kid." We don't believe this to be 100 per cent true by any means. It is only an excuse for our own failure or maybe we're too old to remember back to our "model" childhood.  
 If a child is guilty of being born on the wrong side of the tracks, or a friend of the wrong "guy", we as adults, aren't willing to look for the good in them to see something worth salvaging, or give a helping hand. Instead, we are too ready to help push them down — not physically, but by word of mouth, or a cold shoulder.  
 Why are some parents so apt to say, "All is well in my own back yard, my kids aren't involved". So they close their eyes and ears and say it doesn't concern them. Have they stopped to think that some day their little "dears" may wind up wanting to marry a so-called "juvenile delinquent?"  
 Many of our teenagers do have problems, and no one they can turn to. Let's use our energy to help them, instead of condemning them.  
 We are mothers of teenagers. We are willing to take the stand that confidence, love, and understanding will pay dividends. By being real parents and putting faith in our youth today, gives us a stronger tomorrow.

The inbound movement of general cargo and hardwood lumber increased considerably at the Port of Tacoma last year, according to the 1959 report issued by the publicly-owned facility this week.  
 Receipts of cargo soared from 27,774 tons in 1958 to 69,282 tons last year. At the same time inbound lumber—principally Lauan from the Orient—almost doubled to 8,732,766 feet, the report showed. The 1959 total made Tacoma the major U.S. receiving harbor for Japanese-produced Lauan lumber.  
 Outbound general cargo jumped from 42,818 to 63,692 tons.

### County Agent's Corner

 Pheasant chicks will be bouncing all over Pierce County soon. Last Tuesday twenty 4-H members received 3,900 fertile pheasant eggs from the South Tacoma Game Farm. Most of these will be custom hatched at Bonn's Hatchery in Edgewood. The bouncing little feathered friends will come out of their shells during the latter part of May.  
 During the following ten week period the 4-H members will be busy feeding, watering and keeping the pheasants out of mischief. The little rascals like to pick at each other. Cannibalism is the number one problem. Most successful pheasant raisers allow at least seven sq. ft. of yard space per bird. The yards need to be completely enclosed, too. Wire on the top and sides help keep the pheasants in and the cats and dogs out.  
 When the pheasants are ten weeks old the department buys all healthy birds and releases them in selected wooded areas. You guessed it—the next step is that they will be used as common fodder for hunters this fall.

### County Agent's Corner

New Report on Northwest's Oldest Arboretum

The Wind Arboretum, located about 30 miles north of Bonneville Dam, is the oldest arboretum in the Northwest. It was established in 1912 to test the suitability of trees from all parts of the world for forest planting in the Douglas-fir region. To date, the study covers 621 lots of seed or planting stock. Research Paper 33, "The Wind River Arboretum", is a 50-page illustrated circular summarizing successes and failures (mostly failures) of these trials up to 1956. Copies are available from the PNW Forest Experiment Station, P.O. Box 4059, Portland.

Hardwood species almost all failed and no additional species were added after 1928. There are species from most genera of conifers. For example, 62 species and varieties of pines have been tried, of which 42 were living in 1956. Of 28 species and subspecies of Abies, 24 were living. The larches (Larix) are the only genus of all those tried that equalled native Douglas-fir in height growth, but their showing became less favorable after 30 years.

One point is noted that is well for us to remember. Adequate tests of introduced species require many years. Coulter and knobcone pines were completely killed by frost in November 1955 after growing well for 39 and 43 years, respectively.

One of the purposes of the Wind River Arboretum site have available as many forest-tree species as possible to serve dendrological study and exhibition purposes. This Arboretum is a place to visit if one wishes to see conifers by the

The automobile was such a novelty in 1896 that the Barnum and Bailey Circus displayed one as its main oddity.

Today there are more than 80 million passenger cars traveling on the world's roads and about 56 million are owned by Americans.

That's enough cars to take every man, woman and child in the U.S. for a Sunday drive at one time . . . with room left over for all the people of Great Britain and France. And even then, there would be 15 million empty seats.

Statistics also show that private passenger cars in the U.S. travel more than 500 billion miles a year . . . a distance greater than 2,700 round trips to the sun.

All of which probably has you ready to say "So what?" The "So what" of the situation is that we're building, selling and buying cars faster than our highways can be developed to handle the hordes of newly purchased autos.

Two car families were few and far between a few years back yet today the one car family is nearly the exception to the rule. Our population is exploding and as it does so does the need for more and more cars and in turn the need for more and better highways. It is impossible to supply the latter in proper retrospect to the need.

What's the answer? As I see it more people will have to take to the air. Small aircraft sales hit an all time high in 1959, yet the percentage of earth bound mortals taking to the air is but a dribble where a regular flood is necessary to preserve life and property.

Statistics prove that you are four times safer in the air in your own plane than you are on the highway in your car. This margin of safety should grow, if anything, as more people take to the air and greater thought is given air travel. Off the ground the room for maneuverability is unlimited. On the ground in a car you are limited to a ribbon of blacktop or concrete. Why then don't more people get into the air and live? The answer is simple. FEAR! Fear caused by the American press playing up private aircraft accidents far beyond their normal scope of importance.

Take the case of one issue of a daily newspaper I read dated April 25th, 1960. On page one was a story with a 2 col. 2 line head in large type stating, "5 Die In Flames, 3 Hurt As Light Plane Hits Car," and under a dateline of Columbus, Ohio, there followed 5 3-8 column inches of story which told of a private plane running into a car when trying to land on a highway. This story was set up in the exact same style as another story on the front page stating, "700 Killed, Thousands Injured In Iran Quake", with 6 7-8 col. inches of news following under a dateline of Tehran, Iran.

On this same front page was a story with a 1 col. 2 line head in large type stating, "Fatal Chute Meet Probed" and under a Seattle dateline appeared 3 col. inches of story which announced a meeting that I know for a fact was never scheduled to be held in the first place. The story referred to the first fatal parachute jump by a civilian in the N.W. in years.

This chute story was set up in the same style as another front page story stating "Two Women Killed In Fife Crash."

On page two of this same paper appeared two stories side by side one with a 2 line 1 col. head stating "Local Man Hurt In Oregon Crash" and under a Eugene dateline 1 3-8 col. inches of story. Beside it appeared a 1 col. 3 line head stating "Plane with Bad Prop Lands On Calif. Race Track" and under a San Mateo Cal. dateline appeared 1 1-4 col. inches of story that to anyone with a knowledge of aviation would prove about as interesting as a story of a flat tire would to you.

On page three appeared another story with a head in large type stating, "2 Still Lost With Bomber," and under a Hill AFB Utah dateline appeared 2 3-4 col inches of story.

On page six appeared a 1 line 2 col head stating "Head On Crash Kills Family" and under a dateline of San Luis Obispo appeared only 2 1-2 col inches of story telling of the tragic death of a whole family of five and a friend in a highway accident.

Finally back on page 14 I found a story with a 1 col. 2 line head stating "Bus Crash Kills 4, Hurts 8" and under a Baton Rouge, La. dateline appeared 4 col. inches of story. Here was a story equally as important and involving the same number of people as the plane crash story and from the same distance away from the N.W. yet in some editor's thinking it only rated page 14.

Thus one paper devoted 5 1-8 col. inches more news space to aircraft stories involving only 13 people than it did to a story involving 700 deaths and thousands injured.

This is the reason lots of folks don't fly. The American press, in my way of thinking, is selling the aviation industry down the drain by playing up even minor accidents involving aircraft far beyond their importance.

Last year alone 548 people lost their lives on the highways in the State of Washington and I'll bet you can't remember the details on more than a dozen of these, yet you can probably remember a 3 col. picture and story appearing on page one of a N.W. daily showing a small private plane which crashed back in Maine killing 2 people some time last year. Why is this? The answer is simple enough. Most of the stories on highway deaths were buried someplace between page two and sixty four unless they happened right here in Pierce County. Out of state accidents resulting in death usually don't make our papers unless its a semi-slaughter, with three or four people involved.

All I can suggest is that you folks take a good hard look at the facts and figures, disregard over emphasized adverse aircraft publicity and get into the air and live.
