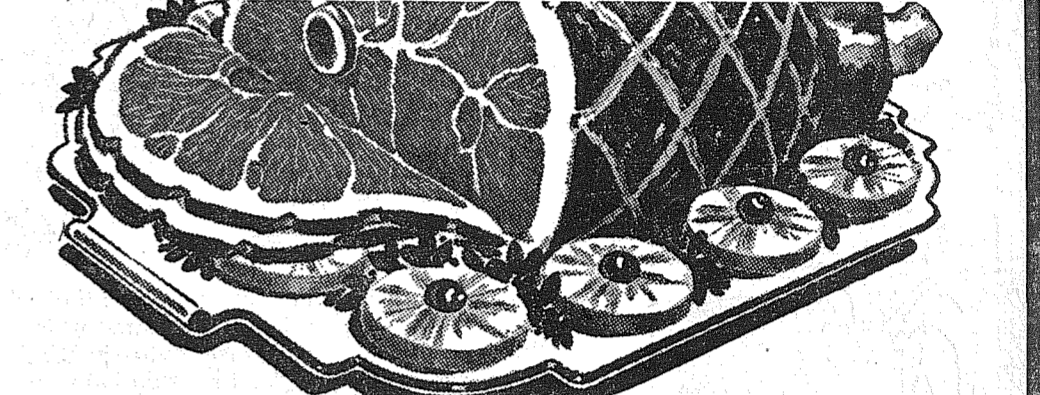

## Pirates Favored To Hand PLU Fourth Straight Loss

Riding the crest of a five game winning streak, Whitworth's undefeated league-leading Pirates will storm into town Saturday to take on the Pacific Lutheran University Knights. Kickoff time will be 8 p.m. in Lincoln Bowl.

Led by ace passer Denny Spurlock, junior quarterback, the Whits rank as one of the top small college elevens in the nation. Spurlock leads the league and nation in passing and total offense. Coach Jim Gabrielsen's Lutes, who have suffered three straight setbacks without victory in Evergreen play, are underdogs in this tilt. PLU's weakness has been pass defense and the Knights will be up against one of the best aerial games in the land.

Gabrielsen is planning some shifts this week in his defensive alignment in an attempt to bolster his defense. "We will have to get more mobility in our defensive backfield if we hope to hold down those rampaging Pirates," he said. The Lutherans came out of the 26-6 homecoming loss to Western in good physical condition with the exception of a head injury to defensive line standout John Mades. The powerful junior guard suffered a slight concussion and may have to sit out the Whitworth engagement.

Lute quarterback Doug McClary had an off day against the Vikings but his season's mark is still good with 48 completions on 99 tries for 478 yards, and five touchdowns. Bill Lennon, senior end, has gathered in 15 aerials for 212 yards and four TD's, and Dave Bottemiller, All-Conference junior wing-

man, has pulled in 19 passes for 188 yards.

This week's starting eleven for PLU will have Bottemiller and Lennon, Ken Knutsen and Bruce Nunes at tackle, Norm Juggert and Dick Johnson at guard, Al Svinth at center, McClary, Bruce Alexander and Dave Reynolds at the halves, and Ron Ratliff at full.

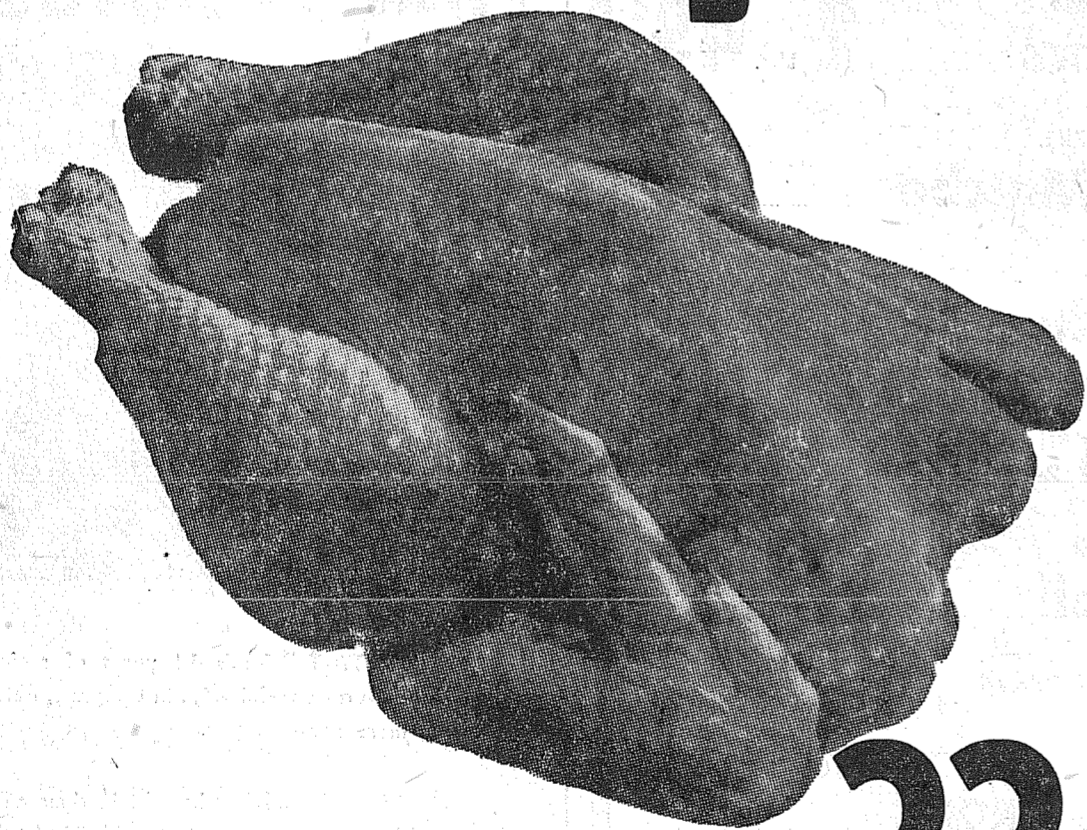

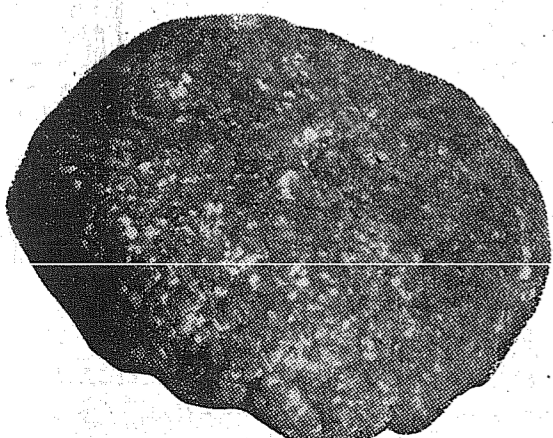

## a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

With JACK BROWN

Bad news, it seems, often gets more attention than good. This little truism can be applied to the American economy. Isolated declines in certain fields of production, and even mild slowdowns in certain growth rates, have been singled out during the present campaign and pessimists have deduced from these that there is serious trouble ahead.

The problem this presents is apparent. In the words of a top executive of U. S. Steel, "There is danger that our people will forget, if only temporarily, how strong our country is, how great its accomplishments and how dynamic and promising its future."

No sensible man argues that everything is perfect in the economy, and that all the widely varied indications used to measure its ups and downs are precisely as we'd want them. But even a quick survey of the facts and figures demonstrates that the plus factors outweigh the minus ones — and by very wide margins.

Here are some of those facts and figures I've obtained from Industrial News Review.

The gross national product — which is the total value of all the goods and services produced in this country — is the most comprehensive measure of national growth. At mid-1960, it had attained a level of \$505 billion a year — a figure which would have seemed almost impossibly fanciful not many years ago. Moreover, the trend is still upward, even though by a slightly smaller percentage than in the immediate past.

Personal income measures the money we Americans receive from any and all sources — wages and salaries, dividends, pensions, and so on. It thus is the total of our nations consumer spending power. This August it reached an annual rate of \$408 billion — 4 per cent more than in the same month last year.

Retail sales, always an important barometer of conditions, have been running at very high levels during this year, despite more restrained use of credit and a material increase in savings. And it now looks as if 1960 auto sales will reach the second highest total in history — as much as 6.5 million cars.

Total construction, in the face of a decline in home building, is another highly encouraging factor. The anticipated 1960 figure is \$55.5 billion. That is well above the 1958, 1957 and 1956 levels, and only slightly under the record established last year.

One of the most important of all indications is investment in plant and equipment by industry. This is what makes future growth, and gives the nation new and improved plants to produce new and better products for consumers. Here, also, the picture is bright. The 1960 figure will be about \$37 billion — a whopping 13 per cent above that of last year. Investment in research is also growing at an explosive rate — which means more new and valuable products of every conceivable kind.

Employment and unemployment figures hold a high place in the minds of everyone — business executives, employees, consumers and jokers like myself. It is true that we have 3.8 million unemployed, and that the problem is a serious one in certain areas. However, last August we had 68.3 million employed civilians — 1.1 million more than a year before.

So it goes down an almost endless list of gains. And these aren't limited to production figures. Individual and family incomes have increased substantially and continue to increase. Our health is very much improved, as declines in the general death rate, and especially in infant and maternal mortality rates, show. Educational standards are rising, and more young people are studying for advanced degrees. It is significant, in this connection, that since 1946 nearly half of the Nobel awards for original contributions to medicine, chemistry and physics have been conferred on Americans.

No economy surges ever-forward with never a pause. In ours, as in others, temporary dips are to be expected. But, going by the massive weight of the evidence, we have every right to optimism, and to confidence in the economic future.

The publication Marine Digest, of Seattle, pays a well-deserved tribute to an Iron Workers Union local in that city. The members voted, by a large majority, to work weekends for four months without premium pay in order to prevent a quarter-million dollars worth of contracts from being lost. Had they not done this, the company for which the men work would have lost the business because of delivery date requirements.

Some unions, it seems, have criticized the Iron Workers' action, on the grounds that it breaks down working conditions. But the local involved doesn't see it that way at all. The big thing, in its view, is to save jobs and payrolls. Marine Digest observes, "This is, in our judgment, enlightened thinking on the part of the union, and the sort of thing that contributes most to management-labor understanding and cooperation." It can be added that more of that kind of thinking, in this era of intense world competition for markets of many kinds, would do wonders in building and strengthening the country. My hat's off to this group.



## Bethel School District Pop. Increase Slight

According to figures released this past week by the Bethel School District administration there has been only a slight increase in the school population in the Bethel District's seven schools. Last year, on October 1, there were 2,533 students attending schools in the Bethel District compared to 2,576 on the same date this year. This shows an increase of only 43 students from kindergarten through the twelfth grade, or a 1.7 per cent increase.

Superintendent John Milroy announced that the school census count revealed that the biggest increases were found in the kindergarten classes and the Junior High School. There were 240 children attending kindergarten on October 1, compared to 196 last year. The Junior High School, according to Principal Robert Minniti, had increased from 572 to 608 students in the three junior high grades.

Other school enrollments on October 1 of this year were: Roysons during the day, while the

Elementary, 122; Elk Plain Elementary, 332; Clover Creek Elementary, 326; Kapowsin Elementary, 343; Spanaway Elementary, 394; and the Bethel Senior High School, 430. Milroy points out that the Bethel District elementary schools have reached a good balance, in regard to the number of students enrolled, due to the additions at Elk Plain and Clover Creek Elementary schools. Last year the district began these additions to help alleviate the crowding at Spanaway Elementary school where the enrollment was nearly 600. The October 1 figures of this year indicate that the goal has been reached.

The largest classes in the district, beside kindergarten, are: Eighth grade, 233; third grade, 230; second grade, 225; sixth grade, 221; fourth grade, 217; and the seventh grade, 207.

Milroy also announced this week that the Bethel Schools will be closed next Wednesday, October 12, for the Washington Education Association Institute to be held in Tacoma. The Bethel District teachers will attend a number of sessions during the day, while the

students get the day off. School will be held on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of next week, following the regular schedules.

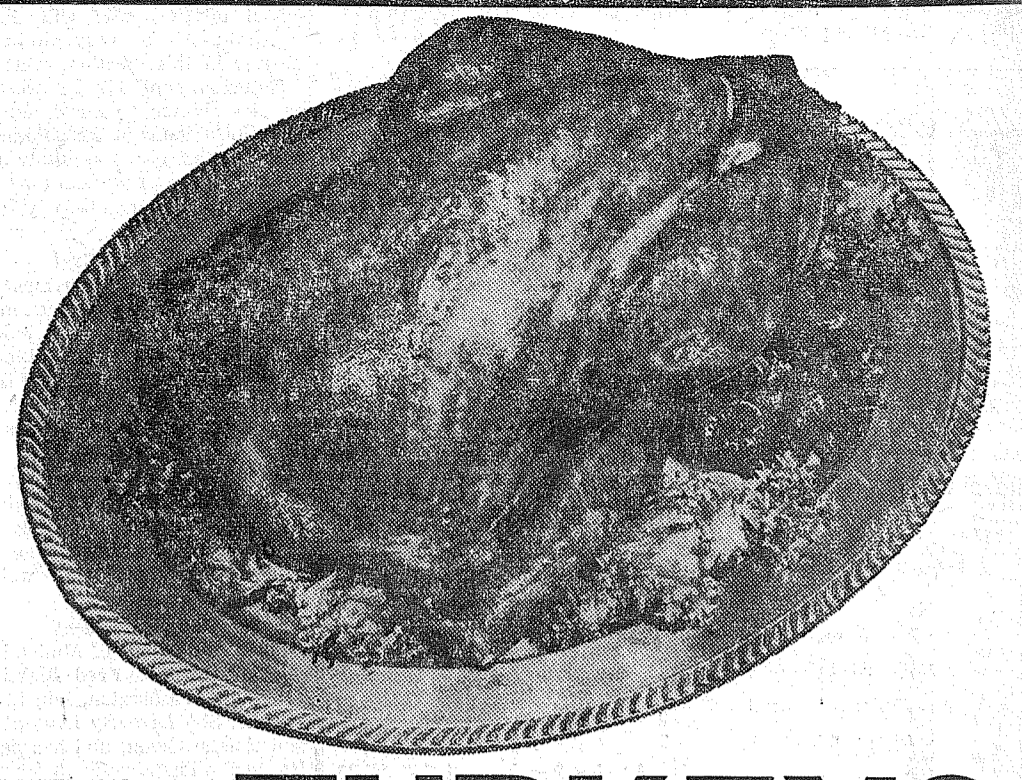

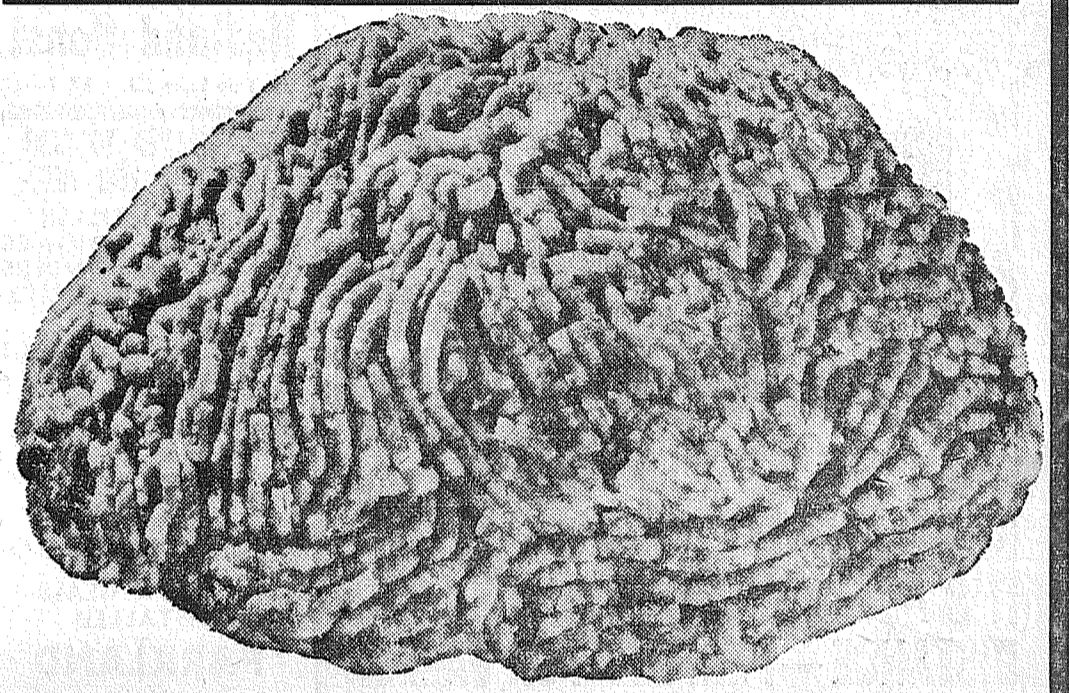

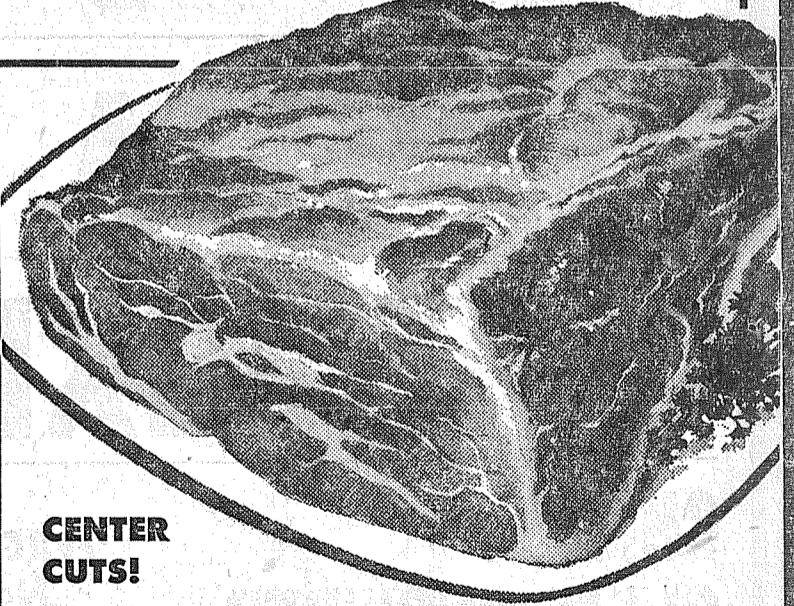
