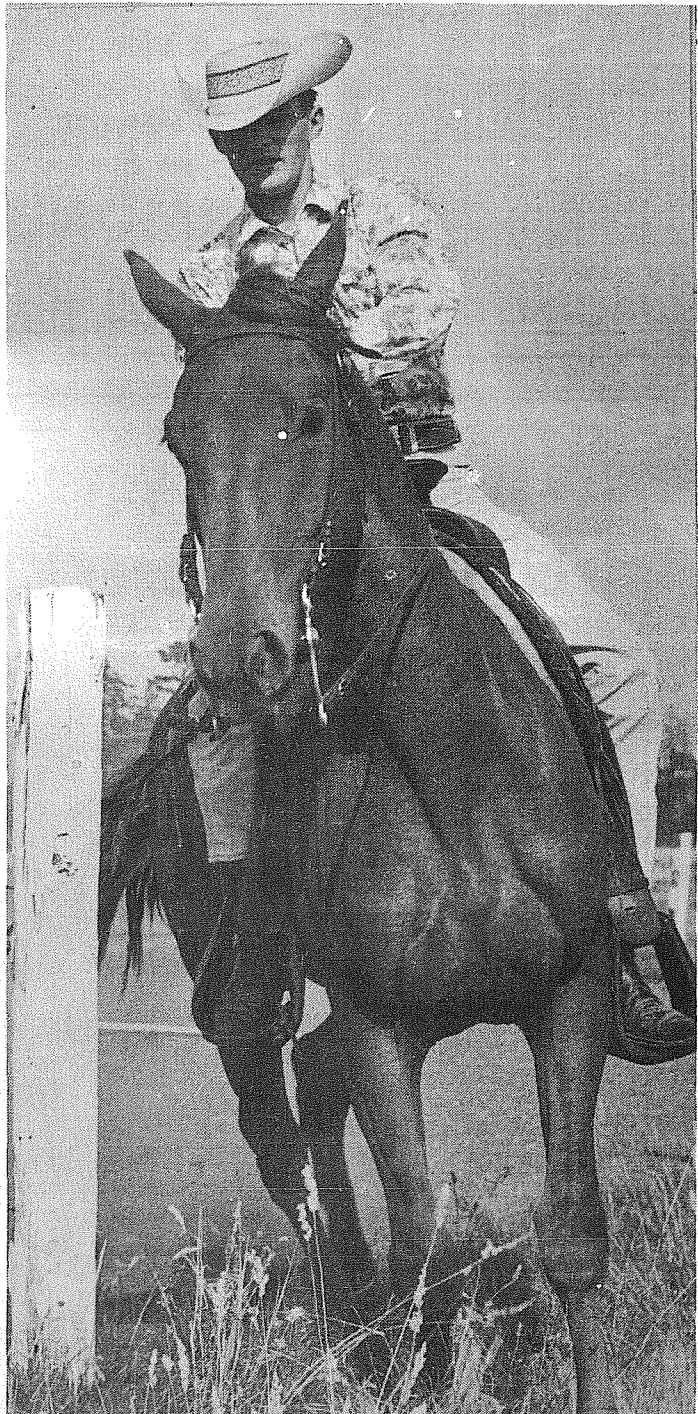

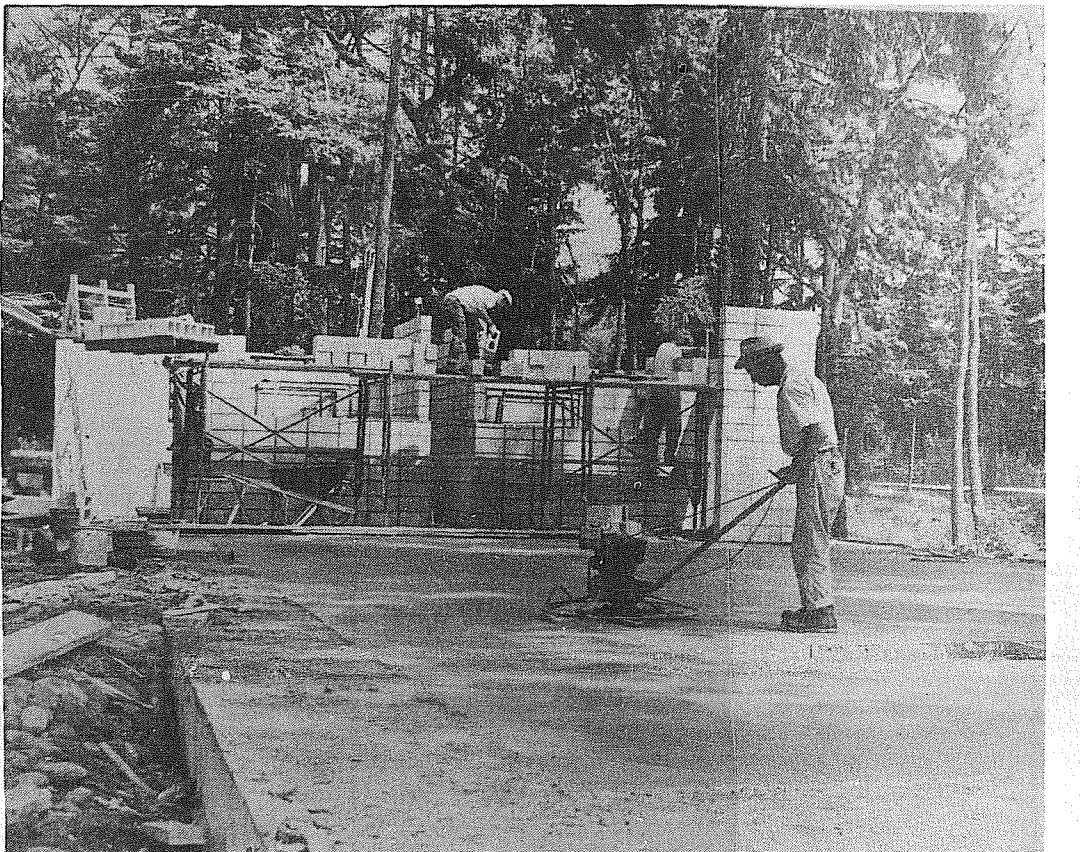
The other dairies to be visited are new, modern, efficient and designed for easy handling of cows and feed.

Willard Winters, Extension Dairy Specialist, will be travelling with the tour to discuss feeding in relation to modern day housing.

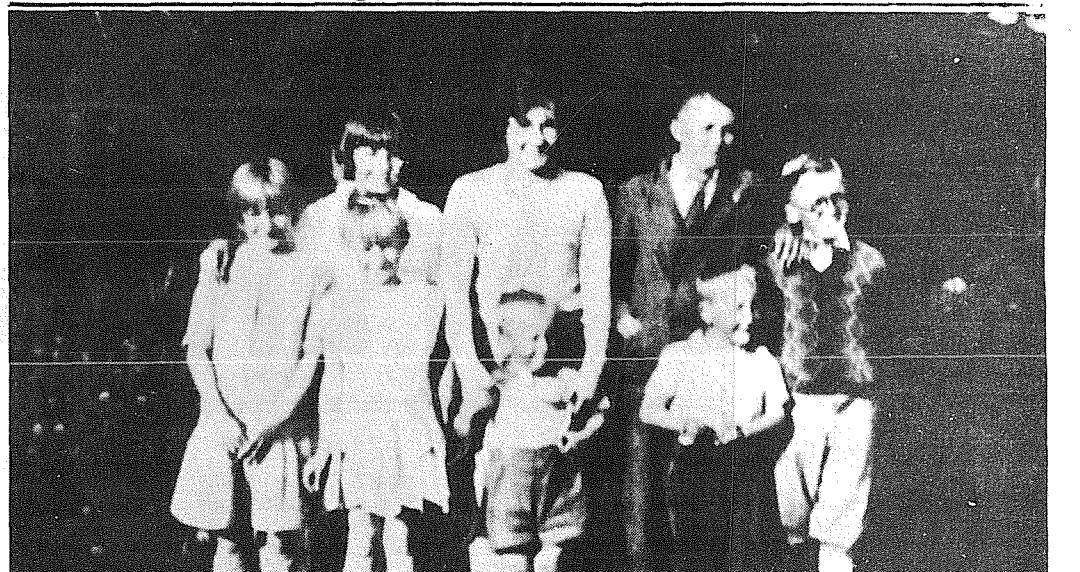

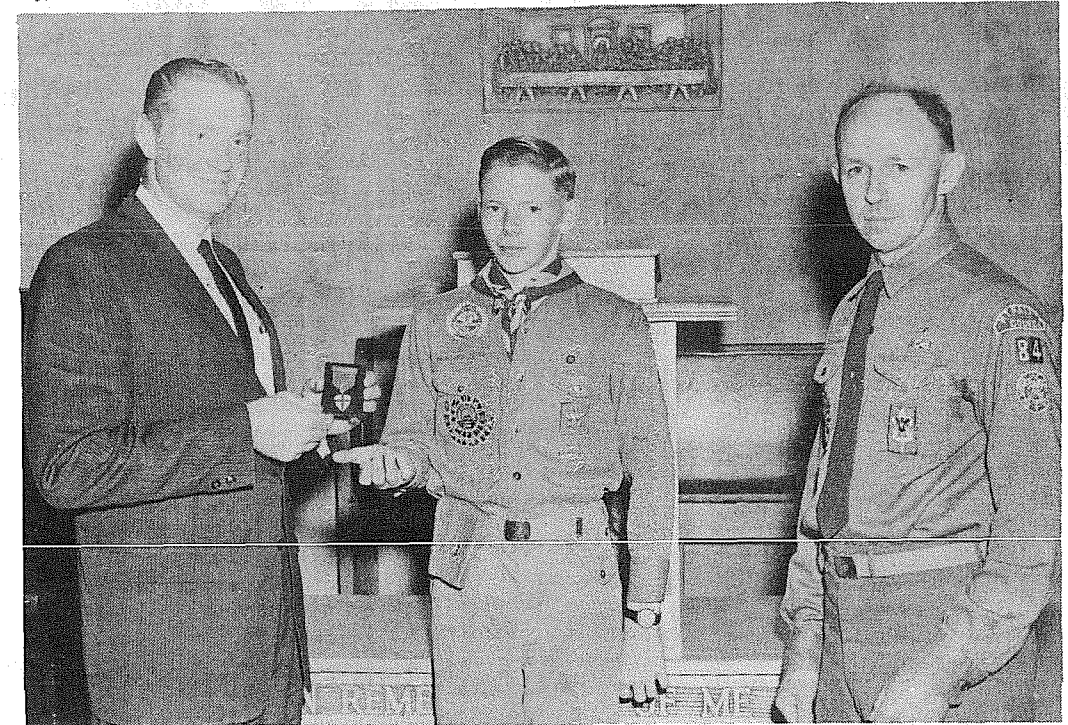

Last week I took off on the serious side and all the comment I received indicated that most readers of this column prefer the frivolous chatter that I toss out when in too big a rush to do any serious research. That's all well and good but I'd like to mix the serious with the frivolous because as a firm believer in America, our constitution and what it stands for I feel that unless I can get you aroused and cause you to carefully think over some serious matter occasionally I am failing in my duty as a newsmen.

Speaking of newsmen it seems to be the consensus of opinion that the real newsmen of this country are to be found only in the large dailies. Nothing could be further from the truth. You can find men just as dedicated to the fourth estate behind the desk of a weekly with only 1,000 circulation as you can behind the desk of a daily.

Actually in all fairness the weekly editor should be given more credit than that in that he is the one who has thrown aside all security except that which he creates himself. He is a man with the courage to sink his last buck into a musty old newspaper shop in the hopes that you readers will consider that he is doing a job for the community and his country as well and cough up a couple of bucks a year to buy his product. Many weekly now operate as does this one sending the paper out free with all revenue derived from advertising.

To all this you are probably thing, so what? What's Brown doing? Patting himself on the back? The answer is that since leasing out this paper I can now say what I've wanted to for a long time about those in a category I no longer am a member of since stepping up to a national publication.

So here's the thought I'd like to impress on you. Whenever you meet a weekly newsmen give him credit for being a real newsmen. True his stories may not be of rape, mayhem or war but his stories of Boy Scouts, 4-H clubs, tea parties and graduations are the backbone on American's freedom of the press. His stories nearly always are of the type that appear in no other publication. What would America be like without the knowledge of the little things in life?

Your dailies are far too crowded to bring the happening of each of it's little bedroom communities. There's a world of stupendous shock new. What do you suppose the outcome would be on future generations if all the little weeklies disappeared and all we had was the shock news? I seriously doubt the effect would be a welcome one.

Like I say. Give your weekly people credit, for credit is certainly due them.

Once a year it seems I have to stop and ponder the workings of the female mind. This year this pause for thought was stimulated by a visit to a beach down in southern Oregon. Thereupon I saw female forms in as near an undressed state as could be possible. The combined cloth from a dozen suits I saw would only make a one cup brassier for some women. It so happened that I knew society circles these particular near undressed creatures habited. There is a high society that condones no loose morals for unladylike dress on occasion of general assemblage yet they lounge around in the sand oblivious to the stares of the male gender on one hand and on the other were you to attend an indoor party requested by these selfsame women you could help but notice the efforts expended in keeping dresses at the proper place with reference to knees.
