Raper said the condition would be cleared soon by the company crews.

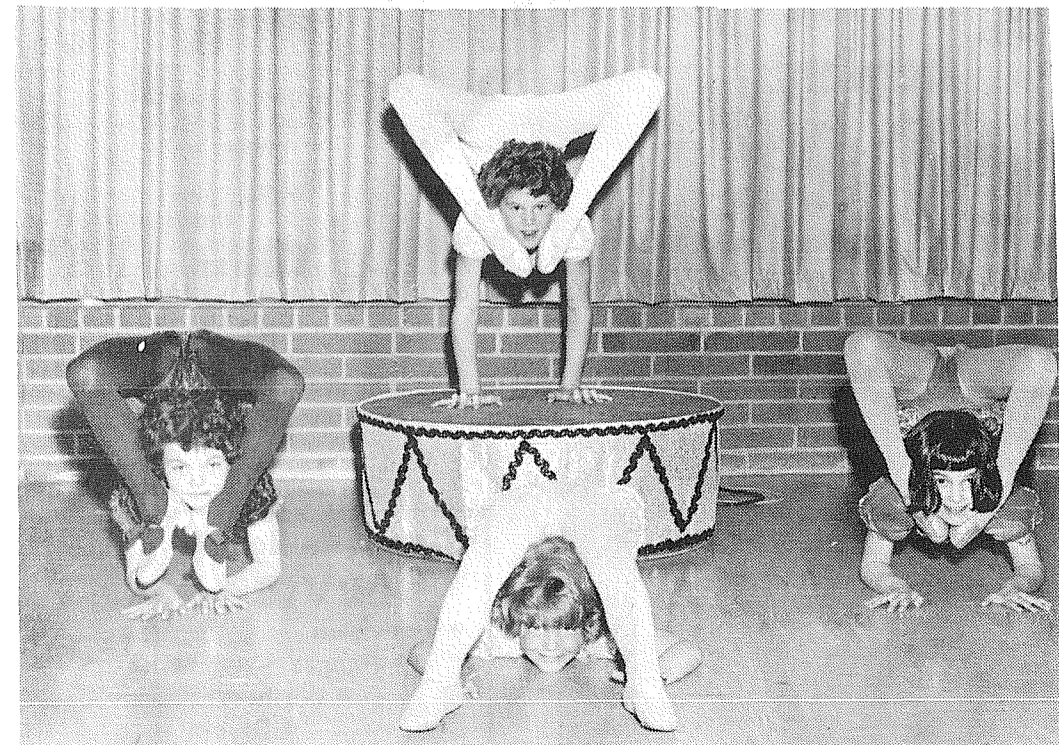

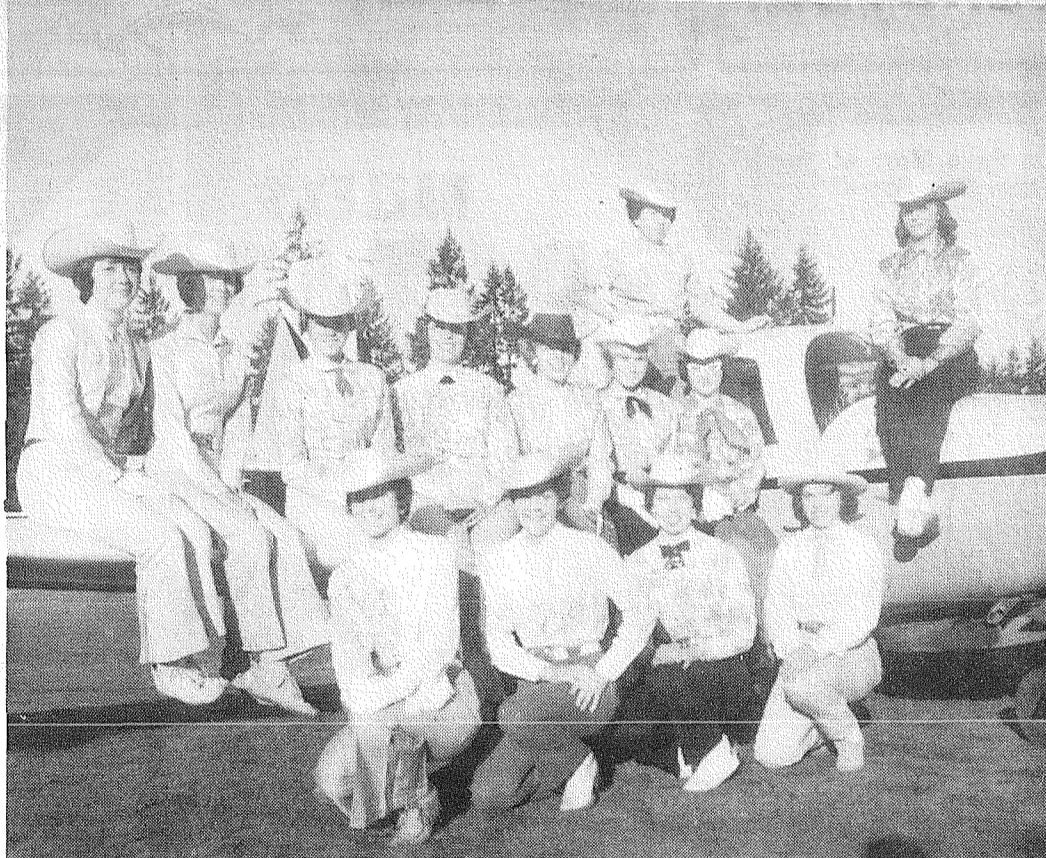

Valerie Clarkston Will Lead Groups; Rodeo Has Added Purse

More entries will take part in the Parkland Round-Up parade at ten a.m. on Saturday, May 25th, than in any parade in Parkland Round-Up history. Plenty of Indians, cowboys, clowns, western music, colorful floats, beautifully groomed horses, snappy drill teams, and bands will be in the line up. There will be a bona fide prospector's pack train, just like the 49'ers used in gold rush days.

Pierce County Sheriff's posse will lead the parade, escorting Round-Up Queen Valerie Clarkston and her court. These girls are not only beautiful but all are expert riders.

The parade will begin promptly at 10 a.m. at 96th and Pacific. Proceeding South, it will turn right at 121st and Pacific (Parkland Grade School) to Park Avenue, then South on Park Avenue to Garfield Street, back to Pacific Avenue, South to 138th where it officially ends. However, much of the parade will continue to the rodeo grounds at 137th and J Streets.

One of the features of this year's parade will be the Presidential Staff Car, a custom built Cadillac, used by two presidents, which will be sponsored by Kimball's Body Shop.

The automobile, an open affair, has rolled leather upholstery, 6-way seats, remote controlled windows, air conditioning, automatic trunk closer, attache case pockets, automatic door locks, thick pile floor covering, magic eye, huge souped-up engine and many other exciting features.

Each riding group must provide its own clean-up service.

Franklin Pierce and Bethel High School bands will march from Keller's Kort at 110th and Pacific to Lucky Store at 133rd Street. Laughon High School (Dupont) will march from 96th and Pacific to 133rd Street.

Trophies will be presented to the best band, best mounted group, best float and the best original entry.

Among the many events scheduled for the Parkland Round-Up this year, is the annual Fly-In Breakfast at Spanaway Airport.

Parkland and Spanaway merchants and residents are all set to welcome flyers from all over the Northwest as the annual feed is planned for Sunday morning, May 26th.

Model T Ford will provide the official transportation this year and all pilots will be furnished transportation to and from the airport. Flyers will have ample time to land, put on the feed bag, take in the Rodeo, and return home in daylight.

Man, talk about your hot weather! I've been sitting down here in Oregon under a sun umbrella all day and really melting. Barnum or somebody once said, "Never underestimate the stupidity of the public," and unkind as these words may seem they are none the less true.

Other signs say READ THE NORTHWEST FLYER, THE PILOT'S GUIDE TO BETTER FLYING. These plus some more signs such as SUBSCRIBE HERE! NOW! TO THE NORTHWEST FLYER. By now you, as a reader, have a pretty good idea that I am sitting here on my duster trying to publicize the Northwest Flyer and my crew and I are trying to sell subscriptions as well.

Now listen to the kooky things I've heard so far today. The number one show of ignorance is for someone to come up and look at our display boards all covered with copies of the paper, pictures, etc. and then after reading all, turn to someone and say, "But what is the Northwest Flyer?" Others come up and ask if this is where they can buy a ticket for the 2 cents per pound rides. Others want to give us a news item about aunt Matilda's bad fall over a thunder mug and then are surprised to find out that this isn't one of the Oregon dailies.

They even go as far as to come up and ask if we're selling trailers when it's as obvious that we're selling subscriptions as it is that a doll in swimming is getting wet . . . and you think old John Q Public can't be led down red lane without a struggle? It seems to me that half the population are running around without their brain being engaged.

Well, anyway, I may be getting sunstroke and fed up with people, but at least my youngest is having the time of his life. One of the local fly-boys is doing the clown bit around here and he's acting as helper. Quite a thrill for a five-year-old.

Over in Idaho recently there was one of the best object lessons pulled off that I have ever heard of. It seems that regardless of where we live there is always someone or a group joined together for the sole purpose of causing a neighbor or acquaintance trouble over some, often times imagined, harmful or injurious action.

Far too often some hard working person is maliciously subjected to harassment and loss of money in fighting some action or other that is intirely uncalled for.

The case in Idaho pertained to a petition to close an airport in which one man had nearly a quarter million dollars invested and some twelve employees who would lose their job should the airport close down. The reason given was that the airplanes coming and going caused too much noise. He howled long and loud once he found out that the airport owner had neglected to get Federal approval for the strip and thus left himself open to such nonsensical action.

The climax of the situation was that the Idaho State Director of Aeronautics, knowing full well that the injuries were imagined, stepped in to try and salvage the airport for the owner. This in itself was like walking into a cage of goosed tigers on a rainy night and he felt the claws of the petition signers. At any rate thru urging on his part the group seeking the closure of the airport finally agreed to run a test on the noise factor of the airport and the director sent to Hollywood for a decibel meter. The kid next door who took off on his scooter to deliver papers had rung the bell for second place. The city bus with it's diesel in the rear had racked up third place with it's four stops at the bus stop in front of the house during the test. Two other vehicles, guessed to be trucks, had rung the bell and then came the house phone, the door bell, a motorcycle backfiring, and finally the old four lunger plane and then the rest of the covey.

But stop and think. How many petitions have you heard of against someone for either real or imagined wrongs? How many times have you seen neighbors gang up against neighbor? How many times have you seen someone suffer because of action such as this?

The next time some joker shoves a petition under your nose, particularly one curbing the action of another, stop and give it a good long think before you sign.

PLU Professor Awarded Ford Foundation Grant

Dwight J. Zulauf, assistant dean of the school of business administration at Pacific Lutheran University, has received a \$3,000 Ford Foundation grant to continue his doctoral study at the University of Minnesota during the 1963-64 school year.

Zulauf will complete work on doctoral dissertation, "Measurement of Ability to Pay Wages," which deals with the concept of ability to pay in labor negotiations.

This subject is frequently raised in wage negotiations, but there has been little work done on what this term means and whether it is a useful concept. Zulauf will

formulate and examine the major variables which determine its magnitude. He also will explore the contribution accounting analysis, records and statements can make in attempting to arrive at a practical measurement.

Zulauf first joined the PLU staff in 1949. After six years of graduate study and teaching at other schools, he rejoined the staff in 1959. He received his bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Oregon and his master's degree in labor relations from Columbia University.

He also has taught at the University of Oregon, University of Minnesota, and Northwest Christian College.
