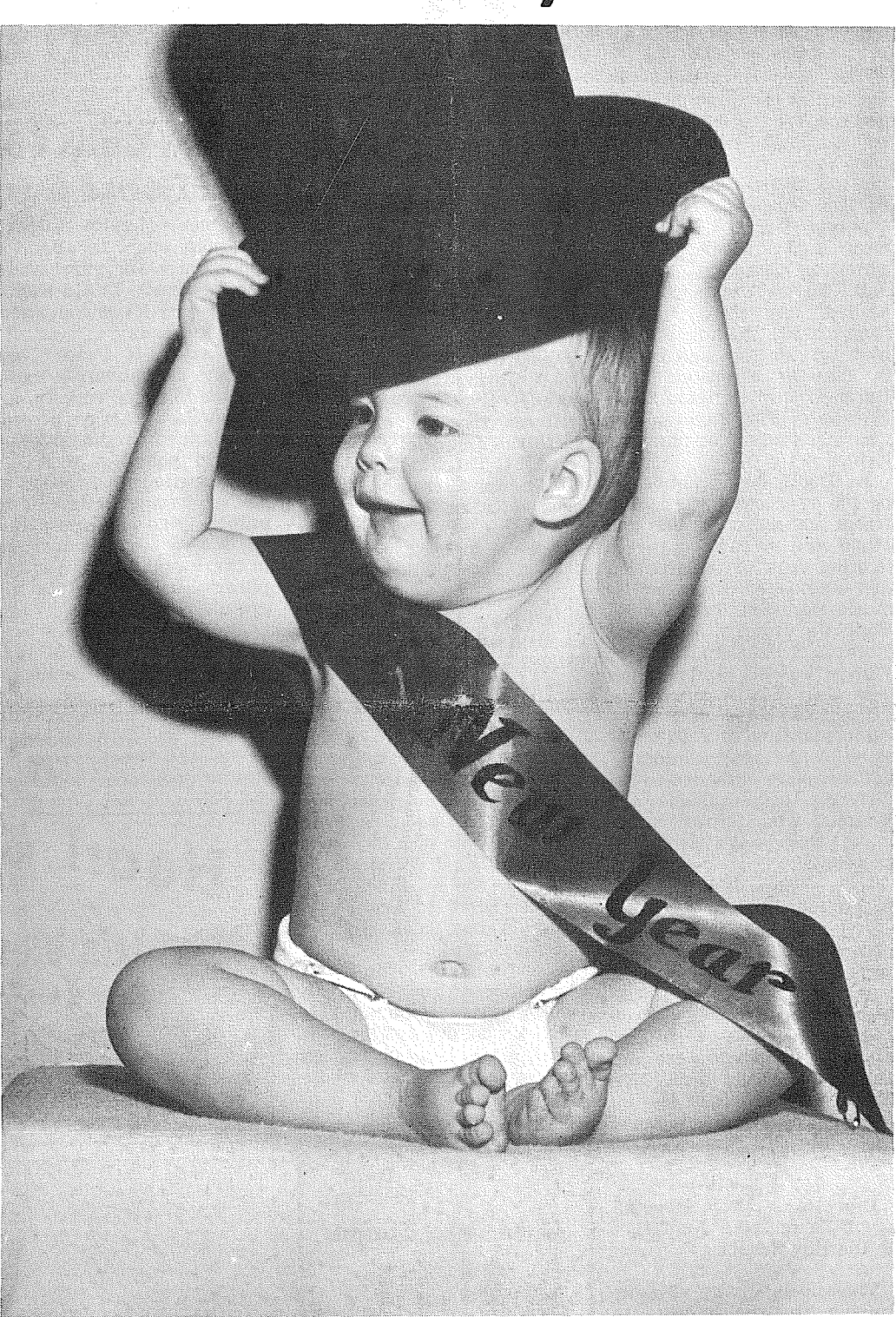

Growers Hear Specialists In Puyallup

Western Washington fruit and vegetable growers should circle on their calendars January 8, 9, and 10th to attend the 1964 Western Washington Horticultural Association meeting.

The meetings will be held in the Fruitland Grange Hall near Puyallup. John Dodge, secretary of the association and Extension fruit and vegetable specialist, says the 1964 meeting, like those of the past, will include a round-up of information from the experiment stations and growers experience.

The meetings are divided into three parts, says Robert Hulbert, Association President from Mt. Vernon. The opening day will feature rhubarb, cucumbers, beans, peas and cole crops. The final day will be devoted to information on small fruits production.

Also, Hulbert reports Thursday's program will include a discussion of future research in agriculture by Dr. David Allmendinger, Superintendent of Western Washington Experiment Station and a talk by Joe Strock, manager of perishables for Flying Tiger Airlines in California. He is expected to tell of interest and successes his company has had in moving fresh California fruits and vegetables to mid western and eastern markets.

Claims For Retirement Can Be Entered Early

If you are retiring at the end of this year and are eligible for Social Security payments starting in January or February, you may file your claim now, reports the Tacoma District Social Security Office. Jack V. Chastain, manager of the Tacoma Office offered the following points regarding advance filing.

It is not necessary to wait until you retire before filing your application. By filing your claim before retiring, you avoid any delay in receiving your first check.

- 1. Your Social Security number.
- 2. Proof of your age (birth certificate, baptism certificate, etc.)
- 3. Earnings information about yourself, i.e. what were your earnings last year, this year, and expected earnings next year.

By earnings the Social Security Administration means wages or self-employment income. Naturally, certain claims require additional information, but your district office will tell you if anything else is needed, at the time you file your application.

Everyone who files his Social Security claims wants his first benefit check to arrive as quickly as possible. By filing your claim a few weeks before you retire, you stand a better chance of receiving your Social Security check on time.

IRS Forms Available, Says Director Warren

Income tax forms and instructions for filing federal income tax will be mailed to State of Washington by January 1, well in advance of the April 15 filing deadline, District Director Neal S. Warren said recently.

Because the Internal Revenue is converting to automatic data processing, Warren also said that every individual taxpayer must have an identification number. This number must be correctly indicated on his tax return which will assure proper credit of payments, more systematic handling and faster action on refunds, and better maintenance of the tax account.

Quantities of all forms will be available for those who did not receive their forms by mail, after January 1 at local IRS offices and many post offices and banks. Mail orders should be sent to the Internal Revenue Service, Sixth and Lenora Building, Seattle, Washington 98121.

Warren urged that taxpayers prepare their returns carefully and file them as early as possible with the District Director of Internal Revenue, Tacoma, Washington 98402.

Aliens Must Register Soon

The United States Immigration and Naturalization Service announced recently that aliens are required by law to report their addresses to the Government during the month of January 1964.

John P. Boyd, District Director, pointed out that address report forms will be available at all Immigration Service Offices and Post Offices. He also stated that persons who are unable to pick up a form due to illness or other reason may have a relative or friend obtain one for them.

Cards should be returned to one of those offices. Boyd said that every alien is required to make this report except diplomats, persons admitted temporarily as agricultural workers and representatives of certain international organizations.

He also urged aliens to report before the end of January as willful failure to do so could lead to serious consequences.

a - Wandering . . .**

A reader suggests that I adopt this verse as my New Year's resolution:

I'll be careful of the words I use
I'll keep them soft and sweet;
For I never know from day to day
which ones I'll have to eat!

Now since it came in unsigned, I can interpret the meaning in several ways: A threat? A friendly word of advice? Or could it just be that I've been stepping on someone or some organization's toes?

In any event there certainly wouldn't be much point in continuing my column, if I were to adopt that policy, now would there?

The day following the Studebaker shut down I had to leave my plane in Kelso for some work I wanted done and failed to hitch an aerial ride home, so in desperation I turned to the "Galloping Pooch" for a lift.

The first thing that caught my eye when boarding the bus was a sign saying, "Do not talk to the driver while coach is in motion." This rather amused me, since it was apparent that the driver was a friendly fellow liking nothing better than to keep up a running gabfest with the passengers. This was all well and good and helped some of the other six persons on the bus to pass away the time.

I found myself thinking about the 6,000 employees back east that were out of a job and in analyzing the situation, wondered if they had anyone to blame but themselves. If nothing else, I thought, their case might open the eyes of others as to the dangers of completely draining the company coffers until there is nothing left for the stockholders.

Thoughts such as these seemed to have completely escaped the mind of our affable bus driver, for he was telling the rest of the passengers about his job and working conditions. Foremost in his mind seemed to be the thought that next year the employees' representatives were going to push for a paid holiday for the drivers on their birthdays. This remark brought me to life and I listened intently to this man's philosophy.

He seemed real happy with the thought that this would mean nine paid holidays for himself and his fellow drivers. He went on to point out that he usually put in a request to work on those holidays because he could really take home a bumper pay check after each one. As an example he pointed out that he had it made already for Christmas and New Year's Day. He would get up and take the early run from Olympia to Portland and return, that would get him back in plenty of time for the family dinner slated for 1 p.m. on Christmas day. He mentioned the fact that the family opened their presents on Christmas Eve, anyhow, so if he didn't work he'd just sit around and be in the way while preparations for the feast were underway . . . so why not make an easy \$75.00 for working on a holiday?

Now I wonder how many of you could run a business and pay that kind of wages for driving a self shifting, power steering and power braking bus to Portland and back. I wonder how long the "Galloping Pooch" will continue to operate in view of wages such as that and in view of the fact that they certainly are operating in the red on many trips now, as evidenced by the fact that seven seats were occupied in the bus, driven by a driver dreaming of a never ending fat paycheck.

More than anything else I wonder when some of the people like this good natured bus driver will wake up to the fact that what happened at the Studebaker plant could happen to them, too, unless they ease off someplace along the line on their demands.

It's a cinch we have enough people on the unemployment rolls now without more people crowding themselves into the same boat.

And now just in case any bus drivers happen to be reading this I'd like to point out to you a little fact that you may have overlooked. This jet age we're in has seen the airlines run off with the railroad passenger business due to the great savings in time offered at an equivalent rate. Today the new short haul jets capable of operating off very short runways like the one at Kelso are rolling out of the factories. Considering the fact that I can fly to Kelso in my own plane in 30 minutes and considering the fact that it took me over 3 1/2 hours to get back by bus, how do you think I'll travel once the airlines offer the same trip via jet in 15 minutes? You might just give this some thought and ask the heads of your union if the thought and the possibility had crossed their minds.

And just for the record, I own no stock in the bus lines so I don't stand to lose a thin dime except thru tax supported handouts to the unemployed.

On the local level, I wonder how many more years we will be forced to ford the lake at 130th and Pacific Avenue. For several years the highway there has been flooded everytime we get a heavy rain. Many times cars hitting the water without noticing the warning lights have completely disappeared in a roostertail of water or small cars have been washed off the other side of the road by the tidal wave caused by a large truck passing thru in the opposite lane. Sooner or later there will be a fatality there due to the water.

I've asked several people about the cure but always got the answer that the water is lower than the only available outlet, Clover Creek, so we'll just have to put up with it.

Just recently I heard a perfectly logical outline of a sure cure for the problem by a man, who is certainly not an engineer (a barber, in fact), but seems to be way ahead of our state engineers. He suggested putting in a sump with a pump and a line to Clover Creek and the installation of a check valve on the other end. Simple solution? Absolutely! Now why hasn't the highway department thought of it? The cost? Negligible considering the existing danger!

Now any of you who are as tired of driving thru the lake as I have become over the years, why not just ask the state department of highways why we must continue the inconvenience when there is a rather simple remedy for the situation? Who knows? Maybe they can be stirred into action.

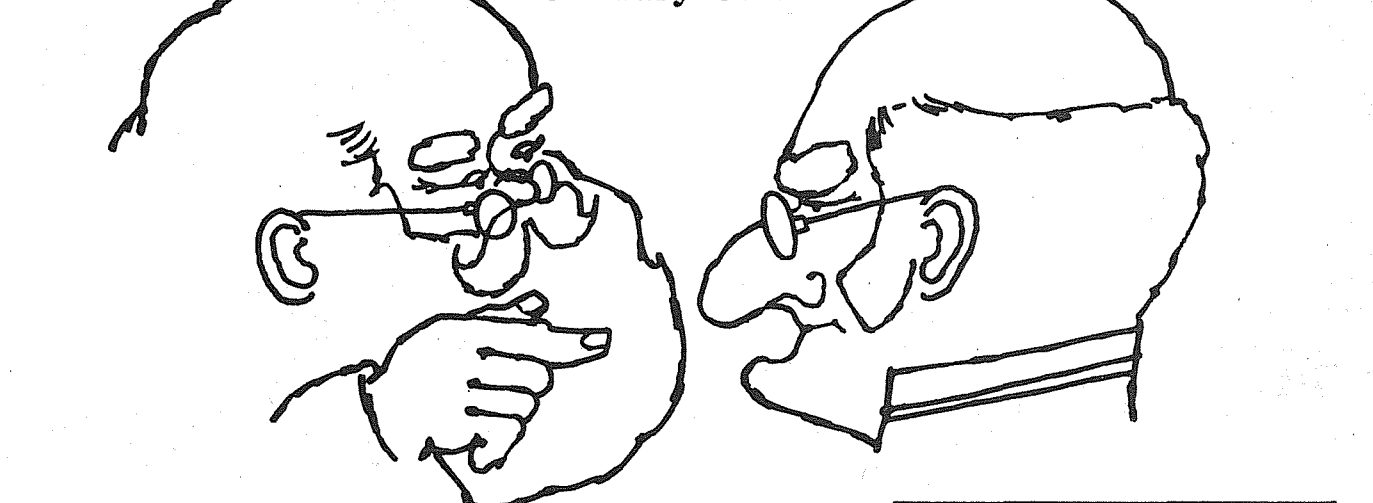

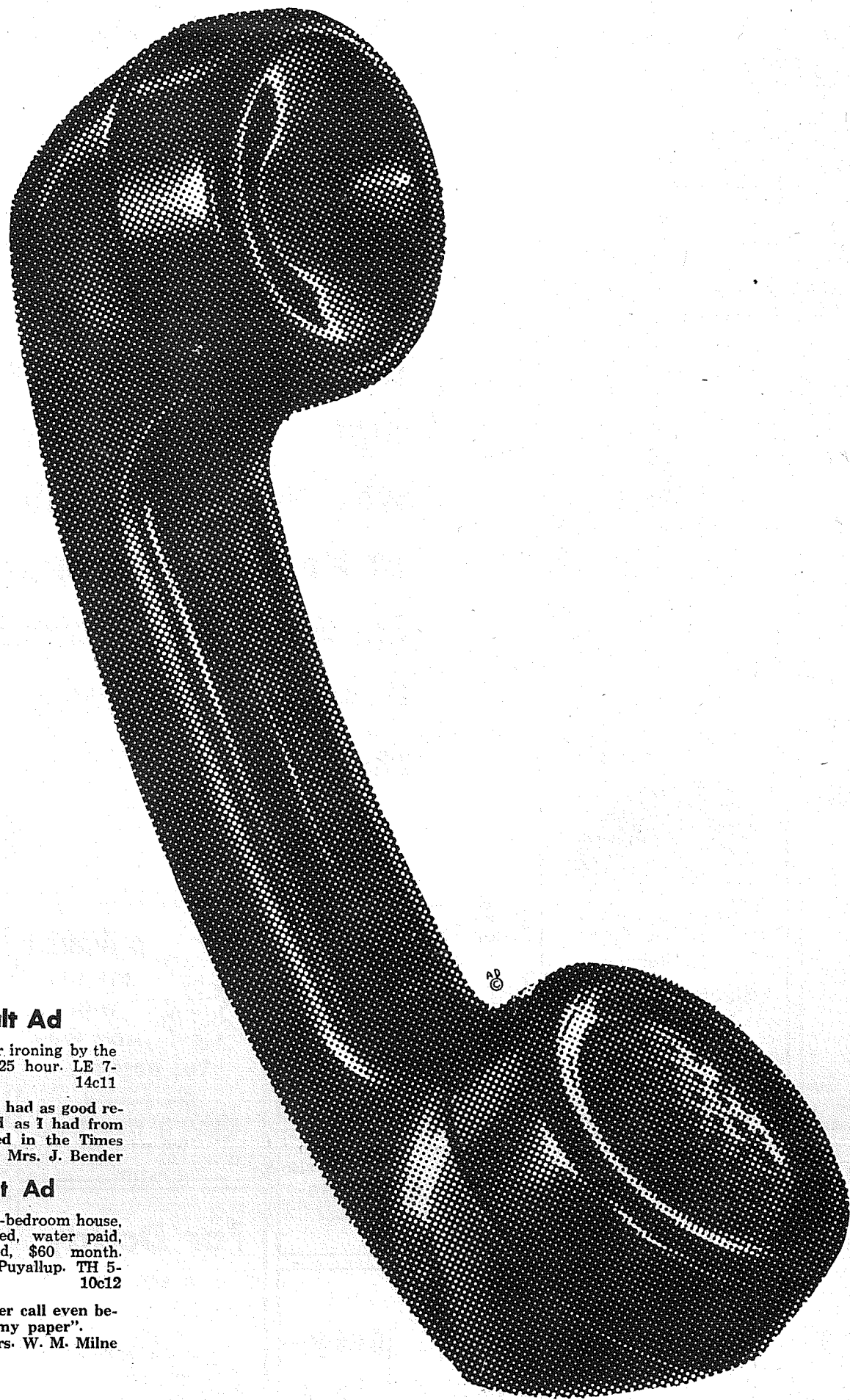

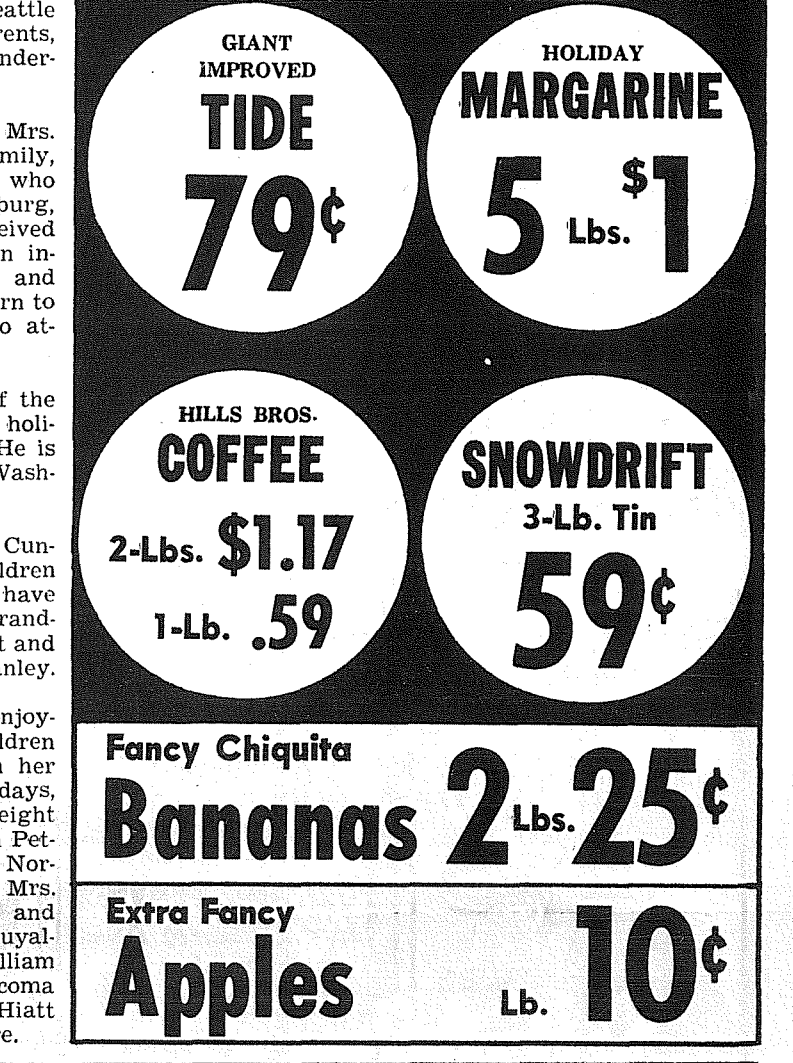

Agent Advises On Poinsettias

Thousands of these lovely, dramatic Poinsettias will adorn homes during the Christmas season. Jack Parsons, county agent, says the growing of this plant is an interesting and complex procedure. First of all, we call this plant a flower while actually it is a foliage plant. The showy part of the plant is modified leaves called bracts. While the small flowers are inconspicuously located in the center of beautifully colored bracts.

To regrow this plant for next year, wait until bracts

have faded and then cut the stems back to six inches above the pots. Next stop watering the plant and store it in a warm dry area to rest until May. In May repot the poinsettia and place it in a warm protected part of your garden. As it grows and sends out new shoots, pinch out the tips of the shoots when they are 3 - 4 inches. This pinching continues until mid-August.

As night temperatures fall below 60 degrees, the poinsettia should be moved indoors to a sunny south or west window. Parsons says that the shortened days of fall are a signal to this plant to prepare itself to bloom. We assist it by keeping it in an area where it is not exposed to night lights. Even short exposures to light will interfere with development of its color. It needs light during the day but absolutely none at night. It is a challenge to grow a poinsettia to maturity but to grow such a plant of beauty is a fine reward.

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U.S. Issues Tacoma Map

With the publication of the map of Tacoma and Vicinity, Washington, the Department of the Interior's Geological Survey now is distributing wall-size maps of 58 major metropolitan areas throughout the United States.

The metropolitan area maps include contour lines to indicate land elevations. They also show railroads, highways and streets, bridges, parks, hospitals, cemeteries, schools, and military installations.

On the Tacoma sheet, which embraces 270 square miles of area, the outstanding features include the complex port facility in Commencement Bay, the symmetrical interchanges of U. S. Interstate Route 5, and the area around McChord Air Force Base.
