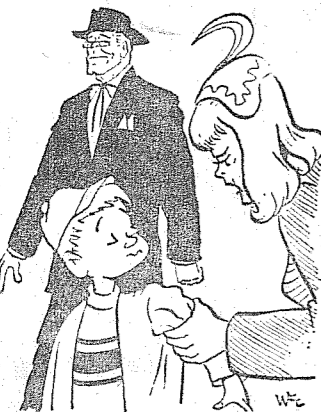
Baseball Jamboree

It looks to me like ghost town U.S.A. has moved to Parkland. I remember a few years back when Garfield St. was a busy happy street. Rain or shine people wended their way along its sidewalks. Some just out walking and some out shopping, but each adding to the excitement and drama of a main street that was alive.

Business houses were all occupied, with merchandise gaily displayed in windows and counters. The proprietors were a friendly lot, each serving his patrons with a genuine sincerity in his endeavors to treat them right, and uncomplainingly shouldering a share in the community's tax load.

Today there are 15 empty business sites in the Garfield St. area and ninety percent of the time you could shoot a shotgun down the street in either direction and not nick a native.

It's a sad plight. Garfield street, Gateway to Pacific Lutheran College, Ghost town U.S.A.

P.L.C. has become an institution in which every Parklandite harbors some morsel of pride for its accomplishments and its contribution to the advanced training of our leaders of tomorrow, yet each is beginning to feel shame over the condition of its doorstep, for it is haunted by the ghosts of bygone businesses.

How has this come to pass? As the college grew, so did its student body and as more and more students poured into P.L.C. from all over the nation its directors felt that more and more services should be offered them on the campus and therein rang the death knell for Garfield St.

Everyone loves company and Mrs. Shopper is no exception. She used to enjoy joining the merry throngs on Garfield street but as the gaily and laughter of the students retreated with them to the campus, Mrs. Shopper too retreated to other livelier places of business.

Unless we are to have the entrance way to Pacific Lutheran College lined with empty buildings and cobwebs displayed instead of merchandise from now on, some action must be taken immediately to salvage the businesses still left in the area, because I know for sure that more buildings will be empty in the very near future unless Garfield St. receives a shot in the arm, but fast.

It seems to me I read some place of another street which leads to the door of another of our great colleges in our land. Its problems were once similar to those of Garfield St. but today it has been renamed "Little Norway Ave." All of its business houses are occupied and each has undergone a face lifting to give it the "Old Country" motif. In some of these business houses standing side by side with those operated by the local citizenry can be found managers and salespeople who are college students working for credits in business management with the proceeds from their efforts going to the college in return for its investment and to further finer education on its campus.

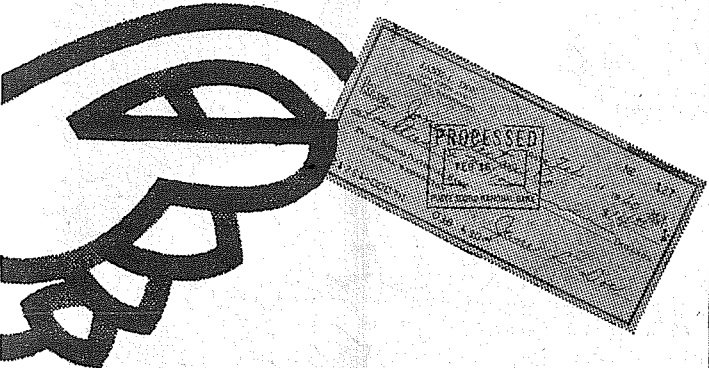
As I recall, it's said that the street is a happy lively street with people driving automobiles to compete with the college students for service in its stores.

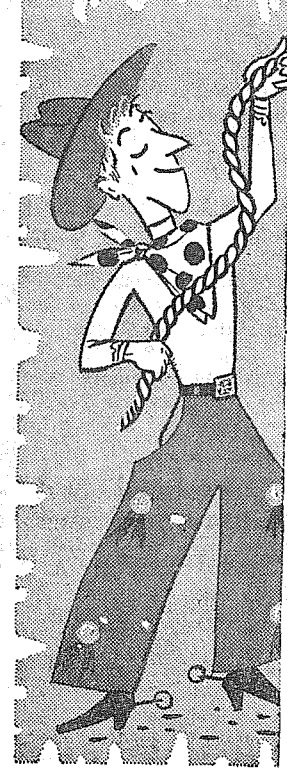

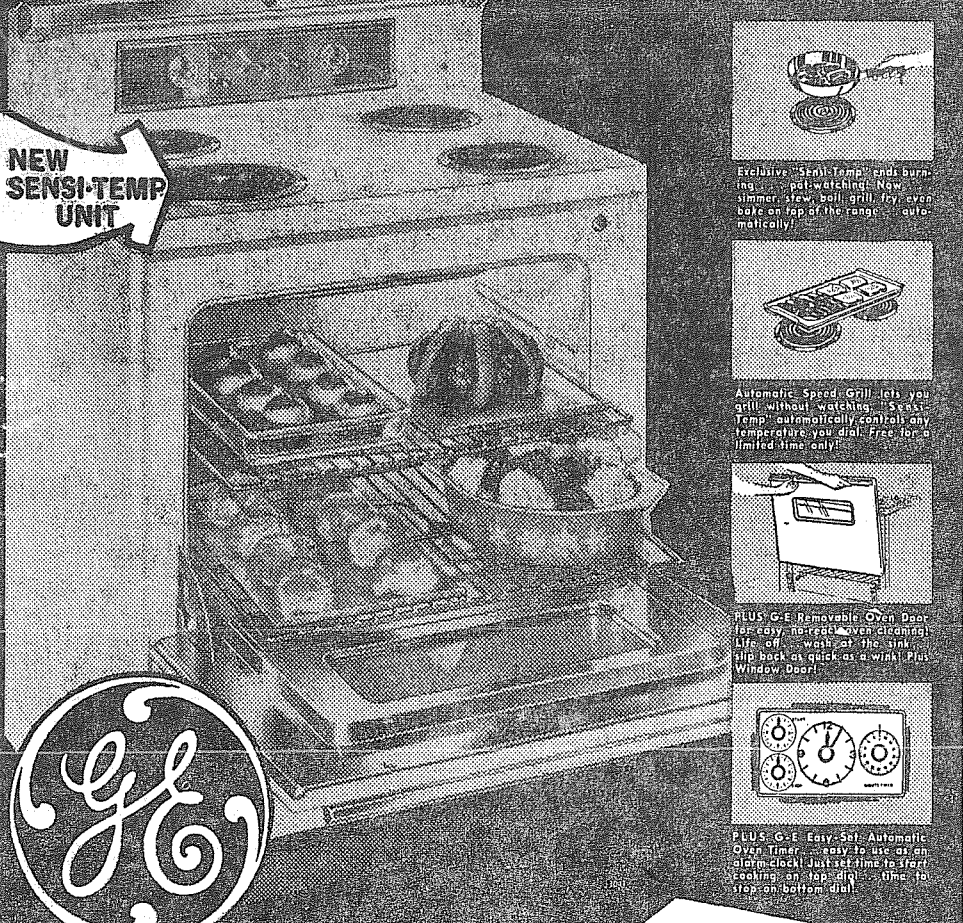

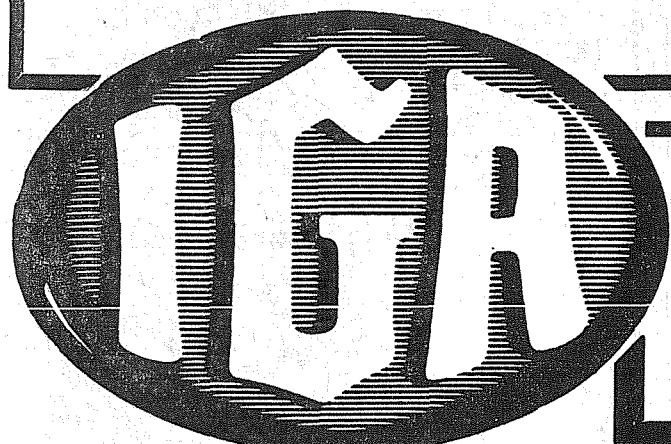

More Extended Phone Service Seems Assured
Pacific Telephone-Northwest customers in Sumner, Puyallup, and Graham have indicated they favor a plan to provide extended area service with Tacoma and Dupont according to manager Ron Johnson.

Some 50 per cent of the company's customers in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner returned cards in the company-sponsored mail survey. Johnson said 83 per cent of the customers who expressed their opinions were in favor of extended area service. Before the service can be provided, the plan must be approved by the Washington Public Service Commission.

The proposal would enable all customers in the three communities to dial directly to phones in Tacoma, including Dupont, without long distance charges. Tacoma and Dupont customers also would be able to dial Graham, Puyallup and Sumner directly without long distance charges.

The plan would greatly increase the number of phone customers in the three communities can dial. Puyallup customers will gain 17 times as many phones as they can dial now; Sumner 50 times as many; and Graham 212 times as many.

Regular monthly service rates in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner would be increased if extended area service is provided. There would be no increase in Tacoma and Dupont rates, but long distance charges to the three communities would be eliminated.

Johnson urged customers who have not yet marked their cards or mailed them to do so as soon as possible.

"We would like to have as complete and accurate a survey as possible before the results are submitted to the Public Service Commission," he said.

The plan would greatly increase the number of phones customers in the three communities can dial. Puyallup customers will gain 17 times as many phones as they can dial now; Sumner 50 times as many; and Graham 212 times as many.

Regular monthly service rates in Graham, Puyallup and Sumner would be increased if extended area service is provided. There would be no increase in Tacoma and Dupont rates, but long distance charges to the three communities would be eliminated.

Johnson urged customers who have not yet marked their cards or mailed them to do so as soon as possible.

"We would like to have as complete and accurate a survey as possible before the results are submitted to the Public Service Commission," he said.

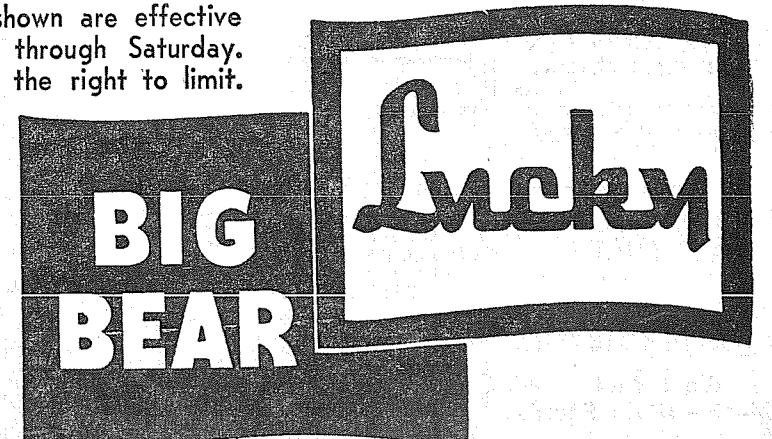

Water Safety Course Offered in Tacoma LEARN TO SAIL During the summer of 1960 the Puget Sound Sailing Association with the cooperation of the Metropolitan Park District is offering an expanded sailing program for the residents of the Puget Sound area, particularly those living in the vicinity of Tacoma. Starting on Monday, June 13, 1960, there will be a sailing school conducted at the port Waterway Marina, 1112 Alexander Avenue. There will be a class each morning from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon and another in the afternoon from 1:00 until 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. New classes will start each week and continue through the last week of August. Classes may be cancelled for those weeks in which registration is inadequate.
