Trash Burning Requires Care During Summer

—Says Chief Larson

Parkland Fire Chief E. R. Larson released the following statement this week in regard to trash burning.

With the coming months bringing added fire hazards, we urge all the people of Parkland to use extra caution in helping to keep our area free from fire.

It is important when burning that a fire permit is obtained from the fire department. Failure to do this is a violation of the law and subject to fine.

Do not leave fires, and watch them carefully so that children do not get in them and spread the fire so as to make them uncontrollable.

Landlords should pay particular attention to advise tenants as to the requirements of the fire department in doing outside burning. This year promises to be extra dry later in the summer, even more than other years, so extra care should be used when burning trash outside. About 90% of our brush fires can be traced to faulty trash burning and children with matches, so be alert for these conditions.

Fire permits will be issued on a day to day basis in dry weather and may be withdrawn at any time, depending on weather.

The Spanaway Improvement Corporation was formed for the purpose of cleaning up Spanaway Lake, in the area of weed control, trash removal, and to regulate boat traffic. The group also plans to investigate ways of eliminating the itch.

The original incorporators are Paul Boyle, Mrs. Lila Boynton, Joseph DePrito and William D. Swenson. The first meeting will be held at Spanaway Hall, in the park, at 7:30 p.m., June 13.

The group has set its boundaries as the Spanaway Loop Road, Military Road, Pacific Avenue and 176th St.

School Board Asked To Youth Meet

Franklin Pierce School Board members have been invited to the June 7 meeting of the Summit Youth Center Association, Inc., at 7:30 p.m. at the Youth Center.

The Association and the School Board have a problem concerning the future of the Youth Center, since it is built on School District land at the Central Avenue School site.

According to State School law, the building takes up part of the acreage needed for future expansion of the school and the classroom to be built. The Central Avenue School site is apparently near the limit for the present school building.

The Summit Youth Center building started in 1955 as a necessary meeting place for Scout Troop 76. The troop stayed in the school for 8 months before the building was started.

The group took four years to build the present building, which was dedicated in February of 1960. It represents donations of much time and money by the people responsible. A recent appraisal set the value of the building at \$31,000.

A review will be made of the past activities and growth of the building and the plans that are now being laid for the development on the grounds.

A series of district meetings of Northwest Dairymen's Association will be held through the Puget Sound area during May 20th through June 11th, it has been announced from the Seattle office of the Association.

The meeting for Pierce County will be held at the

Winter School Building in Puyallup on Thursday, June 6, at 8 p.m.

In commenting on the meetings, Joe Sutter of Puyallup, director from the Pierce-Thurston county district on the Northwest Dairymen's Association's Board of Directors, stated that the purpose of the meeting was to report on the operations of the Association for the fiscal year ending on March 31st, to consider amendments to the Association By-Laws to bring them into conformity with the new 1962 tax laws, and to discuss any other matters which may be brought before the meeting.

Representatives of Consolidated Dairy Products Company will be present at the meeting to report on the operations of the sales and operational branch of the Association.

Northwest Dairymen's Association is the organization which resulted from the merger of eight Puget Sound associations in November of 1961, one of which was formerly Washington Milk Producers Association. The membership is located in all Puget Sound counties as well as Clallam and Jefferson counties on the Peninsula and Kittitas county east of the Cascades.

The membership numbers 1403 and comprise approximately 40 per cent of all dairymen in the area. The operating report will show volume of milk handled for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1963, to be in excess of 5000 million pounds, with a gross producer value in excess of 22 million dollars.

Mrs. Webb has been a very popular teacher, both with her students and the people she has worked with, and she will be missed.

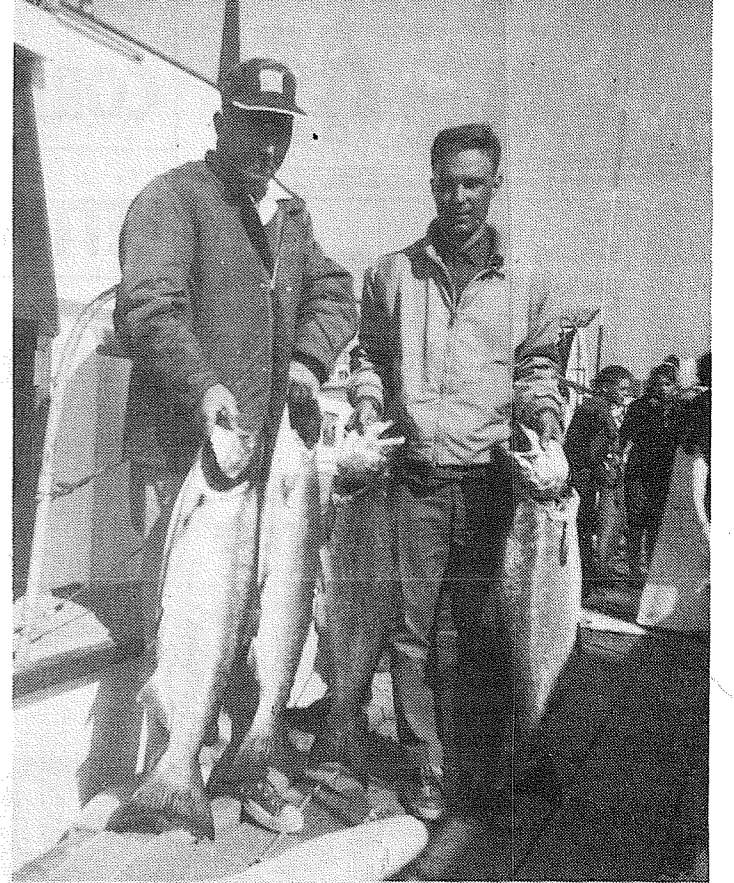

The U. S. Treasury has announced that, for the first time in history, the national debt has passed the \$300 billion mark.
This figure divides out to \$1,600 owed for every man, woman and child in the United States.
How do you enjoy the thought that whenever an American baby comes into the world nowadays, it arrives with a \$1,600 U. S. tax lien hung around its neck by a chain which nobody can break?

Not too long ago I wrote in this column about the unfair publicity given the aircraft industry every time some crop duster in Tasmania, or some other place, blows a tire or incurs some other minor damage. This past week I was the subject of just such unjustified publicity.
I fly a Mooney aircraft and have always been impressed by the safety features of the aircraft. One such feature is a built-in false bottom on the fuselage allowing a wheels up landing to be made without incurring major damage to the aircraft. A few years back an Oregon distributor successfully made over fifty wheels up landings in one day with the same aircraft and still flew it home that night. The other day I made just one such landing for real, because my gear warning horn failed, and subsequently received an undue amount of publicity. The only difference being that I did not have enough warning to stop my engine to protect my prop. However, I did make one of the smoothest landings of my flying career, so much so, that my youngest son, asleep in the front seat failed to wake up until the plane stopped moving.
By the time I got out of the plane you'd have thought a 707 had landed in downtown Seattle. People kept coming out from under the rocks and soon the plane was surrounded by a throng of thrill seekers, newsmen and police, all trying to ask questions at the same time and one hullabaloo in general.
We pulled the plane off the runway, I rented another plane and came on home to get a replacement prop to fly the Mooney home, which I did the next day without incident.

By the time evening came and I was trying to get my kids off to bed the phone was ringing off the hook with people wanting to know how badly I had been hurt, etc. It seems newscasters on TV had been hard put for spectacular news and were blowing up my minor misfortune into a gigantic thing. Finally in desperation I took my phone off the hook and went to bed in disgust.
By morning it seems that every radio newscaster in the country was expounding on the miraculous escape of one Jack Brown who had crash landed, (bellied in, smashed and several other choice descriptive words) his plane. Since then I have had frantic phone calls from my daughter in Denver, my mother in Port Angeles, my grandmother in Monroe and countless calls and even telegrams from friends.
It seems that only one reporter even took the time to verify the wild story and here and now I tip my hat to the Tacoma News Tribune for at least stating only the facts in the matter and for checking up on the news release before printing it verbatim.

Actually it was hogwash sent in by some obviously overeager reporter trying to make a mountain out of a mole hill. The magic word "Aircraft" seemed to light the fuse.
Anyway, my thanks to you who cared enough for my welfare to call, or who tried to call to check on my health. At least I got one laugh out of the above. When my youngest woke up and saw a bent prop staring him in the face he said, "How you gonna 'SPLAIN this?" That's what my insurance man keeps asking me.

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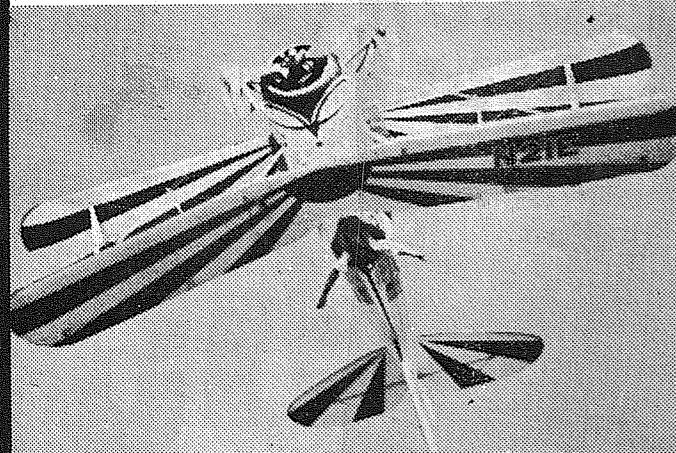
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
