# Air Show Here Aug. 3-4 With Voice Of Skyways

Every pilot likes to talk about flying, but few attract the audiences who listen to Bill Sweet.

Crowds from 100,000 to 350,-000 are the rule rather than the exception each week end as Sweet, the self-confessed "Voice of the Skyways", describes one of the smallest, yet most dramatic facets of general aviation — the areobatic action of the pilots in his National Air Show which will be at Thun Field, August 3 and 4.

It's old fashioned aviation brought up to date by two of the nation's top aerobatic pilots, Harold Krier and Charlie Hillard, Jr., and Sweet "pitches" the show. Light Aviation Fan



taxes and everybody has to pay theirs. But did you ever stop to really consider how they are growing and that we, the taxpayers are largely responsible for their growth by demanding more and more handouts from government? You get nothing "free" from government. It first takes from you the dollar of which it returns you a part.

Every bit of government extravagance, waste, and pork-barrel spending that you permit by failing to object. when you vote, turns more and more of our earnings over to politicians to spend. Particularly is this true in regard to domestic affairs, both local and national, on which you can inform yourself if you'll just do a little reading.

A local example which is probably pretty general throughout the country is shown by figures published by "Oregon Tax Research". They show that the property tax bill in Oregon for the fiscal year 1962-63 now averages \$520 for a family of four. Schools take 67 per cent of the total property tax bill. In the last five years Oregon property taxes have increased 40 per cent and school levies have increased 45 per cent.

The point is that you as a taxpayer should check your property tax bill as carefully as you do your grocery bill. It is only one tax. Then come state and federal income taxes and various other taxes which when totaled take the biggest bite out of the average family income.

Think about taxes as your money that someone else is spending and see that the public servants you elect don't waste your money. They can't reduce taxes except by good business management, but they can increase them every year by extravagance and ask you for more.

Reward good officials who conserve your money, and boot out the tax playboys.


#### $\mathbf{G}$ : Why encourage tourism anyway?



## **Phone Dial Changes** Are **Made Here**


Local telephone users will take another step toward Direct Distance Dialing scheduled here next year. Effective Sunday morning, June 30, Pacific Northwest Bell's information and repair service numbers will no longer begin with the digit "1". All telephone customers in the Tacoma, Graham, Puyallup and Sumner areas will dial "411" instead of "113" to reach local information. Tacomans will call "911" for repair service. In Graham, Puyallup and Sumner the new repair service number will be "611". The conversion of the service numbers will make it possible to use the digit "1" to channel calls into Direct Distance Dial equipment when it goes into service in 1964. The safeguard will eliminate the chance to misdial local calls reaching the DDD network, said Pacific Northwest Bell manager David L. Williams. The new service will be found in the 1963 telephone book scheduled for delivery in early July.

Mrs. Doe ran over to watch the fire. A crowd gathered behind her and she got pushed closer and closer to the fire. Suddenly a gas line to the building under construction law.)

The builder said she had no one but herself to blame for her injuries, as she had a fire. "She assumed the risk of injury by being a fire watcher, and was negligent herself," the builder contend-

Do you think she can recover damages for her injuries? In such a case in Ohio, the court held that Mrs. Doe did not assume any risk by watching the fire. She did not know of the gas line or any of its dangers, the court said. Nor did she contribute to her own injuries. The flying debris and the stampeding crowd caused her injuries, the court concluded.

The jury decided that the major event, the fire, was foreseeable as a result of the negligence of the welder in working near oily timbers,

and that the fire was the actual cause of her injuries. However, it's still a good idea to keep a safe distance away from burning buildings. (This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the
