Past Presidents will meet at Mrs. Kittleson's Wednesday, April 18. April 26 will be a recreation meeting.

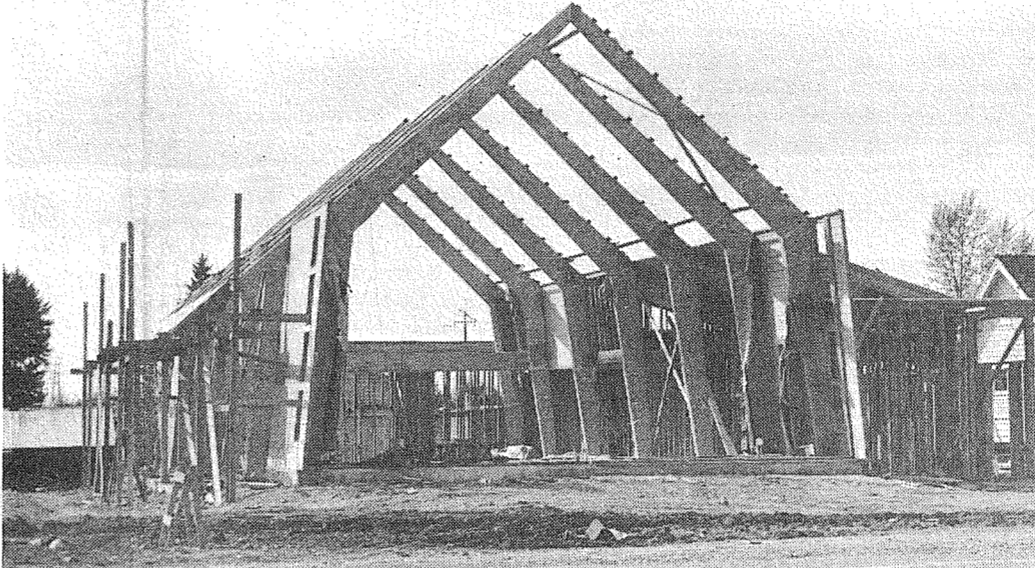
The post again is setting up their Jr. Baseball program of high school boys from the Franklin Pierce District.

## Planning Commission:

### Hearing on Zoning Acreage Set Back

Louis Pedersen, Chairman of the Pierce County Planning Commission, announced today for those interested parties planning to attend the May 1st regular meeting of the Commission that no official action will be taken on the petition of Ralph Marvin, to zone approximately 1 3/4 square miles of land in the Midland area, at that time.

This request for zoning was originally heard at the March 6 meeting of the Planning Commission and held over until May 1st pending adoption by the County of the proposed new zoning code. Inasmuch as this is being done in connection with the Easter Holiday period.

## Let Me Tell One: Litterbugs in Space?

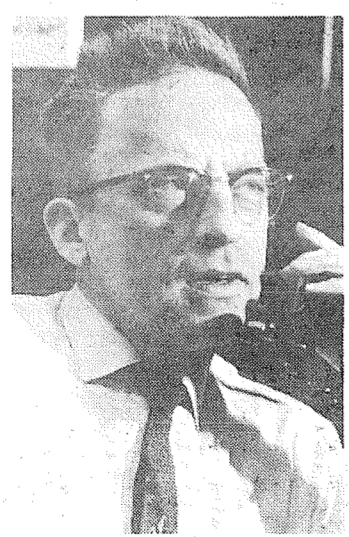
As a symbol of the Space Age, the beer can seems to me the most unlikely representative of the era we are entering that I can imagine.

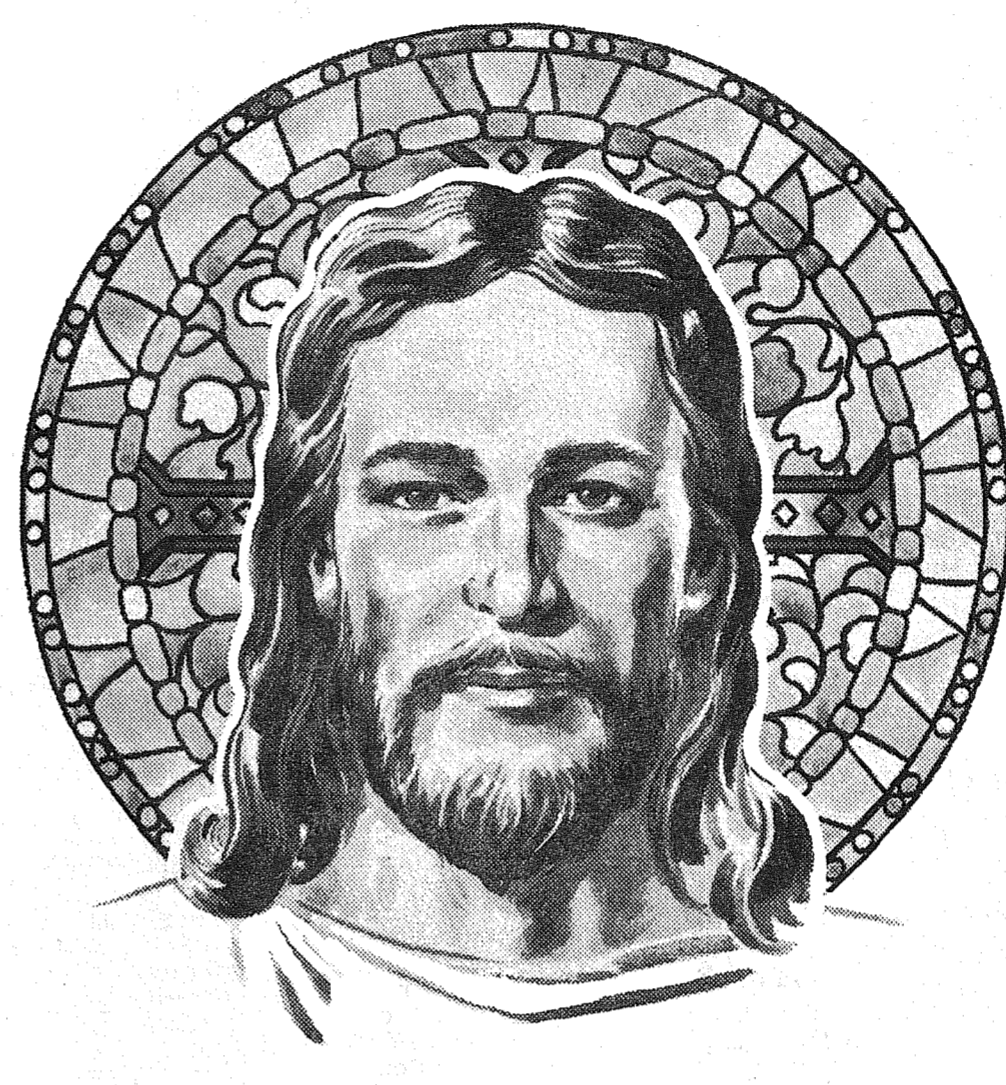

a-Wondering... and a-Wandering... Future Bright For Motherless Girls, Blind Father, At Mooseheart Haven

with Jack Brown Last Friday, while in Wenatchee, I had a group of High School seniors all lined up to take their picture. They had spent the day at the airport cleaning it up prior to the festival, and in so doing became news to our aviation publication.

A Tacoma family of four motherless girls, beset by tragedy and with their father rapidly nearing total blindness, faces a bright new future with complete security at Mooseheart, Ill. world-famous Child City of the Loyal Order of Moose.



The girls, three to 14 years old, are the daughters of Thomas E. Corbett, 47, of 1703 No. Fife. They are entitled to make their home at Mooseheart by virtue of their father's membership in Tacoma Moose Lodge #435.

Approval of the lodge's application for their admission has been received from the Supreme Lodge, R. E. (Gene) Tucker, Governor, announced today.

Reservations have been made to fly the girls, with a chaperone couple, to Chicago May 2 on United Air Lines jet flight 834, Lodge Secretary F. W. Miller, in charge of arrangements said. The family is the second largest ever to go to the Child City from this part of the country.

The girls are Joyce, 14, a student at Mason Junior High; Marcie, 11, and Mary, 8, both of St. Patrick School, and Candy, 3. Since their mother's death from cancer September, 1960, each has done her bit trying to help their father maintain the home, but it has been a trying task. Moving to Mooseheart has been a big decision but despite the change the girls have learned enough about the Child City so that they look forward to their new home with considerable anticipation.

GOING TO MOOSEHEART — The four motherless daughters of Thomas E. Corbett, a member of Tacoma Moose Lodge No. 435, have been accepted for admission to Mooseheart, world-famous Child City of the fraternity, and will leave for their new home May 2 by jet airliner under the auspices of the lodge and Women of the Moose. The father is nearing total blindness. The girls, left to right, are Joyce, 14, Marcie, 11, Mary, 8, and Candy, 3.

There are absolute security, loving care and the finest facilities for children anywhere on earth. Corbett's last job before his disability was supervising the painting contract for the 856 Capehart housing units at Fort Lewis in 1960. At its peak he had a crew of 110 men under him.

The Corbett family are members of St. Patrick church. At Mooseheart the girls, as are all children there, will be raised in the faith that prevailed with their parents at home. Their chaplain will be the beloved Monsignor John J. Laffey, who has supervised the religious training of his Catholic charges at Mooseheart for 43 years.

As a result of continuing progress in cancer control, one cancer patient is saved every three minutes in the United States. To continue this progress, the American Cancer Society needs the support of everyone during the April Cancer Crusade.

Indianapolis, Ind., was the scene recently of a dramatic and, perhaps, historic constitutional fight. It was in that city that The Kroger Co., a retail food chain, defied the Federal Trade Commission in its investigation of low milk prices.

The company objected to the conduct of the investigation on the grounds that the hearings were contrary to the rules of practice of the Commission, in conflict to decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States, and prohibited under the Bill of Rights of the Constitution. In a statement filed with the FTC, Kroger declared its position was in defense of fundamental principles of justice and decency, as well as in defense of the right of the consumer to purchase milk at low prices.

Although the Indianapolis issue is extremely complicated, it was very simply stated by the Indianapolis Star in a lead editorial: "Constitutional government, not the price of milk in Marion County, is at stake."

Barron's financial magazine in a front page editorial called it: "Exercise in Tyranny", and quoted former FTC Commissioner Lowell B. Mason as follows: "Inquisition without warrant, punishment without trial."

Kroger, along with several other retail food companies in Indianapolis, was subpoenaed by the Federal Trade Commission and ordered to produce various documents before an FTC hearing examiner. Kroger charged that it was incompatible with the American judicial system to allow charges to be hurled in public against anyone who is simultaneously denied any opportunity for self-defense--which is precisely what the examiner did--and that such a procedure is characteristic of the police state.

In these days of spreading bureaucracy and law by administrative ruling, it is refreshing to find a citizen--individual or corporate--who has the courage to stand up and be counted.

One day while broiling a rabbit over the charcoal and turning the spit by hand he felt a sudden urge for song and burst forth in a somewhat squeaky baritone. Standing there with eyes upward he gave out with a rendition of "Home on the Range".

A beatnik passing by happened to hear the singing and stuck his head over the fence. After carefully surveying the scene for some time he piped up, "Hey Doc. I don't mean to bug you, but the music has stopped and your monkey is on fire."

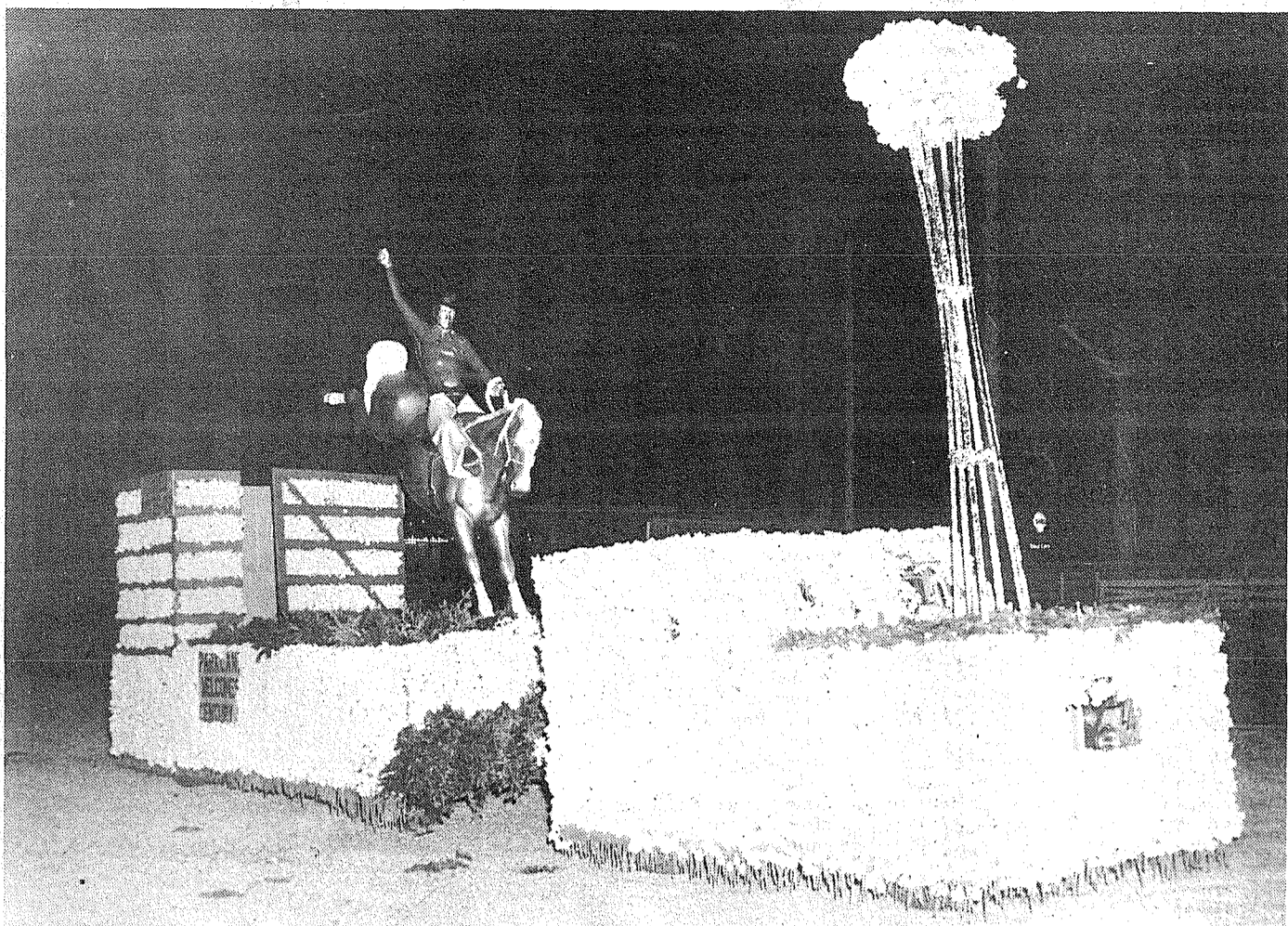

The craftsman award of the month was taken home by Den 1 and the attendance award by the Webelos.

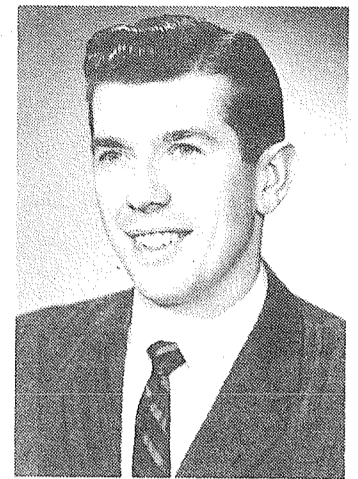

## It's The Law

Alice was taking an afternoon nap. She and her husband had spent all last week moving into their new apartment. Today Alice had been trying to do the ironing and she was tired.

A noise from the front room woke her. She went to investigate and saw a man standing in the middle of the living room.

Alice was about to call the police when she recognized Mr. Irving Snoop, their landlord. He explained that he had let himself in with his pass key to make a routine inspection.

Alice was quite upset and asked Mr. Snoop to leave. She said that he could come back another time, but asked that he get permission before entering their apartment.

Mr. Snoop informed Alice that he owned the apartment building, and that he needed no one's permission to come and go as he pleased.

Is Mr. Snoop correct? Can he enter the apartments of his tenants without their permission?

Mr. Snoop is wrong. A tenant has the sole and exclusive right to the occupation and control of his apartment during the term of the rental or lease. Therefore, as a general rule, a landlord has no right to enter the apartment of his tenant without the tenant's consent, unless the landlord has reserved such a right in the lease.

An unauthorized entry or intrusion by a landlord on his tenant's premises constitutes a trespass to the same extent as an entry or intrusion thereon by a stranger.

A landlord has no right to "snoop around" in a tenant's apartment or home. (This column is written to inform, not advise. Facts may change the application of the law.)

## Enumclaw Tract Destined Park

The General Services Administration reported today it had approved the sale of a 56.14 acre tract of land near Enumclaw to King County, Washington. The purchase price was negotiated at 50% of the appraised fair-market value of \$1,975,000, according to H. A. Abersfeller, Regional Commissioner.

The land, which was acquired by the Government in connection with the Mud Mountain Dam Project, will be developed by King County as a public park.
