Fire Chief Hopes For Safe, Happy Holidays

Editor's Note: Parkland Fire Chief, E. R. Larson, is concerned about fire safety during the highly hazardous Christmas season. He has submitted the following rules the fire department hopes all will observe for a safe and happy holiday.

If you will observe a few simple precautions which we shall outline for you, then yours, too, will truly be a happy holiday season. With the spirit of Christmas in our home and the pressing problems of trying to get everything done at once, it is easy to become careless and forget our normal caution about fire hazards.

One of the biggest contributions you can make to home safety is to keep all wrappings and paper away from heating units. Open fireplaces should be properly screened and protected from small children who just love to watch things burn. Explain to the whole family that during the holidays they are going to be expected to be just a little more careful than usual.

Site to them the rapid burning of many holiday materials. If necessary, take some out in the yard and show them what can really happen.

Choose a small tree that will serve your purpose and put it up as close to Christmas as possible, thus slowing drying. Put it in a cool part of the house. Do not use lighted candles, only electric lights.

Do not go away and leave lights burning on the tree. Inspect tree often for loose or overheated wires.

Remember, if a tree catches on fire it does not burn slowly. In fact, it will burn so rapidly that it will be more of an explosion, giving you little if any time for

Elmhurst Mutual Gives Members Christmas Gift

The 18 square miles of area served by Elmhurst Mutual Company will be getting (and have been getting) a Christmas present in the form of street lights.

The lights are being placed around the area now at intersections and the company's program calls for an orderly coverage of the area with the modern mercury vapor lamps.

The program will take some time to complete, according to Harold LeMay, president of the Elmhurst board, but has been given a good start by C. M. Jolly, line manager, and his crews. The first lights are being installed at major intersections throughout the area, according to company of-

ficials. Harry C. Harrigan, secretary-treasurer, said the lights cost from \$45 to \$150 and will last from two to three years.

The company was founded in 1922 and have advanced to the position where new members are being welcomed. The company covers the area from 128th Street to, in some places, 172nd, with McChord Air Base as the western boundary and a part of Puyallup as the eastern boundaries.

Chief Larson Says Parkland Rates Go Down

"Parkland is now one of the best places in the county to live, fire insurance wise," says Chief Bud Larson. On the completion of a recent grading of the fire district the fire department was awarded a class six. This grading will result in an approximate overall reduction of ten per cent in insurance premiums.

To help understand the progress of the fire department, in the year 1946 the department was graded class eight which it maintained until May 1, 1959. Then it received an improved rate which made it a class seven with resulting savings. Now the last rate making it a class six with still more savings is in effect and will remain until such time as more improvements can be made, which are now being given consideration.

Some of the things making the new rate possible were purchase of a new truck, radio system for alerting the fire men and the completion of a sound working mutual aid program with Tacoma and surrounding districts.

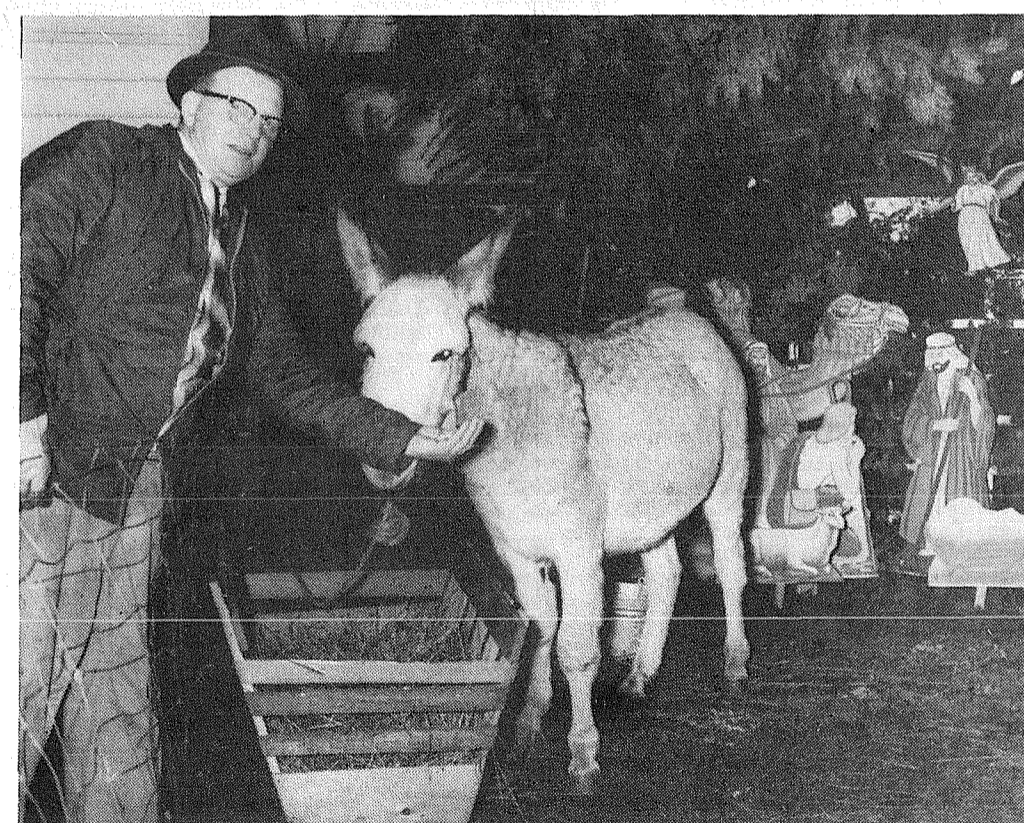

Parsonage To Be Dedicated In Spanaway

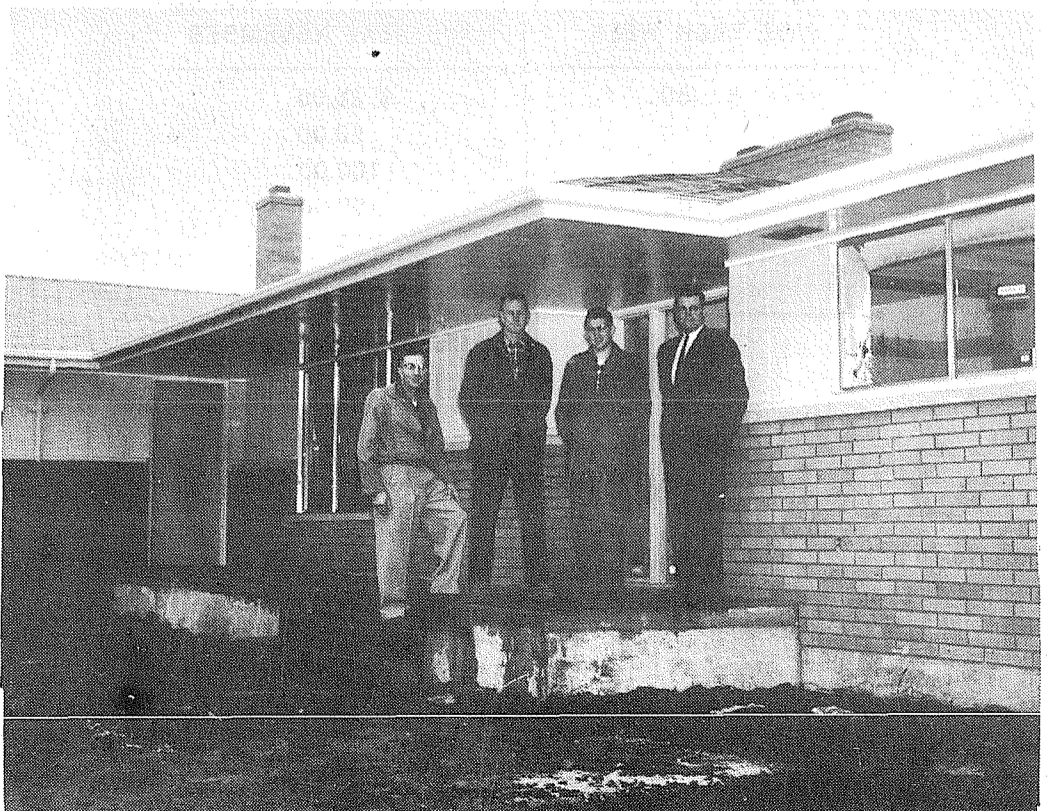

Lamb Report Has Dec. 31 Deadline

All details of marketing either shorn wool or unshorn lambs sold to slaughter will have to be completed not later than December 31 in order to receive incentive payments for the 1963 marketing year, Fred Kropf, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, pointed out. Marketing completed after December 31, 1963, will be eligible for payments for the 1964 marketing year.

The 1963 marketing year under the wool payment program has been shortened to the 9-month period from April 1 through December 31, 1963, in order to shift the wool marketing year to a calendar-year basis.

Growers are urged to file their applications for payment, supported by the required sales documents, with the ASCS County Office, 506 River Road, Puyallup, as soon as possible after their sales are completed. While the final date to apply for payments on 1963 marketings will be January 31, 1964 — an application may be submitted at any time between now and then.

Payments for the 1963 marketing year will likely begin in April of next year, after the program payment rates are determined, based on the average prices received by producers for shorn wool sold.
