## Nearly 1500 Must Vote In FP For Valid Election

More than 1,432 people must cast their ballots in the forthcoming Franklin Pierce School District election if it is to be validated, Edwin L. Nelson, superintendent, has revealed.

Because state regulations require that at least 40 per cent of those who voted in the last election cast their ballots, it is necessary that more than 1,432 vote March 10, he said. This only validates the election. If the issues are to pass, they need the "yes" vote of at least 60 per cent of the people voting.

The three Franklin Pierce School District issues on the ballot will provide funds to operate present and new classrooms, to purchase new buses and to operate kindergartens next year.

The Board of Directors are planning to offer for sale March 12 \$480,000 in General Obligation Bonds, which were approved by voters last year, to build ten classrooms to Collins. If a State bond issue passes in the fall, the District expects to receive sufficient money to complete

the building of Mayfair School, which will open next September. Because it will take students mainly from the Brookdale area, the principal of Brookdale, Leo Gaume, will serve as principal of the new school the first year.

Proposition I on the March 10 ballot will provide \$339,000 in funds to staff and equip these new classrooms, as well as to provide funds for the purchase of new equipment and textbooks for existing classrooms.

Overcrowding and double-shifting of buses each year is a problem in the District, Nelson said. Proposition II is requesting \$70,000 to purchase four new buses. However, he pointed out, the new buses are not to eliminate all of the crowding nor will they replace any of the old buses. Plans call for the District to add three or four new buses each year to eventually catch up with conditions so that students can ride more comfortably and old buses can be replaced.

Kindergartens, which receive 70 per cent support from the state, must be considered an extra item in the school budget. Therefore, Nelson said, funds are needed each year to staff them. At present, the District has 11 kindergarten teachers conducting 24 individual classes. A total of 638 kindergarten students are now registered in the District. Proposition III is asking \$40,000 for the support of the kindergartens for next year.

According to figures for 1962-63 school year, Franklin Pierce Schools spend an average of \$401 for the education of a single student. The average throughout the state is \$488 per student. This means, according to figures released by Orin Pjeran, business manager, that the local schools operated on a \$3,179,359 budget last year. Local taxes provided only 18.07 per cent of these funds.

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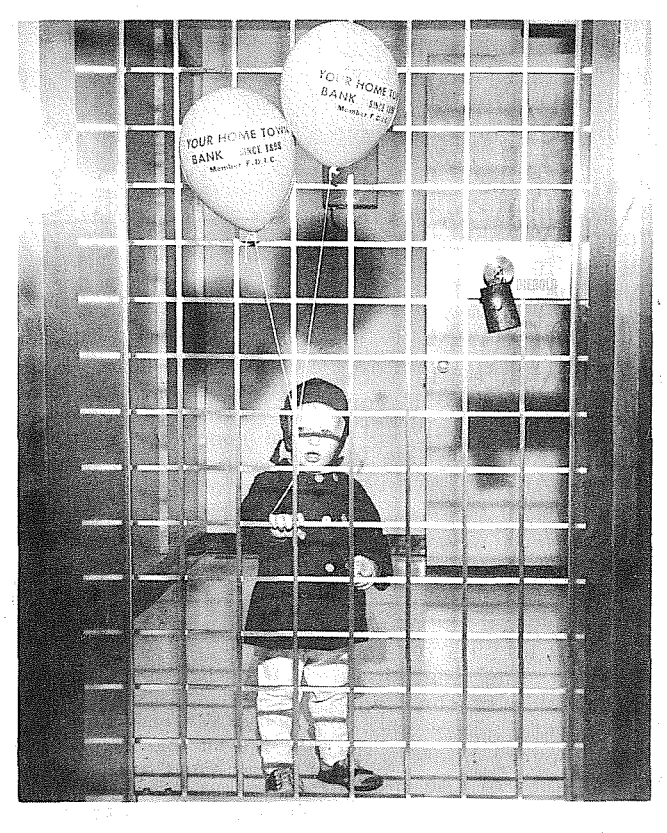

## Sets Record For Cross Country

Times Journal Publisher Jack Brown is now operating one of the most unique interstate publishing ventures involving modern transportation and communications known in the Northwest.

With the signing of contracts to publish the U. S. Air Force's Kingsley Field base paper, the TJ company now operates a marathon communication - transportation procedure that puts a fresh-off-the-press paper almost on the California border within approximately three hours of leaving the loading ramp of the Times Journal print shop. As the Kingsley Sentinel rolls off the Times Journal press, it is folded, stacked, wrapped and loaded into the Times Journal van by circulation manager Kathy Blow. After a quick transfer of pay loads, West Coast delivers the Sentinel "hot off the press" to the waiting Kingsley press staff car in Klamath Falls, Oregon, for distribution to personnel there—all in a day's work, only much less than the traditional twenty-four hour day! It's a fast-moving modern age and Kingsley Field Sentinel readers are the first to proclaim it.

Some interesting facts have been popping up to support predictions that '64 should develop into a business bonanza. In January personal income rose \$2.7 billion; housing starts jumped 9% and new orders for durable goods increased 8% following a two-month decline.

In the Parkland area, expansion or plans of immediate or near future expansion indicate business is beginning to accelerate after an erratic January and February. Reports of the past 60 days range from par to subnormal with a few small gains over the same period of 1963. Interesting to note is the fact that the consumer market in the Parkland area in the past two months has developed a fairly steady through-the-week pace instead of the usual high and low peak market. Whether this will continue remains to be seen. Chances are the additional revenue from Federal tax refunds will have a tendency to throw the market back into "splurge" buying for a period of time. Nevertheless the additional money will bolster both high and low peak areas should it return to this type of consumer market.

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## a - Wondering and a - Wandering ...

Last Friday at a convention in Idaho Falls I was invited to join in a toast to the iron curtain. My first thought about the speaker was, "What's with this nut?" but as he proposed his toast I too raised my glass, for his words were, "I offer a toast to the Iron curtain. May it rust in peace".

I found one definition of an extremist that fits today's pattern to a "T". Today an extremist is a man or woman standing at odds with the course the United States has taken for the last 30 years.

Personally I would like to see the birth of a lot of extremists because I think far too many citizens are in full accord with and really like what has been happening in the U.S. as pertains to the increased trend towards doles. We've been paying for not planting crops, for plowing under good food, for killing pigs, for sitting in the rocking chair while good jobs go begging, for the support of children of promiscuous mothers and an endless line of handouts to the point that we have reared a generation of people holding out their hands saying "Gimme" instead of giving an honest day's work for their wages.

Help to the needy is one thing. Help to a lazy slob is another. I think that any American who condones the government stepping in and taking over little by little our welfare programs, education, public power, agriculture, citizen's rights and duties, to name a few, are forgetting their heritage and the sacrifices that were made to make this country great.

A few weeks back I had a run-in again with local Puget Sound smog, or industrial haze, if you prefer. Then last night the same old song only 25th verse. Here in the Puget Sound country we live in an area of air pollution that is hard to conceive unless you actually see it for yourself.

Let me give you some idea on comparisons. As I said, a few weeks back I had a bout with smog. I had flown down to Klamath Falls, Oregon, in the afternoon and when ready to return found the winds aloft to be severe so elected to stay down over the tree tops to save time as the wind was negligible at that altitude. I flew up the east side of the Cascades to the Columbia river in crystal clear air. I could see every tree, every stream, every house and farm I passed over. The trip was one of the most scenic I have ever taken.

When I reached the Columbia I still hugged the hill tops and came straight in between Mt. Adams and Mt. St. Helens. By the time I reached Packwood I came alive in the cabin for the scenic beauty was slowly disappearing in a pall of haze. From Alder Lake to Spanaway I might as well have been flying at night for all I could see. I called McChord Approach Control and had them take me by the hand, figuratively speaking, to prevent me from running into another plane, so thick was the smog. It was rather disgusting to return home to one of the most beautiful parts of the U. S. only to find it buried under polluted air.

Last night in a near repeat performance I took off from Pendleton, Oregon, and headed for home. The winds aloft were not in my favor so I stayed low, flying over the Eastern Washington farm lands at tractor level and enjoying the trip immensely due to the excellent visibility. I dropped a wing now and then to return a friendly wave from some farmer and couldn't help but marvel at the fact that no matter how often I make the trip there is always something new to look at.

By the time I had climbed over the mountains and started to let down on this side I was back on the edge of the seat burning out my eyeballs trying to see something. At 17,000 feet the air was clear and crisp and I could see north to Canada, south to Oregon, west to the ocean and east to the rangeland, but I couldn't see the ground below for the lousy smog. Disgusting? You bet! Right then I'd have liked to have had all the county and city officials of the Puget Sound area up there with me to see just what industrial pollution is doing to our air.

The whole point is that we now know that steps can be taken to eliminate a large amount of our air pollution, but will they be taken? Certainly not, until the populace knows of the condition and rises to protest. In the meantime what affect is this pollution having on our health? It certainly can't be conducive to strong growing bodies and minds.

I happened to flip on the L/F band in the plane the other day just in time to catch a speech by Senator Rivers and if I hadn't known better I would have sworn he was reading my column over the air, as regards the civil rights bill. It was gratifying to know that I am not alone in my thinking on the matter.

Recently I lost a good friend and didn't find out about it until after his funeral. He was a man who had lived in the air with countless thousands of hours of flying time. He had traveled the length and breadth of the land by air many times. After all this flying he met a horrible fate by being burned to death in a crash ... in his automobile. It never even made the papers in the next county. Had he met the same fate in an aircraft accident his untimely demise would have made national headlines. A point to remember.

I note with interest the fact that the first income tax law ever passed was contained in 26 pages of ordinary print. The new law, soon to go into effect, requires 1,200 pages of the same size, crammed with small print to get the message across. Like the national debt, red tape and double talk keep piling up.
