Members Get \$38,000 In Electricity

A saving to members of almost \$38,000 during the month of November was announced this week by the Board of Parkland Light and Water Company.

The saving, as announced by Jack Quill, board member in charge of public relations, amounts to the company forgiving the November light bill for each customer of the system.

With the Christmas season approaching, this pre-season "gift" is most certainly welcome in Parkland homes, Quill added.

One of the typical homes in the area is shown in the accompanying photograph. The home was built in 1900 by the Benrud family, now owned by the Ken Nicholes family. An interesting fact about the home is that it was built originally with a separate wood or coal heater for each of its many rooms. It originally had no lights or water system and at one time that had been added in exposed positions in the interior rooms.

The one thing about the home that is not as typical as most is the installation of electric heat in the 10-room home. With the adjustment for the free month the adjusted average cost of heating the home is \$18.24 per month.

Quill pointed out that the free light bill was for electricity only and did not apply to water bills. Other members of the board of Parkland Light and Water are: William H. Chambers, president; Albert Lindgren, vice-president; E. W. Beetz, treasurer; and John Curtis, secretary.

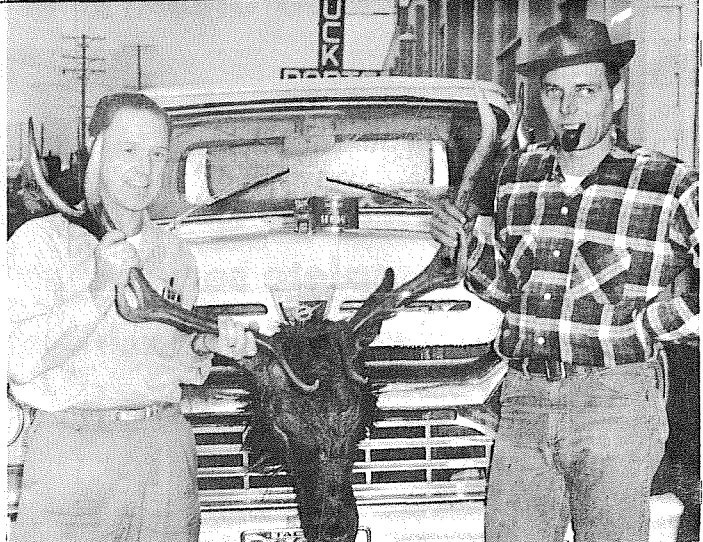
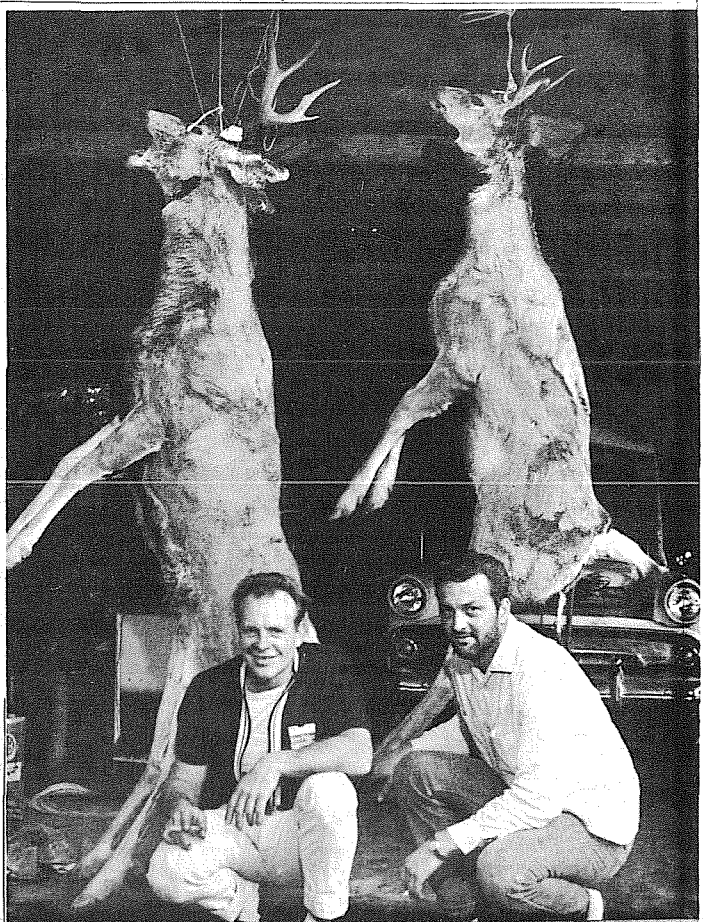
The unofficial count showed 1144 votes against the proposal and 422 for the bonds.

Thanksgiving, 1963. Put In Perspective

When the Pilgrims celebrated the first American Thanksgiving more than 300 years ago, they obviously had no conception of what their descendants might ultimately have to be grateful for. But this wasn't important. It was enough that they themselves knew they were the recipients of God's bounty; they had undergone harrowing experiences, including disease and starvation. They had seen their crops grow. After the first harvest in their new land, there was a mighty upsurge of thanksgiving to God for His bounty.

A few days ago I saw a statement by Dr. Henry Smith Leiper, former associate general secretary of the World Council of Churches, which for me put the modern basis for an American Thanksgiving into very sharp focus. Put, he said, the total population of the globe proportionately into a town of 1,000 people, and this is what you would discover: 60 persons would represent the U. S. population; 940 would represent the rest of the world. The 60 Americans receive half of the total community income; the 940 would share the other half.

Of the Americans, 36 would belong to Christian churches and 24 would not. Altogether the town would include 330 professing Christians; 670 would be non-Christians.

About 80 people would be Communists, but 370 would be under Communist domination.

In color, 303 would be white; 697 would be non-white. In terms of possessions, the 60 Americans would own 15 times as much per person as all the rest.

The Americans would produce 16 per cent of the food, but they would eat 72 per cent above the minimum requirements of the rest of the people. Most of the non-Americans would be uneducated, hungry, sick, and poor — half of them would be illiterate.

Half of the people would never have heard the name of Jesus Christ.

At the moment I am not concerned about whether or not we deserve what we have, or whether or not we have earned it. I only know we have it, and my basic response is to say, "God be thanked and praised for almost incomprehensible abundance!" One day is called Thanksgiving Day, but it ought to be a day of endless repeating itself in our lives.

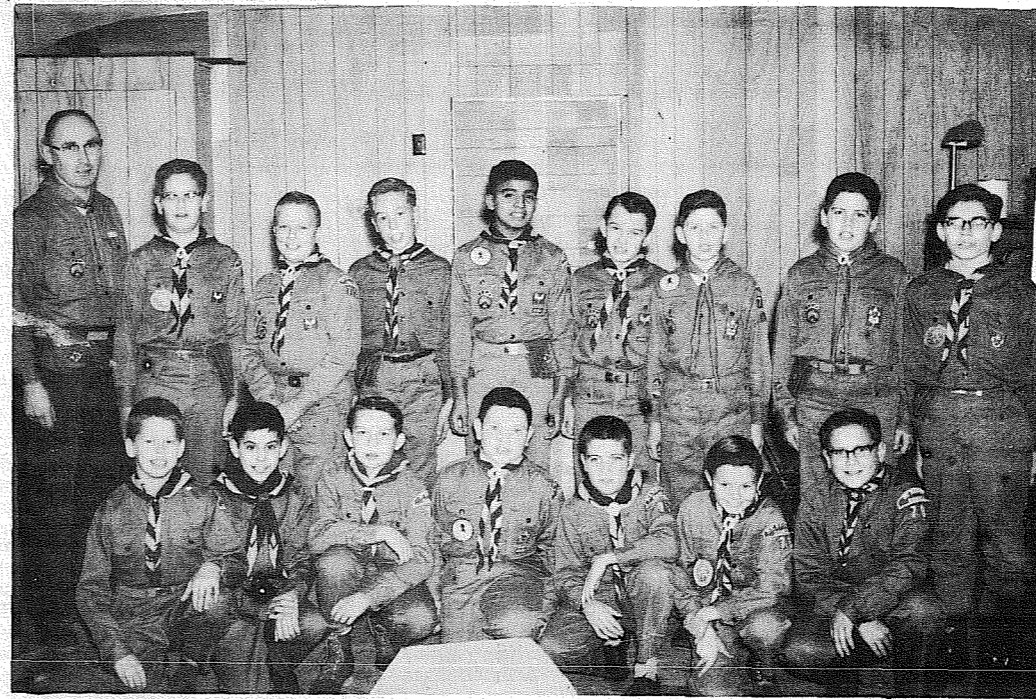

Friday's game gave the Cards a chance to hang up their jerseys with a smile instead of a tear.

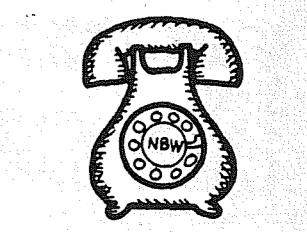
