## a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .

Well, I see where John L. Lewis has retired. With him out of the limelight, newspaper headlines may be a little less lively than in the past, especially during his heyday. At any rate, his has been a colorful regime. You can start a lively argument going on any street corner in the east, or west for that matter, over him. There are those who claim he's done more for the advancement of the working man than any other person and back up their claims with the fact that miners wages have risen from \$2.50 per day to \$24.00 per day during his reign. Others will argue that he's priced more men out of work than any other man in history and point to the tremendous drop in miner employment. Far be it from me to say who's absolutely right. I think I'd go along with both sides for a ways.

We breakfasted on a stack of flapjacks that tasted like flannel blankets with a side of fried spuds dipped, I believe, in axle grease. Cold sandwiches made up our noon lunch and for supper we were served beans and bully beef topped off with a piece of the world's soggiest pie.

Once every three months we got a week off to leave camp for a "bust." Along with all this pleasantry, about once a month we had the opportunity to chip in for flowers for one of our fellow workers who'd "stepped into a grizzly," had taken "the quick route" down the main shaft, or had cracked a pair of primers together. Safety inspectors were still unheard of.

One of John's collectors visited camp once a month and put the bite on me and the others for a day's pay for the privilege of working under these excellent conditions and, being young and foolish, I failed to appreciate the great things that were being done for me. As far as I was concerned I was anteing up five bucks to keep some joker from parting my hair with a drill, and any improvements in working conditions that were promised were too few and far between.

And so it came to pass that on one clear April morning as I was about to enter the tunnel for a day's work in the bowels of the earth under some dripping fissure vein, one of my buddies said "Well Jack, this is the 30th of the month, the day we work for John."

That did it. I told the foreman how nice it hadn't been to be associated with him, packed my gear and headed down the mountain and I've never worked underground except for a few days since.

So there you are. If it hadn't been for working that one day for John, under conditions which never seemed to improve, I suppose I'd still be a mucker, a nipper, a miner or who knows by now I might even be a lead man, that is if I hadn't gone back to check a "sleeper" and had my head blown off.

There's just one thing I still wonder about. I wonder if John or his collector ever did talk to the company about patching up the cracks in the bunkhouse wall like we were promised.

We've got a couple of mentally deficient people running around loose in our midst. Perhaps you haven't heard. They're the kind of people you don't hear too much about until they've caused some real damage and you can be sure they will if they continue to go undetected. One is a woman and one a man and apparently by their voices they are in the adult class. What have they done? They've turned in false alarms by the score. Firemen, police and ambulances have been racing to rendezvous with fictitious trouble all too often in this area lately.

The people making these calls are sick. They need help and the best way to help them is to find them out. They are apparently incapable of realizing the harm they are doing. They're causing us, the taxpayers, untold dollars. They're wearing thin the patience of our volunteer firemen, who come rolling out of bed in the wee hours to answer a false alarm, and believe me, we can't afford to lose a single one of them. Another factor is that in each case they create the perfect scene for an accident. Firemen, police and ambulances rushing to a scene from all directions create an unnecessary hazard. There have been cases of accidents whereby two cars on an emergency run have collided.

Let's not let it happen out here in the south end. Keep your eyes and ears open and let's try to locate these feeble minded individuals before real harm befalls someone.
