It's been estimated that "seekers after greener pastures" carry about 35% of our wealth downtown and into other communities. The sad part about this drainage from our local area is that in the long run these shoppers end up spending more than they would right here in the South End.

There are several explanations for this wanderlust shopping on the part of our local residents: Some are just looking for an excuse to go somewhere. Some feel it is 'chic' to say they went shopping down on Broadway or in the Plaza. Then there are those who were just born to do things the hard way. I think most of them, however, are just ordinary hard pressed consumers who honestly believe the grass is greener downtown. This is far from true. You can find a representative business in the South End for any of your needs. If you consider quality and distance traveled, you'll find time after time that you not only can make your purchase for at least the same price here, but many times actually save money.

This problem of our residents wandering off to other areas is one in which some local merchants share the blame. Downtown merchants know that to lure the county shopper into their stores they must advertise and advertise hard. While they spend money to bring in their customers, quite often the local merchant with the same wares stands idly by, turning his stock by hand and dusting it off to prevent shop wear while the downtown merchant who advertises is busy wrapping his merchandise and ringing up a sale. True, the local merchant was able to save on his advertising, but who gained? Not he Not our local wanderers. The downtown businessman made the

There is still another side of this wandering to be considered. As you drive past our local stores on your way to town to blow your month's loot, do you ever have a touch of guilty conscience? You should, for the businessman you just passed up has shown a faith in you and in the community by opening a store here for your convenience. Besides, you can bet he lives here and helps pick up the tab for the good streets, schools, policing, etc., that we enjoy in this area. To be absolutely blunt about it, he deserves your business because he is carrying a big load for you.

A good example of the whole situation is my own business. Week after week I publish this paper and send it to your homes free of charge. The paper is crammed full of community service items published free to further the cause of the organizations you belong to. I got my valentine in the mail again this year from the county treasurer. I am going to contribute \$850 this year in taxes towards paying for the benefits we all enjoy. I'll sign pay checks this year to the total of \$55,000 or more which goes to the support of local families. Through this paper you are brought into contact with news that would escape your attention entirely, did the paper not exist. Do you appreciate it? Of course some of you do. Yet every day I glance at the daily and see that even when it comes to advertising for a 'lost dog' you have the wanderlust. Apparently your first thought is to go downtown, figuratively speaking, and spend about twice the amount it would cost you to get your dog back by spending a little money here at home with The Times Journal Publishing Company.

Think about this. You probably let out quite a yelp when you got your tax bill this year. What do you think it would have been if it weren't for my \$850 and the tax money from all the rest of the business houses in this area? The next time you drive by these businesses on your way to blow your dough in the supposedly greener pastures give this some thought. And, Mr. Merchant, while you stand in the door of your store and watch Joe Blow drive by on the way to blow his dough in the supposedly greener pasture, who don't you give a little thought to advertising and giving Joe some essential shopping information on what you have to offer? Believe me, you'll save money in the long run.

Here's one I just can't let go by without making a few remarks . . . barbed remarks, that is. Impertinence of public servants has reached a new high with the bill introduced in Olympia to prohibit service station operators from exhibiting home. 
