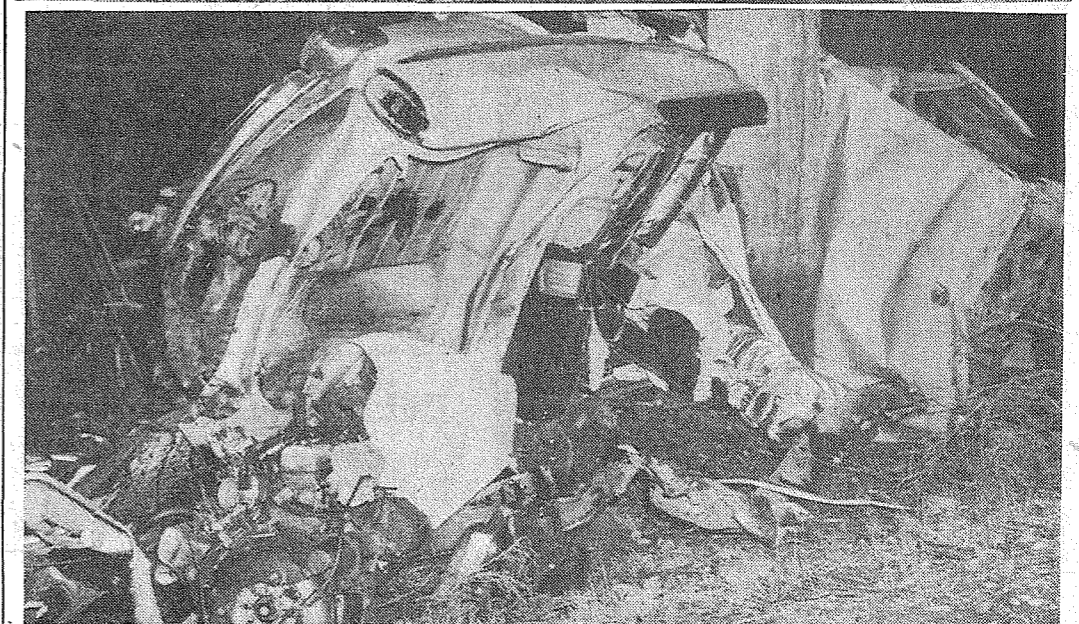
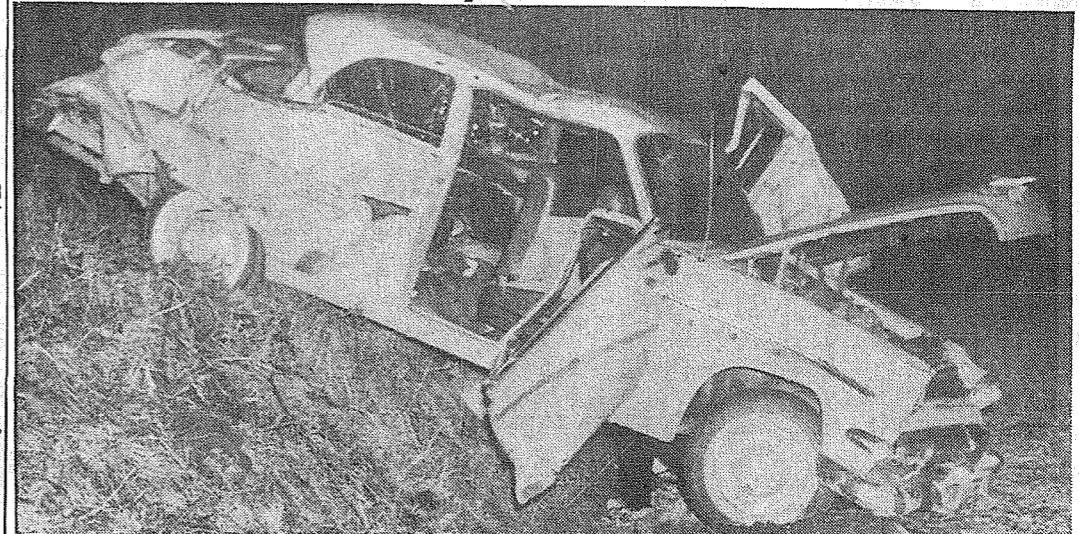

## Death Stalks Highway; Three Die in Two Crashes



**TRAGEDY BY NIGHT**—Two of the worst automobile accidents of the year occur-  
red south of Tacoma within the past week, bringing death to three men and  
severe injury to two more. Shown in the upper picture is the car driven by John S.  
Trueblood, golf professional at Fort Lewis, which went out of control and rolled  
over several times on the Eatonville-Thrift road at 3:30 Friday morning. Trueblood  
died Saturday. State Patrolman Carl Heagle investigated. In the lower picture may  
be seen the wreckage of the '55 Mercury coach in which two other Fort Lewis men  
died instantly just before midnight Monday. Dead are the driver, Warren H. Kin-  
caid, 21, and Elliott H. Valine Jr., 24; at Madigan hospital in critical condition  
are Arthur K. Iwamoto, 21, and Daniel J. Okie, 22. Traveling south on the Moun-  
tain Highway at high speed, the car failed to make the turn at the Roy "Y" and  
crashed into a power pole. It required two hours of work to release Iwamoto and  
Okie from the wreckage. State Patrol Officer Richard Jelsing investigated the ac-

Still hope for the Raspberries; The first step in re-establishing the raspberry industry of Western Washington and particularly the Puyallup Valley, was accomplished at a recent joint meeting of raspberry processors of the area and the board members of the Puyallup Valley Berry Growers Association.

by both as being "promotion of raspberries on the retail level." I have always contended that growers and packers alike have never attempted to sell raspberries either fresh or processed since the days of Paulhamus. This was referred to by one of the long established packers in this area, who was at the meeting. There are fifteen packers concerned with raspberries in this general area. Those who could not attend the meeting sent their "blessings" so to speak in developing a promotional program to increase raspberry sales.

The need in restoring the industry was unanimously agreed upon

Of course this program will cost money, but hasn't the lack of such

a program cost the raspberry growers much money over the years until it has gotten down to the point of losing the industry. This would be a serious blow to the valley and Western Washington on two counts—agriculturally and industrially. We have seen the loss of processing plants, which means payrolls for local people, has affected the economics of the area. No one wants more monuments like the Hunt Plant at Puyallup. If the growers in general show as much concern and interest as the raspberry industry of Washington and Oregon, which produces 30 per cent of the raspberries in the nation, it cannot help but give new life to the raspberry business in the valley.

The growers and packers cer-

tainly should be congratulated on their aggressiveness and cooperation. With this fine start growers should not lose any time in unimously supporting this revival drive!

the forestry industry. The circular points out that fully stocked forest land will earn from \$10 to \$20 per year under average conditions. Land growing brush or the wrong kind of trees earns little or nothing, but is taxed just the same.

Five methods of controlling excess brush with chemicals are outlined in the leaflet. They include foliage sprays, basal bark sprays, notching and frilling trees, stump treatment, and treated tabs. Copies of the bulletin are available free on request at the county Extension office, Buhaly says.

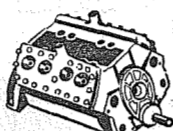

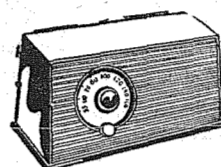

After listening to several members of the Parkland Business Club at its last meeting and reading a couple of letters to the editor in this paper, I have decided that the Sunday closing issue regarding county car dealers is an issue I can no longer keep my big nose out of. About a year ago a county ordinance was passed that prohibited the sale of automobiles by a dealer on Sunday. Right here and now I'll make my stand known. That ordinance should be rescinded immediately. It's a threat to the basic freedom guaranteed each of us by the constitution and a freedom that a lot of us fought for. It's a threat to free enterprise and a step toward dictatorship as endured by those countries under the flag of communism. There is no religious issue involved in this, although some would like us to think so. It's strictly a matter of dollar and cents. Some dealers either can't keep open Sundays due to high overhead or just don't want to. In either case they have one purpose in advocating the continuance of the present ordinance, and that is to see that they don't miss a sale while they're lounging around. It's that simple and it's wrong. I say that if I want to open a car lot, take out the proper licenses and sell cars on Sunday, go to church on Sundays or go fishing on Sundays that's my business and my sacred right to do so, and if you want to buy a car from me on Sunday, go to church with me or go fishing with me, that's your sacred right and business. What man or men have the right under the law of our land and under God's law to forbid us to do these things? There are some ministers I understand who are jumping into the middle of the discussion on this subject advocating the closing of all business in the county on Sundays. I say to them that they have never been so wrong. I personally know many fine Christian people who are in business here in Pierce County and find that staying open on Sundays is a matter of business survival. It certainly can not be the wishes of the Lord to punish those in business who are not fortunate enough to have the money to remain closed on Sundays without jeopardizing their livelihood. One thing I know for sure: It's not fair to discriminate against the car dealers. If one business must be closed on Sundays, then all should be closed to be right, but this then I say would be a transgression of our freedom. Try on the shoes of our county car dealers, then tell me where you stand. You are the type who likes to lie around on Sundays and relax. Some one passes an ordinance that you cannot sit around. You must get up and mow the lawn because neighbor Smith has to, as Sunday is the only day he's home since his job as salesman keeps him out of town. Would that be right? You are the kind of person that looks forward to taking your family to church on Sundays, someone passes an ordinance that you cannot do that. Your neighbors are Seventh Day Adventists and so you must go to church on Saturdays with them. Is this right? Let's say you run a business. Any kind of business like those that operate every Sunday here in Pierce County, such as gas station, restaurant, hardware, variety, grocery store and you name it. You decide to stay open on Sundays. Along comes a sheriff's deputy with a warrant for your arrest. Seems your competitors in the big city wanted Sundays off so they had an ordinance passed that no business of the type you own may operate on Sundays. Is this right? Well! How about it? Are the car dealers' shoes beginning to pinch when you think about it? Maybe you're a homeowner who says "nuts, I'll just stock up on my Sunday needs on Saturday." Well, some Sunday when you take the kids out for a drive, if some one doesn't pass an ordinance against it, try handing them an ice cream cone you bought on Saturday and if you happen to run out of gas, see how your thumb holds out. Let's ask our county commissioners to rescind the present ordinance before it leads to real trouble, for if ever all business in this county is closed on Sundays, it will be the death of prosperity here as well as a blight on the freedom of our nation we all cherish.
