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

**a-Wondering . . . and a-Wandering . . .**  
With JACK BROWN

It must be frustrating to the teenagers to have us adults take over their own private language as fast as they develop it. It seems the harder they work at it the faster we take over, leaving them no way of expressing their individuality.

This was brought to my mind rather forcibly recently when as I visited a friend's home he had another caller. A man of the cloth. After introductions and some conversation the preacher turned to me and said "Tell me, Dad, what do you think of this?", referring to the topic under discussion at the moment. Coming from him, this remark rather startled me, considering that I had taken him to be several years my elder. However I didn't let it "bug me." I played it "real cool" and told him I thought it was "way out."

During further conversation, he mentioned a disturbing incident that had happened to him whereby he was forced to contain himself even though, as he put it, he had every right to get "real shook" and "blow his stack." All this began to paint a picture in my mind of him standing in the vestibule of his church each Sunday morning greeting his congregation in the following manner as he grasped for their hand: "Slip me mittsville, Daddy-o. Glad to lamp you out of the pad hot footing it for a sky pilot lift."

At any rate I found it a stimulating experience talking to this man of God and I'm sure his congregation must hold him in the highest esteem for his ability to absorb youth and defy age.

Since this conversation I've kept my ears open and from becoming a careful listener I find that we adults perhaps unknowingly have absorbed the teeners' slang to such a point that I doubt were George Washington to come back to life, he'd be able to understand a word we were saying.

Next time you're in a complete adult crowd step back and listen for a few minutes and see how much infiltration of teen slang you note in others' conversation. You'll find it interesting.

It's always well to hold your head high so long as you keep your nose at a friendly angle.

Talk about shaving the tax payers bill: If all the government agencies and departments that flood our waste basket, and those of all the other papers in the nation, would just type their reports and put the information on file, put on a crew to disseminate the information through a duplicating machine on request at a nominal fee, our nation could be saved millions of dollars. Yes, I did say millions!

Ask any publisher. We break our backs hauling tons of unread material to the incinerator each year. Each year the P.O. Dept. loses its shirt delivering the junk at our expense.

For example, I have in front of me one of hundreds of books printed in our government printing office each year at the taxpayers' expense and then sent out far and wide. This particular book weighs 1 1/4 lbs., is 6" by 9" and contains 566 pages. Considering that it was sent out to all the thousands and thousands of papers across the nation, what do you suppose this one book alone cost us? Plenty! How many people do you suppose will take time to read it? My guess would be maybe one in a thousand.

If I kept all these books and pamphlets for reference I'd have to add another story onto this building. It's a ridiculous waste of the taxpayers' money. How much cheaper it would be to have a manned central information center.


The fact that private enterprise can do it better has been shown by the operation of the Canadian railroads. During the past 15 years the Canadian Pacific Railroad, a privately owned railroad system, earned a profit of 448 million dollars. At the same time the publicly owned and managed Canadian National Railroad system showed a loss of 653 million dollars.

"The Canadian Pacific (privately owned railroad) paid 368 million dollars in dividends to its stockholders and 340 million dollars in income taxes to the Canadian government. The Canadian National paid no taxes, but the taxpayers had to make up the deficit on its operation."

That's certainly not much of a sales talk for a Socialistic form of government. Let's keep government out of business as much as possible by electing those to office that are dedicated to our free enterprise system.



# County Agent's Corner

By George Purcell

Current concerns among many farm people — what, if anything, does my soil need to be productive? Many questions come in. Washington State University has been providing soil tests for a nominal fee. These indicate low, medium or high levels of phosphorus, potassium, calcium, organic matter, and acidity. From these soil test reports and other new valuable aids provided by Dr. Walter Mortenson, Dale Turner and A. S. Baker of the Western Washington Experiment Station, then county extension agents recommend to the farmer either no fertilizer, or if needed, what, and how much per acre. Recently John Erickson of Rt. 1, Box 197, Eatonville, Arthur Kaelin of Rt. 1, Box 209, Buckley, E. M. Nist of 3202 East Grandview, Tacoma, Vern Rockstad of Puyallup, Alex Fox of Rt. 5, Box 238, Tacoma, and Buckley FFA, have used this soil testing service. Of course, all the fertilizer and lime in the world will do no good without some rain or irrigation water. This is one of the numerous gambles a farmer makes since much of your expensive nitrogen fertilizer will be leached out of lighter soils, particularly during winter rains, which will prevent carry over of very much nitrogen applied this year to be used next year.

Silage making time isn't far off — Which is cheaper to build and use, a Bunker or Tower silo? There are advantages and disadvantages for both. In one study by Michigan State University, they found annual costs for less than 400 tons to be lowest for the bunker. For storing then using more than 400 tons, the annual costs to be usually less for the tower type.







**County Agent's Corner**

Fifty years of service to the nation will be completed in June by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Products Laboratory at Madison, Wisconsin.

The 50 years of research at the laboratory have brought about prefabricated houses, laminated wood and new paper pulping processes. Research specialists at the laboratory have also developed processes to make wood more durable. It is now possible to make wood fire retardant, immune to decay, resistant to termites, and even warp-proof. Researchers have also derived such items as plastics, yeast, and alcohol from wood.

Prefabricated housing got a strong boost from the laboratory's experts who developed the stress-covered construction used each year in the manufacture of 100,000 factory-built homes. They worked out techniques for laminated wood, making big timbers and strong arches from ordinary boards glued together.

Through research at the laboratory, pulping techniques were revolutionized to use low-grade hardwoods. Profits to owners of species formerly considered worthless have resulted.

Packaging research established principles of box and crate construction; blocking, bracing and cushioning materials widely used by industry, agriculture, and the armed forces.

For many years, the USDA laboratory was the only one organized exclusively for conducting research on wood and its utilization.

Junior Leadership received a lively discussion recently at a 4-H training meeting held in the Summit Youth Center. Mrs. George Haaland's 4-H club sponsored the training session. Highlight of the event was a panel discussion moderated by Pat McFarland, 4-H'er from Waller Road vicinity. Other panel members included Martha Hovey from Parkland, Shari Young from Edgewood, Roberta Reed from Woodland vicinity, Glenna Haaland from Summit, and Bill Hammar from Midland.

Each of the 4-H panel members is an active Junior Leader and participates in this project. They related the experiences they had in working with club members. All of these Junior leaders reported that a part of their Junior Leadership work included assisting another 4-H club. This assistance consisted largely of helping with demonstration training, record books, parliamentary procedure, judging, fair preparation, and general 4-H organization work.

Still another interesting phase of Junior Leadership is community service projects which was reported by Roberta Reed. Her club has spearheaded clothing drives to aid an under-privileged children's home, a tour of farms for children's home members, a magazine drive to send magazines to foreign countries, and corresponding with

foreign students. A result of the latter is that a foreign student from Java will attend Pacific Lutheran College next year and live with the Reed family. Surely an excellent way to better relations with other countries.

An immediate result of the Junior Leadership project was well expressed after the training meeting. Mr. Gordon David, a new 4-H leader from the Woodland area, remarked that his club would have ceased to exist if it weren't for the help given by Junior leaders Glenna and Trygve Haaland. That Junior Leadership is a valuable and worthwhile 4-H project cannot be denied.

**It's the LAW**

When Jake Colmine decided to leave the mining industry he moved to a town which had no mines in its vicinity.

He asked his friends and neighbors in his new home town whether there were any possibilities for employment as a miner, but always the answer was "no." He applied for unemployment compensation as he could not find any work as a miner. He was denied any compensation. He protested and filed a suit against the Employment Security Department, claiming he was entitled to unemployment compensation.

To be eligible for compensation a person must be able to work and be available for work in any trade, etc., for which he is reasonably fitted. To be available for work, an individual must be ready, able and willing to accept immediately any suitable work which may be offered him and must be actively seeking work.

During the hearing on his claim for compensation Jake failed to show that he was making a determined effort to find work and gave the impression that he had not made any applications for work directly with mining operators. The court concluded that Jake was unwilling to accept any job

even though he might be fitted to perform it unless the wages were the customary \$18 per day he had received as a miner. This fact, coupled with the fact that he had moved from mining regions and had made no real effort to find work, disqualified him from receiving unemployment compensation, the court ruled.




