Recording Secretary — Grace Kirkwood, Mt. View Cleaners, member 13 years.


Treasurer — Neil McLean, Times Journal Publishing Co., member for 17 years.

Ploegsma said the Parkland area was considered the TAPERED SHAPE center of the county and most cars are near the center. "I feel that the rate of drinking and juvenile problems have dropped greatly in this area in the past years and I am real pleased, Ploegsma said.

The Captain said he wasn't happy with the number of personnel on the force and said he felt that more protection could be offered if the staff were larger. He said that they were on the defensive more than offensive. With a larger force, crimes could be stopped before they could be committed.


