Staff policy for stormy weather

In the event that weather conditions require PLU to cancel classes and close administrative services, notification will be broadcast on Seattle-Tacoma radio and television stations. Since PLU is a residential campus, some services are essential as long as students are in residence. Employees in departments providing services to these students should check with their supervisors about attendance policies during such closures. No employee loses pay as a result of the closures. Staff employees required to work will receive extra compensation for the hours worked by submitting them on an hourly time sheet to Human Resources. Employees unable to report for work due to weather conditions on days when PLU is open should report those days on an absence report form as vacation, sick leave or leave without pay.
