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EXPRESSIONS SERIES TO SHOW "PORTRAIT OF FREE CHINA"

A revealing film of the miracle of Formosa or Twiwan, entitled "Portrait of Free China," will be presented Monday at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium as part of the Associated Students Expression Series.

Margaret Baker, noted lecturer, photographer and authority of the Far East, will appear in person to lecture on the documentary film. She has been to Taiwan ten times since 1951 and has had the opportunity to observe the progress that has been made.

The film makes clear that Free China has worked a quiet miracle. In the heart of the Orient, where famine is familiar, the rice bowls of Taiwan are full, and its standards of living are among the highest in Asia, though the population has doubled since 1949 when the Communist took over the mainland. New industries have been expanding, partly through funds given the large land holders.

In her visits Miss Baker learned that ancient Chinese traditions are still being carried on, and religious toleration is practiced; and in city, village and countryside she found it to be a beautiful and stirring land.

Miss Baker's documentary account is a gripping account of democracy in action. Her own life story is a most unusual one.

She was taken abroad when she was five years old and has traveled ever since.

Recently she returned from her tenth around-the-world journey. For many years she and her mother owned a rubber plantation in Malaya. The early death of her father brought her into the business world as head of her family's enterprises--The Champion Company, The Champion Company of Canada, Ltd., and the Tecumseh Building

For her closing work, Miss Seulean will play "Carnival" by Schumann.

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PLU ALUMNI TO OPEN LIBRARY FUND DRIVE IN TACOMA MONDAY

The PLU Alumni Association will kickoff its Library Fund Drive Monday in Tacoma.

The Tacoma campaign, which will be headed by Herman E. (Bud) Anderson, will be one of 30 such efforts to reach PLU alumni throughout the western states to tell them the story of the need for a new library.

The Alumni Association has set a \$250,000 goal to be pledged over a three-year period toward the proposed \$1,650,000 structure.

Larry Hauge, alumni relations director, and Arthur Pederson, associate in alumni relations, are co-odinating the fund drive.

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DEAN THOMODSGARD ESTABLISHES SCHOLARSHIP FUND AT PLU

Dean Olaf H. Thomodsgard of Bordeaux, France, has established a scholarship fund at Pacific Lutheran University in honor of his parents, the late Rev. and Mrs. Halvor O. Thormodsgard, former residents of Spokare.

Dean Thormodsgard, who was on the University of North Dakota faculty for 36 years, set up the fund with an initial gift of \$1,000 with the stipulation that the scholarship of \$100 by given annually to a PLU senior. The recipient must have attended PLU three years and have had a high scholastic average in three years each of courses in French and English.

The late Rev. Thormodsgard served Lutheran churches in the Spokane area from 1905 until his retirement in 1923. Four of his children attended Spokane College, an institution which merged with PLU in 1930.

Stanley Petrulis will make his Pacific Northwest debut as director and soloist when he presents his 61-piece Pacific Lutheran University Orchestra in concert, Tuesday, Nov. 30, at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium. The concert is complimentary to the public.

Petrulis, who joined the music faculty this fall, will appear with the orchestra as a bassoon soloist in addition to directing the balance of the program. An outstanding bassoonist, he has been featured soloist with the Philadelphia Symphony, the National Symphony (Washington, D.C.) and the Baltimore Symphony. He was a member of the latter orchestra for six years.

The program will include the Symphony No. 5 in D (Reformation) by Mendelssohn and Benjamin Britten's "Matinees Musicales."

Petrulis will be featured as soloist for "Concert Piece for Bassoon and Strings" by the contemporary American composer Burrill Phillips. The first part of the work is built on jazz-like, driving, syncopated rhythms. The second section is in a slower, lyric singing style and the final movement returns to the spirit and modified material of the first.

Prof. Gordon O. Gilbertson will direct the orchestra for the solo by Petrulis.
