## Science major wins National Institutes of Health scholarship

**P**LU senior Patrina Pellett, of Sitka, Alaska, was one of 12 outstanding young scientists to receive a significant National Institutes of Health scholarship.

The NIH Undergraduate Scholarship for Individuals from Disadvantaged Backgrounds provides funding to students committed to careers in biomedical, behavioral or social science health-related research. The scholarship awards up to \$20,000 per academic year for tuition and educational and living expenses.

Each recipient also participates in a 10-week paid summer laboratory

research internship. After graduation, recipients continue their paid research training at NIH in Bethesda, Md., working one year for each year of scholarship support.

Pellett '06, who is majoring in biology and chemistry, graduates in May and will do her internship this summer, continuing into the work program next fall.

"The facilities there are amazing," said Pellett, who is thinking about researching signal transduction, which studies cells, at NIH and plans to be a chemist. "The idea of getting to work at a place where you have every resource at your fingertips is incredible."

PLU professor of chemistry Craig Fryhle will work with Pellett as a faculty mentor and advisor in the scholarship program.

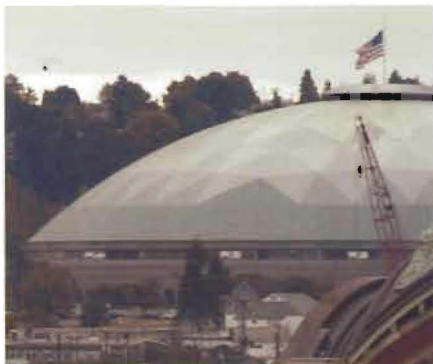
## Federal grant will allow Women's Center to start new programs

**A**nearly \$200,000 federal grant will allow PLU to create comprehensive education and training programs aimed at preventing violence against women.

"We're creating a project that empowers our whole community to be more involved," said Bobbi Hughes, director of the Women's Center. "It's no more of a problem here than anywhere else, but at the same time, it's an issue that isn't usually talked about or very visible."

The two-year grant creates two new part-time positions to coordinate advocacy and training programs, including a Men Against Violence program. It will

more formally connect the campus with community agencies such as the YMCA and the Sexual Assault Center of Pierce County.



## Graduation will move to Tacoma Dome to allow greater attendance

To allow for a much larger audience at the grand spring commencement ceremony, PLU will move graduation to the Tacoma Dome starting in May 2006. The traditions of this important milestone in the lives of PLU graduates and the university will continue in the new venue.

"We're working very hard to preserve the elements of the ceremony that make PLU commencement so special to our graduates and their families," Registrar Kristin Plaehn said. "This move will make commencement much more accessible and comfortable for everyone who looks forward to this important day."

The move means tickets will not be required, and graduates can invite as many family and friends as they want to celebrate their accomplishments in person. In the past, each graduate received a small number of tickets. The dome will accommodate an audience of 6,000, more than twice what Olson Auditorium can seat. It is easily accessible to people with disabilities.

With more than 600 students earning graduate and undergraduate degrees in the past few May ceremonies and ever-growing classes, graduation has simply outgrown Olson Auditorium. For many years, Olson has been filled to capacity well before the ceremony starts, sending many families and friends to two overflow locations airing the ceremony on closed circuit TV. Even those have run out of seats.

Having more space also will allow August graduates to choose to participate in either the traditional May ceremony or December commencement, which will continue to be held on campus. There will no longer be a need for a separate summer ceremony.

Commencement will continue to include traditions such as vocal performances, the faculty procession, University banners and the University Mace. Also, the university will expand the opportunities for graduates and their families to enjoy campus on commencement weekend, including the worship service and brunch before the ceremony.

## Challenge Program gets \$40,000 grant to help students succeed

A \$40,000 grant from the Education Assistance Foundation will help fund PLU's Challenge Program, which gives students who show academic

promise a chance to attend college.

The Challenge Program serves up to 30 students per year who are conditionally admitted to the university and who show potential for academic success but are not currently qualified. Students are granted admission to the university on condition of their successful completion of both the summer and fall components of the program.

The Summer Challenge is an intense, six-week, live-in program with a heavy academic load, support and activities designed to develop a sense of community and participation in the life of the university. Challenge students complete seven or nine credits offered by faculty experienced in working with students of concern. Supplemental instruction, individual tutoring, and mentoring are provided by peer coaches who live in the residence hall with the Challenge students.

The Fall Challenge is an intermediate step between the highly structured summer component and the regular workload students will experience beginning in the spring of their freshman year.

### Students raise money for hurricane relief and AIDS programs

Realizing they can make a difference, students worked this fall to raise money for victims of Hurricane Katrina and for AIDS relief.

The Associated Students of Pacific Lutheran University raised more than \$6,000 for hurricane relief, which was matched by anonymous donors. Donations will be split between the American Red Cross and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America's disaster relief fund.

The university also welcomed two students who were displaced from colleges that were damaged by the hurricane.

In September, more than 250 PLU students, faculty and staff took part in the Pierce County AIDS Walk.

"There was a lot of energy and a lot of PLU pride," said Erik Husa '07, who works in the development department of the Pierce County AIDS Foundation and was a walk coordinator.

Husa and ASPLU president Willie Painter '06, along with other student leaders on campus, recruited walkers. The PLU teams raised more than \$3,000 to fund programs and services for those affected by HIV/AIDS.



The walk coincided with other AIDS awareness events on campus, including Global AIDS Week, with activities designed to encourage action against the AIDS epidemic.

### Audiences treated to outstanding writers and artists

Acclaimed performers and speakers visited PLU this fall, covering topics ranging from gender equity to the arts.

Among them were internationally known pianist Andreas Klein, who was an artist in residence for a week. He rehearsed and performed the Ravel G Major concerto with the University Symphony Orchestra, offered a master class for students and local

piano teachers and spoke about his vocational path.

Virginia Valian, a nationally known expert in gender equity, discussed the reasons behind women's lack of progress in many professions at "Why So Slow? The Advancement of Women in Math, Science, Business and Academia."

Claudia Stevens, a leading performance artist, playwright and composer, as well as a thinker and speaker about the Holocaust, presented "An Evening with Madame F" depicting the performance of music in Nazi concentration camps. Charles Kimball, an expert in world religions, lectured about when religion becomes evil.

Ande Somby, a native Saami, and the musical trio Vajas shared their culture at two Scandinavian events. Somby, professor of law at the University of Tromsø, Norway, talked about the current legal situation for 50,000 Saami

now living in the Arctic climate of northern Scandinavia. He addressed cultural rights, rights to land and water, and new institutions. The Norwegian musical trio Vajas, of

which Somby is a member, also performed.

## *Two professors lend their expertise to TV documentaries*

PROFESSORS E. WAYNE CARP AND ERIC NELSON appeared in historical television documentaries earlier this semester.

Carp, the Benson Family Chair in History, appeared in a segment of the PBS series "History Detectives." An expert in the history of adoption, he was part of the segment "Home for Unwed Mothers."



The episode details the story of a woman trying to find her birth parents and the home where she was born. Homes for unwed mothers were a national trend from the beginning of the 20th century until the 1970s, when they fell from use.

Classics professor Eric Nelson was featured in the documentary "Rome: Engineering an Empire" on the History Channel." The program chronicled the history of the Roman Empire from the reign of Caesar in 44 B.C. to its fall around 537 A.D. and details the remarkable works of architecture and technology during that time.

Morken Center will prepare for careers combining science and business

Collaboration between business and computer science faculty and students in the Morken Center has the potential to broaden the experiences and enhance the career prospects of those studying there. And the success of some recent graduates and current students points the way.

"Trade school grads might be hired for their expertise as network engineers. In five or 10 years they will still be network engineers," said Jim Clapper, dean of the School of Business. "In 10 years the PLU graduate with a major in computer science and a minor in business will be running the network engineering group and could well have moved into upper management."

Clapper says the Morken Center could facilitate the preparation for a lifetime of success. Ken Blaha, chairman of computer science and computer engineering, agrees.

"Working together in the Morken Center should enable us to provide new opportunities for students," he said.

"Business majors might take electives in information technology or database maintenance or even a minor in computer science that will enhance their technical expertise.

"Computer science majors might broaden their understanding of and competence in managerial issues and expand their career options by studying business," Blaha said.

And students also will have gained a broader view and preparation by studying the liberal arts.

The potential that Clapper and Blaha describe is clearly evident in the work of some recent graduates and current students.

Bradley Thonney '04 began his undergraduate career at PLU majoring in computer science but soon discovered a

passion for working with people and switched majors. He graduated with a business degree and a minor in computer science. His experiences as an undergraduate sparked an interest in law, and he is now in his first year at Cardozo School of Law at Yeshiva University in New York City.

"When I'm practicing corporate law, it's inevitable that I'll have cases that involve both business methods and computer hardware and software systems," he said.

"My business and computer science background will give me a depth of understanding both in management and in how computer systems work, making me a better attorney."

Erik Voss '05 also began as a computer science major and switched to business with a computer science minor. In January he will begin working for a medical equipment supply company,



selling a computer-based orthopedic device and working as an operating room technician, helping surgeons run the equipment.

"I'm excited to combine my business education with my knowledge of computers. I'll have a career that will allow me to prove my full abilities," Voss said.

Currently studying for a major in computer science and a minor in business, Jae-Jin Lee '07 expects similar success.

"I decided to take a business 201 class just for the experience and I really liked it," Lee said. "Computer science and business are quite different subjects. Computer science and math are left brain, calculating. Business is right brain, all verbal. It's cool how different they are."

Lee plans to continue to focus on both computer science and business studies at PLU and in graduate school. Then he hopes to establish his own business, providing new applications in wireless network technologies.

Scheduled for occupancy in January, the Morken Center will be the home for the School of Business, the Department of Mathematics, and the Department of Computer Science and Computer Engineering.

Also located there will be the local chapter of a state program, MESA, which works to support traditionally under represented students in achieving and contributing their full potential in mathematics, engineering and science.

A formal dedication ceremony for the building will be held in May.

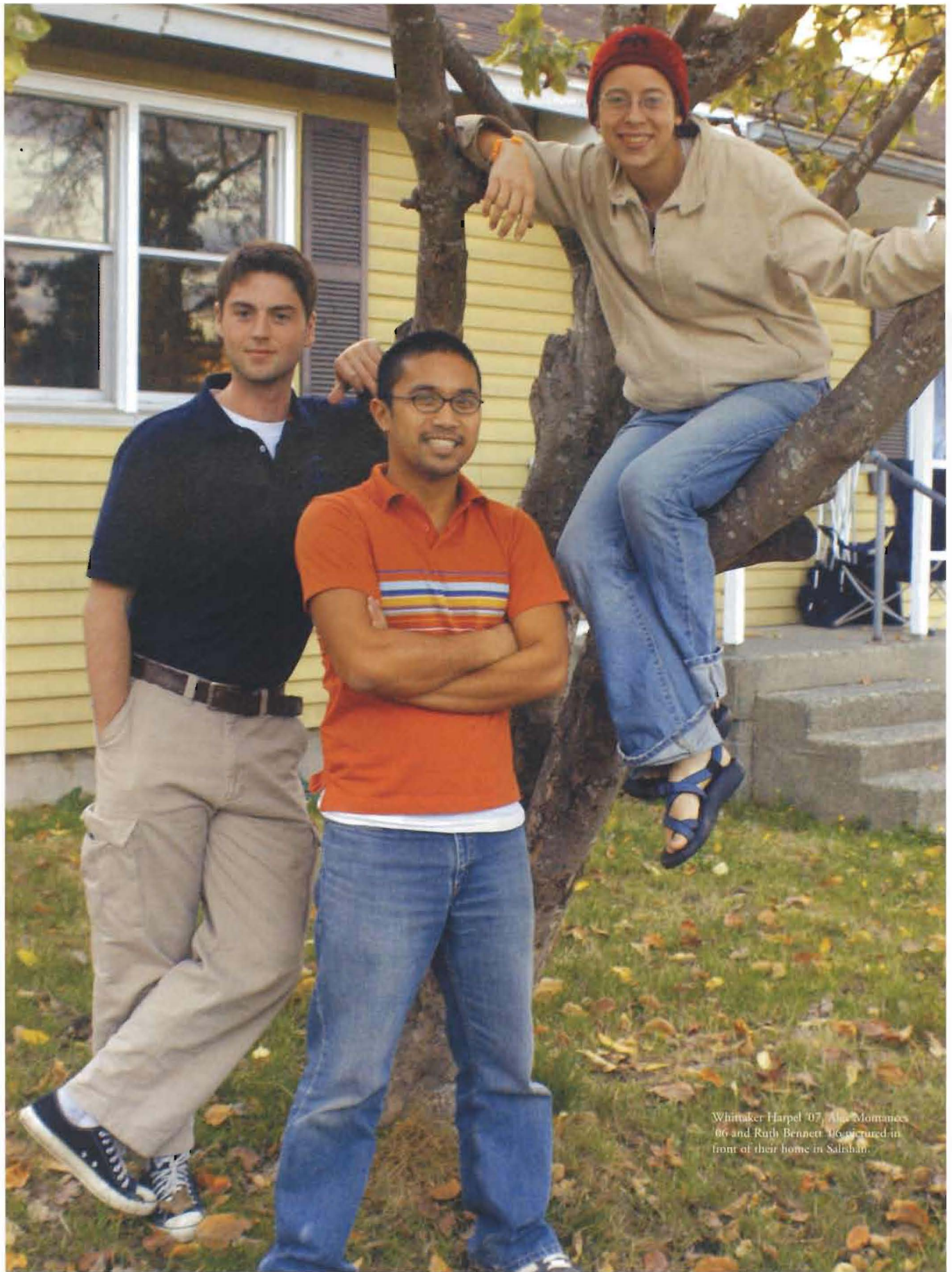


Business professor **David E. McNabb** wrote "Public Utilities Management for the 21st Century," a guide to better train managers in the area

# A T H O M E I N SALISHAN

STUDENTS LEARN THE VALUE OF SERVICE AS THEY LIVE IN A MULTICULTURAL COMMUNITY

ALEX MONTANCES '06 spent his first three years at PLU commuting from his parents' home in South Tacoma. Searching for something different his senior year, he chose to live in a nearby community he knew little about.

Montances and two other PLU students, Ruth Bennett '06 and Whittaker Harpel '07, are living and volunteering in Salishan, a Tacoma Housing Authority community in Southeast Tacoma.

Originally built in 1943 as housing for war workers, Salishan today consists of 900 units that house low-income and immigrant families, many who have lived there 20 to 25 years.

Montances, an anthropology major and sociology minor, said living in Salishan made him realize how much service means to him. He volunteers with a Cambodian dance group.

"The kids are like my little brothers and sisters," he said. "That's what's really important about living here. It definitely changes anyone who comes here."

In exchange for their housing, each student completes at least four hours of community service per week, ranging from volunteering at a Southeast Asian food bank to tutoring math at a local middle school. They agree the service doesn't just benefit the community, but themselves as well.

Harpel tutors math at McIlvaigh Middle School, helps out at

the food bank and volunteers at Salishan's community garden, where residents can grow crops.

"You don't just come in and change things," he said. "You just assist where you can."

The program, which is in its third year, was started by professor of English Barbara Temple-Thurston as an opportunity for students coming back from Trinidad and Tobago to continue living in a multicultural setting. This year, for the first time, a class is being offered as part of program: Community Study of Salishan. While only three of the students live in the house, there are 12 students taking the course, which is taught by professor of anthropology Elizabeth Brusco and associate professor of social work JoDee Keller.

"It's a tremendous opportunity for students living in the house to serve as a link between PLU and the community," Brusco said. "And it gets people to understand that there is all this multiculturalism in the community."

The course also has a community service requirement. In addition, students plan four dinner talks throughout the semester where community members, including current or former Salishan residents, speak about their experiences. Hosted at the students' house, the talks are open to the community.

“The course is really amazing,” said Ron Vignec, former PLU campus pastor and founder of the Eastside/Salishan Lutheran Mission. “It’s important because it ripples through the community.”

Vignec and his wife, Nancy, special projects officer for the Tacoma Housing Authority, have fostered many self-sufficiency efforts for the residents of Salishan, including drug elimination programs, the community garden, English as a Second Language classes and multicultural gatherings.

Vignec says he doesn’t look at the students living in the house as just students – they are part of the community. Bennett, Harpel and Montances say living in the neighborhood allows them to apply what they learn in class to their experiences in Salishan. It is different than living on campus, and they see firsthand issues such as poverty, racial divide and crime.

“It’s sort of like coming to the real world here,” said Harpel, an anthropology and history major who also lived in the house last spring and throughout the summer. “Everyone has to work to get through the day. If they don’t work, they don’t live.”

Although there is evidence of drugs and gangs, the students said they don’t see a lot of crime.

“It’s still present; it’s just not as big as people think it is,” Harpel said. “Most residents enjoy living in the Salishan area and think that what other people think about it is a little inaccurate.”

The students believe that efforts such as the Cambodian dance group that Montances volunteers for are helping make improvements by providing after-school activities for kids.

And while they said they see a lot of racial tension among the adults, it’s not prevalent among the children. Montances said the dance group combines many ethnicities – including Cambodians, Caucasians and Vietnamese.

He enjoys learning about Cambodian culture – and comparing it to his own Filipino background. “The music is so different from the Filipino folk dancing I used to do,” he said. “I appreciate it a lot more now that I’ve been helping the kids dance to it.”

Montances and Bennett both volunteer at adult English as a Second Language classes in the community, where they see different cultures working together to learn English. Bennett,

a biology and history major, said the classes provide immigrants with an opportunity to connect with the country.

“Immigrants feel displaced,” she said, noting that not all residents of Salishan are immigrants. “They are stripped from everything comfortable.”

She can see how those in the ESL classes feel being around a language and culture different from their own. “It’s sort of displacing for us too,” she said. “Service is a good opportunity to connect with people you wouldn’t normally know.”

Changes are in store for the community. The Tacoma Housing Authority, with help from a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and other sources, is building new homes for Salishan residents.

That means people have to move out while the houses are flattened and new ones go up in their place. The result will be more than 1,200 new homes, offering affordable rental and home ownership, and new community facilities.

The students are watching the process begin around them, with people moving out of the houses on their street. Their own house is likely to be demolished after the spring semester.

As for the future of the program, Brusco and Keller hope to turn it into something similar to a semester-long international program – giving students a cross-cultural experience complemented by courses at PLU.

Keller said everyone involved in with program has learned a lot – including herself. “It’s been rewarding to see the transformation with the students,” she said. “You can’t live here and not change in some way.”

Some of the students say their time at Salishan has changed their plans after graduation.

Harpel either wants to join AmeriCorps or work in the education field – and learn how it relates to multiculturalism and different ethnicities.

Montances, who was planning to do contract archaeology in preparation for graduate school, is now thinking about putting it off and continuing to do volunteer work, perhaps with Peace Corps or AmeriCorps.

“I feel like doing more than just getting a job,” he said. “I want to do something meaningful.”

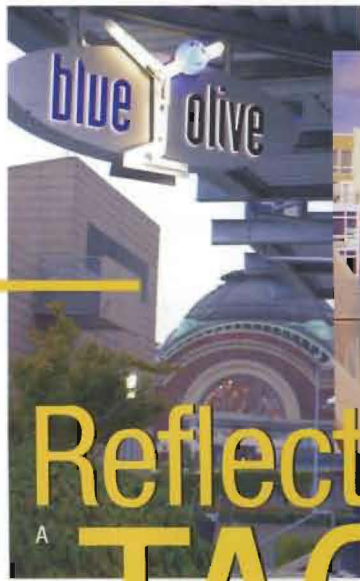

# Reflections on TACOMA

**D** DURING RICK ALLEN'S TENURE at PLU from 1973 to 1985, he made a promise to his wife: If he ever left his job as dean of Student Life, he'd *never* work in downtown Tacoma.

It was a pledge that many people made at that time, when the stretch of Tacoma between Tacoma Avenue South and the Thea Foss Waterway was riddled with homelessness and crime, buildings were vacant and in disrepair and the nearby waterfront was an environmental disaster. It was a place few people were willing to touch.

Some 20 years later, as president of United Way of Pierce County, Allen tells the story from his office on the fourth floor of the Sprague Building, a splendidly renovated 1890s-era landmark. The UWPC offices sit right at the junction of 15th Street and Pacific Avenue – in the heart of the same downtown Tacoma in which he promised his wife he'd never work.

That the area has changed is an understatement. From Allen's window, a cleaned-up Thea Foss Waterway sports a walking trail, a museum and sparkling new restaurants and condominiums – with more on the way. On the other side of the Sprague

Building, across the street, is the swanky white-tablecloth Pacific Grill and the Courtyard Marriott, the first hotel built in the downtown Tacoma since the Sheraton barely survived the mid-'80s.

The gleaming glass-and-steel Greater Tacoma Convention and Trade Center looms nearby, consuming an entire city block. Sound Transit's successful Tacoma Link light-rail zips through the area toward the Theater District to the north, coming from the University of Washington–Tacoma campus to the south, where students congregate in small bunches, not exactly blending in with the suits and museum-goers who roam about Pacific Avenue choosing between the many places to grab a bite.

And nighttime shows what is perhaps the most surprising thing of all: On any given evening, people are out on the streets, doing the things that people do in a thriving urban area.

## The history

For those who graduated from PLU even just a few years ago, such a description of downtown Tacoma would be almost unimaginable. Given

that PLU has been inextricably linked to the city for more than 115 years, it is worth looking at Tacoma's recent successes, particularly through the eyes of a few PLU graduates that have been a part of it.

The recent history of downtown Tacoma spans about 15 years, beginning around 1990. It is the story of a well-timed confluence of investment from the public, private and nonprofit sectors.

"Every success story has a hundred parents," said Lyle Quasim '73, chief of staff for Pierce County Executive John W. Ladenburg. "If this project failed, you wouldn't have been able to find anyone who even lived in the ZIP code."

Indeed, there is no shortage of people that have had a valuable impact on the rebirth of Tacoma. And one needs to look no farther than the swanky new condominiums and remodeled lofts within a stone's throw of Pacific Avenue to see that people are definitely living in the ZIP code.

Similarly, there is no one single moment when Tacoma's resurgence officially took root. More likely, it was a perfect storm of federal, local and private dollars – and forward-thinking citizens – to enable the revitalization of a neglected and bereft region of Tacoma.

"People in Tacoma started to shift from a siege mentality to see things in a totally different way," said Quasim. "And when they did that, they were able to build off even very small successes."

Many believe one of the first small successes was when the city purchased Union Station and renovated it into the lobby of a new federal courthouse. The station, once a thriving terminus to the Northern Pacific Railroad, had fallen into such a state of disrepair, the city paid only \$1 for it.

About the same time, the state was seeking a new place to house the Washington State History Museum. Pierce County's legislators convinced the state to move it from Tacoma's Stadium district to downtown, adjacent to Union Station – and to secure state dollars to refurbish the building.

Tacoma's most prominent citizens, too, were getting into the act. A group of farsighted Tacoma business leaders, including George Russell of Russell Investment Group and Bill Philip of Columbia Bank, started to eye underused properties on the other side of Pacific Avenue with the hopes of making the property available for the possible expansion of the University of Washington.

At the same time, Tacoma had leaders with big ideas and the gumption to try and implement them. Eventually, they backed the downtown location of the UW-Tacoma and a convention center. The city bought contaminated property along the Thea Foss Waterway on the cheap, knowing that the city could clean it up long before the federal government or private business would. The business community bought into the plans.

## The present

Fast-forward 15 years. The fruits of this effort are evident everywhere. Early 1900-era landmarks like the Harmon Building and the Albers Mill have been refurbished and are smart-looking lofts, apartments, shops and restaurants. The Tacoma Art Museum and the Museum of Glass have recently opened in beautiful new exhibition spaces.

"In just 15 years, the middle of downtown shifted south," said Marc Crisson '81, director of Tacoma Utilities. And given that, the next question is, as Crisson put it: "How do you work around some of the community issues as you move forward?"

Those community issues focus largely on housing – namely, making space available for those who now want to live there (and subsequently making the downtown core a more dense, thus safer, area) and ensuring those people have access to goods and services in their immediate area.

"I've had five different developers asking about our parking lot," said Allen, gesturing outside his window. "Twenty-four to 36 months ago, nobody was asking about it. That tells you that a lot of people are dreaming about what [downtown Tacoma] can look like."

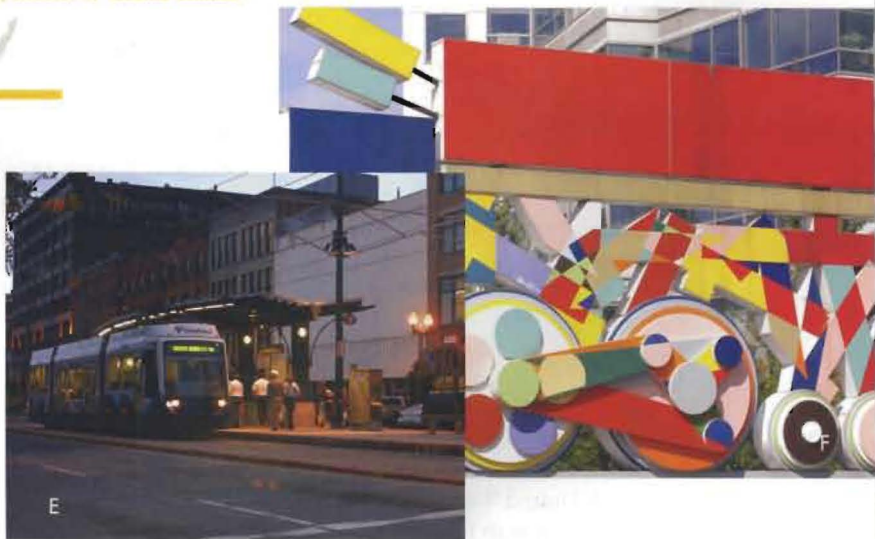
This is certainly true along the Thea Foss Waterway, including along the east side. This is land that remains zoned for industrial use, but many see it as the next best place to build in the downtown area. All this speaks precisely to what people see in the area – if people really want to build even here, there must be some real potential. These are issues the Tacoma City Council is weighing, namely how to balance the needs of residents (and those building homes for them) and those who have longtime industrial use in the corridor. After all, said Crisson, "you can't move the Port of Tacoma."

Similarly, just as the needs of those who have utilized the port over the years, the needs of those lower-income residents who live in downtown must also be considered. A common failing of urban areas that redevelop too quickly is that such growth can push aside the lower-wage individuals that made the area home. Tacoma has come too far, too successfully, to allow this crack in the armor.

"When you don't have growth, you have a problem. But when you do have growth, you have a whole different set of problems," said Crisson. "All in all, this is a better problem to have." >>

# Reflections on TACOMA

## Part of a circle

To solve this problem, Allen says cities have to look to the nonprofit sectors for help. Without it, an effective revitalization campaign will show its cracks, maybe even fail.

"You need to look at economic development and human services as parts of a circle," said Allen. "One begins where the other ends. Wherever there is the weakest link, that is where cracks will form."

To illustrate his point, he speaks of the Rescue Mission and Nativity House, two essential service providers for the area's most destitute. The two nonprofits were once located just across the street from Allen's building, where the Courtyard Marriott and the convention center are today. It became clear, Allen said, that if these new developments were going to displace the facilities that care for those in greatest need, then their replacements must not only be improved, but they need to be located nearby.

The logic is simple: if the Nativity House and Rescue Mission were moved, for example, to south Tacoma, then the population they served would never be able to use those services, and they would be back on the streets. And that would make places like the Courtyard Marriott and the convention center – not to mention simply living downtown – less attractive. So there had to be a balance.

The Nativity House, now located on South Jefferson Avenue a few blocks from its previous space, has a new state-of-the-art facility, serving about three times the people it had once served. "It did exactly what it was supposed to do," said Allen. "It helped the people that it was supposed to, and it helped clean up downtown."

Similarly, the need to address affordable housing issues in downtown will be something that Allen, through United Way Pierce County, will continue to focus on.

"The more you do this, the greater the source of community strength," Allen said.

PLU President Loren J. Anderson said having a vibrant downtown core strengthens PLU as well.

"With Tacoma's renewal, the city offers students, staff and faculty a range of cultural, business and social

opportunities," he said. "At the same time, PLU provides the city and its residents with a place to get a great education, enjoy scholarly and arts events on campus – and most importantly – the university sends well-trained leaders into the community to continue the social and economic progress." □



## MUSEUM DISTRICT

Just north of South 21st Street on Pacific Avenue is what many who recall Tacoma's less glamorous days would be surprised to find there: a tourist attraction. And not one, but three. The so-called Museum District consists of the Washington State History Museum and the Tacoma Art Museum, both on Pacific Avenue, and the Museum of Glass. The Chihuly Bridge of Glass spans Interstate 705, connecting the history and glass museums.

The three museums host tens of thousands of visitors each year. Here's a look at the three museums that are an essential component of the changing face of Tacoma.

### The Washington State History Museum

– Opened at its current location in 1996, the museum celebrated a milestone this past April by welcoming its millionth visitor. The museum, previously located near Stadium High School, mimics the graceful curves of nearby Union Station and features numerous interpretive exhibits, traveling exhibitions and the Great Hall of Washington History.

**Tacoma Art Museum** – TAM has been in existence since the mid 1930s, and has moved all over the city since then. The sleek new space was short listed for several architectural honors when it opened in 2003. Located just north of the other two museums on Pacific Avenue, it features American, European and Asian art, including works by notables such as Edward Hopper and Jacob Lawrence.

**The Museum of Glass** – Opened in 2002, the Museum of Glass features an angled 90-foot stainless-steel cone that has redefined the Tacoma skyline. Inside, there is 13,000-square-foot or gallery space that displays the work of some of the world's best glass artists, including a "hot shop" where visitors can watch glass blowers ply their trade.

## Board chair impressed with PLU's commitment to mission

**W**hen Dr. Cynthia Edwards was first asked to join PLU's Board of Regents, she didn't know much about the board's function. "But I felt really close to the university because of the personal mentoring I received here," said Edwards '76, who earned her degree in biology and met her husband, Terry '77, at PLU.

"I knew the university and felt good about this place. It's been an honor to be involved in a more intimate way."

Edwards, a family practitioner with MultiCare, became a regent in 1987 and has seen the university make great strides since then. Now in her final year of service, she is serving her second year as chair of the board.

"It's wonderful to be involved in a place that is an investment in our future and is committed to stewardship for our whole world," she said.

Her fellow board members are highly committed and talented, she said.

"They give their time, their talents and their energy and they're always asking what else they can do," Edwards said.

"He carries out the mission in his personal life," she said. "I think he is more excited with each passing year than the previous one, which is infectious."

During her tenure on the board, Edwards has seen PLU take great strides in capital projects, development and global education. She has watched as Rieke Science Center, Mary Baker Russell Music Building and the Morken Center for Learning and Technology grew from total commitment and forward thinking.

PLU completed a record-breaking fund-raising campaign last year that significantly increased its endowment and paid for several capital projects.

Edwards, who earned her medical degree from Washington University in St. Louis, is pleased with PLU's increased focus on academic distinction, student-faculty research and international programs. The university has seen the creation of the Wang Center, and has reached out in its commitment to diversity.


She looks forward to the university's expanding role in the community with the Garfield Street redevelopment

project and the revitalization of Eastvold Hall.

"Garfield Street will be a gateway to the university, and the Eastvold project will liven this place even more," she said.

She hopes to see the university's fiscal strengthening continue as it works toward the goal of being less dependent on tuition for operating costs.

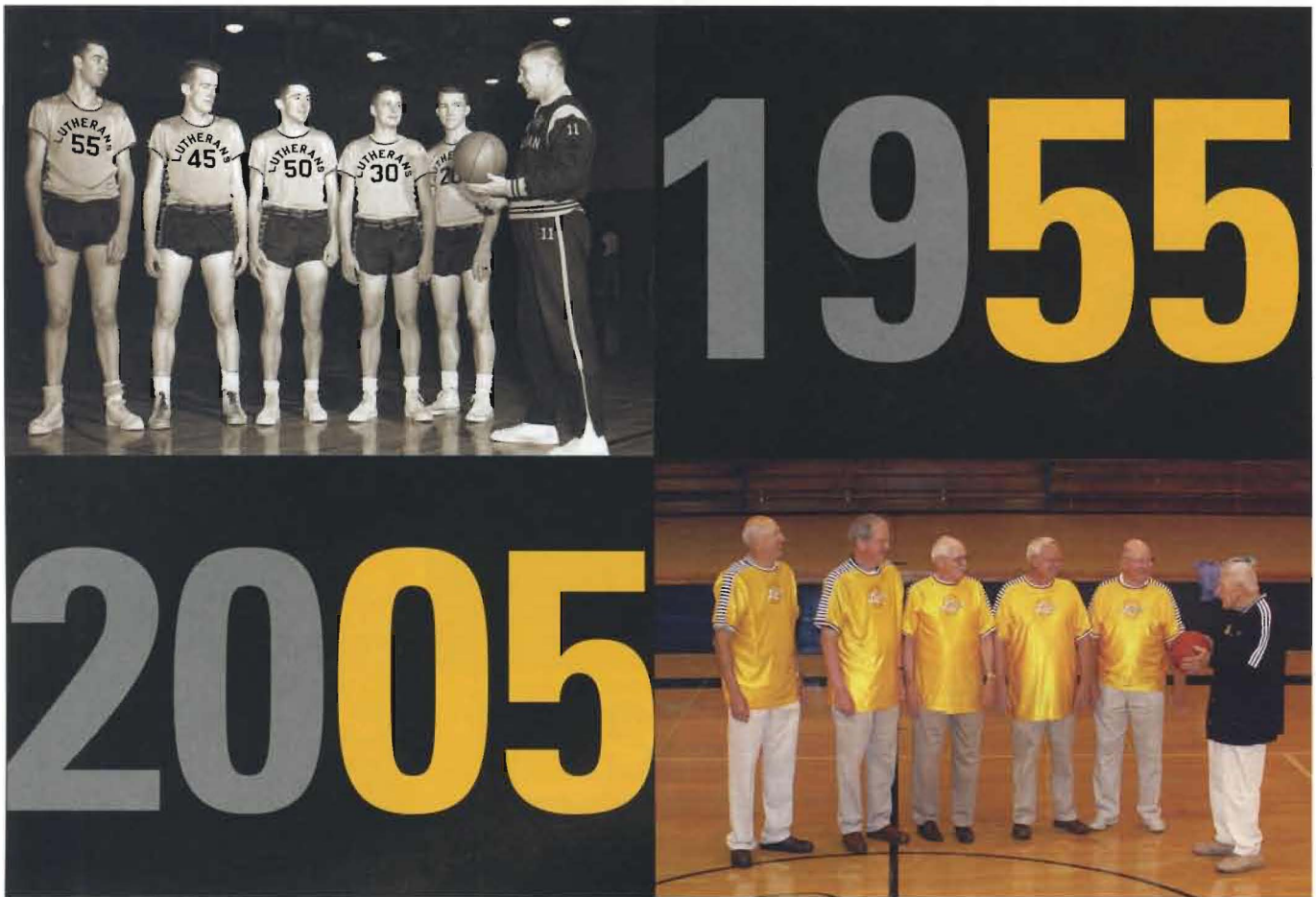
And while the future will inevitably bring more changes at PLU, Edwards said core values will preserve and shape those changes.

## '50s basketball stars relive the heyday with a reunion

**W**ith only one returning starter, Pacific Lutheran College's 1954-55 basketball team wasn't predicted to have a good year.

But, against all odds, the team ended up playing the second most successful season in PLC history up to that time – and became known as a “Cinderella team.”

Celebrating the team's 50th anniversary, the five starters – Al Gubrud '56, Jack Hoover '56, Nick Kelderman '57, Phil Nordquist '56 and Jack Sinderson '58 – and their coach, Marv Harshman '42, reunited in Olson Auditorium in August to reminisce about the old basketball days.

“They were what you would call a ‘we’ team,” said Harshman, who coached at PLU for 13 years, including football, bas-

ketball and baseball. “Everybody was very much a part of it. No one tried to do their own thing; it was a team effort.”

“We just ran together and made the play,” added Kelderman. “There were no real stars. Marv gave us great direction and we followed it.”

That attitude is what tied the team for the championship title that year and – even though they lost the final game to get to nationals – it served as the launching pad for the best series of basketball teams in PLU history from 1955-1964.

The players remember the excitement of the crowds filling the stands in Memorial Gym and band playing “When the Saints Go Marching In” as they entered the court.

“It got us fired up,” Hoover said.

The team won another championship in 1956 and then went three straight

years, 1957, 1958 and 1959, without losing a game in league play and took four trips to nationals.

“The success was much greater than anyone anticipated,” said Nordquist, who retired from teaching history at PLU in May. “I think we played exceedingly well as a team and that's why we won.”

But, for Nordquist, it isn't the team's wins that impress him most, but rather how the players' success continued in life – a testament to the ideals of PLU. The team includes four Ph.D.s, five college professors, two Lutheran pastors, one university administrator, three high school teachers and one of the three first Americans to climb Mt. Everest.

“What strikes me now is how well everyone turned out academically and professionally,” Nordquist said.

## Hacker's coaching success lands her in NAIA Hall of Fame

The most successful women's soccer coach in the history of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in November.

Colleen Hacker was inducted during the opening banquet of the NAIA Women's Soccer National Championships in Olathe, Kan.

Hacker had coached field hockey since arriving at PLU in 1979 but became the head soccer coach two years later when PLU dropped that sport and made soccer a varsity sport. She had never played or coached soccer before.

She stayed with the team for 15 years, during which the Lutes compiled a 233-59-18 win-loss-tie record, won the Northwest Conference title 10 times, claimed five straight NAIA District 1 and NAIA West Region crowns, and played for the NAIA national championship five consecutive years. The Lutes won the national title in 1988, 1989 and 1991, and finished as the runner-up in 1990 and 1992.

Her win total remains to this day the NAIA record, and her .781 winning percentage is currently sixth all-time. She was named the conference Coach of the

Year five times, the NAIA District 1 Coach of the Year seven times, is a four-time NAIA/NSCAA West Region Coach of the Year and four times was named the NAIA/NSCAA National Coach of the Year. She was inducted into the PLU Athletic Hall of Fame this year.

Hacker joined the coaching staff of the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team in 1996 and continues to serve as the team's sport psychologist. She is also an assistant dean in the School of Physical Education. [S]

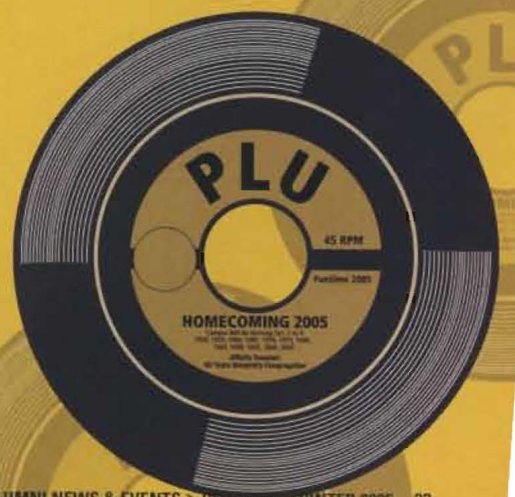

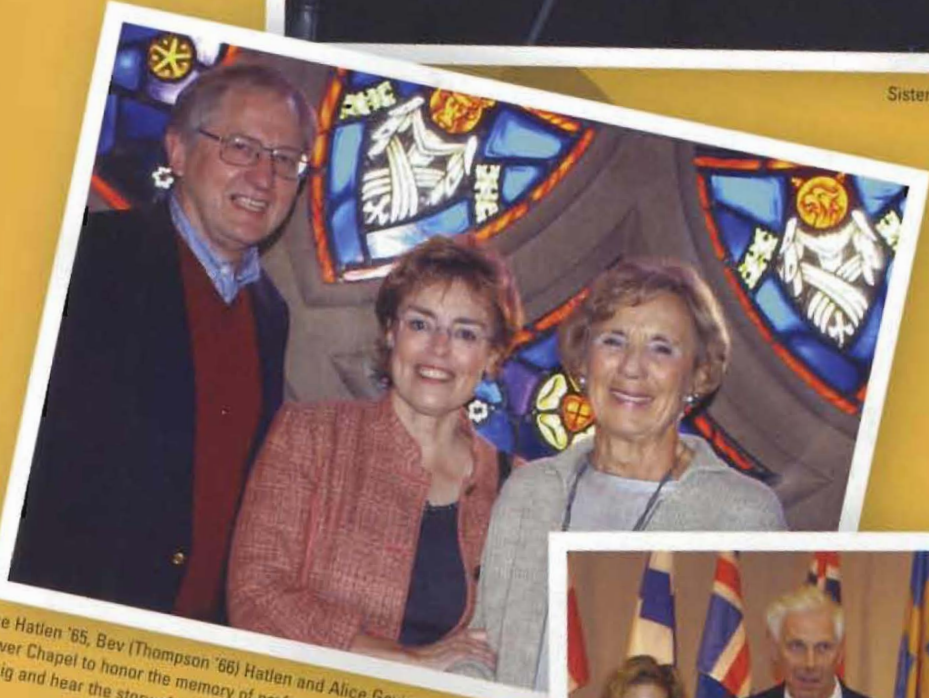

## PLU crew star takes his love of rowing all the way to world championships

**P**LU crew standout Bjorn Larsen '03 had competed at many levels, but getting to the world championships in Japan last summer put him in a whole new echelon.

"You're racing guys who had raced in the Olympics," Larsen said. "There were good crews all around. It was fun to line up next to guys that you had seen in racing videos and always thought were fast. And now, you're close to the same speed."

Rowing lightweight men's double sculls, he and his teammate, Mike Altman, placed fourth in the B final for a 10th place finish overall in the 2005 FISA World Rowing Championships.

Getting to that point took a lot of hard work and dedication. Larsen, who grew up in Lake Stevens, Wash., discovered rowing by following his best friend and freshman year roommate Jed Stoken '04 to a crew interest meeting. He started out on the novice team, joining the men's varsity team his sophomore year.

With a core group of rowers sticking around all four years, the team began winning competitions – placing first in the men's lightweight 4+ at the Pacific Coast Rowing Championships and first in the petite final in the open 4+ at the Pacific-10 Rowing Championships Larsen's junior year.

The next year, Larsen's team won the gold medal in the lightweight men's 4+ race at the 2002 Dad Vail Regatta.

"We were all focused on the same goal," said Larsen, who was varsity captain his senior year. "It was a great ending for our careers."

Even though his PLU crew career was ending, Larsen knew he wanted to keep rowing and attended a lightweight summer camp in 2002 at the Penn Athletic Club, where he gained confidence before returning to PLU in the fall to finish his degrees.

Buying a single scull, Larsen, who earned degrees in math and Norwegian and a coaching minor, spent the year practicing, coaching the men's novice team and helping out with the men's and women's varsity teams.

After graduation, Larsen headed back

to the East coast. "I drove to Pennsylvania without a plan," he said. "I had my boat on top of my truck and my truck full of about three quarters of what I owned."

Camping out on a friend's floor, Larsen spent that summer back at the Penn Athletic Club summer camp. While there, Larsen and his teammates competed at the U.S. Nationals, winning five gold medals and one silver medal.

"It was a very exciting summer because we were going pretty fast compared to other pre-elites," Larsen said. (Elites are those who are in the upper levels of rowing.)

That fall, Larsen joined the Penn Athletic Club and concentrated on getting even faster and stronger. "It's a lot more intense," he said. "You're rowing a lot more miles than you ever had before."

He placed first in both 2004 and 2005 at the Main Line Slide Erg Competition on the rowing machine and finished seventh at the C.R.A.S.H.-B. World Indoor Rowing Championships in 2004 and fourth in 2005.

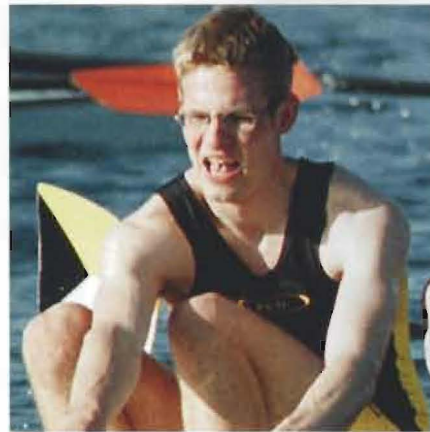
Finally, after missing the U.S. national team for men's single sculls in 2004, Larsen qualified with Altman in 2005. After spending the summer training at the Princeton Training Center they headed for the world championships.

Larsen, who is hoping to return to the world championships next year and is training for the 2008 Olympics, credits his success as a rower to his teammates, both at the Penn Athletic Club and at PLU, and his supportive family and girlfriend.

Larsen, who is a pension administrator at Electronic Data Systems in Cherry Hill, N.J., enjoys the intensity of the sport and the camaraderie with his teammates. "When you have guys around to keep you excited, it's a lot of fun."

He added that the crew teams at PLU, both men's and women's, were like family – hanging out both on and off the water. "Everyone was good friends," Larsen said. "We had fun and, in the end, that's what you want to do."

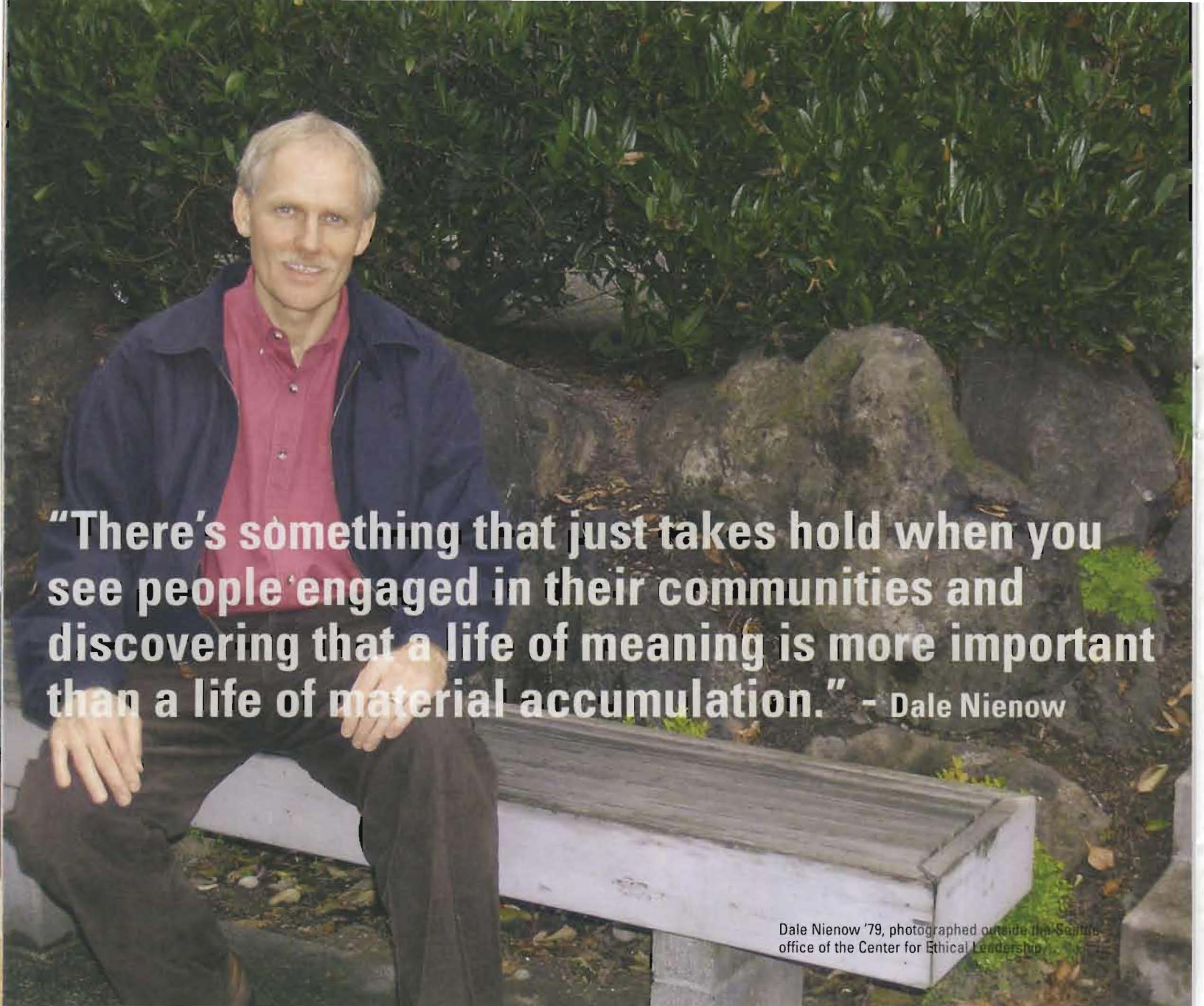

## The common good

Graduate helps individuals and communities define their values and future

**D**ale Nienow learned about how people with different backgrounds and goals can learn to live together when he was a graduate student and hall director at PLU, helping a diverse group of students get along and find their similarities.

“I got to stretch and I learned so much about how to create healthy learning communities,” said Nienow who earned his master’s in education in 1979 and serves on the Alumni Board.

After working for more than a decade in student life at University of Southern California and Seattle University, Nienow’s quest for social justice pulled him into community service.

He is executive director for the Center for Ethical Leadership in Seattle, where he helps communities divided by differences come together to create a shared future.

“There’s something that just takes hold when you see people engaged in their communities and discovering that a life of meaning is more important than a life of material accumulation,” Nienow said. “In higher education, I was working with students who planned to go out in the world and do these great things. Eventually I just knew I wanted to do that too.”

The nonprofit Center for Ethical Leadership helps individuals, communities and organizations define their core

values, then put those values to work in service to “the common good,” which the center describes as a more just, inclusive and sustainable society.

One focus is on creating what the center calls “gracious space,” which creates opportunities for deeper listening and understanding, welcomes diversity and encourages the creative potential of disagreement or diverse views.

One of the center’s goals is to understand that leadership doesn’t reside just in the typical up-and-coming community leaders or executives, but that every member of a community has the capacity to effect change by aligning actions with values.

In 2002, the W.W. Kellogg Foundation chose the Center for Ethical Leadership to help create and manage Kellogg Leadership for Community Change. The Kellogg Foundation has for more than five decades been at the forefront of leadership development programs nationally. The innovative KLCC program focuses on communities rather than individuals, seeking to develop the leadership capacity of entire communities so they remain stronger and more successful well into the future.

Last summer Nienow got to visit eight KLCC communities, which include a small African American community in Michigan, an immigrant community in Boston, a coal mining community in Appalachia, a Latino community in Denver and a Native American community in Bellingham, Wash. Nienow describes it as the most powerful trip of his life.

“I came away from this trip more hopeful about the future of the country than I have ever been,” he said. “There’s so much talent and wisdom in these communities.”

Nienow said he has witnessed incredible transformations in the KLCC communities. For example, on the Flathead Indian Reservation in Montana, where whites and Native Americans share a high school, residents are overcoming divisiveness and stereotypes and realizing they share the same goals for the future. The community is working to

help all children succeed in school.

And in New Mexico, Nienow said Hispanics and Native Americans are finally finding their similarities and working together after 400 years of living side by side. Both communities have worked to include their language and culture in the curriculum of the school they built together to make the history and traditions of each more meaningful for the youth and future generations, Nienow said.

“They’re weaving together a whole different way of working together,” he said.

Nienow said the Center takes care when going into communities, especially those stung by racial or ethnic divisiveness, to show respect and earn their trust. Center staff members don’t go in as experts who will tell residents what to do, but rather ask them to share their stories, value their input and help them find their own direction.

The Center also provides training and consulting for businesses, government and nonprofit organizations, and other agencies. Many times, finding their values means realizing that more than one ideal can exist.

For instance, Nienow believes businesses can be both profitable and good stewards of earth; it need not be a choice between making money and protecting the environment. And communities can embrace their traditions while being open to those from other cultures.

“We need to think in new ways how to integrate important concepts,” he said. “A lot of the future depends onto holding onto two truths at the same time, rather than adopting a single truth to conquer people. We’re taking small steps, but this is powerful work that can change the world.” □

**Lifetime Giving Society (L)**

The most common estate gift involves donating a portion of estate proceeds to PLU as part of a will. By using current assets to establish a charitable trust or gift annuity, donors can receive an income stream for the remainder of their lives, with the remaining trust assets going to PLU upon their deaths.

**Q Club (Q)**

With a minimum contribution of \$300 annually (student giving levels begin at \$60 a year), one can join this gathering of dedicated friends whose mission is to provide assistance to deserving students as they prepare for lives of service through a Pacific Lutheran University education. Q Club is the "giving club" of PLU's annual fund, and the more than 2,000 members provide the core of scholarship support.

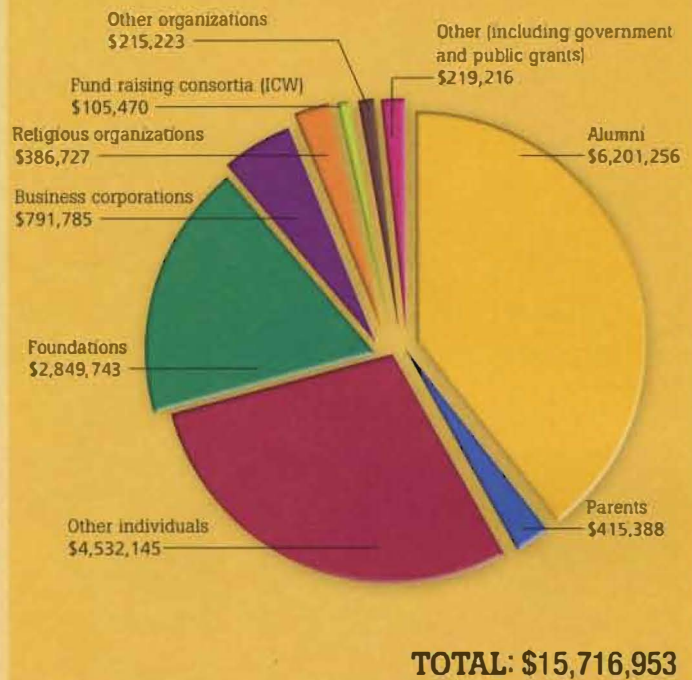

## Professor's gift helps theater students hone their craft even after retirement

Theater professor William Becvar taught aspiring actors at PLU for more than 30 years. But even when he retired in 2003, he knew that his job of preparing students for a career in theater wasn't finished. And, with his recent gift to PLU, that is even more the case.

During his years at PLU, it always bothered him that his students never had access to a script library – a stand-alone collection of theater scripts that aspiring actors could peruse. So, back in the '80s when two rooms in Memorial Gym were acquired by the Theatre Department, he made sure one of them was converted to house nothing but scripts – and be available 24-hours a day for theater majors. "I wanted quick accessibility, so students can walk right in, sit down, grab a script and start reading." Moreover, he began a campaign to make sure the library was populated with current scripts, like "Angels in America" or "Proof" – not merely the old classics from masters George Bernard Shaw or Arthur Miller.

With the Eastvold revitalization campaign beginning in earnest, Becvar's vision continues to bear fruit. The script library will be moved to Eastvold, part of Becvar's \$50,000 gift. Moreover, he plans to donate his personal script library – valued at \$8,000–\$10,000 – when the structure is finally built. "I have purchased just about every play that has come out," he said.

What does this mean for PLU students? According to Becvar, the answer is easy. "When students have the chance to read the day's scripts – what's current right now – they are so much more sophisticated in their craft," he said. "They are better prepared, because they know exactly what's going on outside PLU."

# Scholarship keeps Monica Lightell's spirit alive

When Monica Lightell first set foot on PLU's campus, she knew it was the place for her.

She and her mom, Carole, looked at many schools, but Monica just didn't like the feel of them. Carole read about an open house at PLU, and they decided to check it out. They had never been on campus before.

"We got in the car to leave and she said, 'I have to go here,'" Carole said. "It was instantaneous. PLU gave her a chance and she just bloomed. The fit was like hand to glove. It was unbelievable."

Monica died tragically Feb. 25, 2001, when a deck collapsed at an off-campus party.

And though she never got to complete her freshmen year, her mother is making sure others have the chance to experience all that PLU has to offer through the Monica Sara Lightell Memorial Scholarship.

"It's very rewarding for me to know there's something keeping her spirit alive," Carole said. "It's her legacy. That's what keeps me going."

Carole still aches for her fun-loving daughter, who before college paddled the length of the Panama Canal, played volleyball and threw javelin, was a lifelong Girl Scout and enjoyed traveling the world. At PLU, Monica excelled in class, joined the PLU crew team, volunteered and took up snowboarding.

"She had so many opportunities there," said Carole, a retired Army nurse who now works part-time as a nurse at Steilacoom High School, where Monica graduated in 2000. "Those eight months were the happiest in her life."

Carole keeps in touch with many of Monica's PLU friends and others at the university.

"I had a wonderful feeling about the place the first time I went there, and it continues today."

## Couple's love for Lute athletics helps build a new generation of leaders

Neither Jill Luebker nor her husband, Earl, attended PLU – in fact, no one in her family has. But PLU, and in particular the athletic program, have been instrumental in their lives. So much so, the couple created an endowment to help support PLU's student-athletes.

Earl, who passed away about four years ago, was a reporter for the Tacoma News Tribune for nearly 37 years – 15 of those covering PLU sports. His work made him a 1996 inductee to the PLU Athletics Hall of Fame, not to mention a member of the Tacoma-Pierce County Sports Hall of Fame. Jill was already a PLU sports fan – her father would take her to many events as a child, and her affection for the PLU athletics only grew through the years. The two, along with their daughter, Anne Luebker Leatherman – herself a Lute fan – attended many sporting events.

The Jill and Earl Luebker Endowment for Intercollegiate Athletics is also a perfect match for Lute athletes. Whereas NCAA rules do not allow gifts to go toward tuition of specific athletes, they do benefit the athletic programs as a whole – helping pay travel, recruiting, equipment and other tools necessary to ensure teams sustain a competitive advantage over their rivals. Moreover, the endowment, along with similar gifts to Lute Club, provides for the development of tomorrow's leaders athletically, academically and socially.

So what was it about PLU athletics that made such an impression on the Luebkers? "PLU sports were just different," Jill said, "Everything was just so positive."

And with this gift supporting current and future Lute athletic programs, it looks as though things will remain so for years to come.



# Severtsons' lifelong devotion to PLU turns toward Eastvold revitalization

Erv and Nancy Severtson have built much of their lives around PLU, and now they are working to bring new life to the historic Eastvold Hall.

"PLU is our passion. It's been our life in many ways," Erv said. "We have spent most of our adult lives here."

Severtson '55 so valued his experience as a student that he was determined to teach and could think of no better place than PLU to do that. He joined the psychology faculty in 1966 and retired as vice president for Student Life in 1999.

He and Nancy met on a 1957 study trip to Europe led by former history professor Walter Schnackenberg when Erv was a student at Luther Seminary and she was an undergrad at the University of Michigan.

Nancy quickly shared his passion for PLU. She earned a master's in education from PLU in 1979 and taught fifth grade in the Puyallup School District for 20 years. She has been a longtime member of the PLU Women's Club and Yule Boutique volunteer.

They follow PLU sports, attend music events, and both serve on the Eastvold Leadership Committee, which is raising money for the revitalization of the historic building. Plans call for a refurbished auditorium, state-of-the-art facilities, a renewed chapel, and the relocation and consolidation of the Division of Humanities in Eastvold.

Erv was on the planning committee for the 50th reunion of the Class of 1955, which pledged to raise \$50,000 for a seminar room in Eastvold, which was built while he was a student.

"It was a center for the arts and worship," he said. "In the 1950s it was probably the finest space in the region, but 50 years have passed, and it's time for it to have new life. It needs to be revitalized so it meets the needs of campus and the community for the next 50 years."

"The foundation's mission is to make sure all families have a chance to influence society, and we believe education is the path to that," Walker said. "To see PLU students working for change was very impressive. The university has made the commitment to continue the project, and that really strengthens why it made sense for us to make this investment in the university."

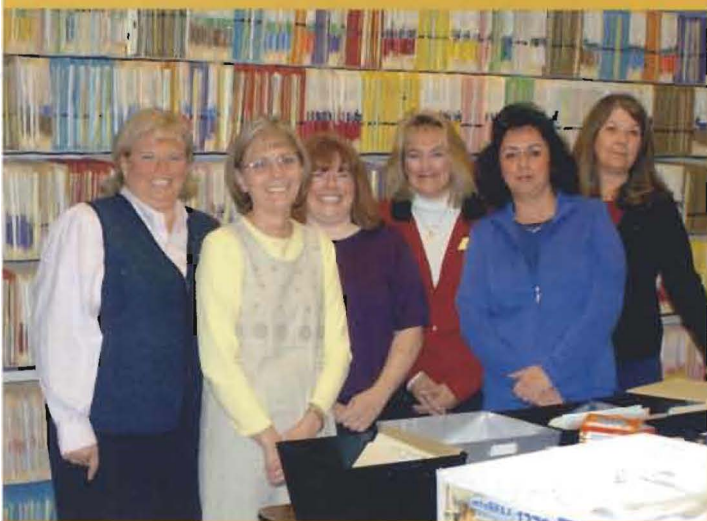

## Couple's generosity will provide PLU scholarships

A generous bequest from a couple who want to make sure others get the college education they could not afford will help students from Puyallup, Sumner and Enumclaw high schools attend PLU.

Norbert and Sonia Grove of Sun City, Ariz., will leave half of their significant estate to PLU to establish a scholarship program for deserving and needy students from the area they used to call home.

Norbert Grove grew up during the depth of the Depression.

"Due to lack of funds, college was not a possibility," he said. "But I know well how important education is in anyone's life."

Norbert, son of the late Carl and Myrtina Grove of Enumclaw, managed a savings and loan in Puyallup for many years. He was active in many civic organizations in the Puyallup area, including Rotary, Elks and the Mt. Rainier Boy Scouts Council of America. He is one of the originators of the Sun City Prides, a group of over 400 retirees who have assumed responsibility for Sun City's grounds maintenance.

Sonia Grove came to America in 1946 from war-torn Poland. She retired from McChord Air Force Base as a budget analyst.

"This country has been exceedingly generous to me," she said. "I hope our legacy will be that we've made life easier for recipients of this scholarship."

PLU President Loren J. Anderson said the university appreciates the Groves' generosity.

"The Groves are people of remarkable vision and generosity, and this scholarship program will assist strong students who have financial need," Anderson said.

The Groves, who have no children, are leaving the other half of their estate to Sun Health Foundation, which operates the community in which they live.

Department of Labor has identified registered nursing as the top occupation in terms of job growth through the year 2012.

In May, the National Commission on Nursing Workforce for Long-Term Care reported that there are nearly 100,000 vacant nursing positions in long-term care facilities on any given day, and the annual nurse turnover rate exceeds 50 percent. The shortage is costing long-term care facilities alone an estimated \$4 billion a year in recruitment and training expenses.

An understanding of the shortage requires some analysis of where nurses choose to work and how long they remain in nursing positions. Rural areas have had better results with creating their own nursing programs, admitting a local population who is more likely to stay a rural area. However, this changes with major recruiting efforts by better-resourced urban areas, promising better salaries, benefits and relocation incentives.

The shortage also has been exacerbated by some creative solutions to downsizing nursing staffs in the late '80s and early '90s. Many nurses work part-time and have become accustomed to flexibility in scheduling, unknown in previous decades. Continuity of care becomes harder as the number of part-time nurses exceeds those who provide care on a more consistent basis.

Depending on who addresses the issue, the root cause for the nursing shortage has been identified as work environmental issues, inadequate salaries, lack of significant career advancement and the aging demographics of the nursing workforce. In the March-April 2005 issue of *Nursing Economic\$*, Peter Buerhaus and colleagues found that more than 75 percent of RNs believe the nursing shortage presents a major problem for the quality of their work life, the quality of patient care and the amount of time nurses can spend with patients.

Looking forward, almost all surveyed nurses see the shortage in the future as a catalyst for increasing stress on nurses (98%), lowering patient care quality (93%)

and causing nurses to leave the profession (93%). Some statisticians claim that it is impossible for existing nursing programs to expand in order to adequately address the nursing shortage.

The most prevalent solution for “fixing” the nursing shortage has been driven by multiple interests including: those employing nurses, institutions wanting to get into the business of producing nurses; and educational programs that educate nurses. In other words the solution has been mostly defined in terms of expanding the pipeline of new graduates.

Public awareness of the nursing shortage has driven increases in enrollments more than anything. The PLU School of Nursing student body

has grown by 47 percent at the undergraduate level and by more than 200 percent at the graduate level since 2002. Those inquiring about our PLU programs in nursing exceed 400 per month, up from less than 100 six years ago.

Students and their significant others have responded to marketing efforts, such as the Johnson and Johnson ad campaign that showcased the potential for nursing graduates in terms of salary, employability, service, job security and international travel, as well as the chance to make a difference in the lives of others.

Whereas we look to clinical agencies to place our nursing graduates, the employers look to us to produce graduates in sufficient numbers to fill their positions. Similarly, applicants anticipate admission and success, regardless of capacity and demands for excellence.

Regardless of one’s perspective, nursing shortages are serious and affect everyone across the country in more ways than the direct recipient of nursing care recognizes. Unfortunately, the shortage can serve as an impetus for solutions that do not serve either the public’s best interest or nursing as a highly desirable profession in the future.

The nursing shortage colors expectations and drives many of the changes occurring in health care, as well as the programs educating nurses. What is certain is that someone at some price will fill the nursing vacancies – or the present system will implode.

PLU’s School of Nursing continues to be committed to producing excellent nurses who are professionally oriented, focused on lives of service and personally accountable for improving health care.

The PLU School of Nursing has worked very hard to establish a culture of excellence in nursing education such that PLU nursing graduates, nursing faculty and nursing staff represent a professional value system and level of commitment far beyond the usual. □

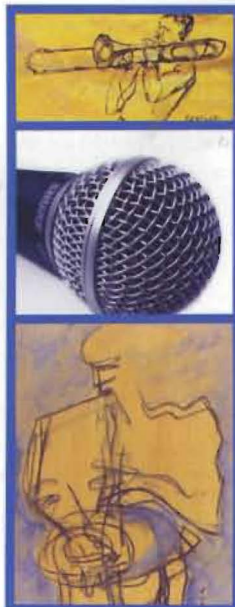

## A new era, a growing shortage and the future of nursing



Terry Miller, dean of PLU's School of Nursing, says better educated nurses and more faculty must be part of the solution to the nation's nursing shortage.

In many ways, it is the best of times for the nation's nursing schools. In the midst of a nursing shortage, the number and quality of applicants to nursing programs continue to rise, the roles and salaries for nursing graduates have never been better, clinical agency support is more collaborative, and the media blitz addressing the nursing shortage has not ended.

At the same time, there is a downside. The competitive demand for quality clinical placements of nursing students make it difficult for any program to expand offerings or increase

enrollments. Understanding both the inherent opportunity and the growing challenge presented by the nursing shortage is crucial for the future of health care.

Having more nurses will not solve the problem unless the nurses are better educated, ethically based, service-oriented leaders advocating more for the public's safety and health, than for personal employment security.

Any long-term solution will require that those entering nursing are better equipped, will stay in practice longer and that a greater number will choose to work full-time. Also, any real

solution will require the recruitment and development of more Ph.D. nursing faculty who are both effective teachers and clinicians.

It is important to first define the U.S. nursing shortage. Nursing is the largest fraction of the health care workforce. According to recent projections from the U.S. Bureau of Labor (<http://www.bls.gov/emp/emptabl21.htm>) statistics published in the February 2004 Monthly Labor Review, more than one million new and replacement nurses will be needed by 2012. The U.S.
