Andean music and ripe raspberries fill July's festival

Come on out to Red Square for the Raspberry Festival from 11:30 am to 1 pm on July 23. Plenty of fresh berries and ice cream will be served while Quichua Mashis, an Andean folk group, provides entertainment. The group's members are Quichua Indians from northern Ecuador, where children learn to play music as soon as they can hold an instrument. Their music reflects the struggles of their people, their connection to Pacha Mama (Mother Earth) and their spiritual journeys through history. The festival is sponsored by Summer Sessions and Food Services. The Peach Festival will be Aug. 13. Admission is free with PLU ID, \$2.50 without.

Browning named PLU's first Distinguished Professor
