FAMILY BAND CONCERT
SUNDAY AFTERNOON TO
BENEFIT CHILDREN

A family concert, presented by the Pacific Lutheran University Concert Band and sponsored by the Parkland Orthopedic Guild, will be presented Sunday, Nov. 22, at 3 p.m. in Eastvold Auditorium.

Proceeds from the concert will be used for the maintenance and operation of Mary Bridge Children's Hospital.

The band, directed by Prof. Gordon O. Gilbertson, is presenting its seventh annual family program. There will be marches, novelty numbers and classics. Gilbertson will explain each number, primarily for the youngsters in the audience.

The program begins with "Vilabella", a concert march by Kenneth Williams, followed by "The Great Gate of Kiev" and Bach's "Fugue a la Gig e".

A trumpet rendition of "Quixote" will be presented by John Byre, an outstanding freshman musician from Corvallis, Ore. Byre has also composed "Interaction: Round and Three:", which will be performed by the percussion lab class, David Robbins, instructor, following Wagner's "Lohengrin: Introduction to Act III", by the band.

The final portion of the program features Morton Gould's "Pavanne", "Mod Squad" by Hagen and "Julie, Do You Love Me?" by Bahler.

The program will be concluded with "America, the Beautiful".

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AMERICAN DANCE
REPERTORY SETS
PERFORMANCE HERE

A two-week Tacoma residency by the American Dance Repertory of New York will wind up this Saturday evening, Nov. 21, with a performance in PLU's Eastvold Auditorium at 8:15 p.m.

Under the direction of Seattle-born Richard Englund, the company has been conducting open rehearsals at area high schools. The professional company is made up of 12 accomplished dancers who perform a diversified repertory, ballet, folk, creative and modern.

Formed in New York four years ago, the American Dance Repertory has received acclaim for both its professional excellence and for its pioneering efforts in education.

A grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, together with local assistance from the Washington State

Arts Commission, PLU and the four city high schools, is making the two-week residency possible.

The company's performance at PLU opens with "Fete Calante", first performed at the Newport Music Festival in August 1969. It will be followed by "Icarus", an interpretation of the mythical tale about the foolish winged man who flew into the sun.

"Pas de Trois", from Swan Lake, a celebrated example of bravura classical ballet, follows. It was first performed in Moscow in 1875. "Napoli", one of the oldest and most popular of romantic ballets, precedes "Hang It All", a brand-new witty look at foibles today, premiered in Bellingham, Wash., three weeks ago.

The performance is an added attraction of the PLU Artist Series. Tickets may be purchased at the University Center or at the door.

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IRENE HOPP,
SOPRANO, FEATURED
IN FACULTY RECITAL

Mrs. Irene Hopp, soprano, an assistant professor of voice at PLU, will present a faculty recital Tuesday, Nov. 24, in Eastvold Auditorium at 8 p.m.

She will be assisted by Calvin Knapp, accompanist, and Jerry Kracht, clarinetist, who are also members of the music faculty at PLU.

Mrs. Hopp is a graduate of the University of Puget Sound and a member of Phi Beta, a women's music and speech honorary. She appeared in the title role in the Tacoma Little Theater production of "The Merry Widow", and sang in the Seattle Opera Production of "The Marriage of Figaro." She regularly serves as a soloist at the First Presbyterian Church in Tacoma, and directs two choirs there.

The program, which is complimentary to the public, will include a group of contemporary sacred songs, German lieder, and groups of French and contemporary English songs.

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REGENTS UNDERWRITE
U. C. REGENCY
ROOM COST

The Board of Regents at Pacific Lutheran University have pledged to personally underwrite the \$50,000 cost of constructing and furnishing the newly named "Regency Room" in the recently dedicated University Center.

The decision was made at the Regent's regular meeting last Monday. The Regency Room is a moderately sized luncheon-meeting room which seats 60 to 75 people.

The Regents gave final approval at the same meeting to a new Religious Life Council Constitution, which was approved "in spirit" last May. The Religious Life Council is responsible for providing the worshiping needs of the campus as well as taking nominations for the position of University Minister.

Final selection of University Minister must be cleared with the Board of Regents "because of the crucial nature of the post of University Minister."

The Regents also approved the commissioning of an artist to paint a commemorative portrait of American Lutheran Church President Schiotz to be hung in the University Center.

Fredrik Schiotz is being remembered for his contribution to the Lutheran Ingathering For Education program of the ALC, a financial drive on behalf of ALC affiliated colleges and seminaries. The University Center is PLU's LIFE project.

Regents also heard Norman Fintel, Executive Director of the ALC Board of College Education say that he is "impressed with the participation of individuals as well as the quality of leadership on the Board and in the PLU administration."

Regents also gave the nod to the PLU development office to explore the possibility of making a development film of PLU.

Sabbatical leaves for 1971-72 were granted to Gundar King (bus.), Emmet Eklund (rel.), Ray Klopsch (Eng.), W. C. Schnackenberg (Hist.) and George Roskos (Art) by the Regents.

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One of the Northwest's finest rare orchid collections goes on sale Sunday, Nov. 22, from 1-5 p.m. in the PLU Field House at Olson Auditorium, with an auction scheduled for 3 p.m. All proceeds go to a PLU scholarship fund.

The rare orchid collection, together with a large greenhouse and valuable orchid library, is an unusual gift to the University from Herbert A. Schoenfeld, Sr., longtime Tacoma Businessman. Although a number of orchids will be kept for instructional purposes the entire collection is more than the University can sustain, a situation necessitating the Sunday afternoon sale.

After collecting and caring for orchids over the past 23 years, Schoenfeld is a recognized expert in the field. As a certified judge in the American Orchid Society, he has traveled as far as Hawaii and Washington, D.C. to judge prize-winning orchids.

Schoenfeld donated his collection and greenhouse to PLU because it is a financial asset as well as an academic attraction. The University requires countless perennial plants for the grounds and the greenhouse affords the opportunity to grow them on campus at a considerable savings.

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By resolution of the Faculty, Friday, Nov. 27, the day after Thanksgiving is included in the regular academic calendar.

Among the reasons for this action was (a) the hope of reducing travel risks for our students by eliminating the lure of a long week-end holiday; and (b) the desire to have enough teaching days on record to make possible the close of the semester on December 18.

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Forty prints and drawings by Keith Achepohl, PLU artist, are on exhibit this month at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Tex. The work consists of 20 drawings in various media and 20 color intaglio prints. Achepohl was at SMU earlier this week as a guest in SMU's series of visiting artists.

It started with a dream and ended with a nightmare-- that was the 1970 season for the PLU Knights who were surpassed by the Lewis & Clark Pioneers Saturday, 34-20, in the Rose City.

The loss dropped the Lutes into a second place tie with the Pioneers in the final Northwest Conference standings. Each posted a 4-2 conference record.

After yielding only five passing touchdowns in eight previous games, the Lutes were victimized four times by the alley--oop lobs Pioneer quarterback Pat Miguel, who
