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PAYROLL

In the interest of streamlining, A. Dean Buchanan, vice president for business and finance, has announced a new system of issuing payroll checks.

CHANGE

Under the new plan, the University will deposit each employee's check into their respective checking account for them. In addition, the business office will send the employee a statement showing gross earnings and deductions.

Buchanan said, "Our data processing equipment will provide for us our payroll journal and individual earnings records, as well as a 'print out' for each bank to which we shall send one check to cover the sum of all deposits normally made to that bank."

This method of payment will begin with the April check.

Buchanan said he doesn't think more than four or five banks in the area will be involved. He added, however, that any person without a checking account with a local bank must establish one.

If a faculty member on a nine-month contract who is not returning next year wants checks issued directly to himself, this will be done.

The business office is asking for the name of every employee, his bank and checking account number soon to start the new plan.

"We feel that this system will be beneficial to all of you, as well as the University," said Buchanan. He added that he would be available at the Friday faculty meeting to answer questions about the system.

FUNG

Chui Ping Fung is a seven year old Chinese boy who has little idea what consists of the world outside Hong Kong. But he is learning, thanks to the generosity of the secretaries at Pacific Lutheran University.

The women decided at their annual Christmas luncheon last December to "adopt" a child. Last month the Christian Children's Fund organization told them of Chui Ping Fung.

He is a first grader at Children's Garden in Hong Kong, the largest cottage-type orphanage in Asia. It was built about 10 years ago by the Christian Children's Fund.

Although the boy is not an orphan, he is supported entirely by the foundation. The secretaries were told his father died two years ago, and that his mother can't provide for her eight children.

The PLU women, most of them with children of their own, support the youth's stay at the orphanage. In addition, they send him special gifts of money and goods.

And the women have started a "round-robin" letter that will have contributions from the entire group before being sent.

At the home Chui Ping Fung will have a chance to attend school through the 12th grade and learn a trade. At PLU the secretaries will have the knowledge that they helped make it possible.

Pacific Lutheran University's basketball season

came to an end this week when Central Washington State College dumped the Lutes in two games of the NAIA playoffs.

Central will represent District I (Ida. Wash., Alas.) of the NAIA in the small-college national tournament in Kansas City. It will be its third trip back to the Midwest in as many years.

The Lutes continued to be plagued by injuries right down to the last game. First it was Doug Leeland and then Al Kollar. Next Mark Andersen broke his arm, and finally Tim Sherry twisted his ankle.

Sherry led the team in scoring the first night of the playoff, but didn't see any action Tuesday. Central won the first night 93-72, and the second night 83-74.

The two losses left the Lutes with a season record of 19 wins and 9 defeats. They were 14-4 in conference competition, which tied them with Linfield College for first place honors.

Regardless of the Central scores, the Lutes fashioned a good season. They led the conference in defense, and on several occasions ranked nationally in that category.

At the close of the conference Doug Leeland, the Knights' team captain, led the league in field goal shooting. Ron Groth, a sophomore reserve, was second, and freshman Leroy Sinnes was seventh.

Senior guard Andersen was a unanimous selection to the Northwest Conference All-Star basketball team, and senior forward Sherry was named as a repeat to the second team.

Freshman Kollar, who broke three PLU team records in the free throw department, was named as an honorable mention, along with senior Tom Lorentzsen.

SWIM PLU's swimming team
will be defending its
league title this
weekend when it hosts
the Northwest Conference swimming champion-
ships.

The Lutes edged Lewis and Clark College
last year to win the crown in their first
year of competition.

Time trials start at 10 a.m. Friday and
continue through the afternoon. At 4:30 p.m.
the 500-yard freestyle finals begin, followed
by the final race in the 200-yard individual
medley.

Starting at 8 p.m. Friday are the final
races in the 200-yard butterfly and freestyle,
100-yard breaststroke and backstroke, one-meter
diving, and the 400-yard individual medley
and freestyle relay.

The meet continues on Saturday, starting
with the 50-yard freestyle time trials at
8:45. The preliminaries continue into the
afternoon until 4:30 when the 50-yard free-
style final and the 400-yard medley relay
finals are held.

Finals for the 1,650-yard freestyle event
will take place at 6 p.m., and the finals in
the 100-yard freestyle, 200-yard backstroke,
200-yard breaststroke, three-meter diving,
100-yard butterfly and 800-yard freestyle
relay will start at 8 p.m.

"It's going to be a close meet," said
PLU swimming coach Rich Alseth. "We will
win a few first places, but lack of depth will
hurt us."

Alseth, whose team stands 3-7 in season
meets, has had problems keeping his squad
eligible. Two of his top performers were
dropped because of classroom trouble.

However, he does have some standout
performers. Thomas Fenn, a senior from
Alameda, Calif., and team captain, holds the
conference record in the 200-yard backstroke
and 400-yard individual medley.

In addition, four of the school's records
have been broken. Robert Tutland, a freshman
from Everett, has the new mark in the 200-
yard freestyle, and John Bustad, a sophomore
from Mt. Vernon, has the record in the 100-
yard butterfly.

seas following a display last summer in
Scotland at the Edinburgh University's
graphics exhibition.

"The work of both artists is provoca-
tive in spirit and excellent in technique,"
said M. J. Kitzman, chairman of the art
department.

The exhibit will continue through
April 10.

Thomas Cooper, another freshman from Everett, has not lost a race in the 200-yard backstroke against conference competition.

The 400-yard freestyle relay team, consisting of Fenn, Tutland, Bustad and Cooper, have established a 3:42.5 mark, compared to the conference record of 3:42.2, set by Lewis and Clark.

The Lutes have also lowered their 400-yard medley relay time which last year set a conference record.

Alseth is counting on his diver, Steve Bennett of Scottsdale, Ariz., to provide the team with a first place. Bennett holds the school record in one-meter diving.

Both Bennett and Fenn are trying to qualify for the NAIA National Championship to be held later this month in Buffalo. Fenn qualified for the meet last year, but did not attend.

The Northwest Conference favorite, said Alseth, is Willamette University. It beat PLU earlier in the season, and its overall team strength will be a determining factor in its performance.
