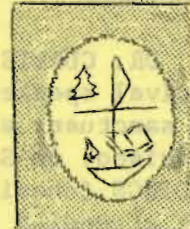

FRIDAY, Sept. 23: John Hambro, secretary general of the worldwide Norsemen's Federation, will speak at a 9:50 a.m. convocation in Memorial Gymnasium. He will describe European feelings about U.S. foreign and domestic policies. Hambro is an old friend of PLU. He arranged for the Choir of the West concert tour in Norway in 1963. A graduate of the Oslo University Law School, he studied at Columbia University and was with the Norwegian Consulate General in New York during World War II. On his return to Norway in 1945, he joined the staff of *Aftenposten*, the country's largest newspaper. In 1949 he returned to the U.S. to represent NTB, Norwegian wire service. He became Norwegian UN delegation press attache in 1953, returning to Norway two years later to assume his present position and to edit the group's monthly magazine, *Nordmanns-Forbundet*. Since 1959 he has also edited *The Norseman*, only English language review on Norway.

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VICE PRESIDENT HUMPHREY TO SPEAK AT CONVOCATION NEXT THURSDAY

Vice-President Hubert H. Humphrey will speak at convocation Thursday, Sept. 29, at 9:45 a.m. in Memorial Gymnasium.

A panel of six student leaders from PLU, UPS, TCC and three high schools will direct questions on domestic and foreign policy to Mr. Humphrey. President Robert Mortvedt will preside.

Tickets for the convocation will be given to all students, faculty and staff. You may also pick them up at the information desk for members of your family. No more tickets will be printed than there are seats in the gym. Those with tickets must be in their seats by 9:30. After that the general public will be admitted.

Vice-President Humphrey will arrive on campus about 9:15 a.m. and will meet with the faculty in Columbia Center. Second period classes that day will be dismissed at 9:10.

Knight football games at home and away are being broadcast over KMO, 1360 kc., Tacoma. The sportscaster is Ed Bowman, who has called games in the Tacoma area for a number of years and who is on the teaching staff at Lincoln High, Tacoma.

KMO will also carry all home and away games in basketball.

All home football games, with the exception of the one this week, are being televised over KTNT-TV, Channel 11, on a delayed basis. The telecasts, featuring Clay Huntington as announcer, will be shown at 8 p.m. each Saturday. Huntington is a well known Tacoma sportscaster and advertising relations man.

For the past few years the sophomore students entering nursing at Pacific Lutheran University received their nursing caps at a semi-formal public "Capping Service" in Eastvold Chapel. This service was originally held early in December of their sophomore year, more recently it was held the first Sunday of the fall school term in September. Four years ago the name of the service was changed from "Capping Service" to "Consecration Service" with no significant change in tone, for to the nurse this had always been a service of consecration.

Prior to this service the nursing student had spent either the fall semester of her sophomore year or the nine weeks summer session preceeding her sophomore year in the hospital gaining an initial experience in the care of the patient and thereby become somewhat knowledgeable about what nursing is. She went to the Consecration Service with an experience which made her consecration pledge meaningful to her.

The curriculum in the School of Nursing at Pacific Lutheran University was changed two years ago. Today the student entering the School as a sophomore has not had the opportunity for this initial hospital experience. The summer session was discontinued, and the sophomore student who participated in the Consecration Service was unaware of what experiences lay ahead for her in nursing. In some cases she was not sure nursing was her choice of major. Yet she was expected in this service to make a pledge "---before God and in the presence of this assembly..." a pledge which required her to make a "blind" commitment of herself to a profession and a service about which she was not knowledgeable.

This concerned the nursing faculty members and prompted them to evaluate the nature and the timing of the Consecration Service which led to its cancellation.

Those students who have been accepted into the School of Nursing will be welcomed by its faculty and present students at 4 pm on Thursday afternoon at an informal function in Marie Health Lounge in Hinderlie Hall.

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SUNDAY, Sept. 25: Renowned Finnish architect Bengt Harald Lundsten will show slide pictures of his work from 2 to 4 p.m. in Chris Knutzen Fellowship Hall. The program is to include a reception co-sponsored by the Tacoma Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and PLU. Lundsten, 38, is a teacher of architecture at Helsinki Technical University, where he graduated in 1954. He was chief designer for the new Toronto City Hall. Winner of numerous architectural awards, his best known creations include, the chapel and cemetery at Partilla, Sweden; city theater at Turku; cathedral in Syracuse, Italy; campus design at Helsinki University; regional hospital center in Tapiola Garden City; the shopping center in Mumkkivouri Satellite City; and the passenger terminal and harbor of Laangnaes Asland. Lundsten also produced the manuscript and served as technical director for the film, "Housing and Nature."

Inquiries about the Danforth Graduate Fellowships, to be awarded in March, 1967, are invited, according to Philip Nordquist the local campus representative.

The Fellowships, offered by the Danforth Foundation of St. Louis, Missouri, are open to men and women who are seniors or recent graduates of accredited colleges in the United States, who have serious interest in college teaching as a career, and who plan to study for a Ph.D. in a field common to the undergraduate college. Applicants may be single or married, must be less than thirty years of age at the time of application, and may not have undertaken any graduate or professional study beyond the baccalaureate.

Approximately 120 Fellowships will be awarded in March, 1967. Candidates must be nominated by Liaison Officers of their undergraduate institutions by November 1, 1966. The Foundation does not accept direct applications for the Fellowships.

Danforth Graduate Fellows are eligible for four years of financial assistance, with a maximum annual living stipend of \$2400 for single Fellows and \$2950 for married Fellows, plus tuition and fees. Dependency allowances are available. Financial need is not a condition for consideration.

Danforth Fellows may hold other fellowships such as Ford, Fulbright, National Science, Rhodes, Woodrow Wilson, etc, concurrently, and will be Danforth Fellows without stipend until the other awards lapse.

ENROLLMENT
