Rev. Elias Newman Speaks in Chapel

Jewish Convert Gives Views on Communism and Nazism, is Conducting Conference in Central Lutheran

Evangelist, Rev. Elias Newman, a convert from the Jewish Faith, who is now on an American tour and is lecturing this week in Tacoma, addressed the chapel assembly Monday. As a guiding text he used, from the last chapter of Galatians, these words of Paul: "From henceforth let no man trouble me: for I bear in my body the marks of the Lord Jesus." He unfolded the details of the Jewish custom of ear-marking a Jewish servant who chose at the end of his compulsory servitude to continue in perpetual servitude. "These marks of the Lord Jesus," said Rev. Newman, "show Paul's everlasting servitude in Christ and are significant of Paul's Jewish background."

Among other things Rev. Newman explained that the Jews are watching the Christians very closely—watching their lives. "The persecution of the Jews (and to some extent other peoples) in Russia is the cause for the curse of atheism in Russia today, he explained.

Concerning conditions in Germany, Rev. Newman said, "It is foolish even to think of exterminating Jewry from Hitler's domains. The "Jewish Forwards" of New York states that there are six million mixed blood Christian Jews in Germany. Neither can Hitler expect to destroy Jewish influence by "scrapping" (because they are Jewish), first, the Old Testament; then, the New Testament, and finally Christ. In way of parting he admonished, "Hold on to your Master and reflect His love. Then you will win those who are so closely watching you."

Rev. Newman was born in Russia and was converted at fifteen years of age. Since a period of mission work in Damascus he has travelled extensively in the near East and Mediterranean countries, in Europe and in all parts of the United States.

Because Pacific Lutheran College is not in the category of large colleges and universities it did not have the opportunity of expressing itself in the college peace poll held by the Literary Digest. Nevertheless this poll should be of interest to us. It may be the means of shaping national opinion on the question. Although some look askance at this student opinion as being immature, it is undoubtedly fair that young people should express themselves on this issue, for it is they that sacrifice the most in time of war.

The question is timely. The thought of international conflict is not far-fetched. Disturbances in Europe, particularly in the Saar, have caused anxiety that world peace might be broken. It is a question, therefore, that demands our attention and thoughtful consideration.

Think Before You Act

In some of our last elections candidates were nominated for important offices who had little interest in the affairs of the organization. Luckily the candidates elected were not of these nominated haphazardly. In all of our organizations there are earnest, hard-working people who could fill an office well, putting their heart into their work. To run our organizations intelligently and efficiently it is necessary to have the right person in the right job. It is foolhardy to gamble at our elections with a careless choice of candidates.

During the past fifteen years the Lutheran Students' Union has convened annually, Pacific Lutheran College being host in 1929.

The work done by this organization is extensive, supporting in collaboration with the Young People's Luther League five foreign missionaries represented in the countries of China, Madagascar, and South Africa. It is a cause worthy of support.
