Funded by a grant from Northwest Airlines, the program provides round-trip airfare to the People's Republic of China and Hong Kong for economic and cultural projects. Applications demonstrating Chinese sponsorship, detailed itineraries and funding already raised receive particular consideration. Past recipients include lecturers, economists, forestry and agricultural experts, medical professionals and artists. Explore the wilds and wonders of Yellowstone with Duncan Foley

If a short trip to Yellowstone National Park sounds like a good idea for this summer, you might want to explore the park through a class from The Yellowstone Institute. Classes are generally three to five days long, and cover a variety of topics, including wild edible plants, learning birds by sound, field journals, fossils, photography, environmental ethics and the Nez Perce people. Some classes also incorporate trips, via backpack, horseback, llama or canoe. Prices average \$40 to \$50 per day; trips are more expensive. **Duncan** Foley (Earth Sciences) teaches with the institute and will spend time in the park this summer. Donate what you can't take home

A message to residential students who prepare to head home for summer this week. Before you throw out everything you don't want to take home, be sure to stop by the three blue bins in the lobby of each residence hall and see if you can leave the items there. One bin is for personal care items, another is for nonperishable food items, and a third is for clothing and household items (including books). Environmental Services will donate the bin contents to local service agencies, including the on-campus program First Steps, a parenting and pregnancy service for low-income women.

Don't throw that bottle away!

Remember that by recycling your Fruitopia bottles instead of putting them in the garbage, you contribute to the glass recycled at PLU -- one ton each month. Through glass recycling, PLU avoids paying about \$75 in disposal costs and makes \$25 in an average month. Also, a ton of glass produced from raw materials creates 384 pounds of mining waste. By making 50% recycled glass, mining wastes can be cut by 75%. So, for each half-ton PLU contributes to recycling, 288 pounds of mining wastes are saved.

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Denis Arnold and Erin McKenna (both Philosophy) presented their paper "Impartiality and Sentiment: A Reconsideration of J.S. Mill's Moral Philosophy" at the International Society for Utilitarian Studies Meeting in March in New Orleans, La. Arnold also presented a paper entitled "Character and Moral Responsibility" at the American Philosophical Association annual meeting in March in Berkeley. Also, Arnold's paper "Introspection and Its Objects" was published in the most recent edition of the Journal of Philosophical Research.

Paul Ingram (Religion) was chosen as president-elect of the Pacific Northwest Region of the American Academy of Religion and the Society of Biblical Literature during the annual meetings on May 1-3.
