PI KAPPA DELTA NATIONAL CONVENTION OPENS ON CAMPUS SUNDAY, 700 PERSONS EXPECTED TO ATTEND FIVE-DAY CONCLAVE, PLU ENTERS THREE COEDS IN FORENSIC COMPETITION

The biennial convention of Pi Kappa Delta, national honorary forensic fraternity, opens on campus Sunday with approximately 700 students and faculty representatives from 130 colleges and universities expected to attend the fiveday conclave.

One of the highlights of the convention will be the forensic competition. Eight rounds of debate have been scheduled along with four rounds each of oratory, extemporaneous speaking and discussion. There will be separate divisions for men and women in all events except discussion and the open division of debate.

These sessions of the national convention are open to the public. All faculty and staff members are invited to attend the various forensic sessions.

Individual awards will be presented in each of the divisions to students rated as superior or excellent. Team awards will be presented to schools earning superior, excellent, or good ratings in the overall men's and women's competition.

At the last biennial convention of Pi Kappa Delta in Carbondale, Ill,, in 1963, PLU was one of four schools to earn a superior rating in both men and wo en's debate. Other schools to earn such an honor were the University of Pacific, San Diego State and William Jewell College.

In the forensic competition at the last four conventions, PLU has had a superior rating in either or both men or women's debate.

Three PLU coeds will attempt to continue the string of champions next week when they will compete in this year's forensic competition.

Entered in the competition are two sophomores, Lynn Still and LaVon Holden, and a freshman, Kathy Simantel.

Miss Still and Miss Holden will participate in the women's debate. In previous competition this year the two girls wen honors at both the Washington Speech Association and the University of Puget Sound tournaments while placing second at the University of Oregon meet.

Lynn also will participate in the oratory competition. She placed first in this division at UPS and was second at Linfield.

Miss Simantell will enter the extemporaneous and discussion divisions of the competition. Among her achievements this year was a first place in impromptu speaking in the WSA meet and a first in extemporaneous speaking at the Oregon tournament.

Forensic activities will run from 8:15 a.m. until approximately 3:30 p.m. each day except Wednesday when they will conclude at noon.

U. S. Sen. Henry Jackson will be the principal speaker, delivering his address at 2:30 p.m. Thursday in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium. He will speak on foreign policy. This session also is open to the public.

The convention will open Sunday evening with a worship service. The Rev. John Larsgaard, student congregation pastor at PLU, and the Rev. Robert Beh of Portland University will conduct the respective Protestant and Catholic services at 7:00 p.m.

Besides the regular convention business sessions and the forensic competition, other features include a talent night Tuesday, a cruise on Puget Sound followed by a salmon bake at Tillicum Indian Village Wednesday, and the convention banquet and awards ceremony Thursday.

CONVENTION NOTES:

Ruth Ellis, a senior education major at PLU has been selected as one of the two student representatives to the National Council of Pi Kappa Delta, national honorary forensic fraternity. The council will meet during the biennial national convention.

A member of the PLU debate squad for the past four years, Ruth was named to the council along with Warren Derbidge of Idaho State College.

In 1963 Miss Ellis helped PLU gain a superior rating at the national convention in Carbondale, Ill., while last year she was a member of the team that placed first in debate in the Province of the Northwest. This year she gained the award of special distinction in the orders of oratory and debate.

KNIGHT TRACKMEN, NETTERS OPEN HOME SLATE SATURDAY; BASEBALLERS AT SPC

The PLU track team will open its home schedule Saturday as it entertains Portland State College in a dual meet at 1 p.m.

Three PLU trackmen: will be attempting to keep their unbeaten streaks alive. Wendell Brown, junior sprinter from Tacoma, will be seeking his third straight victory in the 220 and 440-yard dashes while Craig Knutzen, a junior from Highline, will be after victory number three in both the discus and shot put.

Lief Johnsson, a foreign student from Sweden, will also be vieing for his third triu ph in the triple jump. Johnsson set a new PLU standard for the jump last Saturday when he leaped 45-3 3/4 at Bellingham.

The Knights' 440-yard relay also is undefeated this year, setting a PLU record in the first meet at 43.8. Les Rucker, Terry Tommervik, arry Egeland and Brown comprise the team.

The PLU baseball team will be seeking its initial victory of the season Saturday when it travels to Seattle to meet Seattle Pacific at Lower Woodland Park. The first game of the doubleheader will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The Knights dropped a pair to Central Washington, 9-4 and 5-4, last week as 10 unearned runs crossed the plate in the two contests.

Seattle Pacific will send a veteran team against the Knights. SPC mentor Dale Parker has 16 lettermen back including six veteran pitchers from last year's team which dropped three of four contests to PLU.

Steve Dalgleish, junior first baseman from Kirkland, is PLU's leading batter after the first two games, collecting three hits in five times at bat, including a double, for an even .600 average. He is followed by sophomore pitcher Al Hedman, who has three hits in seven appearances for a .428 average.

The tennis squad also will be seeking its first win of the season as it hosts Puget Sound on the local courts at 1 p.m.

RICHARD ALSETH NAMED AS NEW SWIMMING INSTRUCTOR

Richard A. Alseth, physical education instructor and swimming coach at Puyallup High School, has been named as the new swimming coach at PLU.

Alseth, who was selected from some 20 candidates, also will serve as swimming pool manager and physical education instructor at PLU. He will assume his duties July 1.

A native of Mount Vernon, Alseth is a 1962 graduate of Washington State University. He also had done graduate work at WSU.

While at WSU he was on the dean's list for three years and was a member of Phi Epsilon Kappa, honorary fraternity. He also was a graduate assistant during the 1962-63 school year.

Alseth earned four letters at both Mount Vernon and WSU in swimming and was a high school state champion in the 100 and 200-yard freestyle relays. He also set records in the 50-yard freestyle and the 400-yard backstroke relay at WSU.

He has helped develop the swimming program at Puyallup the last two years. His team compiled a 14-4 record this year.

Alseth is also active in community affairs. He is a member of the board of directors of both the Puyallup Lions Club and the Puyallup Y.M.C.A.

He is married to the former Anne Peterson of Moses Lake. The Alseth's, who live at 1324 4th Ave., Puyallup, have two children, Karen 5 and Richard 1.
