THOR HEYERDAHL TO SPEAK HERE WEDNESDAY EVENING

Thor Heyerdahl, Norwegian explorer and author of "Kon Tiki," will give a public lecture at 8:15 p.m. Wednesday evening, March 2, in Memorial Gymnasium. The program will be complimentary to the public.

The University will also present a distinguished service medal to Heyerdahl.

The Heyerdahl lecture is one of a series of special programs in which the University is bringing distinguished leaders to the campus in the observance of its 75th anniversary.

In 1947 Heyerdahl led an expedition of six men aboard the wooden raft, Kon Tiki, on a 4,300-mile voyage from Peru to the Polynesian Islands. The book, "Kon Tiki," which Heyerdahl wrote chronicling the journey became a best seller and has been published in 58 different languages.

Since 1947, Heyerdahl has led several anthropological and archeological expeditions and has been engaged in writing and research. In 1956 he published the book, "Aku Aku," based on his expedition to Easter Island and the East Pacific, in 1955-56. This book has been published in 32 different languages.

In 1949 Heyerdahl established the Kon Tiki museum in Oslo, Norway, where the original raft is kept and other memorabilia from the 1947 voyage. Over 250,000 persons visit this museum annually.

RECITAL FOR NEXT SUNDAY AFTERNOON

A member of the PLU music faculty for the past six years, Knapp studied at the Julliard School of Music where he received his bachelor and master of science degrees in music. He has done graduate work at Columbia University and is presently studying for his doctorate of musical arts degree at the University of Washington.

His program will include "Sonata in C Major, Opus 53," Beethoven; selections from the "Kreisleriana," Schumann; "Sonata 1946," Rosza; "J'eau d'eux," Ravel; "Ballade in F Major," Chopin and "Hungarian Rhapsody," Liszt.

LECTURE-FILM ON DOMINICAN REPUBLIC
TO BE PRESENTED ON MONDAY

Robert E. Moran, nationally-known writer and lecturer, will speak twice Monday at PLU on the Dominican Republic.

Moran, who recently returned from this strife-torn country, will speak during student convocation at 9:50 a.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium and again at 3:30 in the Jacob Samuelson auditorium in the Administration Building. He will present a half hour documentary film at the latter presentation.

Both programs are complimentary to the public.

Against a backdrop of barbed wire barricades, shattered buildings, road blocks and sand-bagged gun positions, he photographed the Dominican people in all walks of life. He found the conflicts to be complex, involving as they do vested interests, personal ambitions, honest aspirations, bitterness, frustrations and injustice.

Moran appears nationwide on the TV documentary series, "Of Lands and Seas."
