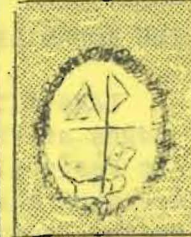

## TWO ADDITIONS MADE TO PLU ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF

Two additions have been made to the PLU administrative staff.

The Rev. Arthur C. Pederson, a native of Brooklyn, N. Y., joins the staff as an associate in alumni relations while Mike McIntyre, a 1964 graduate of PLU, will serve an internship in the Dean of Students office.

Rev. Pederson, who is a graduate of Upsala College and Luther Theological Seminary, has been serving as pastor in Pacific Palisades, Calif. His principal duty will be to assist with the alumni phase of the library fund drive.

McIntyre, who has been an agent for Northwestern Mutual Life in Portland, will work on special projects in the area of student personnel. Next fall he plans to begin work on a master's degree in school psychological services at the University of Washington.

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## PLU HOSTS HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT CONGRESS SATURDAY

The 17th annual High School Student Congress, sponsored by the Washington Epsilon Chapter of Pi Kappa Delta, will be held Saturday at PLU. An estimated 275 students from 24 Washington high schools will attend the session.

Purpose of the Student Congress is to acquaint high school students with the internal workings of the federal government and its current problems. The structure of the congress is essentially a replica of the U. S. Congress.

Each school has two senators with the number of representatives determined by the enrollment of the school.

Bills can be submitted by each high school prior to the meeting and are considered in their respective committees. Bills passing both chambers will be considered at a joint session at 4:30 p.m.

Awards will be presented to student participants who rate the highest during the day's activities.

All sessions are open to the public.

Two former PLU students -- Myrle Overland and Ron Swift--will act as president of the Senate and speaker of the House, respectively.

Gaylord Enbom is director of the Student Congress. Assisting him are Deanna Zimbelman, Annette Leverson, Kathy Simantel, Patricia Johnson, Lynn Still, Conrad Zipperian, John Shoemaker, Don Merchant and Dave Stein.

Prof. Theodore O. H. Karl, chairman of the department of speech, is advisor to the Pi Kappa Delta chapter.

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## KNIGHT FOOTBALLERS INVADE CENTRAL WASHINGTON SATURDAY

Coach Roy Carlson will try to regroup his Pacific Lutheran University football charges this week as the Knights prepare for an invasion of Ellensburg Saturday and a clash with Central Washington.

PLU suffered two key injuries in its 20-13 homecoming loss to Whitworth last week as fullback Ken Tetz, the Knight's leading ground-gainer, and starting defensive end, Oliver Johnson, were sidelined for the season. Tetz broke his left leg in two places while Johnson dislocated his right elbow.

Freshman Don McPherson will move into Tetz's fullback post while Tony Lister will replace the senior stalwart at defensive halfback. Freshman Bill Tye will earn Johnson's berth at end.

This is the third major injury to beset the Knights this season. Earlier NAIA All-American safety Les Rucker decided to sit on the sidelines with an ankle injury.

PLU, which stands at 3-3 for the season, will attempt to climb over the .500 mark against the Wildcats who are 1-3-1 for the season.

The Wildcats lead in the all-time series between the two schools 18-16. The two teams split in 1964, CWSC winning the first game 7-0 while PLU took the return match 34-19 in the battle for the Evergreen Conference title.

Tony Lister continues as PLU's total offense leader with 697 yards, 627 of it passing on 47 completions in 102 attempts.

End Bill White grabbed nine passes against Whitworth to set a new PLU individual game reception mark and give him 33 catches for the season for 375 yards.

Tetz gained 23 yards before he was injured to up his rushing total to 296 yards. His nearest competitor is Morris Blankenbaker with 217 yards.

DR. GERHARD L. BELGUM TO SPEAK  
AT REFORMATION RALLY SUNDAY

The Rev. Dr. Gerhard Lee Belgum of La Puente, Calif., will give the address at the annual Reformation Festival to be held Sunday evening at 7:30 o'clock in Eastvold Chapel. "The Praise We Raise" will be the topic of his message.

Special music for the event will be provided by the Lutheran Choir of Tacoma under the direction of Prof. Gunnar J. Malmin. The massed choir is comprised of members of the Lutheran Church choirs in the area.

Dr. Belgum is a graduate of Luther College (Iowa) and Luther Theological Seminary. He was pastor of Emmanuel Lutheran Church, Tacoma, from 1940-42, and then served for three years as a chaplain in the U. S. Army during World War II. He was on the religion faculty of Luther College from 1948-61. He has been a parish pastor in California since 1961.

Dr. Belgum has a master of theology degree from Yale University.

The Reformation Festival is sponsored by the Laymen's Reformation Committee and the Lutheran Pastor's Association of Greater Tacoma.

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"Youth Are Better Educated... Better Informed..." --Odegaard

Dr. Charles E. Odegaard, president of the University of Washington, earlier this month spoke to a meeting of renowned scientists in Seattle. The text of his speech appears in the magazine section of the Sunday, Oct. 24, Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

A paragraph, which should be of interest to all members of the PLU Family follows:

"Remember that this youth is in many respects better educated, better informed, more conscious of the world and its global human inter-relationships than we were at their age; and they have the courage and forthrightness of youth to try to tell us that they do not sense in our present university conversation with them enough relevance to a world they know exists, a world they are inheriting and concerning which they know they have to make choices, a world which we may think they simplify but about which they feel deeply."
