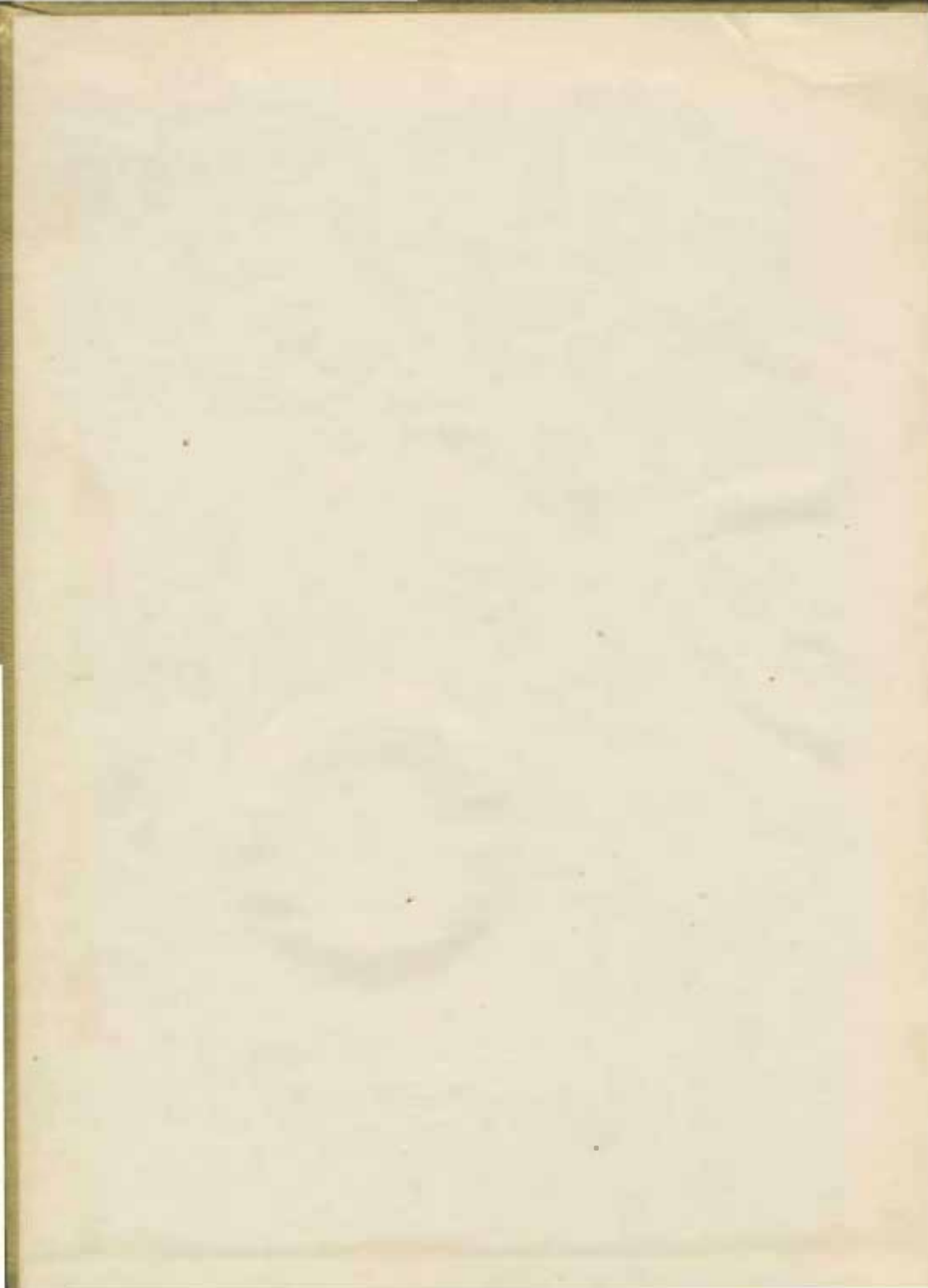

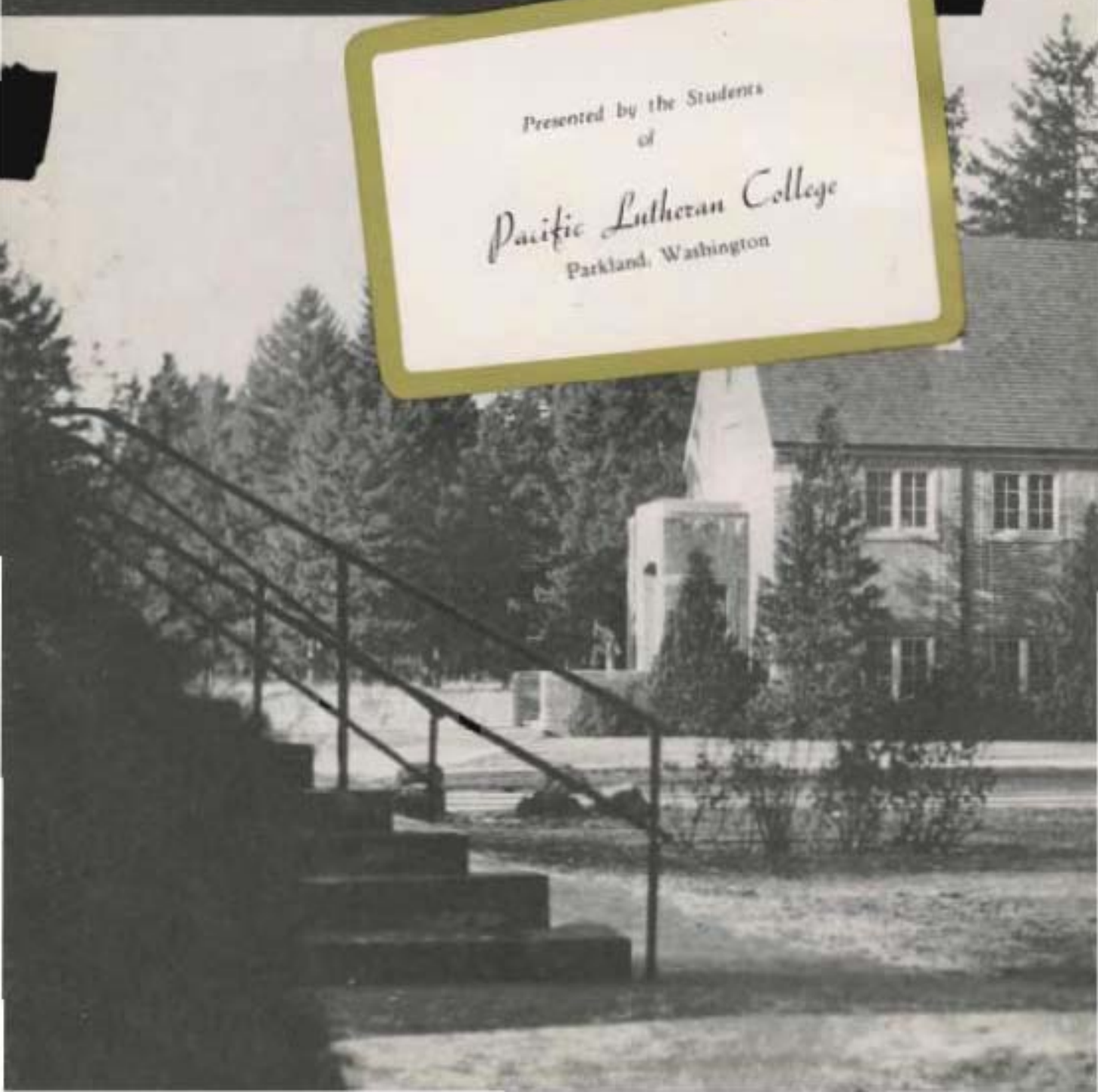

Each morning at 9:45 the students wend their way to the lower campus to attend chapel services which are held in the Memorial Gymnasium.







### Dean of Women

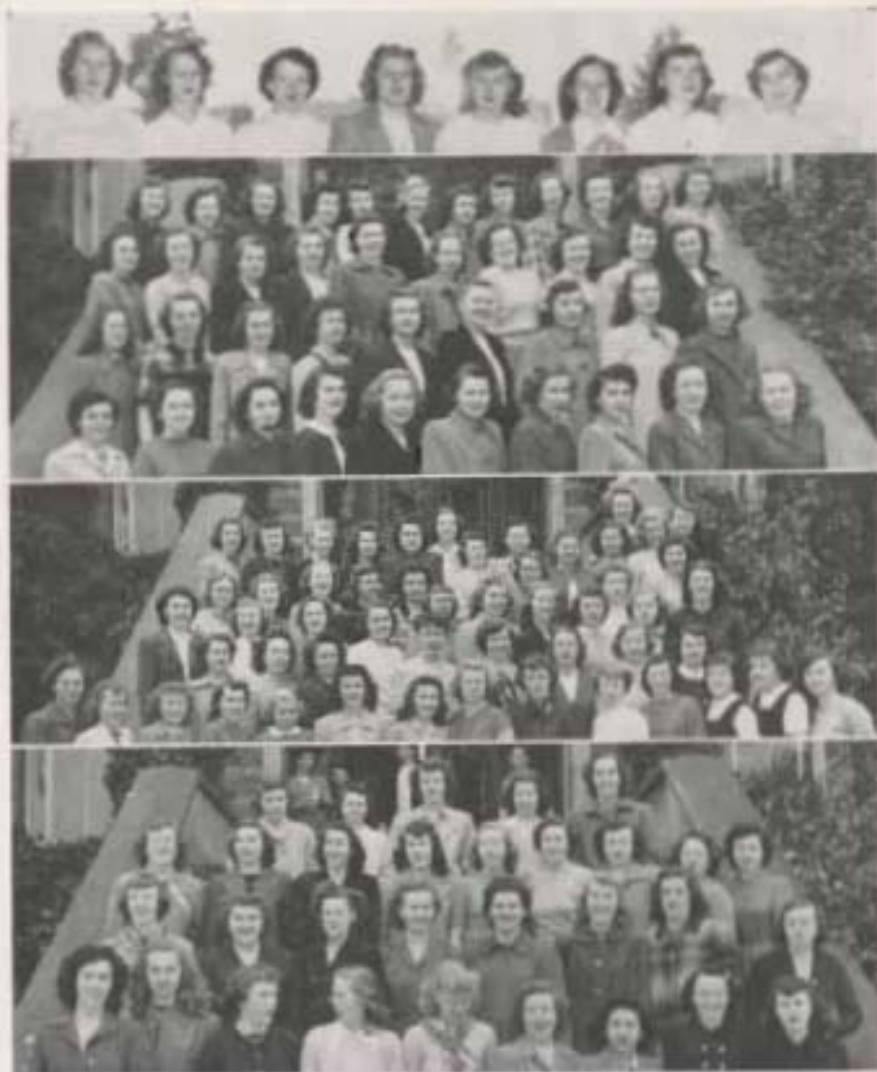

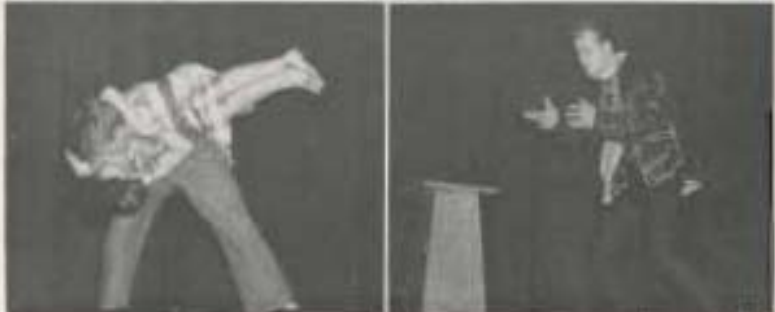

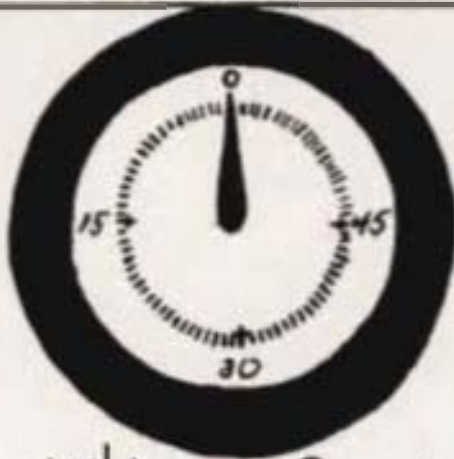

## Football

Working for their second season under the guiding hands of coaches Mary Tommerik and Mary Harshman, the Gladiators of Pacific Lutheran College wound up with a record of six wins, two losses, one tie, and a claim to second place in the new Evergreen Conference.

Spurred by the ground-gaining abilities of backfield performers like Jack Coyne, Gene Kuraudness, and Blaine McKanna operating behind a forward wall that was big, alert, and experienced, the blue stripe going machine ground out a string of triumphs from Northfield, Minnesota, in the Pacific States.

The season's opener, which took place in Northfield, saw the Gladiators trade punches with the Lions of St. Olaf College, with the home-towners coming out on the top of the pile with a 13-7 decision.

Traveling back to their own back yard, the Lions battled their cross-town rivals, the College of Puget Sound Loggers, to a 6-6 tie in a game that revolved only in the air zone.

St. Martins College, the first conference foe, succumbed to the Cold and Black at Olympia in the score of 26 to 0.

The Wildcats of Central Washington College of Education gave the Mary men a real scare for a solid sixty minutes in Ellensburg, but fullback Jack Coyne gathered in a short pun and drove to yardline to give the Lions a 6-0 victory.

On the following Saturday evening, the Gladiators played what was perhaps their best game of the season, but in this case, the best was not enough, as they were humbled for the first time in fifteen games by the Sorogers from Eastern Washington College of Education by the score of 14-12.

The Vikings from Western Washington College journeyed all the way from Bellingham only to have the wounded Parklanders swarm over them by a 116 margin. Gene Strandness and Wayne "Buck" Brock starred with their accurate passing with All-Evergreen and Vee Morris their chief target.

Spokane, Washington, was the scene of one of Pacific Northwest's greatest come-backs since the Bear Bowl game in 1947. Led by head-running Vern Tucker, the Whitworth Pirates gave the Lutes a hard afternoon. In the final period, halfback Harold Malera ran a Buccaneer kickoff back some 84 yards for a rally that threw the game into a deadlock. Then with only seconds to go, "Buck" Brock pitched a long pass to Vern Morris who outran the enemy defense to chalk up the winning touchdown. Final score: P.L.C. 14, Whitworth 13.

The following week-end the Glads made it two in a row against Southern Oregon, as they churned through the mud of the Tacoma Stadium to post a 14-0 non-conference win.

The season's finale against the College at Puget Sound was a natural. The winner of the effort would also receive a half-ownership in the Evergreen title plus the Totem Pole symbolic of the city championship.

The Lutes, using advantage of several breaks called two second period touchdowns to go out in front 13-0. In the second half, the Lutes came back to threaten as Jack Coppe plunged for one touchdown, but after that the Sorogers were unable to manufacture a sustained drive, with the hunting going to the Heinrickmen, 13-6.

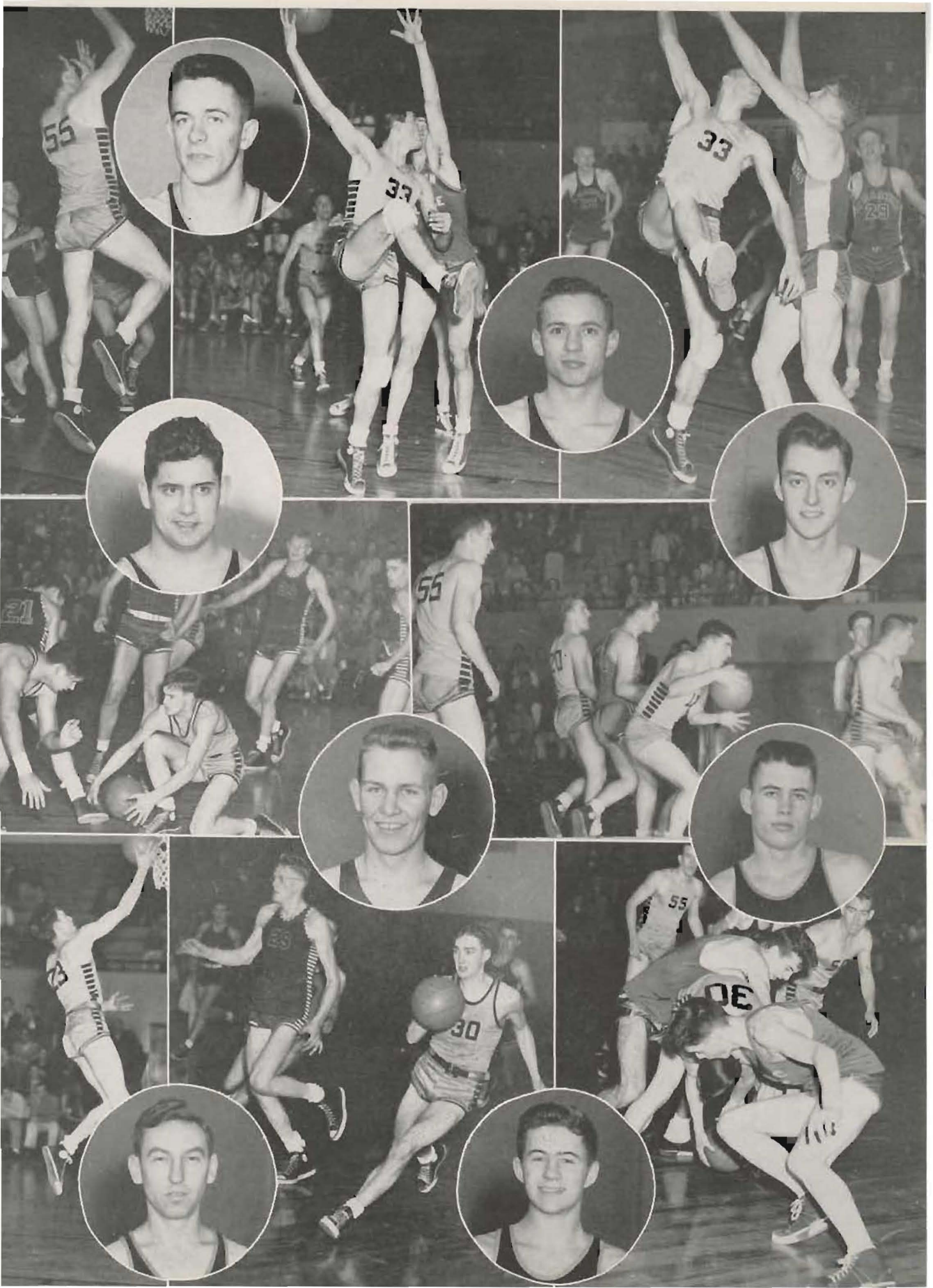
"Mamma, papa er ska vi ha?" baskets, touchdowns, plus four exuberant yell leaders.

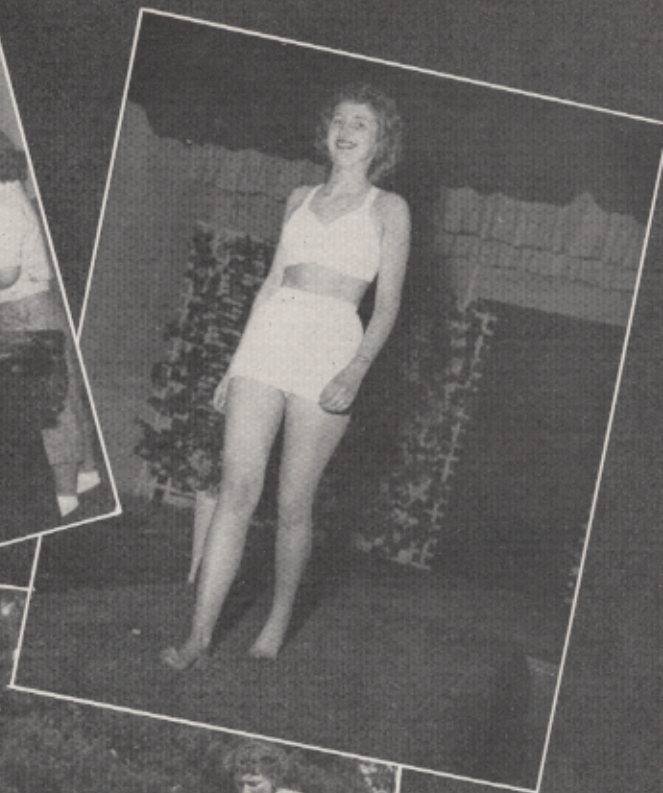
The entire intra-mural cage schedule was under the supervision of Commissioner Wayne "Buck" Brock.
