Football

Working for their second season under the guiding hands of coaches Max Tomaszek and Max Marshall, the Gladiators of Pacific Lutheran College wound up with a record of six wins, two losses, one tie, and a claim to second place in the new Evergreen Conference.

Spurred by the ground-gaining abilities of backfield performers like Jack Goyas, Gene Kura, McNamee, and Blaine McKenna operating behind a forward wall that was big, alert, and experienced, the little single wing machine ground out a run of 1100 yards from Northfield, Minnesota, to the Pacific Dogs.

The season's opener, which took place in Northfield, saw the Gladiators take justice with the Lions of St. Olaf College, with the battle-cowards coming out on top of the date with a 13-7 decision.

Turning back to their own back yard, the Lions battled their cross-towns rivals the College of Puget Sound Loggers, to a 6-6 tie in a game that roared only at the air seats.

St. Martin's College, the first conference foe, surrendered to the Gold and Black in Olympia in the case of 36 to 0.

The Wizards of Central Washington College of Education gave the Marauders a real scare for a solid fifty minutes in Ellensburg, but solidback Jack Goyas gathered in a short stereo pass and dove to perfection to give the Lions a 6-0 victory.

On the following Saturday evening the Gladstones played what was perhaps their best game of the season, but in this case the best was not enough as they were humbled for the first time in three years by the Vikings from Eastern Washington College of Education by the score of 14-12.

The Vikings from Western Washington College journeyed all the way from Bellingham only to have the wounded Parklanders swarm over them by a 116 margin. Carl Strandness and Wayne "Buck" Brock started with their accuracy pairing with All-Evergreen and Vice Morris their chief targets.

Spokane, Washington, was the scene of one of Pacific Northwest's greatest come-backs since the Rose Bowl game in 1947. Led by hard-running Vern Tucker, the Whitworth Pirates gave the Lutes a bad afternoon. In the final period, halfback Harold Malone ran a Buccaneer kickoff back some 84 yards for a tally that threw the game into a deadlock. Then with only seconds to go, "Buck" Brock picked a long pass to Vern Morris who unseated the coach's defense to chalk up the winning touchdown. Final score PL-C 14, Whitworth 13.

The following weekend the Gladstones made it two in a row against Southern Oregon, as they churned through the mud of the Tacoma Stadium to post a 14-0 non-conference win.

The season's finale against the College of Puget Sound was a natural. The winner of the affair would also receive a half-ownership in the Evergreen title plus the Forest Park credibility of the city championship.

The Loggers using advantage of several double tallied two second period touchdowns to go out in front 13-0. In the second half, the Lutes came back to threaten as Jack Cooper plunged for one touchdown, but after that the Southernducks were unable to manufacture a sustained drive, with the bout being going to the Heinrichmen, 13-6.






