TRADITIONAL MAY FESTIVAL SET FOR TONIGHT, SATURDAY IN GYM

The traditional May Festival will be staged this weekend. The colorful program will be held tonight and Saturday evening in Memorial Gymnasium at 8 p.m.

Each evening's festivities will open with the crowning of Diane Adams as the 31st PLU May Queen by Dr. Robert Mortvedt.

Following the coronation ceremony, folk art from many lands will be featured.

Under the direction of Mrs. Rhoda Young, a cast of 44 students, dressed in authentic costumes from 14 different regions and nations, will demonstrate the rhythmic folk dances of such areas as England, France, Serbia, Germany, Poland, Lithuania, Norway, Sweden, Holland, Flanders, Hawaii, New Zealand, Austria and the United States.

The University orchestra under the direction of Gordon O. Gilbertson will provide the music for the festival.

Vocal selections will be presented by Judith Pederson and the duet of Stephen Cornils and Mary Ann Satrum. Additional musical numbers will be rendered by the trumphet quartet composed of Philip Aarhus, Roger Swenson, Dennis Poiak and Terry Oliver.

CONCERT CHORUS TO APPEAR IN EASTVOLD CHAPEL SUNDAY

The 85-voice Concert Chorus, under the direction of Dr. R. Byard Fritts, will give its annual spring homecoming concert this Sunday evening at 8 o'clock in Eastvold Chapel. The program will be complimentary to the public.

To open the program the chorus will sing two selections from Mozart's Requiem Mass--"Sanctus" and "Hosanna." Next will come "Praise the Lord, All Ye Nations," by J. S. Bach, with an important organ accompaniment. This will be followed by Mozart's "Lacrymosa" and "Tui Sunt Coeli" (The Heavens Are Thine) by J. B. Hilber.

Violinists Susan McGee and Roy Helms, along with organist Emily Lou Erickson, will accompany the chorus for the final work of the first group--"Credo" from Mozart's "Missa Brevis in F."

Cesar Franck's powerful, "Praise The Lord," will open the second half of the program. This will be followed by two antiphons of the church composed by Dr. Fritts. Two spirituals, "This Little Light" and "My Lord, What a Morning," will come next. The work, "The Glory of God Thundereth," by contemporary composer Alan Hovhaness will follow. This impressive composition of varied moods is based on Psalms 27 and 117. Final number on the program will be "Our Redeemer's Prayer," a setting for The Lord's Prayer arranged by Dr. Fritts.

The Chorus was very well received on its four-day concert tour last weekend of Oregon and Washington cities.

Set in the deep South during the period of reconstruction that followed the Civil War, of Washington. the drama is under the direction of Stanley Elberson, assistant professor of speech at PLU.

Speaking about the "Forest" Elberson said, "It is not a pretty play, nor is it about pretty people. It is a story about nasty, selfish, ugly, greedy people."

BOARD OF REGENTS NAME PRICE AS SWIMMING POOL ARCHITECT

Tacoma architect Robert Billsbrough Price has been engaged by the PLU Board of Regents to design the new swimming pool to be constructed at PLU, it was announced today by Dr. Robert Mortvedt, president.

It is expected that construction on pool, which will cost approximately \$250,000 will begin by mid-summer. Actual construction will probably take sic months, making the pool available for use by the early part of

the second semester of the 1964-65 school year.

The L-shaped pool will be of regulation olympic size with a separate area for diving and is expected to be located to the north side of the present gymnasium.

Price, who designed the pool and physical education facilities for Mount Tahoma High School in Tacoma, also is the architect for the new intramural physical education building now under construction at the University

Construction of the pool will be the first phase of a new physical education complex which also will include a varsity gymnasium and a fieldhouse.
