## GUEST SOLOISTS TO JOIN PLU GROUPS FOR "ST. MATTHEW'S PASSION" MONDAY

Three guest soloists will join the PLU Festival Chorus and University Orchestra in the presentation of Bach's "The Passion of Our Lord," according to Saint Matthew, Monday, April 4, at 8 p.m. in Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

The oratorio is described as the "richest and noblest example of devotional music in existence."

The soloists include Carl Zytowski, tenor, of Santa Barbara, Calif.; Dr. Eric Paulson, bass, of Spokane; and Mildred Threlkeld, contralto, of Pueblo, Colo.

A professor of music at the University of California at Santa Barbara, Zytowski is a graduate of the St. Louis Institute of Music and has his master of arts degree from the University of Washington.

Last spring he was the featured performer in Atlanta during a memorial to Winston Churchill, presenting Benjamin Britten's "War Requiem." The city's newspaper critics were high in their praises of Zytowski, saying his "brilliant voice, verging on the extended range of counter-tenor, was marvelously effective."

Zytowski also is the director of the UCSB Opera Workshop, the Men's Glee Club, the Schubertians and the University Chorus. He directed the world premiere of Vernon Duke's opera, "Mistress into Maid," in 1959 and also presented several chamber orchestra performances.

A medical doctor in Spokane, Dr. Paulson has had numerous solo performances including one with the Spokane Symphony Orchestra and a recent one with the Spokane

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## LUDLOW KRAMER TO KEYNOTE PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION INSTITUTE TUESDAY

A. Ludlow Kramer, Secretary of State and Coordinator of Urban Affairs for the State of Washington, will be the keynote speaker at the first Public Administration Institute Tuesday, April 5.

Kramer will speak on "The Role of the State Government in the Solution of the Urban Problems" at 9:50 a.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

At a noon luncheon, Seattle Mayor J. D. Braman and Tacoma City Manager David Rowland will discuss how their two cities will meet the future.

Key figures in state, county and municipal government will participate in the various panels during the day-long program.

Cory Richmond, Urban Renewal Director for the City of Tacoma; Jack Willison, Urban Renewal Director for the City of Seattle; and Lloyd Kirry, Manager, Local Affairs Division, Department of Commerce, State of Washington; will discuss "Urban Renewal and the Future of Washington Cities."

John Mlandinov, director of the Puget Sound Regional Transportation Study; Russell Buehler, Planning Director, City of Tacoma; and John Taylor, Administrative Program Coordinator, City of Seattle; will talk on "The Problems and Prospects of Urban Transportation in the Puget Sound Area."

"Financing Urban Government" will be discussed by Tacoma Mayor Harold Tollefson; Karl Norman, Budget Director for the City of Seattle; and W. Phillip Strawn, Washington State Research Council.

TWO LECTURES ON MATHEMATICS

Dr. Carl A. Bennett, manager of the Applied Mathematics Department, Pacific Northwest Laboratories, Battelle Memorial Institute of Richland, will present two lectures on the Pacific Lutheran University campus Monday, April 4.

He will speak on "Using Statistics and Statisticians" at 4 p.m. in room 108 of the Science Hall and "The Use of Order Statistics" at 7 p.m. in room 207 of the Administration Building.

A graduate of Bucknell University, where he also obtained his masters degree, Dr. Bennett has his doctorate in mathematics from the University of Michigan.

Prior to coming to Battelle, he worked for the General Electric Company at the Hanford Atomic Products Operation.

Dr. Bennett also has held academic positions at Princeton and Stanford universities.

He is past president of the Biometric Society and is currently chairman of the Physical and Engineering Sciences Section of the American Statistical Association.

Dr. Bennett is also a member of the PLU Board of Regents.

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DR. CARL HENRY TO BEHOLD  
THE HISTORY OF STATISTICS

Dr. Carl A. Henry, manager of the Applied Mathematics Department, Seattle Northwest Laboratories, Seattle University, Institute of Statistics, will present two lectures on the history of statistics at the campus building, April 4.
