## FAURE'S "REQUIEM" TO BE PRESENTED BY ORCHESTRA, CHORUS TUESDAY

Gabriel Faure's "Requiem" will be featured in a joint concert by the Pacific Lutheran University orchestra and chorus Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

The "Requiem" will be conducted by Prof. Gordon O. Gilbertson, associate professor of music and director of the concert orchestra and band at PLU. The chorus is directed by Prof. Maurice H. Skones, chair an of the department of music.

Soloists include soprano Ellen Hoffman, a freshman music major; tenor Stephen Cornils, a junior theological student; and baritone Raeder Anderson, senior music major.

Calvin Knapp, instructor of music at PLU, will accompany the two groups on the organ.

The orchestra will also present Bach's "Overture No. 1 in C Major" and "Symphony in Bb Op. 21 No. 3" and "Concerto For Oboe and Strings" by Corelli-Barbirolli. William Scharnweber, a senior history major, will be the oboe soloist in the latter number.

The program is complimentary to the public.

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MIKLOS ROZSA WORLD PREMIER CONCERT IS HUGE SUCCESS

Miklos Rozsa, the renowned Hungarian American composer, scored a smash hit as an individual and as a composer when his new choral motet "The Vanities of Life" had its world premier by the Choir of the West Tuesday evening before a packed house in Eastvold Chapel.

Rozsa arrived on campus Monday afternoon and attended a rehearsal of the choir that afternoon. Following the rehearsal he was loud in his praise of the choir and of the interpretation of his work by Maurice Skones, director. That evening he was a guest of honor at a dinner with the choir and ingratiated himself with the group for his warmth and friendliness.

The audience Tuesday night gave the composer a standing ovation when the choir completed the new work, plus another Rozsa motet, "To Every Thing There Is a Season."

Bruce Johnson, Tacoma News Tribune music critic, hailed the new work and also the interpretation of the director and the singing of the choir.

SPECIAL TV SERIES ON "SECURITY"  
TO PREMIER ON UNIVERSITY IN PROFILE

"Man and his Search for Security," a four-part series dealing with the controversy of thought, will premier Saturday, April 3, at 3 p.m. on University in Profile over KTNT-TV, Channel 11. The series is being produced in cooperation with KTNT-TV public affairs department and PLU.

Purpose of the series is to present a concept or an idea that is of importance in our daily lives, that of security. It is intended to show that ideas are not isolated from life as well as to lead the viewer to an appreciation of the great heritage of ideas that is our birthright.

The central theme--"Man and his Search for Security," will be presented from the viewpoint of the four disciplines: history, art, letters and music. Experts in each of these areas will appear in the series moderated by J. C. Doughty, instructor of speech at PLU.

Each professor, with the limitation of a half-hour telecast, will approach the discussion of security from the viewpoint of his own discipline. Interested viewers can obtain a list of readings that will be discussed on the programs by writing the department of speech at PLU.

Appearing on the initial program with Doughty will be Dr. Walter Schnackenberg, chairman of the department of history at PLU, who will present his thoughts and ideas of how history becomes involved in this search for security.

Other dates, programs and guests include: April 10, art, George Elwell, assistant professor of art at PLU; April 17, letters, Dr. Paul Reigstad, associate professor of English at PLU, and Donald Reynolds, instructor of English at PLU; and April 24, music, Dr. Byard Fritts, associate professor of music at PLU.

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KNIGHT TRACKMEN TO OPEN SEASON  
SATURDAY AT PACIFIC UNIVERSITY

PLU will open its track schedule Saturday when the Knight runners travel to Forest Grove, Ore. for a dual meet with Pacific University.

Heading the PLU squad will be a pair of transfers and four lettermen.

Lief Johnsson, a transfer from Lund University in Sweden, and Wendell Brown, an Olympic Junior College transfer, are the top newcomers. Johnsson, who has done 51 feet in the triple jump, finished third in the Washington State University Invitational Indoor Meet last week with a leap of 45 feet. Brown, who will compete in the dashes, took first in the 300 yard-run in the WSU meet.

Lettermen include Terry Brown, PLU record holder in the 880; Craig Knutzen, PLU record holder in the discus; Chuck Snekvik, 880; and Barry Egeland, 440.

Coach Mark Salzman will take an 18-man squad with him to Pacific. Other members include Jeff Carey, javelin; Mark Erlander, long jump and triple jump; Bill Lemke and Les Rucker, hurdles; Dick Mortensen, Bill Mortvedt and John Ott, 880 and mile; Jim Rismiller, high jump; William Russell and Dave Trapp, discus; and Terry Tommervik, 440.

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PLU SWIMMING POOL DRIVE BEGINS  
IN PARKLAND AREA, GOAL \$50,000

A drive in the Parkland area to raise \$50,000 toward the PLU swimming pool began Monday with a kickoff meeting in Chris Knutzen Fellowship Hall.
