Grant allows PLU to explore faculty work

Faculty members are busy, but what are they busy doing? The Associated New American Colleges -- funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts -- gave PLU a \$5,000 grant to be part of a national study of this question through next spring. The study, called the Faculty Work Project, examines the extent to which policies, practices and rewards are consistent and supportive of the purposes expressed in university missions. Dennis M. Martin (English), the project's campus coordinator, said the study started mid-year when PLU took part in a national survey of faculty. The project continues with a series of focus groups, or "coffee klatches," in which Martin asks small groups of professors discussion questions about their work at PLU, how it matches up with what the university wants, and whether or not it is rewarded. Information from PLU and other schools is then carried to discussions at the national level. The study is a "gathering info and finding out" phase of what could be a larger project for ANAC, depending on funding, Martin said -- here the state of faculty work is identified; later there may be funds for modifying problem areas.

Fruit festivals: a taste of summer

Enjoy the flavors of the season this summer as Summer Sessions and Food Services co-sponsor three noontime fruit festivals, with ice cream, fruit and an outdoor performance in Red Square. The Strawberry Festival on June 18 features the cast of A Night of Musical Theatre performing "Summer Lovin,'" a review of hits from "Grease." "Quartet for the End of Time"

Pianist Jairo Geronymo (Music) performs "Quartet for the End of Time," an apocalyptic piece with eight movements, with violinist Lorenz Gamma, cellist Peter Landeen and clarinetist Thuc Nguyen at 8 pm on May 28 in Lagerquist. The concert is free. The work was composed by Olivier Messiaen while at a concentration camp in World War II, and was first performed for 5,000 prisoners, many of whom were put to death a month after the performance. The quartet also gives a live studio performance of the work on "Live by George," a radio program on KING FM, at 8 pm on May 26.

Free airfare to China and back

If you have a project you want to explore in China, check out this opportunity. The Washington State China Relations Council is accepting applications from residents of Washington for its Travel Support Program. Funded by a grant from Northwest Airlines, the program provides round-trip airfare to the People's Republic of China and Hong Kong for economic and cultural projects. Applications demonstrating Chinese sponsorship, detailed itineraries and funding already raised receive particular consideration. Past recipients include lecturers, economists, forestry and agricultural experts, medical professionals and artists. Applications are available from Charry Benston (International Programs), 7628, and are due complete with letters of recommendation by June 14. Awards are announced on July 15.

Explore the wilds and wonders of Yellowstone with Duncan Foley
