P. L. A. Grads Are Linked With Present

Several Descendants Are in Student Body; Three Are on Staff

For several hundred Pacific Lutheran College alumni now scattered miles apart College alumni now scattered miles apart, "the old P.L.A. days" are words magically recalling an era of golden memories of student days in Parkland during the first quarter century of the school's history.

True enough, P.L.U. are the letters still engraved in cement above the main en-trance, recalling that on Oct. 14, 1894, the school opened as a university, but by 1898 the name, "Pacific Lutheran Acad-emy" was in use, and as an academy this Lutheran school in the far west welcomed and bade goodbye to hundreds of young people

GRAND DAUGHTERS AT P.L.C.

It is significant, therefore, that as P.L.C. its fiftieth year, there is genuine evidence within the student body of the past linked with the present. For the first time, as far as can be learned, a great-granddaughter of old P.L.A. is in attendance. Lois Henningsen, freshman in the Liberal Arts department, was pre-ceded by her mother, Mrs. Joe Henningsen (Olga Hauke, '21), and by her grand-mother, Mrs. Peter Henningsen (Petra Holden, PLA 1903), making a three-generation alumni trio from Astoria Ore

A P.L.A. graduate of 1906, Rev. Hans Svinth, has a granddaughter at his alma mater this year, Betty Jane Svinth, of Prospect. Ore., enrolled in the high school department.

For several years children of alumni have been coming back to P.L.C., but this year three members of the staff are in this category. Of special interest is the fact that Isabel Harstad, daughter of George Harstad, PLA '05, and granddaughter of the college's founder. Rev. Bjug Harstad, began her duties this fall as secretary to the new president, Dr. Eastvold.

FATHER-DAUGHTER ON FACULTY

Interesting too, is the fact that there is two-generation combination on the faculty in the persons of Gertrude Tingelstad, '39, who returned to P.L.C. this fall as assistant librarian, and her father, Edwin Tingelstad, PLA '09, who has been on the staff since 1931. Gertrude's mother is the former Ida Fjelde, '12, whose mother, in turn, Mrs. Guri Fielde, was "girls" preceptress" at P.L.A. in 1911. Irene Dahl Hageness, '30, who returned recently to her former position in the office of the registrar, was perhaps the first P.L.C. graduate with alumni parents to join the college staff, in 1930.
