Bishop's Mantle Cast Chosen; Coronation Will Highlight May Day Festivities

Cast in the spring all-school three-act play, "The Bishop's Mantle," are five men and seven women. Try-outs and casting were completed last week, and practice and blocking being Monday evening this week.

Miss Jean MacGregor is director of the show, which will be presented May 16, 17, 18. The comedy-drama takes place in the rector's study of St. Matthew's church in a large Eastern city. A new, young minister, Hilary Laurens comes to take over the parish, which is made up chiefly of the wealthy of the city. When he starts bringing tenement people into the church, trouble begins, and the plot develops around his conflicts and problems.

Opposing Alvord's way of thinking how the church should be run, and helping Hilary with many of his problems, is an elderly member of the church, Mrs. Warner Reed, played by Roberta Schoessler. Samantha Adams, plain wife of Hilary's assistant, and social worker in the tenements, is played by Francis Biery. Mary Perkins McComb, a girl from the tenements, is portrayed by Dorothy Sweet.

Dr. Burton T. Ostenson, head of the biology department, was elected president of the Tacoma Zoological society at its annual meeting April 13. Mrs. Regina Seligh, formerly of the biology faculty at PLC, was re-elected to her post as secretary of the society.

The Zoological society is an organization devoted to furthering interest in zoological things in general and in promoting development of a zoo in Tacoma.

Dr. Ostenson also was recently elected vice-president of the Pacific Northwest Bird and Mammal society, a regional scientific organization with active membership from Alaska to California.

This society publishes the "Murrelet," a quarterly journal devoted to scientific papers on ornithology and mammalogy.

The Gladiator cinder squad will seek their second victory in as many meets tomorrow in a four-way affair at the CPS oval. Seattle Pacific and St. Martin's will complete the draw.

CPS picked up most of their points in the dual meet last week, which the Glads won 69½ to 61½, in the sprints and hurdles. If Harshman can get his boys going in these events you can rate PLC as a dark horse in the coming All-Conference meet and the St. Martin's Relays.

Jim Lund turned out to be a real ironman for the Lute cindermen against CPS. He topped first in the mile and two-mile races and finished second in the 880 for 13 of PLC's points.

Strong in Field Events

In the field events the Harshmen did surprisingly well. Bob Bruns took first in the shotput with a throw of 42 feet, 1½ inches (Cory Magnuson and Ray Green followed in that order to give PLC a sweep in the shotput).

A sweep was also made in the discus with Cory Magnuson tossing it 125 feet, 9½ inches for first place. Ray Green and John Schindler placed second and third.

Dick Gerwald was top honoree in the javelin followed by Paul Garrison.

Kristof Brown won 16 feet, 3 inches in the pole vault by first and Dale Keller and Gene Larson tied for third.

Two Lutes, Bert Wells and Paul Garrison, earned a tie for second in the high jump.

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Shirley Anderson's Activities Not Stopped by Blindness

Blind since infancy, Shirley Anderson, junior in speech, is getting an education and hopes to have a career like any other collegian.

For 11 years she attended the State School for the Blind in Vancouver. She took her senior year at Vancouver high school and attended Clark college in Vancouver for two years. At Clark she sang in the choir, wrote stories for the yearbook, and finished with a 3.54 average in her work.

Last fall Shirley transferred to P.L.C. where she is a member of the choir and gives readings on programs. After graduation she hopes to do extensive writing and speaking. Her education is financed by the rehabilitation program of the state of Washington.

Most people in audience are unaware there is a blind girl in the P.L.C. while she marches in and out and has never blazed out with a note when the rest were's singing.

"I sing every note in every song," she states, "but I sing the first note of a song lightly and at the end of phrases and notes sing the last note softly. I can't see how a director will lead."

Shirley has several aids for study. To clean she takes notes by punching them out in Braille. Her notebooks are old magazines. There are few textbooks in Braille, but she gets supplementary material from Braille books and long-playing phonograph records obtained from the Seattle library. She has the entire Bible in Braille. It has 20 volumes.

Three girls in the dormitory read textbooks for Shirley. They are Jean Nyström, Sally Wisely, and Gertrude DeLatta. One of these girls says, "Shirley has a remarkable memory. We read a paragraph and she knows everything on it."

Like most girls she is clothes conscious. "I learned the hard way," Shirley said. "One day in Vancouver I came to school with one pink outfit and one blue one. Since then I have worn only white ones. Most of my blouses are white, and I try to pick clothes with colors that will not clash."
