GRADUATION ACTIVITIES OPEN FRIDAY WITH PRESIDENT'S RECEPTION

Graduation weekend activities open Friday evening with the annual President's Reception for graduating seniors by Dr. and Mrs. Mortvedt in Chris Knutzen Fellowship Hall.

Alumni Day is scheduled for Saturday with Dr. William K. Ramstad, a 1947 graduate of PLU and president-elect of Shoreline Community College, being the principal speaker at the PLU Alumni Association banquet at 6 p.m. in Columbia Center.

Dr. Ramstad will speak on "Education: Opportunities Unlimited."

The Alumni Association will honor Dr. H. L. Foss, retired president of the PLU board of regents and the North Pacific District of the American Lutheran Church, and Gunnar J. Malmin, who was director of the Choir of the West for 27 years.

A seminar on the subject of "Academic Freedom in A Christian University" will be held in the Jacob Samuelson Chapel in the Administration building at 2:45 p.m.

Other activities include a golf tournament, style show, tea, art exhibition, swimming party, dance and senior review.

Dr. Mortvedt will deliver the sermon at the Baccalaureate service at 11 a.m. Sunday in the Eastvold Chapel auditorium.

Justice Hilbert Schauer of the Colorado Supreme Court will give the feature address at the 69th commencement Sunday at 3:30 p.m. in Memorial Gymnasium.

Degrees will be conferred on 286 seniors while 11 persons will receive master of arts degrees.

SCHOOL OF NURSING
RECEIVES ACCREDITATION

The School of Nursing received notice via telegram on Sunday morning, May 23, that on Saturday, May 22, 1965 the National League for Nursing Collegiate Board of Review voted to grant initial accreditation to the "Baccalaureate Nursing Program" at P.L.U .

This is professional accreditation and though not required is desirable. League accreditation, which is granted by the State Board of Nursing, and which is required, the School has had since its beginning. Be being professionally accredited benefits will accrue to both the students and the University as well as to the School of Nursing. This accreditation comes up for periodic review similar to that for the entire University. Specific recommendations for further development will be forthcoming from the Accrediting Agency at an early date in June
