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FOREWORD

"The Fountain of Life"


On the spacious green lawn outside Kronberg Castle near Frankfurt, Germany, a large fountain gurgles in watery activity by night and by day. Campared to the castle, bulging dark and massive behind it, the fountain seems quite small and insignificant in its constant splashings, and at times it appears to be isolated and lonely. But on a summer night, when heavy clouds have moved down from the north sea under cover of darkness without even a breeze to warn of their approach and have commandeered the countryside, then the fountain at Kronberg is happy and busy, for it is no longer alone and isolated. As though heralding some heavenly guest it welcomes the soft summer rain which disappears into its bubbling waters.

So also with that institution of higher education called the Christian College. It too, at times, seems lanely and isolated as it is placed within its limited formal framework outside the castle walls making its peculiar contribution to the beauty surrounding it. Many a distinguished guest never notices its presence, and few are they who pause by it for a moment of reflection into its waters, or hold out an open hand to feel its fine mist spray. But in that Christian College with its masonry of educational framework is found the fountain-waters of life. Drawing from all the varied sources of the world about it, it makes no claim to uniqueness in the water it uses, for whether they be from the cold high glaciers of philosophy or the coursing torrents of history, the mountain pools of the fine arts or the silent underground seepage of the sciences, they make no distinction and draw as the world draws around them. Its claim comes not then from the waters themselves, but in the way it would use and display those waters to best advantage, and it is to this end that the fountain has been planned and constructed and put into proper motion, for it is in the preconceived formal setting of the Christian College, that life, lived indiscriminately about it, can in it be caught and held in studied motion with a transparency unparalleled in a natural setting.

But the beauty and meaning of the fountain of life which is the Christian College is best seen and understood at those times when the presence of God, the giver and source of all being, spreads cloud-like over the varied geography of life on earth below it, and, whether with a clap of thunder or quietly as on a summer night, gives of his presence to the rugged terrain of humanity below. For although his presence is offered to all, it is in a special way that the Christian College recognize its refreshment and its life-giving substance, and, like the fountain outside Kronberg Castle, welcomes the presence of its heavenly guest which becomes one with its own bubbling waters.

DEDICATION

An inspiration to several generations of college students as teacher, counselor and coach, Marvel K. Harshman left his alma mater in April to take over the position of basketball coach at the State College of Washington.

During his years as a student from 1938 to '41 and as a faculty member from 1955 to '58 he was an inspiration to thousands of students, teachers and friends of the college. Always a Christian gentleman he reflected the ideals of this institution of higher learning in many walks of life.

In his undergraduate days on this campus he was one of the greatest athletes this college has ever produced. He was named to the New York Sun All America football team. For the three seasons ('39 to '41) in which he competed he was the leading collegiate scorer in football on the Pacific Coast. His greatest moment came in 1940 when he kicked a 34 yard field goal from a difficult angle to defeat Gonzaga, 16-13, in the dying seconds of a game played before a throng of 20,000 in the Tacoma Stadium.

In addition to his exploits on the gridiron he was an all-conference basketball player and a versatile track and baseball performer.

During World War II he served in the U. S. Navy as a Chief Petty Officer.
Returning to PLC after the war he was basketball and track coach and assistant in football. In 1951 he became head football and baseball coach and director of athletics, in addition to his basketball assignment.

Harshman's football team won one conference title. His basketball teams won five league championships, five district one NAIA titles, and competed five times in the national NAIA tourney in Kansas City. His hoop teams in 13 seasons won 243 and lost 122, an exceptionally fine record.

Respected by his colleagues and the student body, looked up to as a man of character and conviction, esteemed for his great contributions to the cause of Christian education, he has been a powerful, positive influence on this campus. It is with great pleasure that we dedicate this Saga to Marvel K. Harshman.





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BOARD VOTES MILLION DOLLAR EXPANSION

In December the Board of Trustees inaugurated the PLC development Fund. A long-range program of growth and expansion, it provided an exciting new horizon of opportunity for the College.

Recognizing that in the next few years the number of college-age youth will double in number, the Trustees made bold plans to provide the building and facilities that will be needed to care for these students. Included in the first phase of the plan were these Immediate Needs: An addition to Science Hall; a Social Education Annex for the CUB; a new center for the Education, Business Administration, and Economics departments to be called Tacoma-Pierce Memorial Hall and renovation of the two lower floors of Old Main for men's dormitory rooms and lounges.


A general appeal was made for \$1,000,000. The faculty and staff made the first gifts totalling more than \$75,000. The student body adopted as its project the new swimming pool and pledged \$100,000. Alumni had a goal of \$200,000. Gifts from Tacoma and Pierce County were expected to bring in \$50,000. The Student Voluntary Fund composed of senior and undergraduate gifts raised ALMOST \$10,000.

General Chairman for the appeal was Gerrit Vander Ende, President of Paicfic First Federal Savings and Loan Association. Divisional chairmen were: Herbert G. Socolofsky, Memorial; Marv Tommervik, Alumni; Kristen Solberg, Faculty; Mrs. Anna Enge and Ken Jacobs, Staff; Harold Tollefson, Professional. Construction of the Science Hall addition and the Social Educa-


tion Annex were scheduled to begin in June so that these units

might be ready for occupancy in the fall.

The million dollar appeal was the first step forward in a significant program of advancement for our college. We were fortunate to be present not only as observers, but also as participants in the most important project the College has ever attempted.


PLC ROMPS OVER BRITISH COLUMBIA 26-0





Seattle U. trounced the Gladiators 94-60 as Elgin Baylor stuffed the basket with 51 points and pulled off 37 rebounds to better his own Seattle U. scoring record.

In the preliminary game of the NAIA finals in Washington, the Lutherans bettered Western 85-62. They earned the right to represent District No. 1 by downing Central in a "best of three" series.

The initial contest in the final playoff was a well played, defensive game. As in the conference game in Ellens berg, the Lutes edged the Central Wildcats, this time by a score of 54-51. Free throws proved to be an important factor of the game.

The Lutherans earned their third straight trip back to the national NAIA classic at Kansas City by taking the second game of the District playoff 72-50. It was a rugged contest with 40 fouls being called. The Wildcats were without the services of Bill Coordes, who scored 22 points in the first game, due to a sprained ankle. 
The Lutes, who were seeded fourth in the NAIA Tournament in Kansas City, came from behind in the second half to conquer Eastern New Mexico 76-63. After shooting a cool .278 per cent in the first half, the Gladiators hit 23 of 33 shots in the second period for a .697 percentage.

The Parklanders lost a tense heartbreaker in the last two seconds of an overtime period to Georgetown College of Kentucky 92-91. This was the second straight year the Lutes were eliminated from the tournament by only a one point margin (last year they were shaded 71-70 in the last nine seconds of the semi-final game with Tennessee State).





Mrs. C. K. Malmin, housemother of Old Main passed away February 9, 1958 in a Tacoma


