Dr. W. L. Strunk, professor of biology at Pacific Lutheran College, has announced that three PLC students have been admitted to the University of Washington medical and dental schools. The students are Ken Pate, dental; and Gene Strandness and Don Nothstein, medical. They will begin their course of studies at the start of the fall quarter.

Having three students accepted from PLC is in itself quite an honor, because of the fact that only 75 were admitted out of over 1,000 applications received from throughout the country, stated Dr. Strunk.

Dr. Strunk, who has worked closely with these students, states that he expects high things from them.

Tuition To Be Upped \$25 Next Fall, Eastvold Reveals

A tuition increase of \$25 a semester will become effective next fall, stated Dr. S. C. Eastvold, president of PLC, in chapel this morning. The increase, raising the tuition for the school year to \$350, was authorized at a recent meeting of the board of trustees.

A number of other colleges universities, including the College of Puget Sound, have raised tuition as a means of meeting higher operation costs. Even with the higher fee, PLC is still among the lower rated colleges as far as tuition costs are concerned.

Costs at PLC as compared with other colleges are illustrated by the following statistics. At Reed College the tuition is \$500 plus fees; Lewis and Clark, tuition \$450; Pacific University, tuition \$450, board \$180 (at of \$15 and a library fee of \$10, to- of a private college.

taling \$440; Willammette, tuition \$390, room and board \$470 plus fees (PLC room and board is \$380); Whitman, tuition \$400; College of Puget Sound, tuition \$350. At CPS board is payed on a six-day week basis at \$140 a semester; at PLC day week and is only \$130.

The reason PLC gives so much more for the amount of money than other schools is that the professors here are getting a smaller salary than those of other institutions. The faculty is really sharing expenses with the students.

While tuition is higher at private schools than at state schools, room, board, and other costs are less. Statistics show that students at state PLC board is only \$130); Linfield, colleges often spend more money durtuition \$390 plus a student body fee ing a school year than do students

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



Bud is a former president of the Letterman's Club.


